President's Report

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our RPEI board members for their work and commitment over the past year. Your collaboration and professionalism is greatly appreciated, and I have enjoyed working with you all during my tenure on the board. Thank you for all you've done.

Our sport would not function without the countless volunteers across our five club associations and our high performance programming. Ringette on Prince Edward Island is built upon the efforts of our collective ringette community stepping forward to carry out almost every key function—coaching, minor officiating, event organization, administration at the team and board levels. To all volunteers, thank you for your continued commitment to our sport. Your contributions enable our athletes the opportunity to play the sport they love.

We are extraordinarily lucky to have an ED/TD that has grown up within our sport, still plays at the house league and high performance levels, and has such an incredible passion and knowledge of the game of ringette. Victoria, thank you for everything you do.

Thank you to everyone for the past nine years. I'm looking forward to witnessing the continued growth and success of our sport on Prince Edward Island.

U8/U10/U12

For the 2019/20 Regular Season:

• Teams in the U8 Division competed in several jamborees hosted by each Association. A standard format was developed and implemented.

- The U10 League consisted of 18 Regular Season games.
- The U12 League consisted of 20 Regular Season games.

RPEI used a tiering scheme in the U10 and U12 Divisions. The purpose was to have the majority of teams be as competitive as possible in as many games as possible.

In U10 the process was that after 8 Regular Season games had been played the U10 teams were divided into three groups based on accumulated points. There are no published standings or playoffs at U10 so specific divisions were not required. The remaining scheduled games were divided amongst teams in the same group or one group above or below.

At U12 after 12 games the six teams with the highest accumulated points were placed into the Hollis Division. The remaining seven teams were placed in the O'Brien Division. A new schedule was created where teams competed only inside their respective Division. Each Division had its own playoff format and unfortunately the season ended before the two U12 Championship Games could be held.

U14, U16/U19 and 18+

- The U14 League consisted of 20 Regular Season games.
- The U16/U19 and 18+ Divisions consisted of 22 Regular Season games.

The U14 league was tiered after the first 11 games into the Beaton and Galloway Divisions. Teams then competed inside their respective division.

The U16/U19 and Open competed in separate Divisions.

Final Four Tournament formats were planned for U14 (both tiers) and for the U16/U19 Division. The Tournaments were to be held in Souris on 26-29 with all Championship Games to be held in Souris on March 29th but did not proceed.

Coaching Report

Congratulations to all Ringette PEI coaches for another great season. We would also like to extend our thanks to all assistant coaches, managers, parents, officials, and volunteers who's support is integral to the success of Ringette PEI.

In the fall of 2019, due to time restrictions of various work schedules a Community Sport Initiation clinic was not offered this year however there will be in the fall of 2020. Ringette PEI did offer a Competition-Introduction clinic to ensure all coaches were properly certified on the provincial side of things. Ringette PEI will continue working with coaches to ensure all required certifications are in place.

Thanks to all the instructors for volunteering their time to certify our coaches and give them the knowledge they need to properly develop our players, ensuring they have fun playing our great game.

The percentage of female coaches was down a bit this season to 36% compared to 38% in the 2018/2019 season. Ringette Canada is encouraging all provinces to bring the female coaches percentage to 50%. Ringette PEI will continue to work on initiatives to further increase the representation of female coaches in Ringette across PEI in the coming years.

This season we had a number of high performance teams competing at U14, U16, U19, and 18+ levels representing PEI at the Miramichi Tournament, Pierrefonds Tournament and the Atlantic Ringette Championships. Unfortunately our season was cut short due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and teams were not able to compete in the Eastern Canadian Ringette Championship and the Canadian Ringette Championships

Provincial U14 Wave Team Report

It is with great pleasure I present the report for the 2019-2020 U14 PEI Wave Team. This team was a talented group of respectful young women who showed up to every practice ready to put in the work. It is extremely unfortunate that their season ended short without any notice.

The U14 PEI Wave tryout process concluded September 25, 2019 after 6 sessions. Every player was given four tryouts before a cut was made. There were two final tryouts to allow coaches to make final decisions. 17 players (15 skaters, 2 goalies) were selected from the 66 players that competed for a position. Four were returning 2018-2019 Wave players, five were 2018-2019 Edge players and eight were provincial team rookies (two of which were second year U14 and six of which were first year U14 players).

