Where non-wood bats are permitted, only approved “BBCOR” stamped aluminum bats in the 15U AAA and 18U categories will be permitted for use.

Note: 15U A, AA, Tier 1, 2 and 3 players may use -5 (or -3) metal bats.

Note: Junior and Senior Players must use wood or wood composite bats.

Note: Wood or wood composite bats are allowed at all levels and there are no weight requirements for wood bats.

- Maximum differential refers to the difference between the length of the bat (inches) and the weight of the bat (ounces). So, a bat that is 30 inches long and 20 ounces is a -10 bat.
- For the 13U National Championships using up to a minus 10 length/weight differential is permitted. For 16U Girls, 21U Women and Senior Women National Championships a max barrel of 2 3/4" with a 1.15 BPF (Bat Performance Factor) or USA Baseball Model and up to a minus 5 length/weight differential is permitted.
- USSSA 1.15 and USABB bats will be both approved for play under Baseball Canada rules for the 13U and under categories. This allows for all previous & current 2 1/4", 2 5/8" and 2 3/4" USSSA 1.15 certified bats to be used.
- All Post Provincial Championships (Western Canada Championships and Baseball Canada National Championships) for categories 15U 'AAA' and above are wood or wood composite bat only Championships.
- The 17U Canada Cup Championship is a wood, or wood composite bat only championship.

APPENDIX III – Coaching Certification

NATIONAL COACHES CERTIFICATION PROGRAM (N.C.C.P.)

The National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) is a nation-wide training program designed to develop coaching excellence. The levels of the NCCP have been carefully designed by Baseball Canada to meet the needs of a wide range of coaches, from novice to elite.

How do I start my training as a baseball coach?

All coach training by Baseball Canada is now started through an on-line module at <http://nccp.baseball.ca>. Just type this URL into your computer address line. This site was developed by Baseball Canada as part of the *Initiation Coach* program. It is an inter-active self-directed training tool that you complete at your own pace and convenience. It costs \$37.45 (including taxes) and gives you access to on-line video drills, materials, practice plans and skill development tools in an easy to follow format. You continue to have access to the site after completing the on-line portion of the entry course. The focus of this module is on the 'What to Coach?' side of coaching. Once you complete the course you will be given a choice of workshops where the focus will be on the "How to Coach?" side.

Baseball Manitoba A, AA, and Tiers 1-3 Provincial Championships

Process:

- a) Baseball Manitoba will review all teams attending Provincial Championships 10 days in advance of the event. The 10-day requirement is only possible for leagues that inform Baseball Manitoba of their league reps at a minimum of 2 weeks prior to the event. The earlier Baseball Manitoba gets provincial reps the better the chance is for leagues/coaches to be informed in a good amount of time.
- b) League Presidents will be informed which coaches have not completed the necessary certification and which certification is needed. The league can deal with this in any of the following ways:
 1. Remove the coach from the roster entirely.
 2. Remove the coach from the roster and replace them with another coach (who meets the requirements) and has been rostered on another team for the 2024 season.
 3. Inform the coach what certification is missing and that they are eligible to be on the roster if it is completed by the Tuesday prior to Provincials. This is possible for requirements that can be completed online, such as My First Pitch, Coach Initiation Online, etc., but is not possible for clinics that are only offered in-person, ie. the Initiation Coach Clinic.
 4. Pay a \$50 levy and the lack of certification will be forgiven for this season and the coach is allowed to be rostered. This is only allowed once per coach and if the coach is delinquent in the future the levy will not be an option and the coach will automatically be removed from the roster.
- c) Baseball Manitoba will assume that the coach will be removed from the roster unless the league informs Baseball Manitoba of their preferred route. If they choose #3 it is expected that they will inform Baseball Manitoba when the coach has completed the required training.
- d) If #4 is chosen for one or more coaches the league will be invoiced by Baseball Manitoba for the entire amount and they can choose how to be reimbursed by the local association.

APPENDIX III – Coach Certification Process

Baseball Manitoba AAA provincials

The same process as above will be followed except:

- The AAA certification is more intense, therefore requires more in-person clinics. The fee would be \$50 per clinic that is missing should the league/coach choose this option.
- Baseball Manitoba has no jurisdiction on WCBA or National events therefore the fee option would only be available for Baseball Manitoba Provincial Championships and the coach would be removed from the roster for any WCBA or National event.

