In total 43 teams played 522 games for the 2024/2025 season.

The season started on October 19th and ended on February 23rd, 2025.

Provincials started on February 23rd and ended on March 5th, 2025.

Scheduling

The only tiering that occurred this past season happened in the U19 division where there were 14 teams. It was divided into two conferences with 8 teams in the upper conference and 6 teams in the lower conference.

U10 teams had 16 regular season games. U12 and U14 teams had 18 regular season games. U19 and OPEN teams each had 22 games.

Blackouts and less ice times this year proved to be a challenge to schedule games evenly and consistently throughout the season. The only two official blackout periods for the RPEI regular season are the Montague Tournament and the Charlottetown Tournaments. Apart from those two blackouts, U12 teams and higher have two travel authorities granted to them so we are seeing teams starting to take part in the Gary Field Tournament in Nova Scotia which happens typically at the end of November / first week in December. This removes three full weekends of ice in PEI for regular season play. Ice time in Charlottetown was reduced due to sledge hockey and Women's Hockey in the month of December.

Provincials

The month of March was very tricky and decisions were made to hold Provincials prior to the Moncton/Dieppe/Riverview tournament because of how the weekends unfolded.

March Weekends

March 1 and 2 - available

March 8 and 9 - NB Tournament (not available for games on PEI)

March 17/18 and 24/25 - March Break - there was no appetite to hold provincials or games during March Break with so many traveling post COVID.

March 31 / April 1 - U16 and U19 WAVE teams away for Nationals and by this time, there has been too much of a gap between March 2nd to March 31 to finalize playoffs.

So you can see from the above March outline why ending the season in February and holding Provincials before the Moncton tournament was essential in order to complete Provincials and end the season. The plan moving forward will be to have the regular season and provincials completed before the start of the Moncton tournament each year.

The playoff format chosen allowed for every team to at least get three games played before their season ended. It was a tournament style format rather than a best of three series or single game elimination. Antidotal feedback received was very positive as it was very inclusive and provided meaningful competition among teams. As we progress from year to year, we will learn from any lessons and adapt accordingly to improve our year end Provincial Playoff program.

- **The U12 Division Champions are Souris-Llewellyn-U12** with an OT win vs Souris-Penny-U12.
- **The U14 Division Champions are Rustico-Deagle** with a win over Souris-Bailey.
- **The U19 Clark Conference Champions are Chtown-Blagdon** with a win over Chtown-Dollar
- **The U19 Dowling Conference Champions are Chtown-MacDonald** with a win over Chtown-Saulnier
- **The OPEN Division Champions are Chtown-Devine** with a win over Chtown-James

The U10 Division wraps up their season with a year end jamboree where all teams will play a few games vs teams of the same skill level as identified throughout the season with regular game play.

Conclusion

My goal this year was to provide a year-long schedule for planning purposes which meant tiering at Christmas did not happen with the exception of the u19 division. I will revisit this on a go forward basis for practicality and competitive play. Also, it was my goal to also provide a meaningful way to wrap up the season with the past Provincial format in a tournament style while ending before the Moncton tournament. This also allowed the High Performance teams more flexibility to plan and practice during the month of March leading up to the Nationals and Easterns. It is very apparent now after sitting in this position for a few years that starting to plan the whole season starting in September is necessary with the amount of blackouts, tournaments, conflicts, lack of ice and maneuvering around the High Performance program.

Many thanks to those who took the time to submit their nominations through Ringette PEI Website. Also, thank you to the selection committee (Association Presidents and/or delegates) who took the time to review all the nominee submissions.

This year, we made three call outs for player of the game throughout the season. Coaches were to submit the Player of the Game nominee by google form on the Ringette PEI Website. Coaches were able to provide a description of why they chose that player. A player could be nominated more than once.

On April 9, 2025, there was also one final call for Player of the Year at the end of the season. These submissions asked how the athlete developed over the season, how they had shown sportsmanship, what types of things they had done to support their teammates and what sets this athlete apart. The player of the game and player of the year submissions were combined and reviewed to choose a player of the year for each level.

On April 9, 2025, award nominations opened for the Senior Goalie, Jr Goalie, Coach of the Year, Team of the Year, High-Performance Team of the Year, Official of the Year and Volunteer of the Year nominees were all submitted through Google Forms on Ringette PEI website at the end of the season.

All nominations closed on May 4, 2025. Nominations for Ringette PEI Scholarship opened on April 9, 2025, and closed on May 15, 2025. Nominees provided academic information, a personal letter explaining their academic goals and how ringette has impacted their life, they also provided a ringette resume and two letters of reference.