Our team practiced nearly every Saturday morning in Pownal, then going to Colonel Gray for an hour of off-ice training. Saturday mornings worked well for the team, not interfering with house league commitments.

The U14 PEI Wave season consisted of 32 games (14 tournament competition and 18 exhibition games) and 20 practice sessions. We took part in 3 out of our 4 planned tournaments. In Miramichi, we lost in the bronze medal game to the Hotshots. The Hotshots were our team to beat all season, however with many close games we were unable to beat them. In Pierrefonds, the team went 1-3. The girls played well, never giving up. All games were very close. It was exciting to watch, as every game could have gone either way. For the Atlantics, our team won bronze. The bronze medal game ended up being against PEI Edge. The whole team was looking forward to Easterns. It was quite shocking to everyone when the season came to an abrupt end announced April 14. No Easterns for our team. No final competition that was talked about all season. Quite disappointing for the girls and coaching staff who put in many hours.

The team made time for fun as well. They were a spirited group who loved their time together. Memories were made on their long bus ride to Montreal, running the Souris Christmas Parade Turkey Trot, Christmas party, hotel stays, team meals, shopping malls, trip to the movies, and even a night out at an Escape Room. We all look forward to a team gathering when safe to do so.

A big thank you goes to all the parents who never questioned anything the team was doing. They all contributed any way they could. All parents were willing to help with meals, snacks, fundraising, game clocks, game sheets, and videoing games. Thank you to T&T Meals (Tara MacPhee and Tara Jeffery) for organizing every meal and snack for all tournaments and exhibition games. Big thank you to Brian Morrison for handling all team finances. Not an easy job. Thank you to Jamie Jeffery for booking ice times and thank you to Vanessa Neale for all her fundraiser organization. It was a true team effort to make everything flow smoothly. Being my first year as part of a provincial team, I had many questions. But the way parents stepped up to help, I never felt overloaded with the team responsibilities.

A big thank you goes out to the broader PEI community who supported our team through our various fundraisers and to the corporate community who came on as player, banner and social media sponsors. Their support was invaluable in making sure we were able to reach our goals.

Provincial U14 Edge Team Report

I'm very pleased to present the team report for

the 2019-20 PEI Edge Team. This was a dynamic young team that was on a consistent improvement path over the course of the year, culminating in competing in the Bronze medal game at the Atlantics – likely the first time that has taken place for a U14 Edge team in an un-tiered tournament.

The U14 Edge tryout process followed on the heels of the selection for the U14 Wave team. There were 50 players who tried out for the team including 4 goaltenders and 46 skaters. The selection process included two sets of two scrimmages. The selection process was very difficult and we were luckily able to rely on 6 experienced assessors in making the initial selections. 18 skaters and two goaltenders were selected from the initial tryout process and all were invited to participate in the first tournament in Dieppe. After the Dieppe tournament, the final roster of 15 skaters and 2 goaltenders were selected and the remaining 3 players were invited to remain as affiliate players for the year – they were welcomed to participate in all Saturday morning practices, Synergy training sessions, and exhibition games where players from the final roster were unable to attend or were injured.

The final roster of 17 players included 12 first year U14 players (8 of which were on the U12 development travel team from 2018-19) and 5 second year U14 players (3 of which were returning players from the U14 Edge team of 2018-19). The season's schedule consisted of 42 practice sessions (25 ice times, 15 Synergy training sessions, 2 classroom sessions), 9 exhibition games and 18 tournament games. The team participated in the Dieppe, Miramichi, Pierrefonds and Atlantic's tournaments.

It was truly an amazing team to be part of. Mainly due to the amount of improvement the team showed over the course of the year. With little lead time for preparation, and for most of them their first competition at the Provincial level, the initial jamboree in Dieppe was tough. In the following tournament in Miramichi, the team started to win some games and lost in overtime in the 5th place game. Then in Pierrefonds, the team had a win and a tie in the first day which put them in the running for the crossovers at the start of the second day. In the Atlantics on Day 1, the team similarly had a win and a tie against teams it had not won against previously. This ended up carrying the team into the top 4 and eventually making the Bronze medal game against the PEI U14 Wave.

