Throughout the year, you all had to adapt and improvise to ensure our athletes were able to play the sport they love safely; for that, I am so grateful.

Our sport would not function without the countless volunteers across our five club associations and our High-Performance programming. From coaching, officiating, minor officiating, board members and Covid-19 trackers, please know your work is very much appreciated and by no means goes unnoticed. To all volunteers, thank you for your continued support and commitment to the sport we all love. You are the reason our athletes can play the sport they love.

It was not an easy year. Our team roster sizes were reduced, there were travel restrictions in place, and all facilities across the Island had capacities. Highlights of the year:

- Souris Ringette Association for winning three divisions (U12, U14, U16/19).

- Both the U8 and U10 jamborees were successfully run.
- High-Performance teams were able to play 20-25 games this year and created a mini schedule.
- Ringette PEI was able to maintain registration numbers.
- All levels within Ringette PEI had the opportunity to develop.

Thank you all, and I'm looking forward to witnessing our sport's continued growth and success on Prince Edward Island.

The 2020/21 House League season began on November 1st and ended at various times for different divisions. Typically, the house league season is supposed to end on the first Monday of March where playoffs will then follow however that did not happen in various divisions.

As Competitions Director I was filling a big set of shoes left by Brad Potter in the numerous years he held this position. With his help and others, I was able to weave through the various nuances and variables that make this job challenging. Even though this year there were no tournaments therefore causing less blackout dates to maneuver around there were still a unique set of challenges such as two, 2-week circuit breakers due to Covid, a small amount of blackout dates that were not communicated up front for a newbie, high school exams, parade day in Souris, and a few snow storms. Overall the weather was very co-operative and Mother Nature avoided heavy snow fall on Sundays which would have cancelled a lot of games throughout the Island.

Overall, we have to consider ourselves very lucky and fortunate as I believe we are the ONLY Province in Canada that has finished a complete season and also completed a Provincials to give team's closure to their season.

- U8 league ended up playing a jamboree at the end of the year while some associations organized jamborees between each other throughout the season
- U10 league had 9 teams playing each other once before the New Year. After which, the U10's were divided and scheduled accordingly based on competitive pairings for the remaining of the year. In total, the U10's played an 18 game season with a 2 day jamboree held in Georgetown
- U12 league had 14 teams and played each other at least once which meant 13 games before
 tiering. Shortly after the New Year, 7 teams were placed in the Hollis conference and 7 teams
 placed in the O'Brien conference. Seven games were played to complete the season for a 20
 game total season. Due to COVID and a 2-week circuit break there were a handful of teams that
 were awarded a 1 point tie to finish off their 20th game. Regular season ended on February 28th.

U14 | U16/19 | OPEN

• The U14 division, similar to the U12 division had 14 teams and were split into the Gallaway and Beaton conferences after the New Year playing a 13 game round robin. Regular season

- ended for the U14's on March 2nd also facing the same circumstances with the 2-week circuit breaker forcing some teams to not play their final game resulting in a 1 point tie.
- U16/19 division had 15 teams in its league, 3 more than last year. This division did not see
 any tiering or splitting of teams mid-way during the season like the U12 and U14 divisions.
 They played in total 22 games each, however, due to the 2-week circuit break, there were 1
 point ties awarded to teams who were yet to play against each other. The games could not
 be played due to the timing of the 2-week circuit break as it carried over into March where
 playoffs are normally underway therefore games could not be rescheduled.
- OPEN division had 5 teams in total, 3 from Charlottetown, 1 from Montague and 1 from Souris. In their 22 game schedule teams faced each other frequently.

Playoffs

This year we were able to complete a playoff in a modified format for U12's and up.

After having planned and scheduled a playoff format for the U12, 14, 16/19 and OPEN – it was all for nothing as the 2-week circuit break made it impossible shutting down Ringette for the first 2 weeks in March. Losing the first 14 days in March called for a modified playoff format which at that point was imperative that the circuit breaker ended on time on the 14^{th} of March.

U12 and **U14** – Bye's were awarded to the top seeded team only. Single round elimination ensured every team regardless of how they finished the regular season allowed them at least one game in the playoffs.

U16/19 – Single round elimination was also used for this division until the teams were down to four teams at which point a final four tournament was held among the four teams to decide the one game winner take all pairing for the championship.

OPEN 18+ - This division was small enough with 5 teams to be able to hold a normal playoff where the bottom two teams faced off in a one game elimination and then the four remaining teams played their best of three series to determine the winner. The final game was a winner take all game.

