FINANCIAL REPORT

The 2019/20 season concluded with an overall balanced budget. There were many contributing factors, here are some examples:

- Registration revenue was up this year and hopefully this trend continues.
- Ice Rental Expense was down \$23,000 from 2 years ago (2018/2019 year memorial rink was down for 1st half of the season so it's up from that year)
- Shared ice practices and games for younger players
- The \$60,000 community gaming grant

CMHA is looking into options of revenue from some home tournaments through our new gaming committee. We hope that this will help replace lost funds that the 50/50 previously brought in. The application for another community gaming grant has been applied for and this would be used for player and program development. Of note, we were please to be able to keep fees the same as last year and it is a goal to keep these fees as low as possible for families.

Looking ahead to the upcoming season, we are in the process of partnering with sponsors to purchase the new Cranbrook Bucks jerseys and will be able to continue to keep up with our players needs. Important programs including concussion testing for the rep teams (peewee and up) and goalie clinics will be discussed. With CMHA's careful planning, we foresee the association will be able to continue to grow while keeping it affordable for families. On page two, find comparison of 2019's expenses to what is budgeted for 2020.

We know the kids enjoy it, the parents enjoy coming home at night, and it can be a good overall boost. Each team had two "away tournaments" and were allowed to attend a tournament close to home as their "home" tournament.

I'm sure if you asked each one they would all say that it also has its own reward, but they really deserve any and all accolades they receive.

HOUSE PROGAM

The Peewee house program had one fewer team this season from the year before, which made Wednesday evening "game nights" for only two of the three teams. Teams rotated sitting out and were able to invite out of town teams to play or come up with alternate uses for their ice time on the same evening. This was a downfall that reduced the amount of home town house league games.

Monday was practice night with two teams sharing Western Financial Place and the third team having Memorial ice to themselves. There were mixed feelings about 1/2 ice practices at the Peewee level, in particular, the number of kids on the ice. All in all, it worked out.

Team skill levels fluctuated as some players quit mid-season. There was one trade made mid-season by a player who volunteered to help out the situation, which helped level out the teams. Having the Development players in house added lots of skill and competitiveness to games and tournament competition.

It was great that the Development team called up some players to join in their practices, great exposure for the house league players.

Teams were large with 15-17 players, but at this age often players had other commitments and sometimes there would be 8-10 players per team at practice, but usually 90-100% at games!

As I have brought up at board meetings, the back and forth between higher level hockey and house was very taxing as a coach, but more so you could see it on the players. It was very hard for them to adjust to high level pace with higher quality players around them with a coach that had expectations on effort and attitude, then go back to house where they would



play different and the same work ethic isn't required for recreational hockey. More importantly it was hard on the kids playing against one another week in and week out in the house program, and then sit in a Kings locker room together after maybe "taking a greasy hit" from one of their team mates. I could see it was tough on the kids and a lot of them were verbal about it to me how they disliked the back and forth. I sincerely think if there aren't enough players, which does occur in certain years, then it would make sense to forego a development team at all and just keep the house program strong.

The amount the kids were on the ice was also an issue in my opinion. One house practice, one house game, one Kings practice, plus league games, plus the three Kings tourneys, plus house tourneys.

I think the Kings played 22 games (so two over recommended), but by the end of the year it sure seemed like we lived at the rink.

In summation, overall fantastic year. Just a future suggestion would be if the numbers aren't there for stand alone, then just keep house strong.

PEEWEE A WINGS

The Pee Wee AA Wings had a very successful season on the ice. In total we played 44 games consisting of 31 league games, 4 league playoff games and 9 tournament/exhibition games. Unfortunately, due to COVID 19 we were not able to attend Provincials in Penticton but if we were able, we would have finished with a very comfortable 47-49 game season which is perfect for U13 level hockey.

Our team played in the South Central Alberta Hockey League(SCAHL) and although we had a slow start, our design and philosophy to the season started to take shape as the weeks wore on. To expand, we view the season in two parts.... first half is the Development phase where we become accustomed to Team Culture and learning new skills and strategies. In the second half the execution phase arrives in which accountability towards expectations to execute, act on and implement our first half learnings. If you look at our record over the course of the season there is no question that this approach was adhered to and reflected our philosophy. We finished the SCAHL playoffs winning 14 out of our final 17 games. We lost to the eventual league winner twice and the runner up once over this timeframe. Making the semi-finals of the league playoff and finishing 4th overall in the SCAHL was the best result a Cranbrook team has had in the PW Division in many years. Although the on-ice achievement was significant the highlight of the year was the positive comments by other teams and Coaches and parents which recognized the little things



our players and Coaches did to represent our team, our community and our Association in a positive light. Hockey is important but helping mold good people is paramount.

