

Thank you for being part of this journey.



From expanding our presence in Calgary’s soccer ecosystem to strengthening internal operations, this year was marked by collaboration, innovation, and resilience.

One of the most significant milestones of the year was a leadership transition. After 22 years of dedicated service to soccer in Calgary, we bid farewell to Executive Director Pearl Doupe, who retired in the spring. Her legacy of integrity, passion, and community-building will continue to shape CUSA for years to come. We were proud to welcome Stacey Hatcher as our new Executive Director—bringing fresh energy, deep experience, and a bold vision for the future of the organization.

Awareness

Advancing the CUSA Brand & Soccer in Calgary

- **Earned Media & Advocacy:** Our new Executive Director, Stacey Hatcher, authored an op-ed on the power of sport in building community, and appeared in a televised interview addressing Calgary's indoor facility crunch—amplifying CUSA's voice in public discourse.
- **Community Visibility:** CUSA proudly participated in 2024 Calgary Stampede networking events and the Pride Parade—our largest-ever turnout—alongside CDSRA, ASA, Calgary Wild, SoccAbility, and other soccer players and fans.
- **Strategic Partnerships:** We supported the launch of Calgary Wild's NSL profile and contributed to the opening of the new Soccer Centre Dome with CMSA, CWSA, and ASA.
- **Nations Cup Sponsorships:** We welcomed sponsors—World of Soccer, Cavalry FC, Wild FC, Santi-Med Health Clinics, and 1Up!—to elevate our flagship tournament.

Enhancing Member Experience & Building Community

- **Inclusive Programming:** CUSA joined the Western Cup for the first time, fielding four teams in this North America-wide LGBTQ+ multi-sport event, with support from World of Soccer, Red Bull, and Old Dutch Chips.
- **Data-Informed Decisions:** We began collecting member demographics through our registration system to better understand our players and tailor programming—while safeguarding member privacy.
- **Collaborative Growth:** We worked closely with CMSA on their initiative "Fields for Our Future," a campaign to draw awareness and action on the lack of space to play soccer, as well as supporting and advocating for the City of Calgary's GamePLAN strategy to invest in and build more sport facilities in Calgary.
- **Scholarship Expansion:** Thanks to a generous donation from the Villains Alumni, our scholarship program grew—reflecting their deep commitment to community and CUSA's mission.

- **Umoja & KidSport Contributions:** As agreed upon by members at a past AGM, CUSA continued bi-annual contributions from member fees to support these vital organizations.

Governance

- **Leadership Transition:** We welcomed Stacey Hatcher as Executive Director and celebrated the retirement of Pearl Doupe, whose 22 years of service shaped the heart and soul of CUSA.
- **Board Development:** We welcomed Gregor Nielson and Max Atkins to the Board and bid farewell to Kennedy Mutepfa and Peter Newman. A new onboarding process was introduced to support governance continuity.
- **Policy & Operations:** CUSA updated its Rules & Regulations, Discipline Code, and launched a comprehensive Employee Handbook.

The A & J BUCKLER TROPHY is awarded for the most outstanding contribution to the sport of soccer within Calgary and the area.

The Calgary Minor Soccer Association (CMSA) represents 31 member clubs and is the largest sports organization in Calgary providing year-round activity for youth ages 6-19. Each year, over 2,000 teams and approximately 30,000 players participate in CMSA programs supported by over 3,000 community volunteers.

2024 marks the 50th year of CMSA's operations in Calgary.

President's Award

Pearl has been an integral part of CUSA since 2001 and has always been a strong advocate for adult soccer in Calgary. Her contribution to the soccer community in the city, province and nationally are too numerous to mention. Pearl was the first woman to win the Alberta Soccer's President award. Pearl was always willing to help anyone with soccer and non-soccer matters. Pearl has been a pillar to the community and her mark on the community will not be forgotten.

Life Memberships are awarded to those individuals who have dedicated a large portion of their time to develop and grow the game within Calgary and CUSA. Pearl has certainly contributed to the development of the game for CUSA and the City of Calgary.

During her time at CUSA, the Association has tripled in size and went from two programs to eight different programs. She was instrumental in growing Nations Cup to a premier amateur soccer event and raising the standards for hosting Canada Soccer National competitions like the Canada Soccer Futsal Championship.

Awarded annually to an individual for their outstanding contributions that improve the refereeing community in Calgary and area.


2024 Recipient | Sue and Charles Vanderwindt

Sue Vanderwindt was an incredible member of the soccer community in Calgary for many years. Sue began as a referee around the late 1980s. Over time, Sue showed incredible promise as a referee and became a Level 1 referee (the equivalent of a Provincial referee today). Her fitness was always on point, and she had a demeanour on the field with players that allowed her to excel on the field. Her fitness and her personality on the field made her a great role model for many young referees - male or female.

