

Treasurer's Report for CRMHA – Fiscal 2017 - 2018

We have provided everyone with a balance sheet and a comparative income statement for the year ending March 31, 2018. The comparative numbers on the income statement relate to the budget approved by the executive in the fall of 2017.

Overall cash at the end of March was \$136,000, including \$2,800 in the gaming account and \$2,400 in the provincial travel account. We continue to hold a GIC for security on the raffle application in the amount of \$27,718.

Our registration fees, totaling almost \$180,000, were down this year by about 30 registrants. We made up for most of these lost kids with the first shift program but of course the revenue was lower for this program. Along with lower registration, the raffle revenue was down as well to \$48,000. Our tournaments were very successful fundraisers with tournament revenues totaling \$55,500. Finally, once again, we were approved for our gaming grant and received \$68,000 to cover ice costs. Total revenues from all sources at \$407,866.94.

As for the expenses, our clinic costs overall were close to budget although the mix changed in the year for a total of \$43,350. We spent \$22,400 on equipment this year and \$150,000 on ice. Referee costs came in at almost \$38,500 and overall tournament costs at \$52,400 with budgeted costs at \$47,000 and \$51,100 respectively. Total expense for operations in the fiscal 2017 – 2018 totaled \$428,407.32.

We incurred an overall annual deficit of \$20,540.38 – we did budget for a deficit this year and came very close to that.

There was a great balance of new faces and experienced individuals at the executive table this year, as well as many new and returning coaches and organizational volunteers. I thank each of them for their outstanding commitment and service to the hockey kids of Campbell River. It is hoped that you can look back on your involvement and recognize the value that you brought to the game and the players.

House league playoffs were exciting for the players and fans – congratulations to the Midget Northstars, Bantam Chiefs, Peewee Icebreakers and Atom Storm for winning their respective CRMHA playoff championships. Our feedback from the recreational divisions was positive indicating that the league was balanced and competitive this season. Our female Hurricane teams were strong throughout Island League play resulting in our Midget Hurricanes capturing the Island Playoff Banner and the Peewee Hurricanes winning the League Banner. We're very proud of our legacy of a strong female hockey program in Campbell River and we look forward to continuing to build upon its success in the coming years.

In competitive hockey, the Bantam A Tyees swept the Island League playoffs to win the Banner and advance to the Provincial Championships in Hollyburn. There, they won provincial bronze with a decisive 9-0 win over the South Zone team. Congratulations to the Bantam Tyees! CRMHA teams in the rep program were for the most part competitive in their respective divisions in Island League this season and we have had many successful tournaments on and off the Island in both recreational and competitive hockey. With the Island League T1 zone team implementation in the 2018-2019 season, we will see a change to our rep program with players from CRMHA having the option to try out for a North Island T1 team. We will continue to have rep teams in Island League T2 (A team) and possibly T3 (B team) as we have in seasons past.

As the season comes to a close, I like to reflect on what has been accomplished this year. I am very proud to have worked with fellow volunteers with great enthusiasm and level headed decision making ability. It has been our goal to guide the association by focusing on financial responsibility, creating player development opportunities and supporting our volunteers and community.

Financial and administrative responsibility:

- Maintained registration numbers at a time when numbers are decreasing district and province wide.
- Retained grant funding in the amount of \$68 000 per year.
- Streamlined online registration and maintained fees that are among the lowest in the Province.
- Transition package to meet the requirements of the new BC Societies Act underway.
- Advocated on behalf of CRMHA during the facility needs assessment and the project development phase for proposed upgrades to Strathcona Gardens
- Advocated for CRMHA with our governing bodies and fellow MHAs.
- Maintained a hardship fund to cover registration and equipment costs so that all Campbell River Kids have the opportunity to play.

Player development:

- Provided a progressive goalie development program with weekly ice sessions throughout the season for each division.
- Entered into a development services contract with Bryce Cockburn investing in development of both players and coaching staff.
- Successful delivery of IP 1-4 program and investment in new dividers.
- Hosted Esso Fun Days and The First Shift Program in partnership with Bauer, Hockey Canada and Canadian Tire.
- Invested in advanced clinics for coaching staff.
- Hosted Future Stars Female Development Camp with Olympian Brianne Jenner.

Supporting our volunteers and community:

- Good retention of existing volunteers and recruitment of new volunteers.
- Participated in numerous community initiatives including; providing Christmas for families in need, donations of socks, coats and food to those living below the poverty line in Campbell River.

While we have had much success, the season has not been without challenges; there are areas where I know we can improve. This year, we have had to focus on code of conduct. As President, it is my responsibility to ensure that our Association provides an environment that is supportive for members; where players, parents, coaches and volunteers can participate in their respective roles without fear of recrimination, abuse and disrespect. I ask that all members respect the code of conduct. Respect referees, especially our youngest officials, who are also developing and doing their best to ensure games are fair and safe.

