Ringette PEI hopes to continue to grow and build on the success that the organization has experienced over the last number of years, and support our local associations in building memberships, and providing development opportunities for players, coaches and officials.

A big thank you goes out to our Board of Directors for their hard work and dedication during the 2022-2023 season, and to our Executive Director, Victoria Leard, for all her support and knowledge this past season.

COACHING REPORT

Congratulations to all Ringette PEI coaches for another great season. Thanks also going out to all assistant coaches, managers, parents, officials, and volunteers.

Francois Caron conducted a Competition Introduction course over a few days in December. 6 coaches were able to get their coaching certification. Of these 6 coaches, 5 were able to conduct their on ice coach evaluations. Another coach who completed the course last season also completed their on ice evaluation this season. These 6 coaches are now fully certified in Competition Introduction. We were unable to offer a Community Sport Initiation course this season, this will be a priority for next season to have more coaches trained at the house league level.

Thanks to Francois for volunteering his time and working so closely with the coaches to ensure their certification was completed.

Overall for the 2022-23 season, 56% of coaches over all levels of the sport on PEI were female. At the HP level, Wave, Edge, and Canada Games, this percentage was 78%, with 21 of the 27 coaches being female. Ringette Canada is encouraging all provinces to have 50% of coaches be female at all levels of competition. Ringette PEI is supportive of this goal and will be continuing to work on initiatives to have this female presence in coaching in future years as well.

This season we were back to our normal competition schedule. All HP teams were able to participate in a number of tournaments this season. This included tournaments in Memramcook, Moncton, Pierrefonds, Atlantics on PEI, as well as the Eastern Canadian Ringette Championships in Dieppe and the Canadian Ringette Championships in Regina.

A U16/19 Development team was also formed to help fill the vacant U19 Edge team spot. This team had great success as well!

MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

Many thanks to the coaches and managers who took the time to pick a player of the game and to submit the google form through the Ringette PEI website. Last but not least, thanks to those who took the time to thoughtfully craft nomination letters for various teams, volunteers, coaches and officials.

Again this year, we really put an emphasis on a player of the game for each team. Each coach was to pick a player for each game who showed skill, sportsmanship, leadership and demonstrated that they were coachable. Coaches were to go onto the ringette PEI website and fill out a google form under the Player of the Game link to submit their player of the game. There was also an area within this form to give a little description of why they chose that player. Players could be nominated more than once if they were deserving game after game. This was encouraged as it really narrowed down who truly are the most valuable players. Coaches were also called for one final player of the game reminder at the end of the year for any last minute submissions. This made the pool of athletes much bigger to choose from, along with good intentions when it came to selecting the finalists and winners. Players were narrowed down for our meeting to pick the final MVPs in each division. We had 31 U10 submissions, 18 U12 submissions, 52 U14 submissions and 8 U16/19 submissions.

The Senior Goalie, Jr Goalie, Coach of the Year, Team of the Year, High Performance Team of the Year and volunteer of the year were done through google forms, as done in the past. Victoria Leard created google forms for all of these awards. These included questions to provide details on the nominees (division, years played, a spot where the nominator could explain why they nominated that player and even a spot to provide a picture). This was sent out to all teams. This allowed for people to easily select the category for their nomination and send in their nominees. It was a quick and simple process. This format also could be shared easily with the awards committee. This made it simpler to make decisions as everyone was able to have a look at it before the meeting. Everyone was able to have a good idea on who was nominated and have their top picks. The awards will be given out at the AGM on May 25th, 2023.

Our award nominees, finalists and winners should all be very proud of their accomplishments in 2022-2023. Congratulations to you all! We also had a number of scholarship applications from athletes Islandwide. It is impressive to see the contribution they are making in their communities not only where ringette is concerned, but in other sports, academics and volunteer initiatives. Best of luck to all of our young ladies as they graduate from high school and move into a new stage in their lives. We hope that you carry fond memories of ringette with you, and find your way back to the sport in some capacity.

OFFICIALS REPORT

This year I came back to be the Director of Officials again and it was great to have a year that went a little more smoothly.

On November 12, 2022 I put on a Level 1 Officials course to see if we could get some new faces into the position of Official. We ended up with a total of 18 people taking the course.

