Kerry Park Minor Hockey Association 2020-2021



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<u>President's Report</u>

There is no doubt this was an extraordinary year, which shouldn't be too surprising given the abrupt ending of the 19/20 season. Certainly, it was also to the Board, especially early on, as it was significantly more difficult to provide our members with answers as to what the season would look like and what efforts were necessary to get our 20/21 season back online. The main elements of our season required us having to consider requirements of the Provincial Health Officer, ViaSport, Hockey Canada, BC Hockey and VIAHA, and with the utmost respect to the hard work of our governing bodies, an extreme amount of effort was necessary to coordinate and facilitate the actions necessary to get our hockey season in operation.

Volunteers Were Key

KPMHA was not any different than any of our peer-Associations, having to adjust to the new and extraordinary situations brought on by having to manage its affairs during restrictions and requirement brought on by COVID-19. And it almost goes without saying that there was an amazingly higher level appreciated of our volunteers across the Association given they had to deal with a new set of challenges. Every volunteer should be commended for the outstanding dedication they made to ensure our youth were able to experience hockey this past year. The vitality of our Association is founded on volunteerism and, as President, this is why I have absolutely no tolerance for members and players who treat our volunteers unfairly and disrespectfully.

As a Board member of KPMHA, I always find it difficult to uniquely recognize individuals amongst all the hard-working volunteers. At the team levels, our team managers were extraordinarily tasked with ensuring we had enough volunteers for our practices and our games. These were mainly the same members on each team who volunteered to be the Group Hosts, or safetys, and they were the spirits that stayed at the arena, while most of just dropped off our kids and returned to pick them up. In saying all that, we did have one volunteer whose tireless commitment and dedication to the hockey players in our MHA stands out as exceptional, and that is Michele Taron. Her herculean efforts, leadership and dedication, made our season the best it could be, and we all should be thankful of her. We were proud to nominate her for the VIAHA Volunteer of the Year award.

Development Triumphed

Due to the limited games, there isn't much to report from the year with respect to games. To ensure our practices and limited games were possible we had to work very closely with our facility providers. We are blessed having our partners at the Cowichan Valley Regional District and Shawnigan Lake School and in working with us to ensure that we were able to provide the best hockey experience and programming under the circumstances.

These partnerships are crucial and provide a platform that makes our Association distinctively different than other MHAs in the South Island. As a Tier 3 level MHA, we have access to two ice sheets. We are able to deliver an extensive hockey program and our success of obtaining funds through gaming grants affords us the opportunity to provide an exceptional development experience for our players. I kid you not, this is what makes our Association special. Whether it be extra ice and our suite of development coaches, our players have ample opportunity for development.

This was an amazing year for development, and our coaches did a tremendous job even through the on-ice restrictions.

Challenges Ahead

I felt it important to share one of the most challenging moments I had as your President over the past year. Very early on in the season, VIAHA made the decision to continue with the Tier 1 shared player arrangements which allows for our players to try out and play for Juan de Fuca's (JDF) Tier 1 teams in U13, U15 and U18. Our support for this was based on not supporting BC Hockey's plans for a U15AAA and U16AAA in the South Island. Our Board, and of which many of you have brought up, have had concerns that with an ever-growing array of competing options for our players (especially at the U15 and above levels), it is making our A level hockey (rep) in our Association less and less sustainable – I can assure you that this is the case and this is why I share this with you.

In response to VIAHA's decision not to support BC Hockey's AAA programs, BC Hockey organized a town hall to discuss its program and VIAHA's decision. MHA President's on the South Island had been given no prior notice than any other member of BC Hockey on the South Island. We were not presented with an agenda, nor did we know the specifics of meeting. I attended the meeting to listen in on the discussion, and quickly realized that the Chair of BC Hockey intended to do an unexpected roll call of all South Island MHA Presidents to provide their views and express their support or not for AAA hockey in the South Island. While I had an opportunity to briefly express our challenges about the continuous competing draw of our players, I can assure you that a more thorough reflection of these challenges and carefully crafted response would have been given, if I was provided the format of the meeting and what the Chair of BC Hockey intended to do. It did not afford a more wholesome understanding and discussion of the challenges our Association and other MHAs are facing. I remain perplexed with how this was conducted.

