Great Lakes Ringette League (GLRL)

Supplementary Discipline Committee Policy

October 2023 (Updated)

1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to establish a clear and transparent framework for supplementary discipline within the Great Lakes Ringette League (GLRL). The goal is to foster a safer environment, promote sportsmanship, and provide an enjoyable ringette experience for all participants. This policy also ensures alignment with Ringette Ontario's Reciprocation Policy, so that suspensions and sanctions are recognized consistently across both league and tournament play.

2. Committee Structure

- The Supplementary Discipline Committee will consist of a minimum of three (3) members and up to five (5) members.
- The GLRL Executive will appoint committee members prior to the first league game each season.
- If a committee member has a conflict of interest, the Executive Chair may temporarily appoint a replacement member on a case-by-case basis.

3. Scope of Review

- The committee will review video evidence of dangerous play that may warrant supplementary discipline or educational measures.
- Situations assessed by referees as major penalties or minor penalties will not be reviewed. If a submitter believes a penalty was assessed incorrectly, they should discuss the matter with their Referee-in-Chief (RIC). The committee is not intended to override referee decisions made on the ice.
- The committee focuses on incidents that may have been missed by referees and that pose safety risks.
- Reviews are limited to incidents occurring during GLRL league play (from the time teams' step onto the ice until they leave). Tournament games are not subject to GLRL review; however, any suspensions imposed by GLRL will be recognized in tournament play in accordance with <u>Ringette Ontario's</u> <u>Reciprocation Policy</u>.
- The committee will not review goals, disallowed goals, or gameplay rules such as blue line violations, crease violations, shot clock infractions, or 4-in rules.

4. Submitting a Video for Review

 Videos must be submitted by a team's GLRL Representative, who forwards the request to the GLRL Vice-President.

Submission Requirements:

- Video clips must be no longer than 45 seconds.
- Submissions must include date, time, opponent, location, jersey number of the player, and a brief description of the incident.
- Videos must not contain full player names; only the association name and jersey number may be referenced.
- A deposit of \$300 is required with each submission. This deposit is refundable only if the appeal is upheld in whole or in part; otherwise, it is forfeited.
- Associations are asked to wait at least 24 hours after a game before submitting a request.
- Submissions must be made within 7 days of the game in question
- The Vice-President will acknowledge receipt of the submission within approximately 2 days and forward the video to the committee for review.
- Decisions will typically be rendered within 5–10 days.

5. Review Considerations

When reviewing video evidence, the committee may consider (but is not limited to) the following factors:

- Did the player have time and space to avoid the dangerous play?
- Could the play reasonably have resulted in injury?
- Did the incident involve dangerous or reckless play near the boards?
- Did the incident involve dangerous or reckless contact to the head?
- Did the play appear intentional or retaliatory?
- Has the player or team previously committed similar infractions?
- The committee and/or GLRL Executive may contact coaches, players, or witnesses for further information.

6. Disciplinary Actions

Upon review, the GLRL Supplementary Discipline Committee may recommend, and the Executive may impose, any of the following actions:

- No Action No supplementary discipline required.
- Warning or Education A written warning and/or assignment of educational responsibilities.
- Player Suspension Suspension of one (1) or more games for the offending player(s). Suspensions apply to GLRL-sanctioned games, including both league and tournament play, and are enforced in accordance with <u>Ringette Ontario's</u> <u>Reciprocation Policy</u>.
- Coaching Suspension Suspension of one (1) game for a member or members of the coaching staff of the team whose player committed the infraction.

The GLRL Vice-President will notify all applicable parties of the Executive's decision.

7. Repeat Offenders

Suspensions for repeat offenders escalate on a doubling basis. Suspension history carries over into subsequent seasons, while team fines reset annually.

- 1st suspension = 1 game
- 2nd suspension = 2 games
- 3rd suspension = 4 games
- 4th suspension = 8 games, and so on

All suspensions apply to GLRL league and tournament play and will be enforced in line with Ringette Ontario's Reciprocation Policy.

8. Team Offenses

If multiple athletes from the same team commit infractions within a single season, the GLRL Executive may impose additional fines on the team, in addition to individual suspensions:

- 2nd offense = \$200 fine
- 3rd offense = \$300 fine
- 4th offense = \$400 fine

These fines are intended to encourage proactive responsibility for safe play at the team and association level.

9. Communication and Appeals

- Following a disciplinary decision, the GLRL Vice-President will share the ruling and any related video evidence with the RIC of the home association involved.
- The Vice-President will also be available to respond to questions or clarifications from teams or associations.
- Any appeal of a disciplinary ruling must be submitted through the current GLRL Appeals Process. Appeals will be reviewed in accordance with league procedures and recognized under <u>Ringette Ontario's Reciprocation Policy</u>.

This updated policy ensures that disciplinary actions within GLRL are fair, transparent, and consistently enforced, supporting a safe and respectful environment for all participants.