With this being my 3rd year Coaching at this level, I can tell you the amount of preparation, time and energy put into running a SCAHL team is constant, as it never ends. I couldn't have asked for better support from our dedicated and caring team staff. From Coaches to Volunteers it takes commitment. I would like to thank Brett Virostek, Wayne Wiemer, Jody Roberts and Dawn Virostek for all of the effort they put forth in putting kids first. I would also like to thank all of our other volunteers who gave significant amounts of their days to help with safety, discipline and goalie development.

This season was not easy and there were many lessons learned that will hopefully manage to be positively transferred to whatever future hockey opportunity is earned.

BANTAM DIVISION

HOUSE PROGRAM

1.Crystal Glass(Miles Chisholm, Craig Cawte and Jason Richardson) 2.Ok Tire Coaches(Stacey Paulson, Eric Johnson)

Our Bantam house program was comprised of two teams which had one game and one practice per week. Practices were one hour long, and games were one and half hours against each other every week. The teams both did two travel tournaments, and they both attended the same locations.

Feedback we received from some parents, players and coaches included how it was difficult for players to be combined in both the "B" and "house" programs. This was challenging due to the different levels of development and compete amongst all of the kids. When you combine more developed players with those who either chose to play less competitive hockey or have not had the experience of competitive hockey, it becomes a more challenging from the coaching perspective, we as contributed to frustration at time for players of both calibers.

This also contributed to differing opinions for families as some felt the amount of hockey was plenty with one game and one practice per week; however, others felt were frustrated that they couldn't be on the ice more often. Only having two teams also added to animosity between the players towards the end of the year, so it would be far more beneficial to try and have the house teams play other teams to alleviate some of these feelings.



From speaking to some families, and I am aware this is not everyone's opinion, but I think it would be more beneficial to separate recreational and competitive players when possible and even consider mixing house programs between Peewee and Bantam or Bantam and Midget for added numbers in the house program and allow the more competitive players to have the added opportunities they are looking for added development.

BANTAM DEVELOPMENT/TIER 4 HORNETS

Coaches: Craig Cawte, Miles Chisholm and Jason Richardson

As noted above, the players on this team were also a part of the Bantam house program, so in addition to the one game and one practice, they also had an additional early morning practice for 45 minutes each week. We also played as part of the East Kootenay League, which included 10 league games, a preseason tournament and a year end banner tournament

The team also played two additional tournaments and three exhibition games, so in total 30 development level games.

As noted above, the combination of players on the development team playing house as well made for numerous challenges...

1. The kids never really came together as a team as they some would compete against each other in the house program and adopt different habits at each level.

2. Lack of practice/game ice time for the development team made it difficult to gel in practices, which translated into games as well.

3. The biggest challenge at the Bantam level was players having to go between contact and non-hockey, which proved to be a safety concern at times as players were often very hesitant to engage physically after playing with their house teams.

4. Tryouts at this level would be very beneficial to ensure players end up at the right level. The team also ended up with three goalies, which made it very difficult for fair rotation.

I think the best move for everyone involved at this level would be a separation from house and development/rep hockey.

Unfortunately, due to COVID, the Midget Tier 3 team was unable to attend Provincials and also had to cancel their year end tournament in Las Vegas.

At the beginning of the season, I ran an Esso Fun Day to recruit new players to try out our great sport and this contributed to the many new faces this season.

COACH COORDINATOR REPORT

The 2019/2020 season was my first year in this role and with any new position comes growing pains. I believe we made a lot of progress last year and I'm excited about some of the upcoming developments for the 2020/2021 season and the direction that this board is heading.

Last season, Coach interviews and selections were completed earlier than normal. This allowed us to name coaches within the first week of July which resulted in these coaches having more time to plan and schedule their seasons and to book tournaments. This also gave more time for myself, coaches and the board to plan and prepare for tryouts.



We used this as the basis of why we moved the rep registration earlier this year. This has allowed us more time to evaluate numbers and the feasibility of having standalone rep teams while maintaining healthy recreational level numbers.

The player evaluations went well with no significant complaints or concerns. I learned a lot from this process, and I believe those lessons learned will improve our evaluation process for the upcoming season.

This season, one of the biggest changes has been the merger with Kimberley for the U13 - U18 levels. I'm excited about the benefits that this will have for our association. The merger will improve our numbers and has led to the development of "The City League", which will provide a full league feel for our recreational level players.

I'm also excited to work with Kimberley through the Coach and Player evaluations. This deepens our rep level coaching pool and we've agreed to work together to select the best coaches available for each level. The merger will also result in an even balance of unbiased evaluators.

We're currently working on an "evaluation process" matrix to provide more information on the process for both parents and players while increasing our transparency to our membership.
