I would like to welcome you all to the 2023 Annual General Meeting! We greatly appreciate you taking the time to join us this evening. We cannot stress enough how important it is to have the support and feedback of our membership, as this allows us to continue to improve the hockey experience for everyone involved.

In the Board's opinion, the 2022/2023 season was successful in many ways; however, we certainly recognize there is always room for improvement. Ice time issues were our biggest problem this year, with Marysville Arena not opening until January. Despite that, our Board and our excellent Registrar/Ice Coordinator spent countless hours doing what they could to make the hockey experience positive for all involved. This included some shared practices, both for house and rep teams, which are likely to continue into the future. Many of our other teams also had great success at their banner tournaments and Provincials; the icing on the cake coming with our U13 Bucks and their Tier 2 Provincial Championship! We look forward to seeing that banner hanging from the rafters in the Memorial Arena!

We also must again thank the NHLPA and Dean Brody for their generous donation this year, which will be used to help families in need get and stay involved in hockey!

As the largest association between the Okanagan and Southern Alberta, we continue to emphasize retaining players in Cranbrook for as long as possible, while ensuring that all of our players are able to compete at a level that is appropriate to their skills. By forming stronger relationships with Kimberley Minor Hockey and the EK as a whole, and by allowing players from all over the EK to tryout for our top teams, we believe that we have taken large strides towards accomplishing these goals.

As a Board, we also recognize the importance of building the association from the ground up, by supporting and participating in programs such as First Shift, and by supporting all of our coaches and volunteers in the youngest age groups. The 2022/23 season concluded with the attached budget. CMHA year end is May 31st. The annual report will be done by Redding and Associates in June.

CMHA will continue to purchase new Bucks jerseys for our program, look at new on ice tools for skill development and other ways to help further develop and enhance the kid in CMHA hockey program. The community gaming grant is a big part of keeping registration fees down and help with player development costs. CMHA will apply for the gaming grant again before the end of May.

2022/2023 Female Program Report

Head Coaches: U9 – Michele Lunan (Winchar), Littles U7, U11/U13 development Bobby-Jo Hekob, U13 Female Bucks- Todd Kostiuk

We have had a very successful year in the female program. Our development program is thriving with the support of Bobby Jo Hekob and her huge commitment and passion towards the development of our female players.

This year's numbers have increased. Last year our number of female hockey players registered number was 88, this year we have 122 females.

I believe since we started offering all female teams, many players are staying in the game because there are more options to choose from. We have found that when the girls are able to play together, they have more opportunities to touch the puck, receive passes and are required to work harder in general. The bond and memories made have been amazing to watch and the development from each group is enormous.

With up-and-coming female families joining CMHA our hopes are for more coach volunteers to support the female program as Bobby Jo takes on a lot herself and the support would create more opportunities for the females to have more teams.

Bobby Jo has offered all female development camps in the summer, Female Jamborees throughout the year and new this year a goalie development session that was very well attended with a lot of support.

This year we had a U13 female Bucks team, that had a successful year playing in the Alberta Rocky Mountain Female Hockey League, although a lot of travel, the team was able to play at the appropriate level and came third in the league. The team has brought a lot of buzz around the EK and has many little girls wanting to try hockey. Many younger females have set a goal to play on the Female Bucks and represent the green and white. Hosting Provincials this year was a lot of work, but huge success. The game has started to grow again in our area and giving the girls opportunities to have competitive teams hosted in Cranbrook keeps females in the game and looking onto bigger goals.

Year End Report: U7 Minor/Major for the 2022-2023 Season

The U7 Division was made up of a total of four teams: two U7 minor teams and two U7 major teams with a total of 50 players. Below is a breakdown of the season for each team.

U7 Major Cranbrook Avalanche – coached by Mike Harris

The Cranbrook Avalanche had 15 players all ranging in experience and skill set and had a successful year. Coach Harris' feedback is he saw success in player development, team development and focused on encouraging the kids to have fun. Every player was encouraged to work hard, play with passion, and play fair. Coach Harris felt like the focus on fun brought the team together over the course of the season and commented on how great it was to watch the kids develop strong connections & friendships as well throughout the year.

U7 Major Black Bucks – coached by Bobby Botterill

The Black Bucks had 15 players as well. It was a great year, and everyone had a lot of fun. Player development was evident as everyone on the team showed an increase in skill and confidence on the ice. The commitment throughout the season was great with almost full attendance all year. Players developed strong friendships with one another, making the year a success.