Not only did the team do better and better in the outcomes of the tournaments, but it did likewise in the scores of the games. At the start of the year, there was a large spread against the strong AA teams. But the games got closer and closer the more times we played them, losing only 4-2 to the Stingers in the Atlantics semi-finals. The team was definitely building in skill and confidence over the season and if the extra month and a half remaining of the season had been played, there's a good chance they would have taken another step up at the Easterns.

The team was a great group to be around. This group of players have a lot of leadership abilities that if guided properly, should provide PEI Ringette with an excellent cast of strong performers over a long time. The best part was watching their confidence grow over the course of the year.

The team also benefitted tremendously from a fantastic coaching staff. I can't say enough about how the knowledge, experience and dedication of Kurt, Katie and Scott helped the team improve exponentially. Having a dedicated goaltender coach in Danielle was also a huge asset. We were blessed with very strong goaltending and having a coach dedicated to helping them improve every practice made a significant difference over the course of the year.

Off the ice, the team also had a very strong supporting cast. A huge thanks to Lauren, Vanda and Pat who did a lot of heavy lifting to make sure that we were organized, the girls were well looked after and the finances were in order. In addition, it was a great parent group with everyone chipping in to help out when called upon.

I would also like to thank all the work done to support the team by Ringette PEI. The knowledge gained from talking to the other coaching and team staff greatly contributed to the success of this team. The only disappointment I had from the year was that it finished too early!! Hopefully COVID-19 loses its steam soon and we're able to get back on the ice.

Provincial U16 Wave Team Report

In September, tryouts for the U16 Wave commenced. With forty- five players trying out for the PEI U16 Wave team, of those forty-five, seventeen were selected. Those selected invested a lot of time honing their skills, improving their fitness and learning the team systems. The team had 30 practices, played in



29 games which included participation in a pre-season jamboree, the Miramichi invitational, Pierrefonds and the Atlantic Canadian Ringette Championships. In addition to on-ice development, the U16 Wave had 10 off-ice fitness sessions at 3rd Degree Training, 2 nutrition sessions, 10 classroom sessions and some team bonding days as well.

The 2019-2020 season had a few "firsts" for the U16 Wave compared to past seasons.

To start, I'd like to thank Ringette PEI for giving me the opportunity to be the head coach for the U16 Wave. This was a first for me and for the athletes. I was fortunate to have Mike, Jamie and Mike alongside me to provide experience, advice and expertise. Secondly, we had an athlete join our team halfway through due to a season ending injury. This was a first for Ringette PEI. It was a lot to ask of the athlete and their family, however, they joined our team and fit right in. I would like to thank them for the contributions they've made to our team! Thirdly, I'd like to give a special shout out to 3rd Degree Training. This was the first time a Ringette PEI team had used their facilities and trainers to get a team in shape. The athletes absolutely loved it, Pam pushed them harder than anyone had before and accommodated all of their needs – from a crazy schedule to letting them listen to their own music. After our season was cut short, Pam offered to do a virtual workout with the athletes (every single athlete participated). 3rd Degree went above and beyond for our team this year. Lastly, COVID-19 struck in early March, which cut our season short. This resulted in the U16 Wave having to cancel a mental prep session, a team bonding session, 9 practices, 3 games as well as the Canadian Ringette Championships. Although COVID-19 didn't allow for us to finish our season as we would have liked, the U16 Wave still consider the 2019-2020 a successful season.

A special thanks to our assistant coaches who gave so much of their time to support the team. Their playing knowledge and ability to relate to the girls was invaluable. The athletes were lucky to have Mike and Mike for the entire year, bringing experience and knowledge from the Canada Games level. The U16 Wave would like to thank all of the parents who helped with many tasks to make this year flow

smoothly. Although every parent has put much time and effort into the development of their athlete this season, there are a few on the U16 Wave that went above and beyond, therefore, I believe should receive the recognition they deserve. Volunteering countless hours of minor officiating – Ray Carmichael, Wayne Peters and Trent MacPhee and Steven Murphy. As stated above, Melynda, Kelly and Shelly were our team managers this year and each one of them did an exceptional job. Without them, this season would not have been as successful as it was.

