COMPETITIONS REPORT

The 2021/2022 Ringette House League regular season began in early late October and finished on March 30, 2022. The season started out as planned with COVID-19 restrictions still in place but mid-December through January the season halted due to outbreaks and CPHO shutting down sporting activities. During this time RPEI had to decide how the season would finish with the extended 6-week break resulting on teams potentially not being able to complete their regular season. By a majority vote it was decided by head coaches across PEI to use the rest of the season to try and complete as many regular season games as possible. This meant that teams were not able to play a formal Provincial tournament to declare champions in each division. The intent was to provide as many teams as much ice time and development with the possibility of more delays with COVID.

As my second year as Competitions director, I was able to use the experience gained a year prior to help make scheduling more efficient as possible. One such aspect was to dedicate Saturdays for U14 and above to High Performance teams where house league play would be very minimal. For the most part this was successful, and I believe the High-Performance teams had very little conflict in the end. Also, I would like to extend my gratitude to all the association ice schedulers who worked with me to make scheduling easier and when there were cancellations to help reschedule and to make sure referees are notified asap.

This year also marked the transition from Goalline to RAMP which meant associations had to learn a new platform for managing their association's registrations, teams and score reporting. I felt it went smooth for the most part as the upcoming year we will be able to hit the ground running with a familiar system as the rest of Canada transitions to RAMP as it was mandated by Ringette Canada by 2022. I was able to help and support associations with their individual needs and setup of the registration systems, team assignments, pairing with the RPEI website and took part in association zoom meetings to do demonstrations on how to input game scores and game sheets.

Divisional Reports

- U8 league wrapped their season up with a jamboree and before the extended COVID break some associations were able to host a jamboree. It has been well received that year after year each association holds a jamboree day during the season for all associations to attend. However this year only some were able to do so due to COVID.

- U10 division had one team less than last year, 8 in total. They were soft tiered which meant that game scores submitted after the first-round robin it was determined who was strong, mid-range and below average in competitive play. This then determined who would play who for the remaining part of the season. The scores of the games were not made public for this age group but kept for internal purposes for fair competition. The focus of this division is for fun and development.
- U12 division had 9 teams participating this season which was a huge drop from last year having 14 teams total. After the first-round robin, due to the break in COVID and not having Provincials – there was no need to publicly tier the division into the normal HOLLIS and O'BRIEN conferences. Teams were also soft tiered when determining the schedule for the remaining part of the season. Most teams were able to get close to their 20 games played to complete their season but others did not due to cancellations, lack of players to fill a roster due to COVID illnesses. The U12 Cherry Bombs completed the season with 18 games played, 15 wins, 0 losses and 3 ties to lead the division with 33 points followed by U12 Miller with 19 games played, 13 wins, 3 losses and 3 ties with 29 points.
- U14 division had 12 teams participating this season which were slightly down from last season having 14 teams. After the first-round robin, teams again were scheduled using a soft tiering system scheduling teams against each other who could provide fair competition among one another. Teams were not able to get in all their 20 games played due to COVID and cancellations unfortunately. Charlottetown MacDonald (17 games played) and Charlottetown Myers (19 games played) tied for top spot in the division with 16 points. MacDonald 13-4-0 and Myers 13-6-0.
- U16/19 division had the same number of teams playing this year and last year with 15. What was going to be a first for this year for this division was to tier the teams mid-season for the first time. However, due to the stoppage of play with COVID, it did not happen. I'm happy to announce the names of the conferences going forward will be the Dowling and Clark Conferences. Most teams were able to get above 20 games played for the season. Souris team Dingwell finished the season on top of their division with 29 points, 15 games played, 14 wins and 1 tie followed by Charlottetown Gallant with 18 games played, 12-5-1 record having 25 points.
- OPEN division had 5 teams participating from Charlottetown this year and 1 from Montague. Souris was unable to put a team in this year. Eventually it would be nice to see at least 1 team from each association. The stats for this division are not 100% accurate as indicated on the website as gamesheets / scores were not always entered. The division was able to get most of their games in before the season ended.

Playoffs/Provincials/ Year End Tournament

Because there were no playoffs or Provincials this year, there was an informal year end tournament held in Belfast for the U14 group and Rustico for the U12 group. The U16/19 group did not have a year-end tournament due to High Performance teams leaving for the Nationals in early April and the lack of ice available. Although some thought this was the Provincials for the teams, it was in fact not the case. It was good to see the tournaments take place so the U12 and U14 house league teams could have some closure to their year.

The U8 and U10 divisions were able to hold jamborees which took place in early April which Victoria organized and made possible.