Both major teams attended three different tournaments and multiple games which were enjoyed by players, coaches and parents.

U7 minor red – head coach Mike Eadie

The red team had 10 players. Coach Eadie commented on lower attendance throughout the year which created some challenges with keeping practices engaging, especially when there were sicknesses or older siblings' hockey tournaments - some practices were only 5-7 kids. Overall, coach Eadie commented kids enjoyed practices more after practices were combined with the other U7 minor team coached by Corey Kanzig. By combining practices, the coaches had more ability for variety and stations, and larger numbers allowed for a bit of rest time to perform drills and games with intensity. Coaches considered how other associations structure this age groups and seem most teams have two practices a week which would also promote skill development.

Some of the practice plans for this age group suggested are more difficult and require modification by coaches to meet the skill development and keep the kids engaged and having fun. Overall, most of the feedback coach Eadie received was that the players had fun and looked forward to the practices.

U7 minor blue team - head coach Corey Kanzig

Overall, attendance was fairly consistent throughout the year, sickness and or sibling tournaments occasionally had an impact on player turnout. Coach Kanzig was pleased with the amount of on-ice helper volunteers we had - big thanks to them. Coach Kanzig commented on

the number of practices as well and had similar opinions as Coach Eadie on player development to have kids on the ice two times per week.

Overall, all coaches commented on having a great year and had great turnout with on ice helpers. A special thank you to all the parents and volunteers who participated this season. U7 is a challenging age group to promote player development while having fun and the coaches and volunteers did an outstanding job at accomplishing that this year.

Wishing the U7 players all the best next year and look forward to next year.

2022/2023 U11 Division Year End Report

The U11 House Division

This year we had a total of 52 kids split amongst 3 teams. We had quite a few late registrations and players added to our rosters throughout the season. This made for some very large teams and looking back we likely could have rostered 4 teams this year. I am hopeful we will continue to see our association numbers grow and maybe see 4-5 teams for next season.

U11 House managed to pull off a 6 team home tournament in Marysville. This was a tremendous feat given the Marysville arena opening uncertainty. The rink literally did not open until 2 hours before our tournament started. A huge thank you to all of our volunteers for making this happen with such short notice and everyone jumping right in to help. Fingers crossed we will have more stable ice allocation for next season with more time to plan.

Our 3 house teams were coached by Tyler Birkham (Aqua Bucks) Ryan Winstanley/Dan Meldrum (Steel Bucks) Chris Nault (Blue Bucks). Teams all played in the EK league where we had the pleasure of competing regularly against Creston, Fernie, Invermere and Elk Valley. Teams also attended various tournaments this year including Kimberley, Castlegar, Fernie, Trail, Sparwood and Lethbridge. All teams battled hard all season and enjoyed various levels of success.

Our EK league banner tournament was hosted in Sparwood this year and all our teams left it all out on the ice! It made for some very exciting hockey to play and also to watch. In the end our Steel Bucks advanced to the finals where they played a tight game against Invermere. In the end they came home with a 2nd place finish to close out the year. Great work Steel Bucks. All of our teams should be very proud of the season and what they have accomplished.

The U11 B Bucks/Development

Team was coached by Wade Daignault. They had a successful season competing in the EK league and also attended various tournaments. Highlights include Black Diamond taking home Gold, Spokane for a Silver and Fernie with a Broze place finish.

Notes from Wade, "The coaching focus from the start of the season was to develop the kids confidence, skills, positioning and hockey knowledge and IQ in general. The development team maximized the use of the AP process and would frequently have kids from the house program out for practices. This was a huge success in my eyes as we need to develop as many kids as possible who are seeking to play up to the next level."

Looking ahead to next season Wade would like to build off of this platform and continue the lateral movement of players between all teams. "Being first year in competitive hockey we should be laying down a foundation for the players to get to know each other. Most of these kids will be playing with each other at some point whether it be back and forth between a regional team, A or B. This development mindset and use of the AP process not only benefited the B Team but also the house division. The house players who attended the development practices really improved and strengthened their own skill and teams. They also gained a lot of experience and initial exposure to what competitive hockey might look like should they want to pursue it further.

