PN gave remarks and welcomed Paradise Town council members Bic Carew and Larry Vaters, NLSA president Damien Masterson, and Steve White Acct with MNP.

PN Motion to adopt agenda, seconded by KD. Minutes from previous AGM were posted online with no issues. PN motioned to accept previous minutes and SW seconded.

1.FINANCIAL UPDATE/HIGHLIGHTS – SW

In the interest of time it was agreed to allow Steve White, accountant with MNP to proceed and provide financial statement update and then he could leave the meeting. Steve has been working with the club for over 7 yrs providing accounting and oversight of the associations accounting. SW provided more detail analysis highlighting revenues of \$510k along with expenses which were in line with previous yr. Club seen a net income of \$52k.

All Star registration opened In October 2022 thus there was deferred revenue entry needed of \$56,830.66 needed to be recorded for 2022/2023.

With all the uncertainties and challenges facing the association over the last couple of years, PSC has come through these challenging times on a very positive note and we are in a good financial position to start the 2022/2023 season. With that said and with the increase in costs, we will need to work hard on keeping this good financial position throughout the coming years

SW motioned to adopt the F/S, with DP seconded. SW appoint MNP to complete F/S for the 2023 year with KD seconded.

9.SENIOR UPDATE - JK

Review

This past season has been a successful one in terms of senior teams. Our Challenge Cup eam achieved its highest season point tally in 5 years, and made the playoffs for the first time. We saw the introduction of our third intermediate team, as well as the carrying on with two others (1 men's team & 2 women's teams in total). Each intermediate team did well in their respective leagues, Paradise First Choice were runners up in tier 1, Paradise Drilling bowed out in the Quarter finals of tier 1, and Paradise men's intermediate got to the semi final of tier 2. We also had a team compete in the men's masters league, Paradise Island Auto, who made it to the tier 2 semi finals.

Player Retention

With the growing number of players within the club, we now have a clear set pathway to continue playing in Paradise from tots all the way to masters, so players always have a higher level to strive for. We have already begun to see this at a larger rate with aged out U17's graduating into the different senior teams respectively. And based on our numbers, we expect this to continue next year. Regarding player retention, we will look to expand our men's intermediate to two teams to match that of the women's side. This will take place either next year or the year after, in order to accommodate our rising numbers as well as building on what we already have.

Jubilee Trophy

As it stands we plan to have, for the first time, teams competing in all senior soccer leagues this year. This is with the introduction of our new Jubilee team which will play its inaugural season this upcoming summer. This has been a long time coming, ever since the introduction of senior teams at the club, and we are excited for what the future holds.
