 - C. Johnson brought up the date change made to Box Provincials from July 5th weekend to July 12th weekend. Asked why the change was made and stated she didn't remember discussing the date change and that July 12th is the Craven weekend which a lot of parents have spent thousands of dollars on already. R. Trobak said the dates were in the proposal for Provincials that was approved. B. Pottle pointed out that the extra week allowed Member Associations an extra to figure out who would be going to Provincials on their behalf and that MA's struggle to meet the current deadlines associated with having Provincials on the July 5th weekend. T. Froese stated that could have Provincials in October and MA's would still have a hard time getting organized for Provincials. R. Trobak stated he booked the arenas for both weekends so can move Provincials back to the July 5th weekend.
AMENDMENT – CHANGE BOX PROVINCIALS TO JULY 5TH WEEKEND FROM JULY 12TH WEEKEND
 - R. Trobak asked to change Curtis Plotemy to last weekend in April. **AMENDMENT – MOVE SBLA CURTIS PLOTEMY TOURNAMENT FROM MAY 3RD WEEKEND TO APRIL 29TH WEEKEND.**
 - J. Bexson asked does it make sense to have the Tyke Festival all on one day so they can invite other Communities.
 - T. Harding pointed out if this is to be in your community, does it need to be on June 8th
 - C. Hubelit pointed out having Mas be able to do it on their own time works better for them.
 - M. Seeman said there are no tournaments for Tyke
 - J. Bexson said PA will be asking for a date for Tyke Tournament, R. Trobak said the point of the day was so didn't have to ask for dates and it freed up weekends for other events.
 - G. Tornato asked that we table this discussion for the Board to review.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of
Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc.

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. (the Entity), which comprise the statement of financial position as at October 31, 2019 and the statements of operations, statement of net assets and statement of cash flows for the period of September 1, 2018 to October 31, 2019, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In my opinion, except for the effects, if any, of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. as at October 31, 2019 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the period of September 1, 2018 to October 31, 2019 in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many non-profit organizations, Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. derives part of its revenue from membership fees, donations and other fundraising activities, the completeness and classification of which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly my verification of these transactions was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to the revenues, statement of operations, assets and net assets.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the

basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

1. Status and nature of activities

Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. is the provincial sport governing body dedicated to the promotion of lacrosse for all and the development of competitive excellence. The Association is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are initially recorded at cost. Amortization is provided for using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets at the following annual rates:

Computer hardware	3 years
Computer software	3 years
Equipment	3 years

Revenue recognition

Grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are received out of the net proceeds of lottery ticket sales in Saskatchewan. These grants have been recorded as revenue by the Association as approved by Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. Accordingly, any amounts not received by year end are shown as grant receivable and any amounts received relating to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred grant revenue.

Financial instruments

The Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash and cash equivalents and accounts receivable. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

3. Sport Legacy Fund

The fund of deposit and the offsetting deferred revenue from the Sport Legacy Fund consists of donations based on various programs and top-up contributions made by Sask Sport Inc. To qualify for the additional top-up contributions made by Sask Sport Inc, the Association is required to leave the original amount of donation in the Sport Legacy Fund for a minimum of 5 years.

5. Deferred revenue

During 2019, Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. received \$NIL (2018 - \$119,800) from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for expenses which will occur in the following fiscal year.

The remaining deferral of \$35,015 is monies received from SaskSport Inc. for Indigenous Sport Enhancement for expenses which will occur in the following fiscal year.

6. Appropriated net assets

The Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. has established a Box Lacrosse Contingency Fund and a Field Lacrosse Contingency Fund for the purpose of accumulating funds for the future development in these areas. A fee of one dollar per player is assessed annually as a contribution towards the fund.

During the year \$2,557 (2018 - \$2,418) was contributed to the Box Lacrosse Contingency Fund and \$1,292 (2018 - \$1,197) was contributed to the Field Lacrosse Contingency Fund. The Field Lacrosse Contingency Fund had expenses of \$1,623 (2018 - \$NIL) and had an ending balance of \$7,728 (2018 - \$8,059). Box Lacrosse Contingency Fund had expenses of \$11,475 (2018 - \$2,500) and had an ending balance of \$16,483 (2018 - \$25,401).

