- Officiating burnout, senior injuries, resulting from working too many games
- Timekeepers, scorekeeper abuse continues to be inappropriate at the u11 & u13 level

Mindful Wellness

Mental Health Program



What is Mindful Wellness?

The Mental Health Initiative started in 2019 with a Mental Wellness Survey created by Dr. Caroline Harker-McDonald and her research team at Mount Royal University. The survey was distributed among OMHA and OOAA players to assess the players overall well-being. From there, the OMHA welcomed Amy Snyder (Parallel Youth Connections) to add a Mental Wellness component to their safety program.

The goal of the now "Mindful Wellness" Initiative, in addition to the physical component provided by the safety program, is to support both social and emotional well-being, and to ensure players have both physical and mental health balance to perform their best.

What is Mental Health?

Mental Health or Mental Wellness, refers to: "A person's condition with regard to their psychological, social and emotional well-being. It affects how we think, feel and act. It also helps us determine how we handle stress, relate to others and make choices. Mental health is important at every stage in life, from childhood and adolescence through adulthood."



Your mental health is just as important as your physical health.



Early identification and intervention are key

What can Mindful Wellness look like for your association or team?


Amy is currently primarily working with teams within OMHA, but has had some involvement with OOAA. To date for the 2022/2023 hockey season she has responded to over 60 reach outs from parents, coaches and players. Her involvement consists of individual and team session that are mindful, strength-based and empowering. These sessions address current themes or concerns while providing a safe, positive team environment. Some examples of these sessions are: Mental Health, Sports & Mental Health, Stigma, Social Media, Decision Making, Resilience, Perspectives, Team Positivity and Goal Setting.

Players have access to Amy's services whenever they need it, in accordance to the players preferred method of communication, and can book one to one sessions as well. All sessions are confidential.

"Amy was an integral component to our hockey season last year. It was no secret that our young players were struggling with their mental well-being after their return from COVID-19. As a coaching staff, we felt it necessary to bring in Amy as a resource to ensure our players mental health was looked after. Our players loved meeting with her as a team every two weeks, often feeling refreshed, supported, and ready to continue on with their busy week. We were pleased to find out that once our sessions with Amy started, our players felt like they could better manage this stress, while also feeling validated in their emotional responses. Additionally, the coaching staff could not ask for a better mental health liaison throughout the season. Amy always gave us 24-hour access to her, should we need to call from the road, set up an emergency session or individual meeting, or give us strategles on how to mediate our players overall mental well-being for that week, she was always easy to get into contact with. It was a tough season on all of us; however, Amy's unwavering support, knowledge, and guidance, allowed us to confidently continue forward, even in the toughest times. As a coaching staff, we believe that mental health is a large aspect of the game and therefore, we could not be more excited to bring Amy back for her second season with the Raiders!"

- Our vendors delivered over 235 hours of additional on ice and off ice development to our athletes this season provided by OMHA.
- We were able to do this because of the incredible work that was put in by our tournament volunteers and organizers. Because of all their hard work, we are able to host profitable tournaments that generate the revenue necessary to provide these opportunities for our young athletes throughout the course of their minor hockey journey.
- We will be hosting our annual OMHA Development Camp again prior to our evaluations. (Sept 11-20th) These skates will be run by our OMHA approved skill development vendors. This is a great way to get our athletes on the ice and have our potential coaches familiarize themselves with our skill development coaches leading into the upcoming season.



VP PLAYER DEVELOPMENT – GEOFF ROLLINS

- After overwhelmingly positive feedback, we will be moving forward with in season positional development sessions for both coaches and players. (Goaltending, Defence, Offensive Tactics/Scoring)
 Schedules and formats will be released in the fall.
- We will be putting our Skill Development out for bid again early June.
 We are looking to onboard a few more vendors as we continue to grow.
- OMHA will be forming a Goaltending Committee that will be managed by a board appointed Goaltending Liaison. That committee will work directly with the executive, and will be tasked with providing the feedback, planning, support and resources required to develop and provide the necessary opportunities to netminders in OMHA.



2024-2025 SEASON

The U18 jerseys were replaced for the start of the season. The U9 division are scheduled to be replaced for the 2024/25 season with the U13 and U11 divisions the following year.

Some highlights for registration this year

There is a 3% admin fee added to registration fee to offset the credit card processing charge. This fee is not added to payment by e-transfer

Registration opens June 24 and closes July 21. Any registration after registration closes are subject to a \$100 administration fee for late registration, and only as space in the division allows

Payment deferral plan will be permitted with credit card only registration - $\frac{1}{3}$ due on registration, $\frac{1}{3}$ due Aug 1, remaining $\frac{1}{3}$ due Sept 1.

Any payments that are not cleared by the credit card company will be subject to an admin fee

AGM QUESTIONS (FROM ONLINE FORM)

What is being done by OMHA to keep players from leaving to independent leagues? (HSL/PHL)

How come you don't have more B teams in U9?... it seemed there was quite a discrepancy in the house league this past year between those who should have been playing house and those who could have been on a B team.