- Rustico Association had 3 participants
- Montague Association had 2 participants
- Charlottetown Association had 13

On December 9, 2022 we sent 2 of our Officials, Judy Hennessey and Ashley Hollis to an Evaluation Course in Shediac, NB. They are now able to evaluate at Level 1. I hope this will help all our associations by moving up our younger Officials quicker into the rotation.

On January 27, 2023 we sent 4 Officials to the Atlantic Ringette Championships which was hosted by Montague and Souris Associations. The four Officials were Judy Hennessey, Marc Reid, Jeff Hughes and Breanne MacInnis.

On February 18, 2023, David Saunders attended the Canada Winter Games 2023. He was selected by Ringette Canada as one of the two Shot Clock Officials for the Canada Winter Games 2023.

The Canadian Ringette Championships, David Saunders was selected as Shot Clock Official held in Regina, Saskatchewan from April 9th to the 16th.

The Eastern Canadian Ringette Championships were held in Dieppe, NB from April 20th-23rd. PEI sent three Officials to this tournament. I was happy to send Marc Reid, Judy Hennessey and Natalie Caron.

I want to thank all Officials for their time and devotion to the position of Official for the game of Ringette. Without these people taking the time to learn the rules and officiate the games there would be no games to play.

HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

The Health and Safety of our game are of utmost importance to Ringette PEI. I would first like to congratulate all athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, and everyone who participated in the wonderful 2022/23 season. It was also our first season without any stopping or starting of the season due to Covid-19, as well as my first year in this role. I would like to thank our previous Director of Health and Safety, David Saunders, who assisted in getting us through those challenging times by ensuring all Covid-19 protocols were followed.

The objective of this position is to keep track of all injuries and concussions throughout the season, ensure all teams have up-to-date information and forms for insurance and incident reporting, ensure all teams have the proper first aid training and equipment, and lastly promote the health and safety of all participants.

This 2022/23 season we saw a total of 14 reported injuries:

- 3 concussions (all U16/U19 level)
- 10 injuries
 - 1 elbow injury (U16/U19 level)
 - o 3 head injuries (U16/U19 level)
 - 1 neck injury (Canada Games Team)
 - 2 shoulder injuries (U16/U19 level)
 - 1 ankle injury (U16/U19 level)
 - 1 back injury (U19 Wave)
 - 1 broken thumb (U19 Wave)
 - 1 abdomen injury (U14 Edge)

I would like to note that most of these injuries were not considered severe as nearly all athletes were able to return safely to play. I would like to thank all athletes and parents for completing the forms and following all injury/concussion protocols. We take all information on injuries/concussions seriously, and this allows us to develop future protocols and education to limit the number of injuries and ensure the health and safety of all participants

Ringette PEI also recognized that as much as our physical health is important, our mental health and wellness are equally as important. This season we have added additional resources to our website under the Health and Wellness section, which include:

- <u>Body Sense-</u> includes helpful information, tools, and tips to guide you to positive body image and strong self-esteem
- <u>The Canadian Centre for Mental and Sport</u> –includes access to Canada wide in person and telehealth mental health support services and additional mental health resources
- <u>Prince Edward Island Mental Health Resources-</u>includes Prince Edward Island-specific resources and information on Mental Health services on the Island
- <u>Canadian Mental Health Association (PEI Division)</u>-includes Prince Edward Island-specific peer support, education, training, and resources available on PEI

HIGH PERFORMANCE TEAM REPORTS

PROVINCIAL U14 WAVE TEAM REPORT

Tryouts for our season began early this year in August to get ahead of busy ice schedules. 75 athletes tried out for the team, with 15 skaters and 2 goalies being selected. Of those 17 athletes, 4 were first year players, while the other 13 were second years. Shortly after the season began, we lost a few weeks of practice due to hurricane Fiona, to combat this, we traveled over to New Brunswick to play their teams since they still had ice.

Our weekly practice times were at 9:00am in Pownal on Saturdays, and 5:30pm in Morell on Mondays, with dryland training at Third Degree fitness every Wednesday at 6:30pm, and extra ice being picked up for games or more practices leading up to a tournament. We attended five tournaments this season, with a fourth place finish and two second place finishes, both second place finishes were against the same NB team losing by just 1-2 goals in the final. Easterns was another success for us this year, although losing in the gold medal game, we have made history two years in a row by making it to the gold medal game.