OFFICIALS REPORT

Nicolle Hogan

Director of Officials, Ringette PEI

We successfully offered two Level one trainings this year one held in Rustico and one held in Montague. Combined there were 18 new officials that received the course and began officiating this season. We currently have 59 active officials with RPEI.

In October 2024, there was an increase in officiating fees from \$30 to \$33-\$37 per official who ref high performance games (range is due to the level of high-performance game and time allotted; 2-17 mins periods vs 4-10 mins periods).

Officials were assigned to 119 High Performance (HP) tryout and exhibition home games for six HP teams throughout the season. Twelve officials were assigned for the Championship final and semi final games in March 2025 and David Saunders provided shot clock officiating for all final games.

High performance tournaments provide an opportunity for local officials to receive updated evaluations to support their growth as an official. In October, the HP jamboree welcomed Jeff Hughes and Breanne MacInnis. In February 2025, Breanne MacInnis, Steven MacIntyre, Natalie Caron, and Jamie MacAulay participated in the Atlantic Ringette Championships hosted by NB. Breanne MacInnis was also chosen to officiate during the Canadian Ringette Championships in Ontario this year and David Saunders participated as a Shot Clock Official. The Eastern Canadian Ringette Championships in April welcomed Natalie Caron and Chris Rushton as officials.

A total of 40 evaluations and feedback forms were completed over the 2024-2025 season. Providing ongoing feedback to officials is imperative to continue to support their growth in gaining awareness and to enhance their confidence as an official.

RPEI held an official's celebration this year to celebrate the dedication and commitment of our island officials and in a recruitment and retention efforts. Each active official received an engraved whistle and were invited to participate in an afternoon fun social at Pony Boat.

Continued efforts over the coming years will be focused on supporting recruitment and retention of officials and supporting and building their capacity. As a ringette community, we all need to take the time to thank our Island Officials for their time and dedication in officiating ringette on PEI. Without the commitment of officials in taking the time to learn the rules and gain confidence in their abilities in officiating games, there would be no games to play.

The Health and Safety of our game are of utmost importance to Ringette PEI. I would first like to congratulate all athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, and everyone who participated in the wonderful 2024/25 season.

The objective of this position is to keep track of all injuries and concussions throughout the season, ensure all teams have up-to-date information and forms for insurance and incident reporting, ensure all teams have the proper first aid training and equipment, and lastly, promote the health and safety of all participants.

During this 2024/25 season, there were a total of 6 injuries reported

- 3 Concussions (1 U12 and 2 U16/U19 level)
- 2 Wrist Fractures (1 U12 and 1 U16/U19 level)
- 1 Elbow Injury (U14 level)

Despite this being one more injury than last season, I would like to note that most of these injuries were not considered severe, as nearly all athletes were able to return safely to play. In addition, I believe we have better communicated the process for reporting injuries and have thus also seen an increase in reporting.

I would like to thank all athletes, coaches, and parents for completing the forms and following all injury/concussion protocols. We take all information on injuries/concussions seriously, allowing us to develop future protocols and education to limit the number of injuries and ensure the health and safety of all participants.

Thank you all for a great season. I look forward to continuing to advocate, educate, and propose new ways to ensure the health and safety of our sport!

Tryouts for this team began on August 27th, 2024. Our team was picked on September 4th, the team consisted of 17 athletes: 15 skaters and 2 goalies. Of those 17, seven came from Rustico, three from Souris, three from Montague, and four from the Charlottetown area.

Our season consisted of biweekly ice times on Saturdays and Mondays, with a weekly dry land fitness session held at the Stratford soccer complex. We had a total of 50 practices, 23 workouts, and 44 games (including tournaments) this season. We participated in three tournaments: Pierrefonds, Atlantics held in Shediac, NB, and Eastern Canadians back in Pierrefonds. This team brought home a silver medal from Pierrefonds, gold from Atlantics, and another silver from Easterns.

We are very pleased to present the team report for the 2024-25 PEI U16 Edge Team. This was a dynamic team that gelled extremely well and grew over the course of the year. We had success through out the year as a team and as individuals both on and off the ice. Our team goal from the first player meeting was to win Easterns and we came up just short losing 5-3 in the final.