The optional levy to allow for participation in provincials can only be used when Baseball Canada Clinic certification is what the coach is lacking. Baseball Manitoba Screening devices ie. RIS, CRC, etc. necessary to be coaching at that level are a mandatory requirement.

Deadline

All coaches (A, AA, and AAA) must have the appropriate certification done by June 15th.

FAQ

Why does Baseball Manitoba have coach certification standards for AAA baseball?

The coaches for Baseball Manitoba teams that attend National (Baseball Canada) or Western Canada Baseball Championships must have the certification required by that organization. Our provincial requirements typically align with those.

Why does Baseball Manitoba have coach certification standards for non-AAA baseball?

Baseball Manitoba wants registered players and coaches to have experiences that are both fun and developmental. The coach certification we require helps prepare coaches to follow through on that goal whether they are new to the sport, new to coaching, or experienced on both. We also believe the time commitment required to do this training is within reason for a non-AAA coach. The standards for AAA are much more time consuming, but we do encourage all coaches to take training above and beyond what is required.

APPENDIX III – Coach Certification Process

Why does Baseball Manitoba only check the certification levels of coaches attending Provincial Championships?

The process of checking the certification of each coach is very time consuming and Baseball Manitoba does not have the staff or budget to check all the coaches in our province. This may change in the future but is the case as of now. We feel that with the number of provincials that are offered at the different levels that this method of checking allows us to monitor a large portion of the coach community and hope that local leagues and local associations do their part to ensure coaches get the proper certification.

Why does Baseball Manitoba fine coaches that do not have the proper certification?

The consequence to a coach that does not have the proper level of certification is removal from the roster which means they cannot coach in the provincials. We do allow the coach a one-time option to pay a levy which will allow them to coach in that provincial (based on the approval of their league). This levy is consistent with what the coach would have paid to attend that clinic. There is no fine applied if the coach chooses to not coach in the provincials.

Why can a coach get away with not taking their proper certification by paying their way out of it?

There are many reasons why a coach did not take the proper certification that season and often these reasons are legitimate and could not be avoided. This levy provides some discretion and allows the person to coach the team. It is only allowed for one season and very seldom does a person find themselves in the role of coach for only one season, so they will very likely get the training in the following season.

Why is there a screening process for Baseball Manitoba coaches?

We realize that online courses like Respect in Sport and Rule of Two may be time consuming for the coaches, but the idea behind the screening processes is to do our best to ensure there is a safe environment for the players and the coaches. These courses have shown as some of the best options to provide the education needed for that to occur.

APPENDIX III – Coach Apprentice Program

The Apprentice Coach Mentoring Program has been developed to help recruit and train more young coaches. Apprentice appointments can be made at any competitive level (A, AA, & AAA) and age division (11U to 18U). The program allows for coach mentorship to replace the required clinics as a form of training for the season. The program has the following features:

Apprentice Coaches must:

- Be accepted as an Apprentice by a Head Coach who is fully certified for age and competition level of the team under consideration.
- Be approved as an Apprentice Coach by the local baseball association in charge of the team.
- Complete the **Respect-in-Sport** online course not later than two weeks into the season.
- Not be a parent of any player on the team.
- Be subject to any current club or association requirements for child-abuse and criminal registry checks, just like any other rostered coach.
- Be older than the players in the age group they are coaching (ideally multiple years older).

Mentor Coaches must:

- Be approved as a Mentor Coach by the local baseball association in charge of the team.
- Accept the Apprentice Coach and ensure the support of the local baseball association for the appointment.
- Commit to helping develop the Apprentice's coaching skills throughout the season.

Clubs Administering the Program will:

- Ensure that there is a maximum of 2 apprentice coaches per team and a maximum of one apprentice coach per mentor.
- Be responsible for reviewing and approving the participation of any individual Apprentice and their Mentor.
- Be responsible for ensuring completion of RIS by the Apprentice and responding to any substantive issues that may arise during the season.
- Ensure that roster forms submitted through RAMP to Baseball Manitoba include any Apprentice Coaches labelled as such.
- Understand that Baseball Manitoba does not oversee competitions beyond Provincial Championships, therefore the Apprentice Coach would not be authorized to participate in Western Canadian or National Championships should the team advance.