It has been very challenging over the past couple years dealing with COVID and scheduling. I am looking forward to continuing as Competitions Director for another 2 year term and building off the past two years of scheduling experience and hopefully back to a normal year of ringette without pandemic restrictions.

COACHING REPORT

Congratulations to all Ringette PEI coaches for another great season. Thanks also going out to all assistant coaches, managers, parents, officials, and volunteers.

We were able to hold two coaching courses this season. Francois Caron conducted a Community Sport Introduction (CSI) clinic in December 2021. This clinic had 8 house league level coaches attend. Francois then put on one Competition Introduction course over a couple days in December as well. 8 coaches were able to get their coaching certification. Of these 8 coaches, 7 were actively coaching this season at the high performance level, 1 coach plans to coach at this level next season. Francois was also able to work with the 7 coaches to conduct their on ice coach evaluations. All 7 coaches were evaluated and are now fully certified at the Competition Introduction level. We also had two coaches who completed the Competition Development course with Ringette Nova Scotia to be able to coach the 2023 Canada Games ringette team. These coaches are now working on their portfolios to apply for their on ice evaluations to complete their training prior to the Games in February. Ringette PEI will continue working with coaches to ensure all required certifications are in place.

Thanks to Francois for volunteering his time and working so closely with the coaches to ensure their certification was completed.

Overall for the 2021-22 season, 44% of coaches over all levels of the sport on PEI were female. At the HP level this percentage was over 50%. Ringette Canada is encouraging all provinces to bring this number to 50% at all levels of competition. Ringette PEI is supportive of this goal and will be working on initiatives to further increase the representation of female coaches in Ringette across PEI.

This season we were back to our normal number of high performance teams competing at U14, U16 and U19 levels representing PEI. Although the Covid-19 Pandemic still caused some obstacles for our teams, all HP teams were able to participate in a number of tournaments this season. This included a tournament in Memramcook in late November, as well as the Eastern Canadian Ringette Championships and the Canadian Ringette Championships in April.

MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

Many thanks to the coaches who took the time to pick a player of the game and write it on the game sheets. Also, thank you to managers who sent me the games sheets/ players for their player of the game. Last but not least, thanks to those who took the time to thoughtfully craft nomination letters for various teams, volunteers, coaches and officials.

This year, we really put an emphasis on a player of the game for each team. Each coach was to pick a player for each game who showed skill, sportsmanship, leadership and demonstrated that they were coachable. Coaches were to write one name per team at the bottom of the game sheet. The home team then sent me the names and I put them down on a spreadsheet. If a player was nominated for a second time, they would get a 2 beside their name and so forth. This indicated that the player was nominated more than once. This made the pool of athletes much bigger to choose from when it came to selecting the finalists and winners. Players were narrowed down to 5. We sent the coaches of the 5 players so that they could complete a write up for these players. This allowed the committee to have a better understanding of why these players were chosen. The committee then chose the 3 finalists and chose the winner.

The Senior Goalie, Jr Goalie, Coach of the Year, Team of the Year, High Performance Team of the Year and volunteer of the year were done through google forms as done in the past. Victoria Leard created google forms for all of these awards. These included questions to provide details on the nominees (division, years played, a spot where the nominator could explain why they nominated that player and even a spot to provide a picture). This was sent out to all teams. This allowed for people to easily select the category for their nomination and send in their nominees. It was a quick and simple process. This format also could be shared easily with the awards committee. This made it simpler to make decisions as everyone was able to have a look at it before the meeting. Everyone was able to have a good idea on who was nominated and have their top picks.

Our award nominees, finalists and winners should all be very proud of their accomplishments in 2021-2022. Congratulations to you all! We also had a number of scholarship applications in 2021 from athletes Island-wide. It is impressive to see the contribution they are making in their communities not only where ringette is concerned, but in other sports, academics and volunteer initiatives. Best of luck to all of our young ladies as they graduate from high school and move into a new stage in their lives. We hope that you carry fond memories of ringette with you, and find your way back to the sport in some capacity.

This year the U14 Wave team had a successful season. The coaching staff was Brittney MacCormac, Tyler Larter, Georgia Fraser, and Terry MacCormac. Manager was Nicolle Hogan.

The season began in September with over seventy athletes trying out for the team. After 4-6 tryout sessions, 15 skaters and 2 goalies were chosen for the team. Our weekly practice time was 9:00am Saturday mornings in Pownal, with other ice times picked up for games and extra practices leading up to tournaments. In October, we attended a high performance tournament in Moncton, NB with good results, losing in the semi-final game and finishing fourth. Every odd weekend, we also took turns hosting and traveling to play exhibition games against high performance teams from New Brunswick.