COACHING REPORT

Congratulations to all Ringette PEI coaches for another great season. We would also like to extend our thanks to all assistant coaches, managers, parents, officials, and volunteers who's support is integral to the success of Ringette PEI.

In the fall of 2020, Francois CARON received his certification to facilitate both Community Sport Introduction (CSI) and the Competition Introduction (CI) coaching courses. Francois put on one CSI course for each of the five associations that over 40 plus people were able to get their coaching certification. It was decided by the board that it was not in the best interest to offer a CI course this year due to the Covid 19 Pandemic but it will be offered in the fall of 2021. Ringette PEI will continue working with coaches to ensure all required certifications are in place.

Thanks to all the instructors for volunteering their time to certify our coaches and give them the knowledge they need to properly develop our players, ensuring they have fun playing our great game. The percentage of female coaches at the house league level for the 2020-2021 season was 42%. This is up from 36% in the 2019-2020 season, which is a significant improvement. At the High Performance level, Ringette PEI had a 59% female representation on the bench. Ringette Canada is encouraging all provinces to bring this number to 50% at all levels of competition. Ringette PEI is supportive of this goal and will be working on initiatives to further increase the representation of female coaches in Ringette across PEI.

This season we had a number of high performance teams competing at U14, U16 and U19 levels representing PEI. Unfortunately due to the Covid-19 Pandemic our teams were not able to compete off island in the Atlantic Championships, Eastern Canadian Ringette Championships and the Canadian Ringette Championships.

MARKETING & AWARDS REPORT

Many thanks to all who took the time to thoughtfully craft nomination letters for various athletes, volunteers, coaches and officials.

Last year, the committee discussed (based on last year's report) that there needed to be a simpler way for people to get nominees sent in. Victoria Leard had created google forms for all the awards. These included questions to provide details on the nominees (division, years played, a spot where the nominator could explain why they nominated that player and even a spot to provide a picture). This was sent out to all teams. This allowed for people to easily select the category for their nomination and send in their nominees. It was a quick and simple process. This format also could be shared easily with the awards committee. This made it simpler to make decisions as everyone was able to have a look at it before the meeting. Everyone was able to have a good idea on who was nominated and have their top picks.

This year, we have really put an emphasis on the volunteer award. The committee recognized how important volunteers are, especially this season. Volunteers had to stand outside of the rinks with the added duty of contact tracing. If not for them, things wouldn't have run as smoothly. We decided, as a committee, to recognize 2 volunteers instead of the usual 1.

With Covid still affecting our province, the awards ceremony will allow 50 people as per the Covid cohort rule. The ceremony will be held at the Wilmot Community Centre in Summerside. We are encouraging the nominees that they have been nominated for an award to join us at this event to share their recognition. We cannot have whoever there this year, therefore we are minimizing it to only the nominees.

Our award nominees, finalists and winners should all be very proud of their accomplishments in 2020-2021. Congratulations to you all! We also had a number of scholarship applications in 2021 from athletes Island-wide. OFFICIALS REPORT

This was a transition year, as I took over the position from Dave Saunders. First I would like to thank Dave for his years of service as not only an on-ice official, but as a Provincial Director/Supervisor, Nationally ranked Shot clock operator, community evaluator, instructor and coach. As I progress into the 2nd year of the term, I hope that he will continue to assist the younger officials (and us old folks) instead of just running into the sunset.

This year was a challenging year, as Ringette Canada had instituted that all courses at the beginning of the year were to be delivered online. It complicated matters in scheduling as only RC certified online instructors could deliver the course. When the decision was finally made that we could go back to in person / limited seating delivery, it was into January and I made the decision with only 2 months remaining in the season to postpone all courses for the year. I did have several one-on-one courses with some returning officials as to increase the number of senior officials on the ice, to assist with the u16/19 and provincial games.

This year, with the assistance of Dave Saunders, we identified a number of officials that we want to start moving up in the development level. These officials were identified, and started to move through development games as well as into provincial tryouts/league games to gauge their ability and throughout the year, were evaluated and given feedback as to their progress. My hope is to hold a Level 2/3 clinic over the summer, and continue to develop these officials.

Evaluations continued throughout the season, for both newer and returning officials, as well as officials at the provincial level. It was saddening that we couldn't get Atlantics/Easterns in again this year, as this would have been a way to get additional feedback and evaluations done by different evaluators.