Future Coaching for Apprentice:

- Apprentice Coaches at the A & AA levels are only able to remain in the program for one season. The coach would be required to complete the regular NCCP training requirements for future coaching.
- Apprentice Coaches at the AAA level can remain in the program for a second year should they choose. The requirements of remaining in the program include the apprentice to become **NCCP Initiation Trained** or complete the **AAA Core Clinics**: Absolutes, Planning, and Teaching & Learning.

APPENDIX IV – Umpire Certification

NATIONAL OFFICIAL’S CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Developing better officials is one of the goals of the National Officials Certification Program (NOCP), a nation-wide standardized program. Five levels of competency provide officials with the necessary instruction to officiate from club sports all the way up to international competition. The program is sport specific, and baseball's five levels are divided in the following manner:

APPENDIX VI – Pitch Count Rules

Pitch Count Regulations

- Any player on the team is eligible to pitch and there are **NO** restrictions to the number of pitchers a coach may use in a game. This includes 9-year-old players in the 11U age category.
- An appearance shall be defined as 1 pitch thrown or more.
- Pitchers are permitted to have a maximum of 2 appearances in the same calendar day. If a pitcher requires a rest following the 1st appearance, they cannot return to pitch in the same day. (Example: a 13U pitcher throws 29 pitches in their 1st appearance. That pitcher has not reached a rest threshold and may pitch in another game that calendar day. Another 13U pitcher throws 40 pitches in their 1st appearance. That pitcher has exceeded the no-rest threshold of 30 pitches and cannot pitch for the remainder of the day). The official scorekeeper will calculate the total pitches thrown for that calendar day and determine the required rest starting the next calendar day. These two appearances would only occur if 2 or more games are being played on the same day.
- Every pitch thrown in the game is counted (including foul tips, and all foul balls). Warm-up pitches between innings, or when a new pitcher enters the game, are not part of the count.
- A pitcher cannot pitch 3 consecutive days unless a pitcher's first two (2) days combined does not exceed:

11U: 25 13U: 30 15U: 35 18U: 40 22U: 45

If a pitcher's Day 1 + Day 2 total exceeds the figure shown above (and Rule 8 was not applied), they require at least one day's rest. A pitcher cannot pitch four consecutive days. Minimally one days rest is required. (Example: A 13U Pitcher throws 15 pitches on Day 1 (Friday). That same pitcher throws 10 pitches on Day 2 (Saturday). The two-day total is 25 pitches, which is less than the limit of 30. This pitcher can pitch on Day 3 (Sunday) to their maximum limit, which for 13U is 85.

- The official scorekeeper will calculate the total pitches thrown for that calendar day and determine the required rest (if any) starting the next calendar day. Athletes must **not** exceed the maximum pitch count total for that day. If there is no official Pitch Count scorekeeper, the home team Pitch Count scorekeeper will become the official Pitch Count scorekeeper.
 - Once a player assumes the role of pitcher, they cannot catch for the remainder of the day. This rule allows a player to catch, and then pitch in the same game or the same day. However, a player cannot pitch and then catch in the same game or day.
 - When a pitcher reaches the maximum number of pitches allowed for a threshold, he can complete the at-bat without the penalty on days of rest, if he does not pitch to another batter. In this situation, the number of pitches corresponding to the threshold reached will be indicated on the pitching log. The coach or manager needs to acknowledge this to the umpire at this moment prior to the next pitch. The Umpire would then notify the scorekeeper.
- EXAMPLE: 13U Pitcher uses 10 pitches on Friday. On Saturday, the coach declares on his/her 19th pitch of the day that the pitcher will finish the batter (Using Rule 8). The pitcher finished the batter, using 4 pitches – making a 2-day total of 33. He/she will then be eligible to pitch on Sunday, being marked for 30 pitches.*
- Pitchers will be permitted to finish the batter if their maximum pitch limit has been reached for that calendar day. (e.g. 75 for a 11U pitcher, 85 for a 13U pitcher)
 - Intentional walks will be included in Pitch Count totals. Only pitches actually thrown will be included in Pitch Count totals. Automatic balls during an intentional walk do not count towards Pitch Count totals.
Example: if during a count of 2 balls - 0 strikes, a team signals to the umpire that a batter will receive an intentional walk, only 2 pitches will be counted for pitch count.
 - Required Rest shall be defined in "Days" starting at 12:01 a.m. and ending at 11:59 p.m. of the next calendar day.
 - A pitcher who is removed from the mound during the game shall not be permitted to return to pitch in the same game, even if the pitcher is retained in the game in another position.
 - Baseball Canada's Pitch Rules that do NOT apply in Manitoba (from the Baseball Canada Rule Book – Canadian Content: Rule 6.02(3): 2-day and Rule 6.02(4) [second half]: 4 day.

