### INTRODUCTION TO SKILL CENTERS

Every person involved in soccer in Canada deserves an enjoyable experience with the game, regardless of the role they play, their age, their level of experience or their ability. For young players, an enjoyable experience means that they have access to high-quality programs where they can have fun with their friends, learn new skills and play the game in an appropriate format. Clubs play an important role in this, as they are the primary providers of soccer programs where young players experience the game in Canada.

Canada Soccer has created the Skill Center Programs to guide clubs towards best principles in player

development by taking a nationally coordinated approach to developing young soccer players. Skill Center Programs provide a challenging, enjoyable environment for players to develop and nurture the skills required to succeed in the game of soccer.

By taking a structured, long-term approach to player development – based around the principles of Long-Term Player Development (LTPD) – our young players will develop the foundation of fundamental skills required to succeed at whatever level of the game they aspire to reach.

- Keep more young players involved in the game for longer by providing them with an enjoyable experience with the game
- Produce clear training guidelines for clubs so they can deliver the best possible environment for young players in their region.

# SKILL CENTER LEAGUE APPLICATION

Deadline: May, 1st

The NSSL Skills Center Festival League is a Standards-Based Festival League, therefore each club must apply to ensure their programs align with the Canada Soccer Skills Center Standards. Only clubs that operate Canada Soccer Skill Center Programs will be accepted to participate in the NSSL SC League. Any questions or concerns regarding the contract may result in a follow-up meeting with Zach Bauld, Director of Grassroots & Community Programming. Clubs will be audited once per calendar year-if clubs are failing to abide by Skill Center principles, they will be removed from the league.

### U10/11 NSSL LEAGUE STRUCTURE

Summer 2025, will see our U10/11 festival move from festival format to single match format. Teams will play one 50 minute game.  $(2 \times 25 \text{ minute halves})$ 

U10/11 teams will be matched up against other teams/players whom are "similarly developed" as determined the club/league.

For U10 & U11 there will be two pools of competition. Pool 1 - "currently more developed players" and Pool 2.

The NSSL promotes fluid rosters and player movement between teams and pools throughout the season.



# U8/9 NSSL FESTIVAL LEAGUE STRUCTURE

Simalar to last summer, U8/9 teams will participate in their own "regional" festival leagues. However, the NSSL & Wanderers will be partnering to provide three "provincial" festivals open to all U8 or U9 teams across the province.

U8/9 "provincial" festivals will consist of two 25 minute matches.


U8/9 teams must be evenly balanced, no tiering or stacking or teams permitted. The NSSL promotes fluid rosters and player movement between teams throughout the season.





# ADDING/DROPPING TEAMS & ROSTER SIZES (U10/11)

The season will be split into 2 blocks Clubs will submit their teams at the declared NSSL league deadlines.U10 & U11 teams must have a roster size of no less than 12. Teams who do not meet these minimum numbers by the roster deadline will not be included in block #1 of the schedule





Team deletions or additions for Block #2 due by July 1st

Exceptional circumstances on roster sizes may be granted, but must be approved by Zach Bauld, Director of Grassroots Programming & Cameron McCrae, NSSL League Operations Manager.

### **NSSL MATCH RULES**

#### **Kick Off**

A coin is tossed prior to the start of the game and the team who wins the toss will kick-off first in the middle of the playing area.

#### Kick In/Dribble In

Throw ins will not take place. Instead, restarts will happen with either a pass-in or dribble-in from the sideline. Opposing players should be 3m from the player kicking or dribbling the ball into play.

#### **Goal Kick**

Goal kicks happen when the ball exits the end of the field, last touching the attacking team. Goal kicks can be taken anywhere in the Goal Keeper area.

#### **Corner Kick**

Corner kicks happen when the ball exits the end of the field, last touching the defending team. Corner kicks should be treated similarly to when the ball goes out on the sidelines. Corner kicks can be passed or dribbled into the field of play

#### **Penalty Kick**

There is no penalty spot marked on the field. Referees will need to walk out 5m from the goal for U8/9 and 9 yards out from the goal for U10/11.

#### Free Kick

Free Kicks happen when a foul or handball takes place. The opposing player must back up three (3) meters. All free kicks are direct.

#### **Retreat Line**

The retreat line will come into affect when the GK has 1. A Goal Kick or 2. The ball in their hands. During these moments the opposing team must back up to the retreat line. The retreat line will be clearly marked by cones or poles. The retreat line is set at the halfway line for U8/9 and 2/3rds for U10/11.

#### Restarts/ Stoppages

All restarts should be done as quickly as possible. After a goal is scored, restarts happen from the middle of the field

#### **Substitutions**

Substitutions are on the fly, no stoppage is required.

#### PowerPlay Rule

If a team is winning by 4 or more goals, the trailing team is permitted to add an additional player onto the field.

#### **GK Area**

The Goalkeeper Boxes is 10m x 5m for U8/9 and is 15m x 10m for U10/11. Goalkeepers may only use their hands inside this area.