The trend of abuse of officials is still continuing at an alarming rate. It is particularly hard to see and hear officials at the U10/U12 levels come to me with abuse issues and because they are inexperienced and didn't know the proper procedures, these people continue to get away with screaming and yelling at the younger officials. I personally had it happen in a U12 House league game by a parent, and if she was doing it to me, what are people saying to the 14-16yo officials that normally do the league. I would like to have any person who feels it is right to abuse officials to come to the clinic next year, do the course, and step on the ice for a season to experience what we do for the love of the sport.

HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

This is a new position put forth by Ringette PEI this year. The objective of this position is to keep track of injuries and concussions. We, as an association, have never kept track of these issues until now. Some incidents happen so fast in the game that it's hard to prevent but we must start now. At the end of the day, we all must work together so we can make the game safer for our players. The last thing any of us want is to walk out of the rink with an injured player.

This 2020/2021 season saw:

- 2 concussions; both were in the U14 level
- Fractured Wrist; 1 in U12 and 1 in U16/19 levels

Starting next year I will be proposing some new steps in reporting injuries on the ice.

The COVID-19 reports from the High Performance teams that had to be sent into myself to keep on file in case of an exposure were a great success. I am very happy to report that we did not have to use one report for contact tracing.

I would like to thank the parents who had the job of sending in the reports to me, thank you very, very much.

I also want to thank the teams and parents for following the guidelines set out by each rink and the Health Department. By following the rules we had no exposures.



I'm very pleased to present the team report for the 2020-21 PEI U14 Wave Green Team. This was





The U14 Wave tryout process for the two U14 Wave teams were completed together. There were 64 players who tried out for the teams including 6 goaltenders and 58 skaters. The selection process included two sets of skills and drills practices and a set of scrimmages. The selection process was very difficult and we were luckily able to rely on both teams' full coaching staffs in making the initial selections. Subsequent to a cut, a final scrimmage was completed prior to selection of the final teams. The final selection process included the splitting of the Wave players into two teams – each with 11 skaters and one goaltender.

The final roster of Wave Green of 12 players included one U14 Wave player from the prior year, eight U14 Edge players from the prior year, one U14 Edge affiliate from the prior year and two U12 Development players from the prior year. The season's schedule consisted of 56 practice sessions (34 ice times, 22 First Degree training sessions - some in person and some online), 26 regular games and 3 mixed games with the U14 Edge teams. The breakdown of 26 regular games was 11 games against the U14 Wave White team, 7 games against the U16 Edge, 6 games against the U16 Wave teams, one game against the U19 Edge and one game against an Open team. There would have likely been more practices and games except for Covid restrictions during the year that shut down play on two occasions.

It was a really enjoyable team to be a part of. There was a high level of comradery among the players and they really enjoyed spending time together on and off the ice. It was disappointing that they weren't able to participate and experience the regular off-island high level competitions as per normal, but when health restrictions allowed them to, they enjoyed getting together for team functions.

The team had some injury issues early on in the season with two players being injured - one player was out with a concussion (not from ringette) for the first 4 months of the season. With a small roster, having any players off due to injury made a big difference. The first time that the team played with its full roster was during the high performance weekend at the end of the season.

The team showed significant improvement over the course of the year especially in skating strength, defensive zone play, and moving the ring between the zones. The main competition was the U14 Wave White team and after going 1-4 in the first 5 games, Wave Green went 5-1 in the last 6 games played

between the teams. The teams were very close and many of the games could have gone either way. It would have been preferable for the main level of competition to come from off-island teams but that wasn't possible with the health restrictions.

The team was a great group to be around. This group of players have a lot of leadership abilities and are a very hard working group. It was impressive to watch their skills, level of play and team character develop over the course of the year.

The team also benefitted tremendously from a fantastic coaching staff. I can't say enough about how the knowledge, experience and dedication of Kurt, Isabelle and Scott helped the team improve. Having a dedicated goaltender coach in Danielle was also an asset. We were blessed with very strong goaltending and having a coach dedicated to helping them improve was very beneficial.

Off the ice, the team also had a very strong supporting cast. A huge thanks to Nicolle, Kara, Becky, Pat and Kelly who did a lot of heavy lifting to make sure that we were organized, the girls were well looked after, the finances were in order and everyone was covid traced. In addition, it was a great parent group with everyone chipping in to help out with the clock, shot clock, scoresheet, covid monitor and off-ice events.

I would also like to thank all the work done to support the team by Ringette PEI. The knowledge gained from talking to the other coaching and team staff, and especially the coaches circle events, greatly contributed to the improvement of the team.

Hopefully COVID-19 loses its steam soon and next year the girls are able to get back to a more regular high performance season.