APPENDIX IX – Travel Assistance

Travel Assistance / Hotel Fee

Baseball Manitoba will provide the attending team with a \$5,000 Travel Assistance Grant for attending National Championships.

As per the Senior Council, the Senior All Star team attending Nationals will also receive \$10 per Senior Player towards Travel costs.

Travel Assistance to Western Canada Championship competition, will be available for AAA teams, as noted in the chart below. There is no Travel Assistance for any intra-provincial competition which takes place in Manitoba.

AVOIDING AND PREVENTING HEAT RELATED INJURIES WHILE PLAYING BASEBALL




Guidelines


- 1** Avoid dehydration and make sure you pre-hydrate





2hrs before → 500 ml
1 hr before → 250 ml
During (Every 15 mins) → 125-250 ml
Immediately After → 500 ml
1 hr after → 500 ml of chocolate milk



- 2** You should drink at least 500 ml for every 9 kg of body weight
- 3** Drinking carbohydrate/electrolyte fluids may be beneficial in avoiding heat trauma
- 4** Wearing light breathable clothing is advised.
- 5** Officials should be very cautious in authorizing games and practices in environments where the temperature plus humidity combined are 35 C and over. Unlimited substitution is recommended during games as is frequent fluid breaks

Main types of injuries

- 1** **Under Heat Cramps**
 weakness, muscle cramps, collapse with low blood pressure.
 Treatment to replace the salt loss can be orally or by intravenous if vomiting is a problem.
- 2** **Heat Exhaustion**
 weakness, irritability, collapse, unable to sweat adequately, a fine rash is often present.
 Remove athlete to a cooler environment, use ice baths, fans
- 3** **Heat Stroke**  **Medical Emergency call 911**
 mental confusion, headache, poor coordination, delirium, convulsions and death. The body temperature may be 106 F or 40.5 C or higher, the skin is usually hot and dry as the sweating mechanism has failed.
 Rapid cooling is the goal using wet towels, spray mist, sponge baths and removal from the heat. This condition could cause the athlete to go into shock and coma may follow so immediate medical attention is required.

Western Canada and National Championships

CHEF DE MISSION

BASEBALL CANADA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Baseball Canada requires a Chef de mission from each team for National Championships. The Chef de mission, or Business Manager, is to serve as the representative of the team and Baseball Manitoba, may travel with the team and be responsible for the team's conduct (in conjunction with the head coach) off the field.

The Chef de mission should be the primary point of contact for the team in its dealing with Baseball Canada officials and the host committee.

These dealings include, but are not limited to:

- Must attend all meetings at the National Championships (even if this means missing a team game)
- Team transportation issues
- Team accommodation issues
- Team meal issues
- Protests involving the team
- Team Discipline
- Tournament rescheduling that affects the team
- Any team-related financial issues

The Chef de mission must always be available and reachable by the Host Committee and Baseball Canada representatives and thus cannot be a coach. The Chef de mission should be familiar with the information in the Baseball Canada Participants Guide.

This is an important position, as this person not only acts for the team, but also represents Baseball Manitoba. A Tournament post event report is required by Baseball Manitoba following the championship. The Chef de mission will receive \$100.00 for their duties following the submission of the report.

