HIGHLIGHTS OF 2022-2023



Pilot Project - North American Super Series

The 2022-2023 fiscal year marked the launch of an exciting new initiative for broomball in North America: the North American Super Series. This pilot project was the result of a collaborative effort between the Canadian Broomball Federation (CBF) and the American Broomball Association (ABA), aimed at creating a high-level international competition to fill the gap between World Championship years.

Inception and Purpose

Recognizing the need for more frequent international competition, CBF board members, led by High Performance Coordinator Racim Kebbab, and ABA President Dave St. Aubin, spearheaded the development of the North American Super Series. The objective was to establish an annual event that would provide elite athletes from the two leading broomball nations—Canada and the USA—with additional opportunities to compete at the highest level.

The Super Series was designed as a best-of-five series, with national teams from both countries competing across three divisions: men, women, and mixed. This format not only heightened the competitive stakes but also fostered a spirit of camaraderie and sportsmanship between the two nations.

The 2022 Pilot Event

The inaugural North American Super Series took place under unique and challenging circumstances. With very little preparation time, the event was scheduled for September 2022 in Minneapolis, Minnesota—the only available time slot that fit the calendars of both the ABA and CBF. Despite the short notice, the timing proved advantageous, as it provided both Canadian and US national teams with a critical opportunity to prepare for the upcoming World Championships in November.



impact and Future Prospects

The successful execution of the pilot event highlighted the potential of the North American Super Series to become a staple in the broomball calendar. Key impacts and future prospects include:

- Increased Competitive Opportunities: By providing an additional international competition, the Super Series helps maintain high performance standards and keeps athletes engaged and motivated between World Championships.
- **Strengthening Bilateral Relations:** The event fostered stronger ties between the CBF and ABA, paving the way for future collaborations and joint initiatives to promote broomball.
- **Community Engagement:** The series attracted significant attention from the broomball community and sports enthusiasts, enhancing the visibility of the sport and inspiring younger players to aspire to international competition.
- **Development of Talent**: The intense competition and high stakes of the series offer valuable experience for players and coaches, contributing to the overall development of broomball talent in both countries.
- **Preparation for Worlds:** The timing of the series provided an excellent training opportunity for both Canadian and US national teams, allowing them to fine-tune their strategies and skills ahead of the World Championships in November. This real-time competitive environment was invaluable in preparing the teams for the high stakes of the Worlds.



The CBF is committed to building on the success of the pilot project, working closely with the ABA to refine and expand the North American Super Series. The positive feedback and enthusiasm generated by the inaugural event have set the stage for an even more exciting and competitive series in the future.

We extend our gratitude to all the players, coaches, officials, and supporters who contributed to the success of the pilot event. Their dedication and passion for broomball are what drive the sport forward and inspire us to continually seek new ways to grow and enhance the game.



HIGHLIGHTS OF 2022-2023

Senior National Championship

The 2022-2023 Senior National Broomball Championships were held in Longueuil, Quebec, attracting over 25 teams from across the country. This year's event featured an exciting addition: the Masters Men's division. The inclusion of this new category was made possible through a partnership with the Canadian Forces, who sent a team to compete, adding a unique and competitive edge to the tournament.

The championships witnessed an impressive display of skill and determination, culminating in a Quebec sweep across all four categories:



LACE TO THE TOP PROGRAM

Our Lace to the Top program is an innovative initiative aimed at introducing new athletes to the sport of broomball through school-based activities. The program includes a comprehensive coaches' workbook and player scorecards designed to track skill development. Athletes progress through five different levels, each represented by a distinct color of laces. As they acquire new skills, they graduate to the next color, providing a tangible sense of achievement and motivation. This year, 20 schools participated in the program, resulting in over 1,700 kids being introduced to the exciting world of broomball. Through Lace to the Top, we are building a strong foundation for the future of broomball by nurturing young talent and fostering a love for the sport from an early age.


SPECIAL INITIATIVES PROGRAM





INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Fédération canadienne de ballon sur glace / Canadian Broomball Federation

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Fédération canadienne de ballon sur glace / Canadian Broomball Federation, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Fédération canadienne de ballon sur glace / Canadian Broomball Federation as at March 31, 2023, and the results of its activities and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Federation derives revenue from program fees the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Federation. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to program fees, deficiency of revenue over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended March 31, 2023 and 2022, current assets as at March 31, 2023 and 2022, and net assets as at March 31, 2023 and 2022 for both 2021 and 2022. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2022 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Federation in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Federation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Federation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

APPENDIX A Audited Financial Statements

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Federation's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit, in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
 as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the
 override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Federation's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Federation to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. PURPOSE OF THE NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATION

The Fédération canadienne de ballon sur glace / Canadian Broomball Federation (the Federation) is an organization of volunteers whose mission is to increase awareness and level of skill of the sport of broomball both across Canada and in other countries. The organization is incorporated under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act as a non-profit organization and is therefore exempt from income tax.

The organization derives 85% (2022 - 86%) of its revenue from a single grantor.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Revenue recognition

a) The Federation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions (Grants). Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when they are received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Registration fees, hosting fees and sponsorships are recognized as revenue once the event for which the fee was paid has occurred.

Affiliation fees are recognized as revenue over the period to which they relate.

Program fees, which comprise rule books and coaching fees, are recognized as revenue when the order has been placed and the goods have been shipped and the events has occurred.

Fines are recorded as revenue once they have been levied by the appropriate committee of the Federation.


Cash and cash equivalents

b) The Federation's policy is to present bank balances and term deposits with a maturity period of three months or less from the date of acquisition under cash and cash equivalents.

Management's use of estimates

c) The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the reporting date, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses for the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. Significant financial statements items that require the use of estimates are as follows: accrued liabilities and deferred revenues These estimates are reviewed periodically and adjustments are made, as appropriate, in the statement of operations in the year they become known.





Financial instruments

d) The Federation initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost consist of cash, accounts receivable and investments.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost consist of accounts payable and accrued liabilities as well as refundable bond deposits.

Transaction costs related to financial instruments subsequently measured at amortized cost are included in the original cost of the asset or liability and recognized in income over the life of the instrument using the straight-line method.

Financial instruments impairment

Financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost are tested for impairment if there are indications of e) possible impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, either directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment loss not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in net income.

Tangible capital assets

f) Purchased tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed tangible capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Amortization is recorded at the following rates, which have been established by estimates of useful lives. Additions during the current year are amortized at one-half their normal rates, and no amortization is taken in the year of disposition. Amortization expense is reported in the statement of operations.

Furniture and equipment

6 yrs straight line

When a tangible capital asset no longer has any long-term service potential for the Federation, the excess of its net carrying amount over any residual value should be recognized as an expense in the statement of operations.

Contributed materials and services

Volunteers contribute many hours per year to assist the Federation in carrying out its service delivery g) activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements. Contributed materials are recognized at their fair value.