Not only was Sue a great referee, she was a wonderful mentor to new referees coming into the game. She provided pointers, suggestions and insight to why things could and should be done a certain way. She took the time after games to provide feedback to referees positively, supportively and based on evidence.

Sue enjoyed working with referees to help them build their game, and she became an assessor. Her ability to watch a game and identify areas of growth and strengths for the referees on the field was wonderful. She had a great eye for seeing what was working well and how things could be improved.

She also had a passion as an instructor. At the time in the early 2000s, Sue was an instructor who brought her experiences on the field to the classroom to help her become one of the best instructors in the city.



Sue Vanderwindt retired from refereeing around 2010. Her and her husband Charles Vanderwindt moved to beautiful Creston, British Columbia. While in Creston they built new relationships with new friends, enjoyed golfing and hiking in the mountains.

Charles Vanderwindt was a pillar in the Calgary soccer referee community for more than two decades. As a referee on the field, Charles had a jovial manner about him and was very fair with all players and teams. Charles, even as he was older than most of the players that he officiated, was often the most fit person on the field. He was a very fit referee who could move around the pitch with grace and a sense of ease, but he worked hard off the field to make it look so easy.

Off the field, Charles was very connected to various other elements of the referee community. Charles was a director on the executive committee/board of directors of the Calgary and District Soccer Referee Association for numerous terms in the late 1990s and early 2000s. Charles was also an assessor for referees where he found that he was also to pass on his experiences as a high-level referee and his knowledge to younger referees through his coaching and assessment feedback.

Charles and his wife Sue loved attending out of town tournaments in the summer in various places in BC and Montana. They were staples at the Kimberley Julyfest Soccer tournament for years and years until they moved to Creston in retirement. Charles and Sue were also regular referees at the tournament in Whitefish after the Labour Day weekend where they met lots of fellow referees on both sides of the border and built friendships with them through the soccer referee community.

In their retirement years living in Creston BC, Charles and Sue were avid outdoors people. They loved to hike, ride their bikes, and to golf. They built a great new friend group in Creston. They visited their winter home in Arizona each year and had a great life together.

Within the past couple of years, Charles had a stroke while on vacation with Sue in Arizona. He was eventually transferred to Canada for care and support from Sue and the medical community in Creston BC. Sadly, Sue passed away in the fall of 2025. Her legacy and her commitment to the growth of the game of soccer in Calgary will not be forgotten. Charles is still in long term care in Creston BC. Charles has a son who lives with his family in the Netherlands.

Structure of Men's League – Outdoor

The Men's Programs offer competitive league play for players as young as 16 years of age. The Program also offers age restricted divisions for older players to solely play with others of their age. The minimum age in the Open Division is 16 years of age, players in the Master's Division must be at least 35, and CUSA offers divisions for Over 45 and 55 age groups as well.

CUSA offers a comprehensive range of leagues and competitions to provide a platform for players of all ages, 16 and above, and of all skill levels. On top of our existing leagues - Open-aged from League1 AB and AMSL through to Division 6, Masters (Over 35), Over 45, Over 55.

The league structure is based on promotion and relegation. Teams earn their way into higher divisions through the previous season results. Top performing teams from the Premier, 1st, 2nd and 3rd divisions of the

Men's Open League and of the Master's Premier division qualify to compete in the provincial championships. Regular season League1 AB champions represent the league in TELUS Canadian Championship. Provincial Champions from the AMSL and Master's Elite Divisions qualify for the Canada Soccer National Club Championships. Introduced in 2022 was the option for teams to play 7v7 Outdoors, in addition to the 11v11 game. A division of O45 was offered in this format at the Calgary Soccer Center.

Outdoor 2023 was marred with challenges for game schedules due to increased days of high Air Quality Health Index.


Promotional Challenges

Initially CUSA had received notice of Promotional Challenges for Divisions 1 through 3. By September when the games were to be played most teams had retracted their intent.

Final Results: South Boys retained Division 3 after defeating the Challenging Team Santos FC.

Age Demographics – Outdoor

The chart below demonstrates the distribution of the players throughout the league by age groups. Not unexpected the largest portion of the membership (35%) is within the 24 to 34 age brackets.




Structure of Men's League - Indoor

The Indoor Program is slightly more diverse than what is offered for Outdoor. Players can choose between three different versions of the Indoor Game: 7v7 or Boardless, Boarded, or Futsal. They also have the option of playing within more than one program.

The growth in interest for the 7v7 program (60% of membership) can also be attributed to the increase in venues. Once again, the City of Calgary operationalized the Encana Bubble. Within the next 18 months another additional full sized indoor field will be constructed that will further increase the opportunities for field access for the 7v7 game.