WESTERN CANADA CHAMPIONSHIPS

For Western Canada Championships, the host province may appoint a Master Chef, who serves as the Chef for all teams. This person will liaison with the Western Canada Rep and the Host Committee and will be responsible for team conduct (in conjunction with the head coach) off the field, and any issues arising including accommodations.



Baseball Canada RBI Program

(Recognizing Baseballs Ideals)

Winnipeg South Minor Baseball Association was the first Baseball Canada RBI Approved Program in Canada. Since then, Red River Valley, North Winnipeg, St. James, South Central and Carillon have been approved. Carillon has gone so far as to have all of their baseball communities RBI approved.

The RBI Program was introduced in 2008 by Baseball Canada to:

- Ensure that local baseball associations apply core common criteria to ensure that consistent good practices are in place
- To ensure that RBI Accredited Associations are recognized through a common approach to branding.
- To provide a focus around which all baseball associations in Canada can come together to support good practice in working with children and young people.
- To promote and reward registration/membership within Baseball Canada, as well as within the Provincial Baseball Associations.

2025 “AAA” QUALIFIERS

- The Zone 1 Winnipeg “AAA” playoffs (WABA) will be one Qualifier for 13U and 15U. The Zone 2 qualifier will be a tournament format and involve all Zone 2 AAA for 13U and 15U. 18U will use the regular season standings after the 18U AAA scheduled league games have completed – this will determine the team’s placement in Tier 1 or 2 and rank them.
- Manitoba will have a maximum of 13 AAA Teams in all categories. When all 13 teams enter, there will be an 8 team Tier 1 and 5 team Tier 2 event in each category. If less than 13 teams enter, there will be a 6 team Tier 1 event, and the remaining teams will enter the Tier 2 event.

If there are 13 AAA Teams

- 13U and 15U - 3 of the 5 Zone 1 teams would advance to the Tier 1 event. 5 of the 8 Zone 2 teams would also advance. This will result in an 8-team Tier 1 Provincial Championship and a 5 team Tier 2 Championship.

If there are less than 13 Teams

- 13U and 15U - 3 of the 5 WABA teams would advance to the Tier 1 event. The top 3 Zone 2 teams would also advance. This will result in a 6-team Tier 1 Provincial Championship and the remaining teams would make up the Tier 2 Championship. If there are less than 5 Zone 1 teams, the Competition Committee may decide to award an extra spot to Zone 2.

Note: 18U AAA tie-breaking procedures, due to there not being a tournament, will be determined by the Competition Committee.

- No pick-ups are available for AAA Provincials, as all teams qualify for either Tier 1 or Tier 2. Player additions from the team’s region and outside the AAA league may be done after the Qualifiers.

APPENDIX XIV – Residency Rules

RESIDENCY RULES

1. Each league, in conjunction with Baseball Manitoba, determines the actual geographic boundaries of the area from within which it shall select players. These boundaries must be described in detail, shown on a map and dated.
2. Any disputes regarding boundaries between leagues, and final determinations of boundaries will be made by the sub-committee of the Competition Committee.
3. For Baseball Manitoba purposes the principal residence for all 18U age category and younger players shall be the actual physical structure in which the person resides (not box office) as of April 1. This is the designated geographical area where the primary care giver resides.
4. An “address of convenience” is not permitted. Baseball Manitoba does not recognize temporary relocation for baseball registration purposes only. The penalty for violation of this rule may result in the disqualification of a player, team, or entire league from regular season and/or provincial championship competition.
5. Residence is established by:
 - a) The parents’ usual residence when parents live in the same house, or if one of the parents is deceased, the usual residence of the surviving parent as of January 1 of the current calendar year.
 - b) In cases where parents do not live in the same residence, the legal residence is the usual residence of the parent having legal custody of the player; or, if both parents have legal custody, the usual residence of the parent with whom the player usually lives; or again, if the player lives equally with both parents, his place of residence shall be determined by Baseball Manitoba as of January 1 of the current calendar year.
 - c) When legal custody has been granted to a third person, the usual residence of that person (in which case there must be a Court order or other lawful proof of guardianship) as of April 1 of the current calendar year.