7. Economic dependence

Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. receives a significant portion of its revenue from grants received from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

8. Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc. is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association Inc.'s exposure and concentrations at October 31, 2019:

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the Association could incur a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash and cash equivalents and accounts receivable. The Association manages its credit risk by placing cash with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable.

8. Financial instruments cont'd

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Association is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its accounts payable and accrued liabilities but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash and cash equivalents and its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue.

9. Change in fiscal year

During the year the Organization made a motion and changed the fiscal year from August 31 to October 31.

10. Comparative figures

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the current year's presentation.

The following rules were approved by vote of the membership at the General Assembly held in Netanya Israel, July 2018. The rules will take effect for all FIL international play October 1st 2018 and will be used at the 2020 U19 Men's World Lacrosse Championship. Member nations are free to implement at timeline that best suits their individual needs.

Rule #	RULE WORDING
29.1	The game shall be divided into 4 periods of 15 minutes duration each
29.2	During the last 30 seconds of the first, second and third quarters, the last 2 minutes of the fourth quarter, and during any overtime period, the game-clock and, if applicable, the penalty clock(s) shall stop whenever the ball becomes dead, and then shall restart whenever play is restarted. This shall apply for all stoppages, including the scoring of a goal. Such a stoppage of play shall not be considered to be an official time-out for the purpose of illegal substitution, the gate or the coaches' area, unless an official time-out is specifically requested by a referee or by the CBO
29.3	At the end of each quarter, the teams shall change ends. The interval between the first and second quarters shall be of 2 minutes' duration. At half-time, the interval shall be 10 minutes long. At three- quarter time, the interval shall be 2 minutes.
31.2	In the event of the score being tied at the end regulation playing time, play shall be continued, after a two-minute intermission, with sudden victory overtime. In sudden victory overtime teams shall play periods of 4 minutes each until a goal is scored, thus deciding a winner. The game ends upon the scoring of the first goal. There will be a two-minute intermission between sudden victory periods. The following "sudden victory" procedure will take place: i) The referees shall call together the captains of each team at the center of the field at the end of regulation play and during the 2-minute intermission. The head referee shall toss a coin to determine choice of goal to defend, the visiting captain shall call. ii) All periods of overtime shall start with a face-off as at the start of each quarter, subject to the provisions of Rule 34.1 being followed.



Rule #	RULE WORDING
	The teams shall change ends between overtime periods.
33.1	The game officials shall call together the captains of each team at the center of the field approximately 5 minutes before the start of the game. The Head referee shall toss a coin to determine choice of goal to defend, the visiting captain shall call the toss. At this time, any special ground rules shall be explained.
37.1	Once the referee has signalled that the ball is ready for play, the restart shall occur in the same relative position where the ball was when play was stopped. The official shall resume play as quickly as possible. If an opposing player is within five yards of the player that has been awarded the ball, and the official blows the whistle to restart play, the opposing player is not allowed to defend the ball until he reaches a distance of five yards from the opponent. A violation will be a flag down (slow whistle) for delay of game. On any restart, no offensive player may be within 5 yards of the player with the ball. The Referee shall clearly indicate the player who is going to re-start to the opposing goalkeeper on a dead ball (non-quick restart situations) restart that is below the restraining lines in the awarded team's offensive end.
61.18	Once the ball has been cleared into the goal area, the ball shall not return to the defensive half of the field through actions of the offensive team. If this occurs, it is an over and back violation. The result is an immediate turnover and a quick restart for the offended team. If the ball does not touch or go over the midline, no infraction has occurred. Defensive players may legally bat the ball to keep it in the offensive half of the field, but if it is possessed and their feet are in the defensive half, it shall be a turnover.