We had some overages with the budget this season, these mostly came from the bus fees for Quebec with the cost of gas prices increasing, as well as continuing with our third degree sessions for the entire year when we had only budgeted for part of the year. These overages were covered though by one last potato selling fundraiser in April. We still have a few bills we are waiting on to pay but expect to be on budget after paying those.

I'd like to thank Ringette PEI for the opportunity to coach this team, along with all the assistant coaches for all their hard work and dedication this season. Without Alanna, and the help of all the parents on the team none of this would have been possible so I also wanted to extend a huge shout out to them. Lastly, I wanted to say thank you to all of our players for their dedication and determination to this sport, showing other provinces what PEI can do and once again proving for the second year in a row that we are amongst the top U14 teams in Eastern Canada.

The season is complete and it has been a wonderful year with a group of eager young athletes who continuously improved throughout the season. A huge thanks to the very supportive group of Parents who provided funding for the team, coordinated fundraising and sponsorships, arranged for team clothing, provided meals and snacks, facilitated transportation to and from team activities, and most importantly - cheered on the team at every event! I had the pleasure of working with a wonderful team of staff, including Valana Deighan as Manager and Bernadette Power as Treasurer. Our Assistant Coaches were committed to the team, generously volunteering their time coaching as well as completing their Competition Introduction Coaching level this season. Thank you to coaches Bianca Roche, Reegan Bolger, and Miranda MacKinnon. Our amazing group of players had a year full of growth and development, and also benefited significantly from the ringette knowledge and experience on the bench.

Our team included 17 full members and had three affiliate players who participated in on-ice and off-ice training sessions. Each of the affiliate players had the opportunity to participate in at least one game during the season as well. The team held our off-ice training at 782 Fitness in Stratford and completed a couple of team building sessions. Thank you to 782 Fitness for providing a positive and motivating experience for our team.

The team participated in numerous competitions, including: the Memramcook High performance Jamboree, the NB High Performance Tournament, the Pierrefonds Tournament, the Atlantic Ringette Championships, and the Eastern Canadian Championships. We were also fortunate to have scheduled some exhibition games with teams from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia throughout the season. We had a total of 28 Practices and 46 Games (including tournament play) and finished the season with a record of 22 wins, 22 losses and 2 tied matches for the season. Of note, we only had one game all season where we were shut out from scoring, and we achieved a silver medal at the U14 B division at the Atlantic Championships. A fantastic result for our U14 Team.

The biggest thank you goes to our players. They showed up at every session with enthusiasm, an eagerness to learn, and a consistent drive to improve their ringette knowledge and skills. Because of the players' willingness and commitment to learn and improve, we as coaches could continue to layer on more and more concepts and skills for them to use as the season progressed. We are extremely proud of how each player improved throughout the year. Special recognition to Camryn Ling who won the Ring-Toss goalie event for U14 at the Eastern Canadian Championships, and to Sarah MacLean who was named our True Sport athlete for this same event. I wish every player future success and continued growth and development in the sport and in whatever future paths they pursue. It was an absolute pleasure to coach with this wonderful group of athletes and parents. Thank you to everyone who supported our team throughout the year.

In August tryouts for the U16 Wave commenced. With 56 players trying out for the PEI U16 Wave team, of those 18 were selected. The players invested a lot of time honing their skills, improving their fitness, and learning the team systems. The team had 40 practices and played in 49 games; with a record of 29 wins, 15 losses, and 5 ties.

In addition to on-ice development, the U16 Wave had 14 off-ice fitness sessions at 3rd Degree Training, 3 mental preparation sessions and several team building days as well.

Thirty-eight players tried out for the PEI U16 Edge this season and after the on-ice assessments and intra-squad scrimmages, seventeen players were selected to the team along with 2 AP players.