Our objective throughout each season is to try to provide our members with the best opportunities and experiences possible at every level. To support and advocate for the players and for each of our programs. We base decisions on the delivery of quality programs and commit to adhering to the CRMHA Policies & Procedures, Constitution and Bylaws as well as the rules and regulations of Vancouver Island Amateur Hockey Association, BC Hockey and Hockey Canada.

It's our job to provide a framework that allows kids to enjoy the experience while developing hockey skills and learning life lessons. We have realized successes and experienced disappointments; but through it all, we will continue to evolve, to work for the players, to build upon what we've learned to drive continuous improvements and deliver a program we can all be proud of.

CRMHA Registrar / Association Manager 2017/2018

The CRMHA 2017-18 season saw a slight decrease in registration with numbers being just under 500 compared to approximately 515 last season. Mini Hockey school and Rep Try outs also saw 20 less skaters this year. Female registration stayed the same.

We were fortunate enough to host the First Shift Program this year which is hosted by Canadian Tire, Bauer and Hockey Canada. The program is for designed to ensure a positive experience for new-to-hockey families, and consists of head to toe Bauer equipment, and 6 on ice sessions. Of the 30 registered, CRMHA had 28 players fall in love with hockey and signed up to finish the season, bringing our total registered players for the 2017-18 season at approximately 525.

Online registration is working well, with less hiccups this season than in previous years, as Hockey Canada continues to fine tune the program. Online registration will open again in June for the 2018-19 season.

Allocation of our total registration (by birthyear) is below with a brief division summary:

PreNovice - 10% (8% in 2016)

Both PreNovice minor and major divisions had a great season with a ton of new parent volunteers! We did have an increase in our pre-novice registration with various levels of skaters which can sometimes prove challenging for coaches. However, the season was a huge success as kids and parents fell in love with the game.

Novice - 16% (18% in 2016)

Our Novice H3 and H4 divisions ran very smoothly this season with the implementation of the new program. Keeping the players separate based on age made the season very cut and dry, with no development or skill set being used as a factor. The age division (team formation) was easy to follow...however, what posed as frustrating for some parents was travelling to other communities and playing teams that had low numbers so were rostered with mixed ages. There were some confused parents who assumed it was a CRMHA decision to keep ages separate, and it was re-enforced time and again that this is not the case.

Our H4 division was split into 4 even teams from the onset of the season and we were able to kept those teams the same throughout the whole season, parents loved this and kids were able to bond with their teammates. The feedback from parents in H3 was overall good, a little bit of frustration in the beginning of the season as teams were formed for development purposes. All in all, CRMHA is doing well and enjoying the new format for PreNovice and Novice divisions.

Atom - 20% (18% in 2016)

Atom house was a bit of a struggle this year as we drafted smaller teams in anticipation of new kids joining from First Shift later in the season. Unfortunately most teams were short players all season and therefore we weren't very competitive at away tournaments due to our smaller teams. However, having a development coach in our association to run practices this season, the development in players skill levels was more evident and the kids always enjoyed and had "fun" during practices which is a great accomplishment.

Peewee - 18% (17% in 2016)

PeeWee had a pretty good season overall, with 5 teams mixed with female and male. Unfortunately we had a number of incidents (parents, coaches, refs), considering how much effort was put in at the beginning of the year to ensure that everyone was respectful. We had balanced teams who were competitive in house and at away games and tournaments. The home tournament was a huge success run by a strong group of volunteers.

Bantam - 17% (19% in 2016)

I was lucky enough to work with fantastic division managers this season which made the season go very smoothly. I have received feedback from division & team managers of areas of improvement needed for their divisions, as well as great successes of the season including many trophies & wins from out of town tournaments as well as our own CRMHA tournaments. We worked diligently to increase communication throughout the association and we saw an increase in volunteers willing to step up into positions for tournaments and team staff positions. In addition, the clear directive from BC Hockey on how to manage prenovice and novice divisions with the implementation of the new program made things much easier this season. The First Shift program was a huge success in getting some new families into hockey.

CRMHA Rep Coordinator Report 2017/2018

It was a successful 2017-2018 season for the Rep program.

The Atom Development program had 34 full time players along with approximately 10 affiliate players.

Both our Peewee A & B teams had 17 full time players each, plus the B Team used 4 affiliates from Peewee house and 6 from Atom Development. Peewee A used 7 affiliates from Peewee B.

Bantam A had 18 full time players and used 3 affiliates from Bantam house.

Midget A had a roster of 19 full time skaters and 3 affiliate players.

Our Atom Development teams this season were stronger than average compared to previous CRMHA atom development teams in recent years. The Atom A team played in Division 1 against all of the big Tier 1 associations and were fairly competitive throughout the season. They ended up losing in the semi-final of the island championship to Racquet Club. The Atom B team played in Division 3 which is something new since our atom B teams are usually placed in Division 4. Although they didn't manage to win many league games, the games were very competitive and could have gone either way. Congratulations to the Atom B's for winning the Bronze medal at their year end tournament in Richmond.