Tryouts for this team began in mid September and included 3 goalies and 41 skaters. The selection process included one set of skills and drills practice (2 ice times players divided into 2 groups), and 4 game scrimmages that had each participant scheduled to play in 3 of the 4 scrimmages to maximize their chance of being assessed. The initial cuts were made after the 6th ice time and we reduce the players for final assessment to 18 forwards, 10 defence and 3 goalies. We completed the roster after a final game day where the rosters were split to be as even as possible. The goalies played equal amounts through out the entire process including the final tryout. Final selections resulted in 9 forwards, 6 defense and 2 goalies being selected. We offered AP roles to 4 other players and that reduce to 2 due to other commitments.

During the year we had a few injuries to overcome which allowed our AP players to play some games. Due to the travel time one of the AP players stopped attending prior to Christmas which led to more games for our remaining AP who also travelled and played in the Pierrefonds tournament. Our AP player showed great determination and desire to improve and was a massive benefit to our team in both practice and games when needed.

Our regular ice times and conditioning sessions were held on Saturday mornings 8 am ice time at Cody Banks, followed by a conditioning session at 9:30 am at 782 Athletics. As well as Tuesdays 7:00pm Full Throttle Fitness in Morell and practice at Morell rink at 8:30pm. Tuesdays were a struggle for our team as house league scheduled games for U16/19 on that night, and despite trying to change our second practice date we were unable to secure another night so we continued on with what we had. There is significant room for improvement here.

Our parent group was outstanding and very supportive. This was shown in everything from supporting the team in the stands to helping out at fundraisers and group activities and with meal preps and loading and off loading buses etc...

I would also like to thank all the work done to support the team by Ringette PEI and a special thank you to Francois Caron on doing the coaching course and reviewing some game video and offering some tips on what we could do in certain situations.

Overall our team had 44 practices and 34 off ice training sessions as well as a mental prep training with Mrs Costello. These training sessions led to impressive game results that included games played against other U16A teams, U19A, U14 Wave, and U18+, 45 games in total. Our

record in 35 games at U16A level was 25-8-2, with a 9 win 7 losses 2 ties against U16A NB and we were 16-1 against all other U16A teams

The U19 Wave program began its 2024-2025 season with tryouts in late August, where 34 athletes competed for a spot on the roster. At the conclusion of evaluations, 17 skaters were selected to proudly represent the U19 Wave.

Throughout the season, the team held practices at Pownal on Saturdays and in Morell on Monday evenings, accumulating a total of 45 on-ice sessions. Our schedule consisted largely of games against UPEI, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia teams, with additional matchups against PEI and NB Open teams. The team finished with an overall record of 18 wins, 21 losses, and 2 ties. We had the opportunity to participate in two major tournaments leading up to the Canadian Ringette National Championships. In December, the team competed at the Gatineau Invitational, advancing to the semifinals. In January, the U19 Wave attended the Pierrefonds tournament, finishing the round robin with an impressive 4 wins and a tie before falling in the semifinals.

The highlight of our season was representing PEI at the Canadian Ringette National Championships. The team competed hard, ultimately finishing 14th overall after a tough semifinal loss in the consolation round.

In addition to our on-ice commitment, the team completed 12 off-ice training sessions at 3rd Degree Training, further building strength, conditioning, and team cohesion.

We would like to extend our sincere thanks to Ringette PEI for providing us the opportunity to coach this talented group of athletes and continue our own growth as a coaching staff.

A special thank you to assistant coaches Sarah Legault and Alex McMonagle for their tireless dedication and to Kelly Sutcliffe, whose work as team manager kept everything running smoothly behind the scenes.

To the parents – thank you for your unwavering support and willingness to assist whenever called upon. And most importantly, to the players: thank you for your hard work, commitment, and resilience throughout the year. It was a privilege to coach this group, and we are proud of all you accomplished.

This season, the U12 Development Program achieved great success, thanks in large part to the incredible support and commitment of our players' families.

We would like to extend our gratitude to Krystal Rice, Erin Aitken and Erika MacLean for managing the program's communication and finances with dedication and efficiency.

Our coaching team brought a wealth of enthusiasm and expertise to the ice. Coaches included Tiffany Doucette, Mitch MacLean, Chris Oatway, Devan Llewellyn, Daisy Doucette, and Davina Baldwin. We were also fortunate to have dedicated goaltending support from goalie coach Nick Duffy.

The program welcomed a total of 64 athletes from the Souris to Summerside Ringette Associations. Practices were held Saturday mornings in Morell, with sessions alternating between 10:50 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. The season ran from late October 2024 to the end of March 2025.