Wade also wanted to note and thank the great group of kids and parents that made the year what it was. "Despite not having a lot of success in league play or the banner, all kids held their heads high and took value in knowing the score of the game is not always the gauge of success. All of the kids developed throughout the season and by the end of the year they were competing and holding their own against some of the tougher teams in the league." Well done U11 B Bucks.

U11 A Bucks

Team was coached by Todd Leffler. They competed in 6 tournaments through the year, along with a number of competitive games against Spokane and Trail. During the U11 Bucks home tournament in February they finished 2nd overall while hosting some strong Tier 1 Alberta teams. Todd noted *"The Bucks played extremely hard, never quit, and managed an extraordinary comeback in the last round robin game to advance to the playoffs and then a shootout win in the semis."* Sounds like some very exciting hockey games! Great job Bucks.

Osoyoos was another noted highlight for Todd's team this year. *"The Bucks showed team unity by dying their hair blond (as is the tradition with this team). They played extremely hard and competed well, just missing the semi-finals."* Now that is some team spirit and camaraderie!

The U13 house teams hosted a home tournament in February, with teams from Castlegar, Creston, Calgary and Lethbridge participating. Excitingly, the U13 Thunder Bucks and Red Devils met in the final game of the tournament, which went to a shoot-out. Ultimately, the Thunder Bucks won the tournament and overall, together the teams raised \$4,500. A big thank you to all the parents who helped make it a successful weekend. The end of the season also saw the U13 Yellow Jackets taking home the "C" Championship Banner in the EK League.

As for our U13 Rep teams, both had a hugely successful year. The U13 Dynamiters participated in the EK League and won gold at a tournament in Spokane. They also went to Tier 3 Provincials in Vancouver. The U13 Bucks were a travel team this year and participated in many tournaments, from Swift Current to Kelowna, including the Vernon Coca-Cola Classic PeeWee Invitational where they came in 2nd after an over-time loss. But the end of their season ended on a thrill when the Bucks went undefeated and won the Tier 2 BC Provincial Championship in Prince George.

We had a very fun and successful season of hockey. Congratulations to all the kids on their hard work and commitment to our favourite sport! I look forward to seeing our players and families back in the rink in the autumn.

U18: Head Coaches and Assistants: Jeff Scott, Andrew Morrison, Patrick McDonald, & Brian Watson Manager: Dellannee Kahlke Safety: Paul Kahlke

Our U18 house team consisted of 34 players & 4 goalies. Throughout the season they played a 4 "mini" team, rotating game schedule. They had two games per week with one practice on weekends. They went to two out of town tournaments, Castlegar and Trail, and half of the group attended an Airdrie tournament. They hosted a home tournament that included 4 out of town teams including themselves.

Coach's & Manager comments:

- The 3 ice times a week became too much. I suggest 2 ice per week, we will likely do 3 games and 1 practice in a 2 week period. Avoiding weekend ice due to low numbers.
- We had 4 goalies this year and only averaged 1 at practices and 2 on game nights.
- We did the 4 mini teams and it worked out to shuffle teams each game night, have different competition and avoid tension/conflicts that build up all year long. I really support this system.
- We only had 4 certified coaches this year, typically 1 or 2 not able to make the ice time and often Andrew was requested to ref due to the ref shortage. So most nights we had 2 coaches, so only 1 on each bench. Would be AWESOME to have a couple more next year, I know that is hard to arrange. Are there options for "guest coaches" to assist from time to time? (like former minor hockey coaches, or Bucks Jr A players, or parents to open doors etc.
- A volunteer deposit would be ideal to encourage more families to step in to help out and also a higher jersey deposit as some families required multiple calls and reminders to return their jersey.
- Earlier house league evaluations so the team can be formed and tournaments can be decided on and registered for.

U15: Head coach: Dawson Pelletier Assitants: Jason Taylor & Easton Jolie Manager & Safety: Chantal Marra

Our U15 house enjoyed their season as a stand alone team not mixing with our U18 house league. They attended two out of town tournaments, one in Castlegar and one in Trail. They attended the Kimberley tournament as their home tournament. The players enjoyed having past minor hockey players as their coaches and we really appreciate the time they put into our community. The feedback would be to continue to have a separate U15 house team to allow the players to play within their own age groups as when mixed with the U18, they can't always keep up.

Thank you to all of our managers and coaches for a successful season, we appreciate all of your time and what you offer to the youth of our community.