There is a delicate balance between supporting programs that allow for options for our players to develop, while ensuring we create a sustainable program for the players who stay behind. Some of our members may not have the family resources, supporting dynamics or interest to play elsewhere. The Tier 1 program has been successful for the last three years, and our partnership with JDF has been excellent, and gives players an affordable opportunity to play a higher level of hockey.

I tell you this story, because we are going to be continuously challenged with keeping our representative program sustainable as time moves ahead, challenged that the allure of rogue leagues is now infiltrating into our community at earlier and earlier ages. Our Board of Directors will be immensely challenged with keeping the viability of our hockey programming going, and it is becoming ever more stressing. We will be challenged to appease everyone with the decisions and/or support for specific programs that compel players to play elsewhere. However, we have to be guided and vigilant to ensure our Association remains viable and sustainable, especially for those that remain behind.

Gratitude For Understanding

As a hockey parent, this had been one of the most challenging hockey years there has ever been. Like a lot of you there were moments of not feeling connected to our childrens' hockey season, just dropping the kid off for practice or, on the rare occasion, a game, and then driving off not being able to enjoy watching.

The number of trips we all made to both Kerry Park and Shawnigan Lake without being to watch our children practice or play throughout the season was often daunting. But we did it to keep our kids connected to the sport, to keep them physically active and to keep them hanging out with their friends.

It was a year where the Board may not have had any of the answers, but we certainly sought them to clarify. It was a year where we had to enact on rules and processes which hindered parents, family members and friends from fully experiencing the season with their children. We found new avenues to bridge these gaps, like Livestreaming, which, while didn't replace the quaintness of being there live, allowed for friends and family who don't even live in our community to watch games and practices, some for the very first time and from long distances away.

In reflecting on the season, I leave the season with a sense of gratitude to all in our small hockey community, pulling together to make the season the best it can be.

As always, there were a few bumps along the way, but the disciplinary committee assembled only once, and for the most part we had fewer incidents than in years past.

Our coaches, managers, safety's and hosts all deserve to be recognized for their monumental efforts this year. And an extra thank you goes out to the coaches that had to work harder than ever before with ever changing rules and regulations. It is my pleasure to represent KPMHA and work with an excellent board of directors and look forward to return to normal programming for next season.

I am sure nobody will forget the words of Provincial Health Officer Dr. Bonnie Henry this past year, "Be Kind. Be Calm. Be Safe". In our hockey world, it was the season of restructuring with many new protocols. Right after the May AGM for the next couple of months, discussions were had, Zoom calls scheduled and protocols were handed down from BC Hockey and ViaSport, based on the most up to date Provincial Health Orders. The GOAL was to get the kids back on the ice, SAFELY. In June BC Hockey announced that each Minor Hockey Association was to have a Communication Officer and they were to develop a "Return to Play plan" within the guidelines of ViaSport and the protocols from each of their home arenas.

Return to Play

In June I became the KPMHA Communication Officer and worked with other Board members that made up our "Return to Hockey" team. **Thank you** Aaron Lamb, Josh McKamey and Shane Kendall for all your contributions to the RTH team ©

KPMHA was one of the first Associations on the Island to submit Return to Hockey plans to VIAHA. Sheena from Kerry Park Rec, Kevin and Roger from Charlie Purdy Arena, (our local arena contacts) were excellent to work with on these plans.

As the PHOs changed in BC, safety plans with each arena were updated by the RTH team and communicated to membership through TeamSnap. Attendance was taken at every ice season and Health Checks were performed through the TeamSnap App. Managers and Safeties were the boots on the ground and a huge support for making our Safety Plans successful this season. **Thank you** Team Managers and Safeties for all your dedication this past season!

TeamSnap

We continue to use the TeamSnap platform and our currently in our second season of registration within TeamSnap. This season the TeamSnap support group provided us with the Health Check options that helped eliminate most of the manual health questions required before entering the arenas. These Health Check questions changed slightly over the course of the season.

Admin support

We are currently looking for an Admin Assistant that can provide much administration support to the Board. Many hands make light work! Please email VP-admin@islanderhockey.ca if you are interesting in helping. Thank you, Amber Champ for assisting with the meeting minutes and consolidated Director's report this past year.