Would it be possible to reset the rosters of the RHL U18 teams a few games into the season? There is a larger than average dropout rate where some kids would rather quit than play at this non-elite level. The kids that stick around are forced to play short handed for the entire season normally missing 4-5 players. They try hard but it is tough to win being short handed all the time. Dropping a team and rejigging early on would fix that.

Would kids be allowed to try out for the AA team as well as for other private teams e.g. HSL and PHL? If they go through the AA evaluation process are they obligated to continue with OMHA if they don't make the team or can they try out elsewhere with no penalties?

Why does OMHA always use the same evaluation company? It's supposed to be an independent third party evaluator, but the company owner sits on the OMHA board with a paid position? Should the evaluator position be a bid position?

AGM QUESTIONS (FROM ONLINE FORM)

Why does U11/ U13 House not have outside evaluators when we pay the same as U11/ U13 Travel?

Can the organization look at 3rd party evaluators this year? Even if it adds a few dollars to my skater's registration, it would be a welcome trade off to ensure teams are made up solely on skills displayed and not who knows who. It makes the organization very unwelcome to new families to town.

What type of transparency is required regarding individual team funds? Who decides where the funds are spent and how much is required?

Will there be consideration into giving the U15 female teams the same amount of full-ice time as the male teams? At this level of play our girls need the full-ice practices to be competitive. Our fees are the same as the male team, we'd like to see the girls get the same consideration in scheduling.

U9 half ice vs full after Christmas

U9 Okotoks needs to increase the amount of full ice. Hockey Canada says that you can transition to full ice after Jan 15. This will allow the 2nd year players to learn about playing a position and difficult rules, such as offsides. Player who are moving into U11 the following year need the experience because their evaluations first thing the next level are full ice. Some players do summer hockey and learn through those leagues, but this puts the players who do other sports on the offseason at a disadvantage coming into U11. Families should not need to pay for summer hockey to avoid their kid being behind for the following age level. U9 needs to switch to teaching full ice after Jan 15. This includes the C level as there are still 2nd year players in those levels. We do not want to keep the gap growing between early bloomers and late bloomers in hockey. After Jan 15 the refs also need to be instructed to call things like offsides and faceoffs.



AGM QUESTIONS (FROM ONLINE FORM)

Why don't we open up more travel teams to more closely match what people register for?

Last season there were more than a full team of kids cut from the U13 travel and forced to play in house league. One of the results from this was many kids leaving OMHA to play for other towns, like Black Diamond. When this upcoming season's registration has closed, OHMA should look at the number of kids registered for travel and prepare to create as many full travel teams as possible that can be matched, assuming there are enough goalies registered. The tryouts can take place and fill the top teams down until there are not enough kids to fill a full team or we are out of travel goalies. Teams can be made as low as tier 6, if desired by registration numbers. Last season a tier 4 team could have easily been made. I do not understand why we are forcing families who desire to play travel hockey to play in house league. I understand that House A might be more skilled on average than playing tier 5 or 6, but if families desire to travel, then let them, even if it is a low tier. 1 of the issues with Okotoks house league is there are only 3 teams per level. Traveling lets the players play in a league with real playoffs. Why not open another travel team or 2 (if registration indicates it that year) and then have a single house league of 4-5 even teams? At least there would be something somewhat resembling league play. Yes, this will lower the skill level of house, but if playing only in Okotoks and avoiding travel is the priority of the families registering for house, then why are we forcing the rest who desire travel into a league to accommodate them? There seems to be this desire to protect and prioritise our house league with 2 levels. Why? Either a family's main priority is hockey close to home or it is to play competitive, but not both. A second comment is that I have heard of the Rocky Mountain Hockey League as a solution. There are 2 things that people do not like about this league. The first is that the format only 1 practice and 1 game each week. This would make it more difficult to move up tiers the following year due to less ice time. The 2nd issue is that the RMHL is never contact (when contact starts). This is unappealing to kids who hope to improve and move up to higher tiers where this is contact. We must remember that many towns do not even have a house league. When I grew up in Okotoks there was only travel from Pee Wee on. If interest in a house league is falling in a year, then don't force it. To summarize the plan I am suggesting: Registration concludes: "X" players register for travel hockey: X/max [players per team] = # of possible travel teams "Y" number of goalies registered for travel hockey. # of possible travel teams and # of goalies are used to determine how many travel teams Okotoks will have for the upcoming season. Whichever runs out first. # of kids registered for house + leftover kids from travel (who cannot fill a full team) will be used to predict number of house league teams. Tryouts commence. The remaining kids who cannot create a full team with a goalie will then drop into house. The number of house vs travel teams will fluctuate slightly each year based on what people indicate on their registration.