Rule #	RULE WORDING
61.18	<p>An over and back violation does not occur in the following situations:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A shot that leaves the offensive half of the field. 2. A loose ball that leaves the offensive half of the field and was last touched by the defensive team. 3. A loose ball that is leaving the offensive half of the field and the defense is called for a loose ball violation (or play-on) or caused the ball to go out of bounds in the defensive end. <p>A.R. 61.2 Red 1 steps into the goal area with possession of the ball. Red 1 attempts a pass to Red 2 that is not caught, and the ball rolls toward the midline. Red 3, who is standing on his defensive half, bats the ball preventing it from crossing the midline without gaining possession. Red 2 picks up the ball, which never crosses the midfield line.</p> <p>RULING: Play continues.</p>
65.1	<p>A team is considered offside when it has no more than 10 players on the field (including players in the penalty box), AND:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. It has more than six men in its attack half of the field (between the centerline and the end line) including men in the penalty box, OR b. It has more than seven men in its defensive half of the field (between the centerline and the end line) including men in the penalty box. <p><i>Note 1: If a player, seeing that he is going to be offside before he can stop, instead runs out of bounds, no penalty shall result from the failure of that player's team to have the required number of men in either end of the field, as long as the player returns immediately to field on the appropriate half of field.</i></p>
65.5	<p>When determining whether a team is offside, a player whose body (including a gloved hand on the crosse but not including the crosse itself) touches or steps on or across the center line is considered to be have entered that half of the field.</p>



Rule #	RULE WORDING
82.6	<p>Where a flag is thrown mistakenly then, when the whistle subsequently blows to stop the play, the ball shall be awarded to the team that has possession.</p> <p>When an official inadvertently blows the whistle, the ball shall be awarded to the team that has possession.</p> <p>If neither team has possession, then the ball shall be faced.</p>

Nathan Adams attended the Sr. Men's Championships in Langley BC in October to round out our participation in the National tournaments. Now that we have more Clinic Facilitators trained, it is our hope to be able to offer more clinics that make it easier for individuals to attend, and receive their certification without the hassle of travel. Having the RAMP Database fully operating will help provide additional reach Province wide for the office to be able to promote and distribution information in both areas. The Office is also excited to welcome Standing Buffalo Lacrosse Club and Lumsden Lacrosse as affiliate MA's this year.

I would like to thank all our Member Associations and their Volunteers for their hard work and dedication to help grow the sport of Lacrosse. Our organization is blessed to have the most passionate and hard-working group of volunteers that truly want to provide as much opportunities as possible.

I would like to thank the SLA Staff and Contractors. The office has an amazing team of individuals who wake up each day excited to ensure as many individuals as possible have the chance to experience Lacrosse. Chris Lesanko's (SLA Programs Coordinator), passion about Lacrosse is so infectious it isn't a surprise the Try Lacrosse School program keeps doubling each year in requests. Tracey Chappell's (Fundraising Coordinator) time management and organization skills and ability to motivate individuals to get moving sets the bar high for everyone working, she keeps the 50/50 running smoothly with out bating an eye. Derek Wagner's, (Summer Student/Admin Coordinator), work ethic and love for Lacrosse was a game changer this year helping to ensure all necessary tasks were completed to keep up with the growth we experienced. Thank you, Chris, Tracey, and Derek, for being amazing people and for all the hard work you have put in this past year. Thank you to all our Try Lacrosse Instructors for all the effort put in to get kids excited about Lacrosse, I receive numerous emails and calls from schools raving about how much they enjoyed the opportunity.

Thank you to our Board of Directors, in all my years of working in the Sport Industry I have never worked with a group so passionate about what they do. This group of volunteers puts in numerous hours of volunteer time over the year to ensure the success of the organization.

Finally, Thank you to Shawn Williams, SLA President. Over the past 7 years you have been a great leader and mentor, always working with myself and staff to constantly improve and provide us the tools we need to be successful. Thank you for your years of service as President and good luck on your next adventure as you take on the roll as President of the Canadian Lacrosse Association.

Please see below for reports in specific areas.



RUSH 50/50

This year we went with experienced 50/50 workers for the Rush 50/50 to take the pressure off Associations trying to find individuals to volunteer even more of their time. This also allowed us to have more individuals selling tickets.

Due to an attendance drop at the Rush Games (the average scanned ticket attendance went from 14K a game to 10K a game), and one less playoff game, we did see a significant drop in 50/50 sales. In 2018 total ticket sales were \$1,297,150.00 with SLA receiving \$356,012.96 after all necessary expenses were paid. \$129,754.00 of what SLA received was distributed to the Member Associations based on worked games. In 2019 total ticket sales were \$800,830.00 with SLA receiving \$208,817.37. This year instead of distributing funds to Member Associations, memberships fees were significantly discounted as follows:

- Player Fees – Discounted from \$41/Player to \$15/Player
- Coach and Officials Fees – Discounted from \$25/Coach or Official to \$15/Coach or Official
- Team Fees – Discounted from \$50/Team to \$0/Team.