Team Accounts

COVID restricted multiple ways of doing business and in order to limit unnecessary in person team financial activities, we pivoted. For team accounts Pam K., Team Management and myself started completing Etransfers from team accounts to pay for expenses and return of seed funds. This alleviated the outstanding cheques of the past and provided a transparency on Team bank statements. The bookkeeper position will now assist with future Team finances. Thank you Pam K. for the countless hours of assisting Team Managers in the consistency of reporting team finances.

Gaming Grant Funds

We were successful in receiving a Community Gaming Grant in the sum of \$47,100. These funds were strictly spent on development coaches and extra ice for each KPMHA player and/or goalie.

Draft Budget for AGM Vote

Nothing substantially has changed with the proposed budget in comparison to last season's budget. A couple of expenses have gone up slightly due to fee increases from the vendor. VIAHA fees and ice have gone up a bit and we have not yet received final confirmation of BC Hockey fees.

2021/22 Registration

Registration was again divided into two phases. The first phase was Early Bird Registration (Feb 24th – March 24th) for returning players. It also provided returning players with min "COVID" credit. Phase two started on March 25th and was open to returning players as well as new players. This phase had a slightly different registration rate for U9 thru U18 Divisions.

Thank you to the 94 volunteers at KPMHA this past season. GOOD JOB on working together to keep the kids active on the ice and achieving a 100% COVID free season in our two home arenas.

<u>Ice Management</u>

Ice Management was an interesting adventure this past season. Normally I pride myself on getting practice schedules out with lots of notice to families and then dependent on VIAHA League schedules, game ice follows. Due to COVID, ViaSport phases and protocols were ever changing. We never knew how long each of the phases for Sport would last and if protocols within the phases would change. Despite the different season we had many successes through player and goalie development which I am sure all will see those results once game play returns.

Ice Success

Every team exceeded their budgeted allotment of ice during the 2020/2021 season.

Preseason ice sessions in August were successful again this year with;

U11 transition sessions, a refresher of what the players learned in Feb 2020

Multiple Recreation and Rep Prep sessions, which allowed the kids to shake off the rust before tryouts/evaluations started

For Rep Prep, these sessions prepared players on the drills that they would later be evaluated on.

It takes a bit of the unknown out of the tryout process.

We added three "Goalie Prep" sessions which were very popular and run by Goalie Development Coach Leighton.

Development Ice Success

We expanded on extra development options this season through our "Parent Paid" sessions, which had a min fee to the parents of the participants. Adam Geric ran these throughout the season on Friday evenings. New this season were holiday camps ran by Jeff Compton; two development camps took place during the Christmas break (U13/U15 and U11) and two camps during Spring break for U8/U9 and U11. We had 27 sessions and they were extremely popular.

We were very lucky to have an excellent group of development Coaches this season:

Adam Geric, joined us for a second year providing development sessions on Fridays,

Brandon Wong, joined us for a second season in a more consistent Monday development sessions,

Brian Passmore, has been part of our development program for many years now

Leighton Williams (Goalie Coach), new to our program this year and worked with flexibility in order to work with goalies at team practices and Provided a pre-season goalie prep,

Jeff Compton, was new to our program this year in the Special Camps category

Thank you Development Coaches, we are pleased to have your enthusiasm and expertise as part of our program!

Ice Challenges

Due to COVID cleaning procedures at the rink, we had to adjust schedules so there were 40-45 minutes in between sessions at KP and 15 minutes in between sessions at the Shawnigan arena. At KP our team staff had to sanitize the warm room after the team was out and then by November our older teams were able to have some use of dressing rooms. At Shawnigan each team had different entrances and exits and by late fall teams were able to have dressing rooms.

With minimal games allowed to be played, 90 percent of our ice sessions consisted of practicing and development sessions for goalies and players. In January we purchased new development on ice tools to help with the creativity of team practices. Part of these tools were foam dividers at the Shawnigan rink that will allow for more cross ice games once game play returns.

Off Season Activities

New to KPMHA we will start a 2021 Spring/Summer Development program for the following age groups; U8/U9, U11, U13/U15/U18 and goalies. Much work has been put in to this program, stay tuned for sign up options.

Recently I have submitted the Kerry Park Arena ice requests for next season. Early Bird registration is very important to this process as it provides me an idea of how many teams we will have, therefore how much ice will be required.
