RVLA Board of Directors Reports

Presidents Report:

Nothing to report as Ashley Reutlinger resigned her position on July 5th 2018.

Vice Presidents report, Keith Berg:

At the start of the 2018 season I brought forth quite a few new ideas for policies after review with the RVLA board we implemented quite few of them for the 2018 season, some of them are the RVLA Code of conduct for parents, the 24 hour rule (which is a cool down time frame) for communication and conflict resolution, it outlines who to contact first and what the process needs to be to come to a resolution. The RVLA Fair play for athletes, parents and coaches. Rule of two for coaches in dressing rooms and a female dressing room policy. Also an internal RVLA club affiliation procedure to help promote our athlete's development and exposure to other coaches during the season. Later in the season we created a discipline matrix, which identifies types of incidents they may occur and provides acceptable types of discipline to be issued if the need arises (this is to help future Discipline directors with their role)

The RVLA board also adopted the CDLA Policy on the prevention of Harassment, Bullying and abuse which includes social media conduct.

Our teams overall did quite well we had about ½ of our teams qualify for the playoffs this year which is good as the playoff format was changed this year by the CDLA and limited most division to just 4 teams qualifying, the CDLA changed the Playoff format to help promote attendance to the provincial tournament. In the playoffs our Novice Girls team won the gold metal and our Peewee and Midget A teams came home with silver metals.

Our Bantam Age group this season was not successful at either level we placed our teams in. with limited numbers in the 2004 and 2005 birth years registered we only had enough for 2 teams this season. This age group also did not have the opportunity to play Peewee A two years ago to learn and develop at that level of lacrosse. We made the really tough decision to place a team in A this season to see how it went with the intent of helping make the right decision in the 2020 season at midget for this group of players. I think we would still place our top team in midget A for the 2020 season but we would more than likely place the second team at the C level in 2020. This would be the recommendation we leave for the 2020 board. We had a few RVLA players make the Jr. Roughnecks again this summer at least one on each team that went to Oakville for the Jr. NLL tournament. The Peewee and Midget teams finished second at this year's tournament both losing to the host Toronto Rock team, who won each division.

We had 3 long time RVLA members win a Gold medal with Team Alberta at the midget nationals this season held in Calgary beating Team Ontario in the finals for a second straight year.

We also had representation with the Bantam Girls team Alberta who finished with a silver metal losing to BC this year.

Executive Director (Equipment, Registrar, Arenas), Melanie Burnsed:

Hours worked from November 23, 2017 - October 15, 2018 - 795 hrs (300 hrs the yr before)

Equipment - When I took over I was told we would probably need to buy close to \$10K in goalie equipment, upon completing inventory we actually only needed to purchase 2 pairs of CAT 2 goalie pants (\$501.90). I was also told there were only 3 sets of goalie gear still out, turned out there were 11 sets (roughly \$11,000 worth) as well as 4 sets of team jerseys (\$6400 for jerseys) that were not accounted for. I also shopped around for a new storage unit after I saw what we pay a month, I found one for \$1903.17/year, its twice the size and half the price. I did purchase some shelving/storage for the locker which was a few hundred dollars. It is incredibly organized from before with everything hung up and counted.

It was a great experience all around I feel and was definitely helpful with all the closures at Genesis this year. 2019 is our 20 year anniversary and we want to make our Fun Day a much bigger event, looking at locations to host.

Coaching Directors report, Keith Berg:

Again we had many new and many returning coaches this season, 135 coaches over all with the 31 teams RVLA had this season we had 31 coaches attend clinics this season. I held 2 RVLA coaching mentorship nights at the start of the season for our coaches to come and watch the Sr. Knights practice. The idea was they would be able to see the drills run efficiently and ask questions, unfortunately attendance was rather spars... the coaches that did come and watch had the reasons we run certain drills explained during the practice. I think a night like this would be very beneficial for our Coaches who work with the Peewee age and above as it shows the more advanced drills.

I also facilitated 8 Coaching mentorship nights For the CDLA during last season for all clubs as part of the CDLA coaching Development project. The biggest thing I found was being able to explain the drills to a coach and his players first hand, it really help the players know why they do drills like wall ball and a simple shuttle passing drill at the same time the coaches found what to look for and how to correct the players. I will hopefully be continuing this program with the CDLA next season and will help facilitate something similar with RVLA at the start of the season with the Tyke and Novice age groups.

Implementation of a coach's binder, this binder included the RVLA fair play policy, Code of conduct policy, affiliation policy, 24 hour rule, dressing room policies, CDLA Abuse-harassment and bullying policy, RVLA coaching drill book and a document on the history of lacrosse. All most every Coach that received the binder said it was really helpful. RVLA plans to make these binders each season moving forward.

Mid Season last Year RVLA asked Greg Bradley The previous Coaching Director to help with the second part of the RVLA coaching Drill book, I reviewed the status with Greg just last week and we will have the second edition ready for next season, this book will be for the older age groups and include more advanced drills and drill specifically for offence and defensive systems, it will be geared for coaches peewee and above.

Discipline Director, Cam Dick:

Cam Dick resigned his possession July 22nd I would like to thank him for his time on the board over the last 2 lacrosse seasons.

Secretary, Tamara Pritchard: Tamara also resigned her position with the board on September 12th, Tamara has 2 girls and will be joining the new CDLA female club next season.

Director of Female Programs, Terilyn Palmer:

In 2018, we saw a slight increase in female players to 73, with the largest division at midget with 23. There were many successes to the season. Peewee girls brought home the gold medal from the St. Albert Jeremy Richardson Memorial Tournament. Kaylee Mckay and Ruby Irwin rostered for Team Alberta Bantam girls. Midget girls took home a silver medal from Girls Rock. They were also victorious in a triple overtime game against the 3 year undefeated St. Albert Titans. Most notably though, RVLA Novice girls took the number 1 spot in regular season and won City finals! Congratulations to all. RVLA sponsored a girls beginner clinic as well as the female Jr Silvertips development camp. Both were successful and profitable.

In light of the varying skill levels between clubs, the idea of tiering the girls divisions came to be. A transition committee was formed and have diligently been working on all aspects of a new female club. They are working on everything from bylaws and budgets to coaching and player development. The new female lacrosse association will be up and running for the 2019 season. The female athletes in each division will be evaluated, then "A" or travel teams will be formed. The remaining players will be placed on parity teams, taking their home community into consideration. With the benefit of all athletes playing within their own skill level, there is sure to be remarkable growth for all. Watch for an AGM to be announced soon and the inaugural board to be voted in.

The girls program will be leaving RVLA but our hearts will always here at home! Thanks for all the support and great memories.

Mini Tyke/Tyke Director, Michelle Anhorn:

The 2018 season opened with a change to the program it moved to weekends only. I believed this worked well for this age group and there were no complaints from parents. Our registration closed with 65 mini tyke players and 96 tyke players. This resulted in us having 6 teams of 11 kids for mini tyke and 6 teams of 16 kids for the tykes. Teams are made based on how much experience the kids have and which hand they play with. Which hand the child uses is given to the association at time of registration and I believe that the parent just picks the child's dominate hand and really does not know which hand they will favour once holding a stick. I believe a one time mini scrimmage done before the teams are made will help the director to make the teams more balanced with lefts and rights. Due to a no affiliation rule give to all teams from the CDLA a lot of kids in mini tyke and tyke were unable to play in the year end festivals. I am hoping the CDLA will reconsider this for next year as then Rockyview can enter a few more teams.

Novice Director, Jon Cullen:
