Report: DDMBA President (Mark Raftus)

Mother Nature was kind to DDMBA in 2024 and overall, a solid season of baseball took place.

REGISTRATION

Registration increased to an all-time high of 1255 exceeding the 2023 sum and seventy [70] total DDMBA associated teams from U9 to U18 resulted.

The positive baseball playing trend is apparent as registered players have increased each year from 2020-2024 moving from 713 to 973 to 1185 to 1255 registered players.

Registration continued to be very strong at the introductory ages of U5 and U7 with solid club and developing parental support which is a great sign for years to come.

However, with increased registration numbers also comes the **need for more fields** to allow the teams to practice and play an adequate amount of time. The DDMBA catchment area is at its limit.

RECREATION LEVEL

A "normal" season of baseball was able to be played in 2024 with a full, robust **Recreation level** containing **fifty-four [54] recreation teams** playing among the U9 minor [12], U9 major [4], U11 [11], U13 [12], U15 [8] and U18 [7] levels an increase over the 2022 levels.

League winners were crowned at all **Recreation levels** behind the guidance of Recreation Coordinator **Kim Pitre**. A special thank you is extended to Kim who will not be re-offering in her role. A thank you is also extended to umpire assignor **Jamie Aalders** who along with Kim spent many hours scheduling games and umpires to make the recreation season happen.

The March 25, 2023 **Recreation Baseball Summit** held by Baseball Nova Scotia with participants from around the province resulted in various recommendations for ways to improve the Recreation level. BNS pledged to bring in standards to be used across-the-province such as club licensing, consistently applied rules, recreation coaching requirements, criminal record check policy and overall technical support for the recreation level. BNS has stated the scope of

recommendations were too much to implement for 2024 but there will be provincial-wide streamlining in 2025.

The Coaching Manual & Practice Plan was updated for 2024 and a pre-season meeting with DDMBA coaches was held on June 2, 2024. It was held at Dartmouth Sportsplex with the goal to better prepare coaches for the coming season. Approximately 40 coaches attended the meeting co-chaired by the DDMBA President and Recreation Co-ordinator Kim Pitre. The Manual/Plan were reviewed, all questions answered as best we could in the allotted time and the playoff format discussed. Playoff tournaments were set to run on consecutive August weekends with two age levels per weekend. That goal was accomplished. This pre-season meeting should be mandatory.

In the season-ending **2023 DDMBA** survey it was identified by many members **better balancing of Recreation teams** involving clubs with two or more teams at the same level was required. The topic was canvassed at the DDMBA Executive meetings and **new 2024 standards were created** and employed in terms of team selection process along with a pre-season exhibition period of play. The 2024 feedback received was these strategies worked and teams were balanced appropriately.

COMPETITIVE LEVEL

The **Competitive level** fell under Competitive Co-ordinator **Brian Secord's** purview.

At the **Competitive level** there were sixteen [16] DDMBA A, AA and AAA teams with the **Arrows** program fielding a total of ten [10] teams. The breakdown was AA and AAA teams being fielded at the U11, U13, U15 and U18 levels and Arrows A teams also being fielded at the U15 and U18 levels.

As well, Cole Harbour fielded two [2] A level teams at both the U11 and U13 levels and an A level team at the U15 level. Porters Lake fielded an A level team at the 11U level for an additional total of six [6] competitive teams.

Six [6] DDMBA competitive teams **medaled at BNS provincials** including Arrows teams winning gold at the U11AA Tier 1 and 15UAAA levels along with Cole Harbour winning gold at U11A Tier 2 level with CH also winning silver at that level [an all CH final]. Arrows provincial silver medalists were awarded at U13AA and U15AA levels.

That means of the thirty [30] BNS provincial championships run by Baseball Nova Scotia, DDMBA teams achieved gold or silver in six a **20% overall medaling percentage** - a great showing reflective of years of player and coaching dedication.

Additionally, the 11UAA, 11UAAA and 15UAAA Arrows teams represented Nova Scotia at Atlantic Championships with the **11UAAA team winning the Atlantic Championship** as the host team on John Russell field in CH and the 15UAAA team winning silver in Kentville.

DDMBA based individuals will be honored at the annual **Baseball Nova Scotia awards banquet** to be held on November 9, 2024 where the following individuals will be recognized [congrats!]:

- Gavin Bernard Minor Male Athlete [Arrows 15UAAA];
- Katie Hagen Major Female Athlete [former Arrow];
- Ashley Helmkay Grassroots Coach of the Year [Humber Park];

EXECUTIVE/SPECIAL PROJECTS

DDMBA was blessed with an **excellent Executive and Board again in 2024**. Each member performed their role at a high level and were very responsive to issues/inquiries from membership.

The third year of using the **interactive RAMP program** championed by BNS found more improvements in scheduling and communication. However, a few bugs still remain to be ironed out on game re-scheduling and technical support was lacking at times but overall, the system is a solid one. Thanks to many who make the system work for DDMBA including Treasurer/Registrar **Jim Scott**, Secretary **Donnie MacDonald** and Florida-based Bluenoser **Darren Hunter**.

Special project – 2023 into 2024 - the Beazley batting cage/storage shed was identified as requiring rejuvenation. The existing storage shed was dilapidated, and the batting cage netting was worn with support wiring for same broken. An associated need was identified for the Beazley satellite fields Kinsman and Little Beazley for on-site storage lockboxes to house bases, field liners, rake etc. The overall capital expenditure for the project was determined to be approximately \$7500. Funding was sought by the President and obtained in 2023. Netting was installed in September 2023 and survived well in 2024. In 2024, the three lockboxes were installed at Little Beazley, Kinsman and Conrad ballfields and were used daily to house bases, liners, grooming tools and flour.

In October-November 2023 Brian Secord, Will Secord, Tim Hoskin, Jason Lombard and I spent dozens of hours **building a new polymer permanent shed**. However, the ravages of the Beazley field wind tunnel blew in early 2024 creating a total structure failure. Fortunately, the lock boxes provided good support for each field until a wood structure can be installed in the cage.

Brian Secord was able to secure an approximately \$10 000 donation for new turf for the Beazley cage from **Casey Concrete** and **Tim Hoskin** through his company **TLS Property Services** installed the turf. Plaques of thanks will be placed in the cage. Brian also secured a top-of-the-line L-screen for the cage.

The cage is now totally rejuvenated, looks fantastic and will be used daily by DDMBA teams for years to come. A **\$100** annual charge per each Arrows team has been budgeted with funds earmarked for ongoing maintenance of the Beazley batting cage and satellite fields.

HRM FIELDS MEETING – As background, Donnie MacDonald DDMBA secretary and I as President attended a meeting on July 26, 2023, with HRM planning and policy representatives.

Several topics were discussed including:

- Multi-field complex with at least one turfed field within the DDMBA catchment area.
- Lights being installed on existing DDMBA fields to alleviate field demand strain.
- Repurposing of existing spaces to alleviate field demand in particular at U5-U7 level.
- Installation of an online field booking program to permit booking/checks on field status.
- Field maintenance requests/inquiries providing better feedback.
- HRM rainout policy making it less of a "light switch on/off" for all fields policy.

HRM was initially responsive to DDMBA's requests and suggested DDMBA members write their area HRM councillors to keep these issues top of mind in particular when budgets are being tabled by HRM. A message was then conveyed by the President to DDMBA membership on same which messaging needs to keep being delivered by members to their councillors.

However, in 2024 HRM failed to implement any of the targeted issues noted above. DDMBA will continue to communicate with HRM and will follow up until we receive satisfaction.

DISCIPLINE/CRC/VIP

From a **Discipline standpoint**, the President chaired the **Discipline Committee** with Vice President **Brandon Purcell** and Secretary **Donnie MacDonald**.

June and July were relatively quiet months with a few intra-team player discipline/sportsmanship issues dealt with internally with team issued one game suspensions.

However, August exploded with discipline matters at the 18U Recreation level where continued verbal abuse by players to umpires is very discouraging in particular with under age 18 "green arm band" umpires involved.

Overall, at the U18 recreation level seven [7] suspensions were issued in August, 2024 including three [3] game suspensions issued to two [2] Eastern Passage coaches and three [3] game suspensions issued to two [2] Eastern Passage players. As well, two [2] game suspensions were issued to three [3] Cole Harbour players. When looked at for the total amount of games played seven [7] suspensions may not appear to be a large sum but the factual investigations were time consuming and just one incident is too many. As well, approximately a dozen additional inquiries were fielded from parents involving complaints of overhearing players swearing at umps, alcohol use at the field as well as a complaint levied against an umpire who called a game due to verbal abuse.