With plans to attend the Pierrefonds tournament in January, we had ramped up our practices and games in preparation, however, were unable to attend due to COVID, which also led to a near two month pause in our season.

After we were able to resume practices, we picked up some extra ice times to get the team back on track and where we needed to be. Atlantics were also canceled in February as it was too soon after the return of play. Our season was then geared towards Easterns, adding in extra practices and games in the 3-4 weeks leading up to the tournament. We ended up finishing off with a silver medal at Easterns, which is the best result a PEI U14 team has secured at this tournament. Overall, a very successful season.

We have a significant amount of money left over, this is due to budgeting for the Pierrefonds tournament and Atlantics when we didn't end up attending. We plan to host a year end party for the team, then divide the rest of the money back to the parents.

The U14 Edge season started on September 25th with our first tryout. Our first tryout consisted of drills to evaluate basic skills such as skating, shooting, and passing. Following the first tryout, we split the group into four teams and had two exhibition games for each group. Once we made the first cut, we then, had one more exhibition game, and we made the final cut. The team consisted of 17 players and two goalies.

Over the course of the year, we had two consistent practice times per week. On Saturdays, with the exception of game days, we had the 750 AM ice time in Pownal, and following the ice time, the team went to 3rd degree for dry land training. We also had the 510 PM time in Morell consistently on Monday evenings.

We were able to setup and play multiple exhibition games throughout the year. Even though COVID restricted travelling for some of the season, we were able to play games against the U14 Wave and the U16 Edge. When we were able to travel, we played exhibition games against NB A teams and against NS. Because NB has split their divisions, and now has multiple A teams in different regions, it was extremely helpful for us, as it gave us more competition to play at our caliber.

The U14 Edge participated in three tournaments this year. The first tournament we participated in was the tournament, in Memramcook, in the month of November. This gave our players their first taste of the level of play that is played at provincial. After a break in the season, because of COVID, we participated in the Hub City tournament in Moncton at the beginning of April. This was a great tournament for us as it consisted mostly of A teams from NB and NS which was our level of play. The Edge team really stepped up at this tournament and we were able to make it to the semi-finals where we lost to the NS AA team. This was the first year for this tournament and I hope it continues in the future as it was very encouraging and exciting for our team to play in a tournament where almost all of the teams were of the same caliber, A teams. Our final tournament of the year was the Eastern Canadian Championships. This was a very exciting tournament for the players as it was their first Eastern Canadian Championships. The team played really good games and the players had a lot of fun. We had also planned to attend the Pierrefonds tournament as well as the Atlantics, however because of the break in the season due to COVID, those tournaments were cancelled.

Our coaching staff this year consisted of myself, as head coach, Paul Power, as assistant coach, and Danielle Mayne, as assistant and goalie coach. Both Paul and Danielle's past experiences and knowledge of the game were great assets to our team. Danielle also scheduled most of the games for our team which was very challenging with the changes we had to make due to COVID. I would like to thank and acknowledge my appreciation of them for their time and dedication to the team.

I would also like to thank the parents of our team, their support and commitment to the team was excellent throughout the year, and did not go unnoticed. I would like to thank and acknowledge our appreciation of Meghan Etchell who was in charge of care and comfort. She was excellent in organizing meals and activities which helped a lot with our team bonding.

As well, I would like to thank and acknowledge our appreciation of Bernadette Power who was our treasurer this year and was phenomenal at keeping everything in order, and as well our thanks and appreciation of our manager Troy Fraser who helped us with the managing of the team and made sure everything was being communicated and our schedule was organized.

As most of our coaching staff and parents were new to high performance, I would also like to mention that we really appreciated the support and guidance from the managers and coaches from other PEI high performance teams. It was very helpful to have them give us pointers and/or insight on different aspects of running a team such as budgets, tournaments and travel.