PEI's Under 16 Edge team started their season at the end of September. Most of the coaching staff had been at the U16 Wave tryouts, and did not believe a full tryout was required for this team. We had 2 scrimmages with the coaching staff and 4 independent evaluators providing feedback for the team selection. The team had 23 U16 athletes competing for 17 spots on the team. The final team was selected on September 29th.

The U16 PEI Edge season consisted of 30 games (16 tournament competition and 14 exhibition games, 3 of which were against U19 PEI Edge and 3 against the U14 PEI Wave so were more like scrimmages) and 34 practice sessions (20 on-ice and 14 dryland). The team had a very successful season, competing hard in all tournaments, finishing with Silver medals in the Miramichi and Pierrefonds tournaments and a Gold medal at the Atlantics.

U12 Development Program Report

The U12 development program this year went well overall. There were no designated head coaches instead the program was run by a committee of volunteers.

Kevin David and Donnie McKinnon were in charge of planning the on-ice practices each week and a host of volunteers would help run the drills making it a very successful practice.

Tracy MacDonald and Nicolle Hogan were co-managers taking care of all the finances.

Mark MacLeod took care of the ice bookings.

There were 60 players and 5 goalies that took part in U12 development program.

Practices were Saturday mornings in Morell 10:20 and 11:30 am. These ice times caused a lot of conflicts with the provincial house league schedule but with organizing each ice time around house league schedule we had very few missed practices by players.

To get a good idea of skill level we had on ice assessments and inter squad scrimmages at the start of the year. We used these to create groups for certain drills during practice and to help decide the roster of travel teams.

We settled on 4 teams this year. Two top level teams and two second level teams.

The two top level teams took part in two off island jamborees, exhibition games against New Brunswick teams and exhibition games against each other. We had two more jamborees scheduled to participate in but unfortunately because of COVID-19 we had to cancel those.

The two second level teams took part in 1 off island jamboree against NB and NS teams as well as having scrimmages against each other.

The program was cut short because of COVID-19 but we only missed the last 2 Saturday ice times in Morel.

The development ice times focused on skill development being broken into the following.

- 1. 10-15 minutes of skating. Edge work, starting, stopping, backwards transition and speed.
- 2. 30-40 minutes group stations. 3-4 stations focusing on shooting, passing and body position
- 3. 10-15 minutes two group competitive drill

U14 Development Program Report

This was the first year for this program, initiated based on the interest and skill of U14 players trying out for the Wave and Edge high performance teams. After players for those teams were selected, there were still approximately 30 players who had been interested in higher performance with no program to continue their development.

Ringette PEI approval was provided in late October 2019 for a U14 Development program to provide regular ice time focused on development, sometimes including inter-squad games with officials and anything further requiring advance approval from Ringette PEI.

A request for expression of interest went out from the High Performance Director, with strong response. The plan was to obtain a regular ice time at the same time as U14 high performance teams had their regular ice time so as not to interfere with home association practices or league games. Securing regular ice time was a significant challenge as was securing referees for inter- squad games.

There were 24 players participating, including two goaltenders, with the group including players from the Charlottetown, Rustico and Souris Associations.

There were a total of 17 ice times booked from November 2 - April 2, including five inter-squad games with officials. The total cost per player was \$150. Four of the games took place on two jamboree style game days (two games, with an hour break between games) on December 29 and January 16, purposely scheduled to take place when the U14 Wave and Edge teams were away at competitions.

The final ice time was cancelled with the Ringette PEI directive following the COVID19 pandemic. After canvassing parents, the remaining funds (\$230) were donated to the food bank.

Based on the feedback provided, the program was successful. There was noticeable improvement in both individual and team play. Players enjoyed the experience. The opportunity to get to know players on other teams in the province will continue to add to each player's experience on and off the ice.

A huge thank you to Michelle Hogan for the significant time and effort involved with organizing the group, booking and cancelling ice time, dealing with officials, parents and coaches. Thank you as well to the many coaches and parents who assisted with the skills sessions and games for these athletes. It was a true team effort.

Thank you to Ringette PEI for providing these U14 players with the opportunity to further develop their skills and love for ringette.