Early on, the focus was on skill development, particularly skating and core ringette techniques. In November, we formed four intersquad teams. U14 Development Program Report

Thank you for the opportunity for Angie, Natalie and I to Coach the U14 RPEI Development Program. Please find below an outline of our season, budget and questions that were raised by parents/players that we were unable to answer.

Our motto was 'THRIVE', with our goal being for the players to have the opportunity to continue to grow their passion for the game of ringette, to develop their ringette skills, to enjoy the comradery of a team, and be introduced to fitness training. For the players to continue to develop their capacity to work hard towards a goal, to be kind and inclusive of each other, to take risks, to stay positive and supportive, to be flexible and open to new ideas, to try to be the best version of themselves, to thrive in their relationships, attitude and approach. The experience with the group was TOP notch, the girls were everything you could hope for as a coach, they battled, they listened, they worked and they laughed.

We had 18 players participate. Our Manager/Treasurer was Paula Pollard. Paula did an exceptional job of keeping everything organized, in her communication with the parents/group, organizing team activities/trips, ordering jerseys and apparel for the players, and managing program funds. Our coaching staff consisted of Natalie MacDonald, Angie Taylor and Dylan Taylor. Coach 'Nat' is a tremendous young coach and a favorite of all the players. An amazing example and mentor for young ringette players. Starting October 19th we practiced each Saturday morning at 7:45 am for an hour, with a 1/2 hour of fitness to follow. We had 17 practices and 8 games. We travelled to New Brunswick twice for games and played the u12 Development teams on two occasions.

Ringette PEI response to questions above:

Why is our group only allowed to travel off Island twice, while the other Provincial programs are allowed to travel as much as they would like? Is it because of the current skill level of our players?

The travel limits for development groups like the U14 group (and the U12 and U16/19) are not based on your players' skill level. Instead, they reflect the purpose and structure of the program. Development groups are designed to focus on training, skill-building, and long-term athlete development. Because of this, travel is kept to a minimum so the emphasis remains on learning and improving through local and regional experiences. Development groups are not sanctioned competitive teams.

In contrast, Provincial teams are performance-based programs that represent the province in high-level competitions. Their mandate includes attending major events like national championships or interprovincial tournaments, which naturally requires more travel. House League teams also travel infrequently, as travel is not a core requirement of their programming. Like development groups, they are typically limited to two sanctioned travel events per season.

Why aren't we able to go into tournaments while the other programs are? Is this something that could change?

Development groups are not considered sanctioned competitive teams under the program structure nor Ringette Canadas policy, which means they are not eligible to participate in sanctioned tournaments that are designed for officially rostered, competitive teams. This is not a reflection of player ability, but rather how the teams are classified and governed. No it cannot be changed, as this sanctioning policy is at the National Sport Organization level.

We will be hosting an information session at the start of next season to help members better understand the roles of governance, sport law, and National Sport Organization (RC), Provincial Sport Organizations (PSOs), our hope is to better support our membership and arm them with important information on the world of sport.

Could Development start right after Edge tryouts?

This is an important point. We can look at opening expressions of interest for the Development program earlier in the season. One idea is to include a question on the High Performance registration form, allowing athletes to indicate their interest in Development if they are not selected for a HP team but still want to continue building their skills. I will most certainly bring this to the next board meeting in June.

Also worth noting: next season, we'll be expanding **Project Peak Performance** to include House League players. This means any U14+ athlete will have the opportunity to take part in additional skill development seminars, regardless of their program placement.

This will allow us to reach more athletes and have a broader impact across the province. Additionally, we aim to broaden the range of seminar topics and invite guest speakers, including high-performance and semi-professional athletes, to share their insights and experiences.

I was also proud to be involved in planning our first Officials Appreciation Event this season. Recognizing the contributions of our officials is essential, and I hope this event becomes an annual tradition to celebrate their dedication and commitment to the game.

Throughout the year, securing grant funding that supports the development of athletes, which continues to be a core value for Ringette PEI has been a major focus. 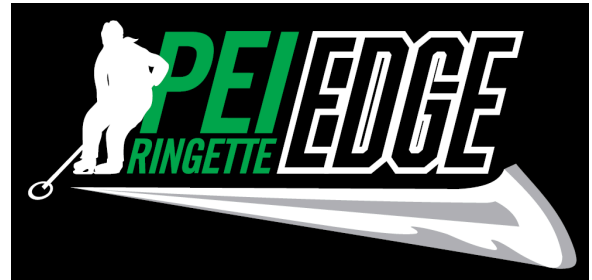
