

Eight of the sixty-three Member Organizations (MOs) who renewed their membership did not offer programming in 2022. There was a 7% increase in MOs over 2021. The 2022 numbers were 93% of 2020.

Indoor '21-22 — Fourteen of the sixty-three MOs were active during Jan-Mar 2022. The season was able to start with limited restrictions and on time. Registrations increased over the same period in 2019 by 45%.

Outdoor '22 — Fifty of the sixty-three MOs were active during the season which was able to start on time with no restrictions. Registrations were 97% of 2019 numbers for the same period.

Indoor '22-23 — Twenty-six of the sixty-three MOs were active during Sept-Dec 2022. The season was able to start with no restrictions and on time. Registrations increased over the same period in 2019 by 7%.

Canada Soccer's Club Licensing Program had eight new members licensed or receive approval for licensing in 2022.

A Referee development best practices guide was developed and used to support members and serve as the foundation of a local Referee Development Plan including metrics for success

Online Referee Education

Thirty-two referee education interactions were completed with SERP, Candidates Program, Community, and Futsal referee training accounting for more than 95 hours of online education.

Sask Elite Referee Program (SERP)

Twelve male and two female participants. The SERP programs supports Saskatchewan's elite referees for advancement to Provincial, National and International levels.

Candidates Program

Twelve male and three female candidates focused on improving their abilities with the goal of preparing them for the SERP program.

Community Referee Laws of the Game Refreshers

Refresher courses hosted over four online sessions to further prepare the match officials for the Return to Play was delivered to 132 registered participants.

2022 Organizational Highlights — Referees

Active Officials Clinicians and Evaluators

A total of 15 Clinicians (13 male and 2 female) with 14 Assessors (13 male and 1 female) were accredited in 2022 and 225 assessments provided throughout the season.

Leadership Development

In support of advancing local referees to advance opportunities, five instructors (Daniel Boudreau, Greg Fischer, Gord Quinlan, Frank Laterza and Theo Diederichsen) were mentored by Len Chelack with Octavian Iliuta delivering the Community Referee Refresher Sessions and Referee Clinics, further developing the instructors available for online education delivery.

Female Leadership

Referee Development Grant

Reduced financial barriers to participation for 23 officials pursuing higher levels of officiating for a total of \$3,000. In addition to the referee development grant, eight SK referees have been funded with \$3,500 for out of province appointment opportunities.



Financial Management

Coming out of COVID, SSA managed the budget to effectively a neutral budget with a deficit of \$597.

Self Help Revenue grew by 16.3% as more participants registered as well as a full year of competitions Investment Strategy was executed in 2022 and is positioned for growth in 2023 with the increase of interest rates.

\$419,936 of Categorical Grants were executed and remitted to MO's and participants.

Staffing Strategy

Staffing returned close to pre-pandemic levels with a new organizational structure being executed to better serve members.

Long-Term Executive Director, Doug Pederson retired after 11 years helping position the organization for long-term success.

Rahim Z Mohamed appointed as CEO & Sporting Director in September 2022, having previously served the association as Director of Soccer for 5 years. Rahim was recognized by CBC Saskatchewan as part of their Future 40 for 2022.

Planning

Overall, 2022 was a year of returning to normal operations and provided the opportunity to finally look forward to plan for the years to come through our 2023-2026 SSA Strategic Plan.