I recommend harsh penalties be implemented early in 2025 to stem the rising tide of U18 disrespect as 2 or 3 game suspensions do not seem to be a deterrent. Suspensions to the point of a season long suspension may be necessary to act as an effective deterrent.

Despite the suspensions, overall there is solid messaging going to players from DDMBA and member clubs provided by the Co-ordinators, Club Presidents and coaches. It is at the **parent level** that respect for umpires needs to be fostered.

DDMBA supports BNSUD in demanding a zero-tolerance environment for umpire abuse. The green arm band policy was again followed for age 18 and under umpire incidents with the abovenoted three [3] game suspensions involving an increase from the typical two [2] games with the additional green arm band one [1] additional game suspension tacked on.

From a **Safety standpoint**, the **DDMBA Criminal Record Check policy** was followed again. The difference in 2024 from 2023 was the DDMBA member clubs monitored the CRC's and reported a summary to the President by July 1st.

In prior seasons the system of compliance predominantly used "myBackCheck" which did continue in 2024. However, the **VIP coaching platform** was again passed along to members who were able to use the on-line platform system to have member CRC's paid for 100% by the VIP program after coaching courses were viewed on-line. The VIP program also awards gifts/swag after program completion.

BNS will be taking over CRC compliance in 2025 at all levels - recreation and competitive. Stay tuned.

MOVING FORWARD/THANK YOU

The **Executive/Board would like to thank** all the club presidents, coaches, managers, treasurers and volunteers for their individual and collective efforts throughout the season.

I would like to extend a **personal thank you to Executive members** who are who are stepping back from their roles including DDMBA Secretary **Donnie MacDonald**, Recreation co-ordinator **Kim Pitre** and Cole Harbour President **Rob MacNeill** who have each volunteered several years of service to make baseball in DDMBA better for the kids. Your efforts have been greatly appreciated and have not gone unnoticed. You have left your organizations in a better position than when you started. Thank you!

I will also not be re-offering as DDMBA President. I initially volunteered for the DDMBA Executive starting in 2009 as a VP for North Central Green Sox [now part of Diamond Dawgs]. I later served a three-year term as DDMBA VP from 2016-2018 and finally have now completed two terms totalling three years as President from 2022-2024. It has been my privilege to have served in this role and I thank my Executive members for making my role easier to manage.

A few points I would like to leave with DDMBA members:

- In my fifteen [15] year journey as a DDMBA baseball coach and administrator, I have yet to come across a player who developed better with an "interventionist" parent. Let the player create his own path through hard work and rise or fall on his own it feels better;
- I believe Club and Executive members perform their role because they want to help make
 the baseball experience better for the kids and leave things better than they found it –
 please listen to them as they really do know what they are doing;
- I have yet to see an umpire change a call because of being yelled at from the stands by a parent please sit back and enjoy watching your son/daughter play this great game;
- I have also yet to see a player have a call go their way after they became annoyed at or swore at an umpire be respectful and you will be remembered.

EXECUTIVE POSITION ELECTIONS

As per **Article 5.2 of the DDMBA Constitution** amended at the 2022 AGM each Executive Member serves a two [2] year term with half the Executive elected in calendar odd years and half in calendar even years. In order to make this division work, those elected in 2022 have to put their positions up for re-election this year to make the alternating two-year terms work moving forward.

The following **five [5] positions are up for election** at the 2024 AGM:

 Recreation Co-ordinator – Kim Pitre is the incumbent – she is not re-offering – open for vote.

- Competitive Co-ordinator Brian Secord is the incumbent he IS re-offering if contested a vote will occur.
- Secretary Donnie MacDonald he is not re-offering open for vote.
- Associate Registrar/Treasurer a position is open to work with incumbent Jim Scott for 2025.
- President Mark Raftus is not re-offering open for vote.

I thank you again for your trust in me during my term as DDMBA President.

I anticipate continued further growth and fun times in 2025.

Report: DDMBA Vice President (Brandon Purcell)

During my first year as Vice President of DDMBA, I had various duties and tasks designated to me that included but weren't limited to:

- Attend monthly meetings to examine new topics not mentioned at previous meetings.
- Address any problems/ issues that require attention or action from the executive board and its members.
- Discuss new rules or policies as well as any updates.
- Communicate with organizations and businesses to talk about new opportunities.
- Review incident reports that we received from umpires regarding players, coaches, or spectators and take action if required as part of the discipline committee.
- Communicate with Baseball Nova Scotia members.