Most importantly, I would like to thank the players for their dedication and commitments to the U14 Edge Team. They represented the team very well this year by always playing each game to their full potential, and exemplifying great sportsmanship and teamwork throughout the year. I could tell at every practice and every game that all the players were eager to learn more about the game and they were a joy to coach. I am truly very proud of each and every one of them. PROVINCIAL U16 WAVE TEAM REPORT

In September, tryouts for the U16 Wave commenced. With forty-four players trying out for the PEI U16 Wave team, of those forty-five, seventeen were selected. Those selected invested a lot of time honing their skills, improving their fitness, and learning the team systems. The team had 32 practices and played in 36 games; with a record of 19 wins, 16 losses, and 1 tie. In addition to on-ice development, the U16 Wave had 15 off-ice fitness sessions at 3rd

PROVINCIAL U19 WAVE TEAM REPORT

Thirty-seven players tried out for the PEI U19 Wave this season and after the on-ice assessments, fitness testing and intra-squad scrimmages, seventeen players were selected to the team. The team worked through their season plan as best they could despite the mid-season shut down due to COVID. This plan included on-ice practices, games versus NB, NS, PEI Open and PEI U16 Wave teams, off-ice training sessions including shooting practice, a fitness program coordinated by Shannon MacAulay of the Canadian Sport Center Atlantic and on-line team tactic and strategy education sessions via Zoom.

The team had 23 practices, played 22 games and attended the Canadian Ringette Championships (CRCs) where they played seven more games. Without attending the Pierrefonds tournament and the Atlantics made getting meaningful competition a bit challenging. The team competed very well at the CRCs and were on the wrong side of a couple of one goal games after making the championship round.

This year, the board of directors of Ringette PEI approved a pilot to allow the U19 Wave players to choose whether they wanted to play in house league or not. Nine players chose to play while the remaining eight chose not to. From a coaching standpoint, it appeared there was no difference in play from those who did play from those who didn't. Weeknight practices and activities continues to be challenging with the number of nights house league was played and with this age group, there were several athletes in University dealing with night classes and labs. This placed a significant responsibility on the players to be self-motivated to train on their own when their schedule allowed.

As coaches, we want to thank the parents for their wonderful support and the players for their hard work. We also want to give a shout out to our 2003 babies who have wrapped up their AA ringette career. It has been a lot of fun watching them grow and develop from their beginnings in the U12 development program to the fine ringette players (and young adults) they are now.

CANADA GAMES PROGRAM REPORT

In April 2021, an information session was held to explain the selection process and the plan for PEI to participate in the 2023 Canada Games. Seventy-two players registered for the tryouts and during the initial assessments in May which included fitness testing, shooting assessments, skating assessment, once skills assessment and intra-squad all the players were graded on a matrix. Based on the results, forty-eight players were named to the training pool.

Over the summer months, players were invited to participate in several optional activities to support their ringette development. The sessions were optional as many athletes are involved in summer sports and this allowed these activities to happen with very little impact on player's schedules.

This included eight in-person fitness and shooting sessions that moved around to different parts of the province (2 in Souris, Summerside, Montague and Charlottetown), seven athlete's circle education sessions which included three nutrition sessions with Nancy Fong, and four power skating sessions with Cindy Stavert.

Players then moved into the regular Ringette programming in the fall and the selection committee monitored the play of those on the training team. Over the winter months, a high-performance goalie consultant was engaged to work with the goalies on the training team in the form of monthly Zoom sessions. These sessions were extended to any of the Ringette PEI high performance program and ten goalies took advantage of this program. With the recent completion of the Ringette PEI competitive season, the Canada Games assessments will resume in May where a list of athletes will be invited to continue the process and participate in the first Canada Games Hub to be hosted in New Brunswick in July. Following that event, the selection committee will then select the eighteen athletes who will represent PEI at the 2023 Canada Games.

U12 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM REPORT

It was a great year for the U12 Development program. This year we did not have to limit participation due to COVID protocols and were able to welcome all who signed up to the program. Initially there were 54 players that signed up for the program, with a few dropping off throughout the season.

The participants had their ice sessions in Morell each Saturday morning either at 10:10 or 11:20. With the exception of the time during the circuit breaker during the Omicron wave of COVID, the session went uninterrupted until the end of March. Leads for the program were Marion Dowling, Dwayne Bailey, Janice Broderick and Stephen MacIntyre. Supporting the organization, communication and finances for the program were Maureen MacBeath and Trish Cameron. The ice sessions focused on both individual player development and teamwork. The participants had the opportunity to play inter-squad scrimmages among 4 teams which were divided with an even skill level. These inter-squad scrimmages allowed for additional coaching in game-like scenarios for the players. Everyone improved greatly throughout the season including our goaltenders. Further goaltender coaching support is always needed as we look at overall development of our ringette participants.

We were fortunate as well this year to have the ability to start travel off-island with players under the age of 12 in March. We did develop 2 more competitive teams from the overall participants, offering everyone the ability to try out for this additional development program at this age level. Evaluations were completed with representatives from all associations with participants (Souris, Rustico, Montague and Charlottetown) and the Development program leaders reviewed the combined evaluations for each player to select the competitive development participants.