The team worked through their season plan without too many interruptions as players prioritized their high performance team over their house league team this season. The players had the option this season, to only choose to play High Performance if they so wished. This allowed the team to work on their systems and plays as we had our full team for most practices. The 2023 PEI Canada Games Ringette Team was selected in July of 2022 after a 15-month team selection process. The eighteen-player team started working towards the goal of becoming the best at getting better and seeing if we could close the gap between ourselves and the other Canada Games teams. Within this goal we also wanted to build a connection with the broader ringette community and find ways to leave the sport in a better place.

The team put together a plan built on six main areas – technical, tactical, physical, mental, emotional, and lifestyle. Over the next eight months the team worked hard on those areas in preparation for the games. This included 51 on ice practices, 42 games, many sport science and video sessions, a goalie specific weekend camp, a weekly fitness program and mental performance activities.

Through using these events and a variety of analytics the team was seeing progress in the lead up to the Canada Games. Thanks to the Souris and Montague ringette associations for their work in hosting the 2023 Atlantics as this event served as a great test for our team getting used to playing in these facilities and in front of large home crowds.

During the Canada Games our team competed very well and made it to the Bronze Medal game and lost in overtime to finish fourth, which was a best finish for a PEI ringette team at the Canada Games. A special thanks to the parents, the broader ringette community, the 2023 host society volunteers and Islanders for getting behind our team and making our time at the Canada Games such a wonderful experience. Getting the opportunity to play in front of large crowds was wonderful and being able to expose many new people to our great sport is something our team was very proud to do.

U12 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM REPORT

The U12 Development program was very successful this year. The program had 45 skaters and 2 goalies registered for this season. The ice sessions for the U12 development program were all held on Saturday mornings in Morell either at 10:10 or 11:20.

The U12 Development program leader was Jules Saulnier and Dwayne Bailey assisted. Maureen MacBeath oversaw all communications and Cuyla Thompson was in charge of finances. Many other individuals supplied much of their time as ice helpers. Without the added help, the U12 Development Program would not have been as successful.

For the first few weeks of ice sessions, the ice pad was divided into three stations. Each station focused on individual skills such as skating, passing and shooting. Later in the year, inter-squad games were played with the goal to evaluate all players individually. The player evaluations were done for two reasons; to be able to play inter-squad games and to name a team roster to play games against teams from NB and NS (travel team). The group of evaluators consisted of one representative from each association that had players involved in the program (Charlottetown, Rustico, Montague and Souris). After the individual player evaluations were completed and summarized, four equal teams were created with the goal of offering all players an opportunity to develop individual and game skills. The second half of the program, two of the teams played an - game against each other while the two teams had skills and drills practice. All four teams played an equal amount of inter-squad games. These games wouldn't have been able to happen without the parents volunteering to do minor official and bench duties.

The players selected to the travel team, had four team practices and played four games against off Island teams (in Borden and Crapaud). The team also traveled to Oxford to play in a U12 Jamboree against teams from NB and NS. The team was very competitive when playing against these teams. The selected players for this team needed to pay more fees to cover all cost practices, games and the jamboree. Overall, I believe the past year was very successful for all participants. The U12 Development program is very important and needs to continue going forward in order to help develop players moving to High Performance teams in U14.

The PEI U14 development program had a successful season, with the initial number of athletes signed up being 31, there were a few who resigned and our final total consisted of 27 athletes, 2 of which were goalies. The teams had a combined weekly development session held on Saturdays at 8:30am, MacLauchlan Arena. Charlottetown Area Ringette experienced another down year for registrations that we believe is the result of the multiyear COVID-19 public health battle, and a pilot program entertained by Ringette PEI to provide High Performance players the option of not playing House League to maintain their eligibility for HP. The results of both saw an approximate 29% drop in registrations for the 2022-23 season with HP opt out representing 35% of that drop.

Highlights for the 2022-23 season:

- Registration decreased to 276 active players
- Team numbers dropped from 30 in 2021-22 to 20 in 2022-23
- Effects of Fiona, Canada Games resulted in some difficult scheduling challenges for teams to have appropriate practice opportunities and normal playoff scheduling

- Charlottetown Tournament was played for the first time in 3 years with 70 teams registering
- Goaltender Development sessions continued to be well attended, many thanks go out to our Goaltender Development Coordinator Deanna Malone and our goaltender assistants for a job well done