After being voted into the position of Vice President in February I was eased into the duties of the position for the first couple of months while I reviewed minutes and notes from previous meetings. I was assigned a few small tasks to give me a better idea of what to expect from the position and how to complete everyday duties and projects. Once I got my feet under me in the

position, I was assigned additional tasks and was given the ability to pursue tasks on my own. My first solo project was to explore an opportunity that would allow parents and fans the ability to live-stream games and tournaments for various age groups, we were unfortunately unable to reach an agreement with the company that would have worked for both parties, but I am optimistic that we will be able to present this idea again at a later date and have the potential to implement it for future seasons once we have time to discuss and review any challenges associated with the live streaming process. The remainder of my time with DDMBA was spent as a member of the discipline committee where a small group of members would discuss situations and issues presented to us by umpires. Depending on the situation we would deliberate and if needed we would vote on the best course of action, whether that might be a warning or a suspension. During my short time with DDMBA, it's been great to be part of a group of people that helps to create a positive environment for so many children and youth. I would like to thank everyone for the amazing work they did this season and I can't wait to continue assisting the association moving forward to achieve their goals and continue to help create additional positive experiences for even more youth in the future.

Report: DDMBA Registrar (Jim Scott)

We registered almost 1,300 kids this year!

Below is a historical breakdown of DDMBA registration, 2024 was a growth year with an increase of over 100 players, 8% over 2023. Registration started fast, we reached the 2023 total by May and the last few weeks were an exercise in moving players around and trying to find spots with the increased numbers space was very tight.


Overall, the percentages per age group have remained very consistent over the last few years even with the overall increase in player counts.

Finance:

Total registration fees with Tryouts, Clinics exceeded \$360k.

Major items of note:

Umpire Fees over \$42k but this was \$9k less than our estimate (12 home games X full umpire rates per each team). This estimate logic will be looked at for 2025 as the total estimate has been over actuals by a wide margin for two straight years. Divers in that difference are games not made up and single umpires vs two, reducing the rate.

Credit Card costs, over \$6k CC's continue to be more and more popular. We have a recovery rate estimate built in but was a bit low as we under-recovered by \$900. This rate will have to increase in 2025 to get closer to full recovery, it's hard to nail down as each card charges us a different fee.

BNS Insurance has been below our estimate for two years in a row, no complaints!

Recreation playoffs costs increased mainly on volume of teams / players and usual inflationary pressure.

Finally, the Arrows finished the year with ~\$5,700 in reserves before accounting for the current fall camp which started a few weeks ago.

Report: Competitive Coordinator (Brian Secord)

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- 1. Competitive Tryouts:
 - a. 250 players attended tryouts.
 - i. 18U = 49
 - ii. 15U = 59
 - iii. 13U = 62

 - b. Try-outs were broken down into 3 Stages this year.
 - i. One Last Rep was used to do the initial skills evaluation.

- 3. We ran winter camps at OLR for all age groups that went for 12 weeks. We will be running them again this winter in the new year.
- 4. Repairs continued the Beazley Batting Cages. The new shed that was purchased last year didn't survive the winter and had to be scrapped. New turf has been installed. This was made possible by a very generous donation by Casey Concrete Dartmouth of the turf, spikes, and the silica. The Hoskins at TLS Property Service donated their time to expertly remove the old turf and install the new turf. Along with the new to us "L" screen, The Arrows now has a very serviceable batting cage.
- 5. The 3 new storage bins have been placed at Little Beazley, Kinsman, and Conrad fields. These will be stocked with bases, and lining equipment. This will allow teams to have the fields properly setup for each game without having to carry the gear themselves.

Report: Recreation Coordinator (Kim Pitre)

The DDMBA 2024 season had 54 recreational teams in 2024 from ages U9 Minor to U18, and one U18 team from Halifax Minor Baseball Association. This season started off with preseason games between all the clubs in early July, then moved into regular season games. I feel to would be beneficial for more pitching education prior to the regular season starting at the club levels. Once coaches get into playoffs, they would have a better understanding of the rules at every age.

RAMP (scheduling system) was difficult to navigate this season with entering the regular season games. So therefore, they had to be manually inputted into the system which was very time consuming. On a better note, the weather held off for most part during the regular season and moving into playoffs.