Provincial U14 Wave White Team Report

It is with great pleasure that I present the report for the 2020-2021 U14 PEI Wave Team. This team was a talented group of respectful young women who showed up to every practice excited to be there. With it being a covid season, we were grateful to have the girls on the ice every week furthering their development. I have heard from many girls that this was the best team they've ever been a part of!

The U14 PEI Wave tryout process concluded October 10, 2020 after 4 sessions. Due to covid, there were two U14 Wave teams made of 12 players each (11 skaters, 1 goalie). The plan was to keep the teams small and for the teams to have someone to play against if travel didn't happen this season. This plan worked for the best, since there was no off island travel all season. Our team consisted of five returning 2019-2020 Wave players, four 2019-2020 Edge players and three provincial team rookies (two of which were second year U14 and one first year U14 player). We had an AP goalie, Leah Sentner. She attended most practices and played a few games. She was a great player who showed much development. Our girls were always encouraging her, and Tyler always expressed such pride in our girls' attitude towards uplifting Leah and all teammates.

Our team practiced every Saturday morning, alternating in Pownal and Georgetown. Saturday mornings before our ice time our team went to Third Degree for an hour of dryland training, in Stratford or Montague. U12 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM REPORT

It was a great year for the U12 Development program. Initially there were 75 players that signed up for the program, but unfortunately due to the COVID protocols put in place we were put in the unenviable task of selecting 54 players for the program.

Never an easy task, but the 75 players were evaluated through a series of skating assessments and then evaluated through game play. The game play evaluators were representatives from each of the associations that had players in the program: Souris, Montague, Charlottetown and Rustico.

The 54 players selected had their ice sessions in Morell each Saturday morning either at 10:10 or 11:20. With the exception of the time during the circuit breaker, the session went uninterrupted until the end of March. With Marion Dowling and myself, along with the assistance of on-ice parent volunteers, the sessions were fast paced with the focus on skating, passing-receiving the ring, moving into space, defending and shooting. It was great to see the skill level of each player improve over the winter and the many comments from parents that reflected this. One piece that should be incorporated in the future would be some focus with the goaltenders. Although some time was spent with them over the course of the winter, I believe a more concentrated effort from someone with a goaltending background would be of great benefit.

With the inability to travel off Island 4 equal teams were created to play a series of games against each other. Over the course of the season each team was able to play 8 games and the skill and pace of play on the ice dramatically improved with each game played. It was hoped that more games could have been played, but trying to balance the U12 teams across the four associations, plus the search for ice, limited these opportunities.

In February one team of 2nd year players was comprised from the 4 Development teams. This team, comprised of 13 skaters and one goalie, had 2 hours of practice time and was able to play 8 games in total against the two U14 Edge teams. Although the U12's didn't win any of these games, the majority of the games were close with a few of the games decided within the last 5 minutes.

This experience against the U14 Edge teams was a great opportunity for the U12's as it gave them the chance to take part in in a series of fast paced

Rustico Ringette Association Report

Most of August and September were spent working with our local arena to come up with an operational plan that would abide by RPEI's Return to Play Guidelines, which were drawn up over the summer. We also collaborated with the local minor hockey association so that our plans were somewhat similar and the arena could operate as efficiently as possible.

Our September online registration process went very well, with only a few families having to find alternate methods to register. Our registration numbers grew once again by approximately 10% to 110 registered players. This allowed us to have a U6 group, one U8 team, two U10 teams, two U12 teams, two U14 teams, and two U16/19 teams.

With no tournaments allowed this year, there was a bit of an impact on our U8's, as they would normally only play games in a tournament or jamboree. By December, we were able to schedule some games with other associations. Our other teams didn't have any tournaments either, which was missed by many, but found the regular-season schedule was a little more consistent without the blackout days for tournaments. All of our teams had some great games this year, and our U14 Rustico Rush made us very proud by winning the Rustico association's first RPEI championship in the U14 Galloway division.

The number of Rustico players playing at the provincial level also grew, with four players in the RPEI U12 development program and six playing on either Edge or Wave provincial teams. We also started a U12 development program for our Rustico Association this year. It was also open to our second year U10's. The program was well received and a noticeable improvement in skill was observed. Our hope is that this program will result in more of our players participating in the Edge and Wave programs in the future. A huge thank you goes out to Jessica Snowden for all of her help with this initiative.

Operating within COVID-19 guidelines did add to the workload of our Board of Directors and I can't thank them enough for the extra time and effort each of them put forward this year.
