As this work occurs our Risk Management Committee also reviews all policy from a Risk Management perspective prior to Board approval.



With the support of Saskatchewan Soccer's governance committee, more of our member organizations are working to bring their governance and strategic planning processes into line with those of the provincial governing body. This process will continue to be encouraged moving forward to ensure that our members all meet standards for good governance which is the foundation of any effective organization.

The Strategic Planning Committee was very active and effective this past year. With the support of Paul Varian, SSA has undertaken a very comprehensive planning process. While there is much work to be done, SSA is confident that the outcomes of the new Strategic Plan will lead our association into a new era for soccer. The process used to develop the new plan was purposeful: we strived for a plan that would reflect the goals of our board, our members and our supporters. Executive Director's Report

Time is a precious commodity in the management of volunteer sport. Any time spent focused on issues that do not contribute to the enjoyment of the athletes should be minimized. Management of a Formal Review of the Regina Soccer Association (RSA) and the successful defense of two court actions taken against the SSA by RSA was an extraordinarily taxing process for the Board and the Staff. Throughout it all we maintained a professional and methodical approach. These types of actions, which take the business of sport outside of its internal processes, cannot be tolerated. Amendments to SSA bylaws and policies have been put forward as a result. With membership support, we will ensure that SSA remains in alignment with FIFA and CSA requirements, and prevent this unnecessary drain on financial and human resources in the future. The SSA has excellent Formal Complaints and Dispute Resolution processes in place. Evidence of this comes from Sask Sport who has adopted our model, making it mandatory for all sports in the province. We work very hard to ensure that there are dispute resolution mechanisms available within the soccer community; all complaints can be handled professionally and respectfully through the internal remedies of soccer and dispute resolution in Canada.

As we have seen with FIFA, the actions of a few individuals, who put their personal agendas ahead of all others, can significantly derail the reputation and progress of an Association. I am pleased to report that, despite the challenges faced in 2015, there was no impact on service to membership. I can also report that legal costs related to this matter have been recovered. I believe this example illustrates to all Members the need for strong leadership and effective governance. As stated earlier, amendments to the SSA Code of Conduct and Policies and Bylaws position the SSA well to defend against this type of action in the future.

All the successes the SSA in 2015 ultimately lead back to our Member Organizations, the guidance of the SSA Board, the skills and dedication of the Staff, and, of course, our external partners. My role is to guide the work of this association and I am proud to be moving into my 5th year of service in 2016.

I encourage all members to extend thanks to the Board, outgoing President Leslie Blyth, Director Ron Miller and the SSA staff, along with all the volunteers and staff throughout the province. These people make quality soccer possible.



RE: Letter from President Montagliani for the 2016 SSA AGM

Dear Saskatchewan Soccer,

Last year, Canada enjoyed its Year of Sport, with the FIFA Women's World Cup Canada 2015[™] taking centre stage both across the country and around the world. The record-setting competition drew 1.35 million fans to the 52 matches and was enjoyed by more than 750 million viewers around the globe. The event also supported an economic impact of \$493.6M.

We are mid-way through a very ambitious Strategic Plan 'Leading a Soccer Nation' – one created in a large part by our members and stakeholders like Saskatchewan. It will look in detail at where we are and where we need to go at Canada Soccer's Annual Meeting in Saskatoon in May.

Much in that Saskatchewan Soccer has embraced governance reform and has been leading the way in Canada with Canada Soccer, our leadership position within the reform movement at both CONCACAF and FIFA can help us further change the culture of the global game and propel Canada forward as change leaders.

We should all be very proud of where we are now. We have a big year ahead, with our Canadian Men's National Team in FIFA World Cup Qualifiers and our Women's National Team preparing for their third (3rd) trip in a row to the Rio 2016 Olympic Games.