Continuing in 2024 – 25 Boardless Program was the U23 Program. This program provided U23 teams with an opportunity to participate within their own designated division. The goal behind the program is




to offer an introduction into the Men’s game and yet allow those graduating, or near graduating youth players an opportunity to learn what the next level of play will involve.

COED Program

Calgary COED strives for adult players to have fun on and off the field and creates a social atmosphere for players to have fun and learn the game of soccer. It remains the only Alberta Soccer Association (ASA) sanctioned COED Soccer league in Calgary and the only league with CSA certified officials.


Calgary COED Rec Soccer added the Outdoor 7v7 program in 2015, where teams compete on half or cross court artificial turf fields. At the end of each season, the top team within the group wins the divisional finalist and the team with the best Fair Play is awarded the Fair Play winner.

Structure of COED League

As the primary intention for COED is social and Fair Play the league is structured for participants with similar goals. In recent seasons the main levels of competition are Intermediate, Recreational and Ultra Recreational.

In 2022 the Fairness Model was introduced. It is applied to all divisions. The intent is that should a team be dominating their opponent, score is a 7-point difference, then the team leading is reduced by a single player. If the difference is reduced to 5 goals, then the teams return to even strength. Throughout this process the gender ratio of the players must be maintained.

Futsal Program


Interest in the futsal program remains stable, 2024 saw a return to an offering of a female division again. Venues for Men’s and Women’s programs were completed at 7 Chief’s Sportsplex and Genesis Centre. The goal was to help prepare the teams for the competition that would be experienced at the Canadian Futsal Club Nationals.

The venue met expectations and was chosen by Canada Soccer to be the host site for the 2024 Canadian Futsal Club Championship, April 11-14, 2024. The winner from the men’s division will go onto represent Canada at the CONCACAF Club Futsal Championships.




Age Demographics

Womens Futsal




Mens Futsal

Special Events, Tournaments and Cups

City Cups

Each outdoor season CUSA offers the opportunity for the membership to take part in six different City Cup competitions. The extra competitions offer teams the opportunity to meet different opponents than those within the league division. In several of the Cup Competitions a variety of teams from lower league divisions will challenge opponents from those higher divisions for bragging rights. Teams can also participate in more than one competition in any one year.



Black Cup - Est.1913

The Black Cup is the oldest soccer trophy in Calgary. The first competition for the Black Cup was held in 1914. The Calgary Caledonian Soccer Club has been the most successful club in the tournament, winning the trophy 25 times throughout the tournament's history.

The tournament format is a single-elimination format and is held in September following the completion of Provincials. This tournament is the only opportunity for AMSL, Premier and Division 1 teams to compete for a City Cup which makes this competition one of the toughest to win. Any registered Outdoor team in Calgary United Soccer is eligible to participate.

Calgary Cup - Est.1999

The Calgary Cup gives a second and final opportunity for Division 2, Division 3 and Master's Elite teams to win a City Cup. The Cup is a single-elimination format and is traditionally held in September.

Any registered Outdoor team in Calgary United Soccer in Division 2 and lower are eligible to participate.

Nations Cup 2024

March 24 to April 7, 2024

The Indoor Nations Cup was introduced in 2015 and is held annually as a competition to bridge the gap between Indoor and Outdoor seasons. It is an opportunity to recognize the cultural diversity that exists locally within the sport of soccer. This tournament provides a unique concept of grouping players based on their ethnic backgrounds and countries of origin, creating an exciting atmosphere that provides a stage for people throughout the community to express their pride in their heritage.



The 2024 Tournament was the largest yet with 44 teams representing 30 different nations competing in 4 different categories, including Men's & Women's.

CUSA continues to work with a variety of partners to help make the event successful. Our friends at Cavalry FC again graciously provided the championship teams with team tickets to a match, Umoja Community Mosaic was present to provide information on their programs and to collect Foodbank donations. For the stuff the bin team challenges Team Italy came through in full force with their donations, earning the club 50% off one team's registration for Nations Cup 2025.



Communications


Website use continues to be strong, with Premiere and Division 2 pages being the most searched.


2024 Total Revenue \$2.03M

Soccer without Boundaries

Under the guidance of Jean Claude Munyezamu, innovative multicultural outreach programs are aimed at integrating new Canadians into their community. Our support of Umoja Community Mosaic speaks volumes to the impact that our communities can have if we work together building community both on and off the field. Together we can create opportunities that build belonging through sport, music, art, and learning and everyone belongs here.

Umoja Community Mosaic started in 2010 as a drop-in soccer club. We host soccer outdoors in the summer months and indoors in the winter months where we focus on inclusion, emotional regulation, conflict resolution, and community building. We also work with competitive soccer clubs to insert talented players into teams across Calgary.

Umoja’s soccer program builds teamwork and leadership skills. Many Umoja athletes become coaches, and all participants stay in school. Many have gone on to post-secondary institutions (some on soccer scholarships) and join the workplace in a range of careers. In addition to their sport program, they also offer a Culturally Appropriate Food Program, Community Based Tutoring and After School Programming.



KidSport Calgary & Area

CUSA and KidSport celebrate a 16-year partnership in 2024. With the donation in 2024 the partnership has seen CUSA Members donate over \$140,000 to support KidSport and its programs.

KidSport provides grants to help cover the costs of registration fees, as well as providing no-cost equipment so that all kids aged 18 and under in Calgary & Area can play a season of sport.

The Calgary chapter accepts applications and administers grants of up to \$500 per child/year, for kids who live in Calgary & Area.



CUSA Membership – Draw for Free Fees





Scholarship Awards

At CUSA, we strongly believe in our commitment to giving back to the community. On our 40th anniversary, we introduced our scholarship program as another way to give back to the soccer community. We believe the future of not just the soccer community, but the community of Calgary is in great hands.

The annual award was created to encourage and financially aid soccer players, coaches, or officials in the pursuit of their academic and athletic careers. Awarded to students with satisfactory academic standing, entering, or continuing in an undergraduate or graduate degree program who are members of, or whose parent(s) are members of Calgary United Soccer Association.

In 2024, twelve (12) candidates were considered for the award, with these four chosen from amongst them:



CUSA is very committed to being a leader in amateur organized sport, by building on our rich heritage, and being inclusive to all, we help build an improved community on and off the pitch. Together, CUSA, and its members will continue our and soccer's growth while having a positive social impact in our city.

For the next round of scholarships, we have received a very generous donation, and our award amount will be doubled to \$2,000. We are very grateful to this award sponsor and know this will be an asset for our recipients.

Referee Report

The 2024 Outdoor statistics showed contrasting outcomes in comparison with previous years. There were fewer red cards issued overall which is encouraging, but that was because the 'lesser' 2nd caution offences were so much lower in total. The more serious offences stayed much the same and our most severe cases which are sent to ASA and typically involved physical or verbal abuse of our match officials increased in number, which is unacceptable.

CUSA are committed to being proactive in trying to combat our more worrisome trends and continue to severely sanction:

1. Violent Conduct and Offensive/Insulting/Abusive/Language or Gestures (OIAL) directed at our match officials
2. 3rd person in altercations, leading to mass confrontations
3. Players and coaches leaving the bench area to come on the field
4. Inappropriate behavior following receipt of a red card
5. Repeat offenders in any of the above and more
6. Players playing using somebody else's player card or an assumed name

The Discipline Code has been amended to try and counteract the above. We speak with teams and players at our Managers' Meeting and throughout the seasons to try and be proactive with our messaging. We encourage players expecting professional referees to appreciate our referees are all amateurs in varying points of their officiating careers, often still gaining experience.

Furthermore, we continue to promote and offer that any of our active members – players or coaches that attend our Referee Entry Level course will be reimbursed the entire cost of the course upon successful completion.

In total, 17 members took this opportunity to become a referee during the 2024 course offerings. We believe this investment is mutually beneficial:

- For our players, they gain experience of the Laws of the Game and how they are applied. They can take this knowledge back with them to their teams, which helps in their future games. It brings further opportunities for health and fitness as well as an opportunity to earn some extra income.
- For us, we gain more referees into our overall referee pool – these particular referees bring a knowledge/experience of how our CUSA games are played and can translate some of that knowledge back out on to the field as a referee. This can also help with better communication and a better relationship between players and officials.

Referee Development

In addition to passing the Entry Level Referee course and gaining experience out on the field, our Calgary referees have access to ever-increasing support to help further increase their knowledge, skills and understanding.

We are supported in these endeavors by a couple of very significant volunteer organizations which are vital in contributing towards a shared common goal alongside our Calgary Associations, CUSA, CMSA and CWSA: Namely to empower our referees to be the best they can be in whatever pathway and levels they choose.

Calgary District Soccer Referees Association (CDSRA)

Major recent achievements:

1. Over 40 education sessions were delivered across Calgary in the past year
2. New classification criteria, including attendance of education sessions to be eligible for upgrades, which is helping raise performance
3. Clear pathways for referee advancement
4. High performance Development and Talent ID

RMOC is a Committee comprised of representatives from each of the Calgary Associations alongside 3 Referee Representatives, who are active respected referees who liaise between the Leagues and the Referees on all matters. Areas they wish to highlight include:

- We hope the mandatory session attendance to upgrade local rating will overall improve the refereeing skills of our less experienced referees. The mandatory session rule has only started. being enforced for this spring's rating review period, so too early to report on what the impact is thus far, too early to tell
- Increased mentoring on the adult games for referees - rather than just focusing mentoring on new referees on youth games
- The Committee is utilizing its powers to remove referees who do not conduct themselves properly more often now that the referee shortage from COVID has largely passed.