We took the first opportunity to travel off island with these 2 teams in early March and were able to play games in Cap Pele as well as Moncton on a couple of occasions. We did not have responses from contacts in Nova Scotia this season. The competitive teams also added practice times on top of the regular Saturday sessions for everyone in the program; and were able to arrange challenging games vs the U14 Development program teams. This competition was appreciated and valuable for our participants (many of whom will be entering U14 next season). Like last year, these games were close and competitive. The players enjoyed this experience and the competition with off island teams as well.

Thank you to the parents who got their players to the rink throughout the season and for those who also repeatedly stepped up to run shot clocks, officiate, and manage the off-ice portion of our program this season including the continual changes to COVID protocols. We could not have had such a successful program without the volunteer support of those on and off the ice. Thank you as well to my co-leads with the program on and off the ice. We had a wonderful team this year. Thanks to Janice Broderick, Stephen MacIntyre, Dwayne Bailey, Maureen MacBeath and Trish Cameron.

U14 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM REPORT

This was the first year of the U14 Development Program – this was a successful year, albeit challenges due to COVID. The program consisted of 30 skaters and 2 goalies who attended the weekly development sessions. There were originally 40 skaters that tried out for the development program, and this was reduced to 30 skaters after 2 assessment ice times in order to create two manageable teams. As well, the limited space during our one weekly ice time contributed to this decision. After the first few initial sessions in November, the group was divided into two even teams. Team White primarily coached by Tiffany Doucette, Andrew Heggie and Terry MacAulay; Team Black primarily coached by Chris Gallant, BJ MacLean and Andrea VanWiechen.

The 32 players attended weekly development sessions, this ice time was at 8:30am at Bell Aliant Centre. There were a few conflicts throughout the session due to tournaments, etc. at the Bell Aliant Centre; otherwise this was an excellent ice time with few conflicts related to house league, etc.. In total there were 6 ice times in November and December including assessment sessions; then in December COVID restrictions increased and the program was put on hold until February. From February until April there were 8 development sessions.

Once divided into two teams the development sessions consisted of about 15 minutes of warm-up with the entire group, when COVID restrictions allowed. For the remaining 45 minutes the teams divided into the two teams to further develop specific skills. In addition, there were exhibition games for both teams. The U14 development teams played each other multiple times – four games in total; and played the top two U12 development teams – six games in total. As well, the U14 teams travelled to Oxford to play two teams from NS on March 19 – four games in total; and then to Moncton to play against a team from NB on April 18 – two games in total. The coaches would have liked to host more exhibition games on the island, but it was a challenge to secure ice time. It would be helpful next year to have more ice time set aside earlier in the year for the U14 Development team to ensure there will be opportunity to host exhibition games with teams from NS and NB. As well, it was a challenge to find teams to play at an appropriate level – would be helpful to have contacts in place for future coaches in order to more easily set up exhibition games.

All coaches feel that it was a highly beneficial program for the 32 players who participated in the preliminary year. There was a significant improvement in the players, and this would have been even more considerable without the break from December to February due to COVID-19 restrictions. As coaches, we hope to see this program continue in further seasons for the benefit of the participants. As well, we see the benefit to future Wave, and Edge teams; as well as the contribution this program will have on the strength of our local house league teams.

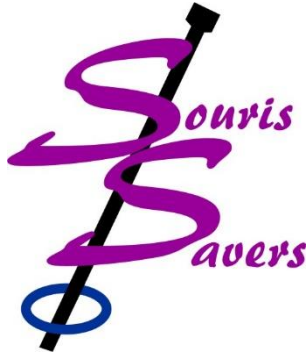

This will also be an exciting season as PEI is host to the 2023 Canada Winter Games!

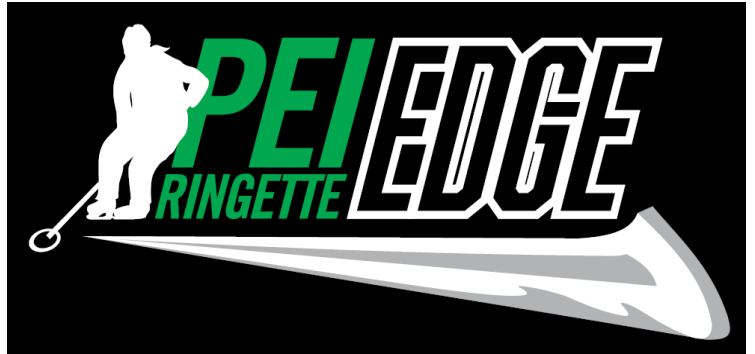