NOTE: The term “usual residence” is defined as four (4) out of seven (7) days.

NOTE: In the application of the above, the term “legal custody” and/or “legal guardian” refers to the granting of custody as determined by a Court of Law in one of the following circumstances:

- a) the application of the Divorce ACT,
- b) in the case of an order enforcing or recognizing a legal separation agreement,
- c) loss of parental authority,
- d) when it is deemed the child’s development is compromised,
- e) when both (2) parents are deceased,
- f) married, or the equivalent of married

APPENDIX XIV – Residency Rules (cont.)

6. Players who are required to change residence and continue to live with their parents will automatically be released.
7. If a player moves with parent or guardians, new residency for purpose of baseball must be established prior to April 1 of the current calendar year.
8. Baseball Manitoba shall retain the right to request the information listed below, but is not limited to, in order to confirm residency status. Residence shall be established and supported by documents dated on or in force between April 1st of the previous year and April 1st of the current year, from three or more of the following categories to determine residency of such parent(s) or guardian:
 - i. Property Tax Assessment
 - ii. Current utility statement or credit card statement (i.e. gas, electric, water, phone)
 - iii. Manitoba Driver's License
 - iv. Rental agreement or bill of purchase of new residence
 - v. Voter's Registration
 - vi. Welfare / Child Care Records
 - vii. Local (municipal) Records
 - viii. Insurance Documents
 - ix. Military Records
 - x. Internet, Cable, or Satellite Records
 - xi. Vehicle Records
 - xii. Financial Records (loan, credit, investments, etc.)
9. Any documents submitted as proof of residence must show customary usage or consumption to demonstrate bona fide continuous habitation by Baseball Manitoba in its discretion. It is recommended that leagues require some proof of residence within the league's boundaries at the time the player registers. Players and their parents/guardians are advised that a false statement of residence may lead to ineligibility to baseball.
10. If the claim for residency is challenged, three of the above materials must be submitted to Baseball Manitoba, with an affidavit of residency from the parent(s) or guardian. Baseball Manitoba shall decide the issue, in its sole discretion, and that decision will be final and binding. Residency documents must illustrate that the residence (as defined above) was inside the league's boundaries throughout the regular season.

Sport Manitoba's RESPECT IN SPORT PROGRAM

Sport Manitoba and Baseball Manitoba believe in being proactive to ensure sport in our province is safe and welcoming for all participants. Respect in Sport helps us promote those values through a simple and convenient on-line training course for coaches and sport leaders. It is designed as a tool to assist coaches in identifying and dealing with abuse, neglect, harassment and bullying in sport. Respect in Sport enables coaches to deal with legal and moral responsibilities, making them less vulnerable and more confident in dealing with sensitive issues. A risk management tool, Respect in Sport will help sport organizations reduce liability.

As a mandatory Sport Manitoba requirement, all coaches from all sports (every Rally Cap, Grand Slam, “A”, “AA” and “AAA” baseball coach) MUST have the “Respect in Sport for Activity Leaders” course completed by May 15 or their name will be removed from the roster. The Hockey Parent version is NOT valid for a Baseball coach.

The course is three hours in length but can be completed at the coach's leisure, in its entirety or in segments at their own pace. The program is available in both English and French and is provided free of charge to all coaches. **To complete this course, go to <https://www.baseballmanitoba.ca/content/Respect-in-Sport>**

For those coaches who completed their Respect in Sport for coaches over 5 years ago, they must **recertify** with the new two and a half hour Respect in Sport for Activity Leaders course as part of their requirements of being a coach in Manitoba. Recertification was always a requirement of the program but has not been available until now. If the email address on their Respect in Sport Profile is correct and hasn't changed, they should have received an email from the Respect in Sport group letting them know they need to re-certify or their certificate will no longer be active. All coaches should be encouraged to check if their Respect in Sport is still valid.

To sign in – you will need your username (your PSO as well as Coaching Manitoba will have) and your special date (this is your birthdate). Once coaches have completed the RIS-Activity Leaders course, they will have 5 years until they are required to recertify. At that time, they will receive an automated email from the Respect Group letting them know it is time to recertify to stay active.





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