Although it was a tougher year for both our Peewee A & B teams, the players managed to develop their skills with Bryce Cockburn and the coaching staff. Congratulations to the Peewee B's for winning the bronze medal at their year end tournament in Ridge Meadows.

Congratulations to the Bantam A's on a productive season. They captured gold at the Peninsula Thanksgiving Tournament and finished 3rd in the Tier II Division at the KIBIHT tournament in Kamloops. They also finished the year off strong by winning the Tier II Island Championship and earning a berth to the Provincial Championships. The Tyees captured the bronze medal with a record of 3 wins and 3 losses in a 6 game format at the provincial tournament.

Due to many injuries and suspensions, the Midget Tyees had a difficult season and were unsuccessful in the playoffs, although they won gold at the Port Alberni Tournament earlier in the season.

There will be a new tryout format for the 2018-2019 Rep season for Peewee, Bantam, & Midget. We will be hiring an outside team of evaluators from Victoria to organize and run the tryout sessions. There will be a mandatory checking clinic on Saturday August 25th for 1st year Bantam players and any bantam or midget player who is new to body contact. Times are TBD.

Tryouts for Peewee, Bantam, and Midget will begin on Sunday August 26-29. Tryouts for Atom Development will begin the first week of school after the Labour day weekend. Times are TBD.

CRMHA rostered full female teams in Midget, Bantam, and Peewee this season. Atom and Novice had females on mixed teams. We had 9 prenovice, 9 novice and 5 atom female that participated in female development. They didn't play in a female league this year.

Midget Hurricanes rostered 2 gold River players, 3 Comox valley girls, 2 overage players. Midget Hurricanes played 15 league games. They had 12 wins and 3 losses for a total points of 37 points during regular season and tied for points with Triport. Triport took the League Banner as they beat CR head to head in league play. The league play offs was in Nanaimo and the Campbell River team finished first with the final game against Triport. They participated in 3 tournaments- Triport, Kamloops and Richmond. Our Midget goaltending was exceptional and had the lowest goals against in the league (23).

Bantam Hurricanes had one player from Gold River. They played 12 league games, finishing second in league play with total of 24 points. They were 6 W and 6L during regular season. In playoffs they lost 7-6 in overtime in the cross over game and didn't proceed to the finals. Bantams played in two tournaments this season and took home Gold in Cowichan and Silver at Richmond.

Peeweee Hurricanes had 3 players from Comox and played 15 league games in the VIAHA female league. They had 13-1-1 and finished first in the league with 42 points. The team had the most goals for (100) in their division (and the whole VIAHA league!) and were second lowest in their division for penalty minutes in league play. They finished as league champions. They had 2 tournaments this season-Finished third in Oceanside and First in Richmond.

We started the year of hockey with familiar faces returning for the season. At our officiating clinic, we welcomed 10 new officials and 43 officials returning to officiate with CRMHA.

My first season as RIC started out with major changes for the officiating program as CRMHA decided to switch website providers. Team Pages was supposed to have a ref scheduler component but it did not and this left me without an online referee scheduler program 4 weeks before the start to the season. Needless to say this did take up a lot of time my coordinating with division, rep team managers and getting refs set up on RAMP, hopefully next season well be smoother. RAMP Interactive was the best alternative and it was endorsed by other RICs that I reached out to. RAMP continued to improve throughout the season with the majority of the officials getting the hang of it. CRMHA allowed us to utilize some ice time to work on our officiating techniques a few times during the season and hopefully I will have more time next season to increase on ice and off ice clinics.

Building on last season, 3 official system for Atom and Peewee House we were able to increase the number of 3 official system games, this was beneficial to the development and growth of our officials. This proved to be a very wise decision as we saw a lot of growth within the officials in such a short amount of time. 40% of the Atom house games and 25% of the Peewee house games were the 3 official system. I believe 60/40 split between 2 official and 3 official system would be a good balance moving forward.

This season marked the start of BC Hockey Cross-Ice or Half Ice minor/major Novice program to include Officials in their games. For officials, there are numerous benefits when considering the aspects of building foundational officiating skills. This is a valuable opportunity for newer officials to put on their uniform, get on the ice in live play and learn introductory aspects of being an official, in a positive atmosphere. We scheduled a total of 41 times slots for new officials this past season.

CRMHA thrived in developing our officials this year. Mike is a very dedicated Mentor and CRMHA officials are better because of Mike and his tireless efforts in encouraging and developing officials. He has attended over 55 games this season and has provided feedback to all officials, no matter their level. I would also like to thank Laura Westcott for her Mentor evaluations this season, totalling 30 written in depth official evaluations which is invaluable to me when scheduling officials. We saw our new official's progress very rapidly this season and I would like to thank all of the Mentors for their reports and guidance.

Thank you to all of my officials for a great year. We all came out and officiated to the best of our ability and I look forward to making improvements in mentoring and development.