As well Coaching and Officials clinics were given at no cost to the Member Associations, where in previous years there was a charge of \$50/Coach for Community Development Clinics, \$80/Coach for Competitive Introduction Clinics, and \$50/Official for Officials Clinics. Based on the registration numbers and clinic information, Member Associations received \$113,296 in discounts. If the old 40% method would have been used Member Associations would have received \$83,822 so the Member Associations received \$29,473.42 addition from the SLA's portion of the funds this year.

I Tracey and her crew do an amazing job running the 50/50 the decrease is purely due to lower attendance, less games, and the initial excitement wearing off. To try increase sales, 50/50 Thank you videos have been created to show off what the Rush Funds are used for. These videos will be played at Rush Games and on the SLA Social Media pages leading up to all Home games.

NEW ASSOCIATIONS AND NEW LEAGUES

As stated earlier, we have welcomed Standing Buffalo Lacrosse and Lumsden Lacrosse as affiliate members this year. Both organizations will mentor under the Queen City Minor Box Lacrosse Association for 2020 and will be eligible to apply for full Membership status for the 2021 season. We look forward to continuing to work with these groups to ensure they have the tools they need to succeed. Thank you to QCMBL for being their mentor Association this year and showing these groups the ropes of running a successfully Lacrosse Association.



This past season we also welcome a brand-new Box League, the Saskatchewan A Lacrosse League. The inaugural season had a Pee Wee and Bantam league with the QCMBL Barracuda, SBLA SWAT committing to 12 league games and Provincials, and the South Sask Elites and North Sask Fury committing to 6 League games and South Sask Elite committing to Provincials. The Barracuda Midget A and SWAT Midget A also did exhibition games and took part in Provincials.

Thank you to Alex Kratz for all the work he put into getting this league off the ground and all the volunteers for getting the teams organized and ready. This league will provide a ton of opportunity for our more developed players and provide opportunities for new players to have more floor/ball time in the house league to develop their skills. Having a league of this level is a true testament to the growth and development of Lacrosse in our Province and we look forward to the continued growth of this league in the years to come.

TEAM SASK

This was another exciting year for Team Sask. Try Outs for the program had 265 players participate, the highest number we have ever had.

Each year the program continues becoming more competitive, this year all five teams traveled to British Columbia (Co'Quiltam for Box and Kelowna for Field), and we had two teams play in the bronze medal game, Bantam and U18, with the U18 team bringing home the bronze medal. Scores are also a lot closer for the teams and Saskatchewan has been deemed a competitive program by the CLA. On top of Nationals, Team Sask Bantam traveled to Winnipeg for exhibition games with Team MB, and Team MB plans to come to Saskatchewan this summer for more exhibition games. It is great that our provinces can work together to get the teams ready, and for our players to have a chance to get to know each other. Before leaving for Nationals our videographer sponsor did some sendoff videos to help get the teams "pumped up".

Each year the program continues to grow and improve, and it couldn't exist without all our volunteers and the work the Sector Chairs and VP of Operations puts into the program. A big thank you to all those involved and for giving up your summer to provide this opportunity to our players.

We are excited to add a 16U all Female team to the program for 2020 and to see what accomplishments the program will reach.

CANADA GAMES

Box Lacrosse has recently been added back to the Canada Games for 2021 in the Niagara region. This is an exciting opportunity for our players that we are ecstatic to be able to offer them. With the short turn around between the games it will take a lot of work getting our Coaches to the certification required and to get players ready and teams selected. In 2020 our selected Coaches will work on their certification and will start to evaluate players at the Team Sask evaluations this year, with ID Camps and Try Outs for Canada Games taking place in the fall.



SPONSORS

This past season we welcomed back our generous sponsors. Subway signed on again as our Provincial Event sponsor and is currently reviewing how they wish to proceed for 2020. Sik Pics jumped on board again as our videographer sponsor allowing us to continue creating valuable marketing material that will be crucial to promoting Lacrosse and all the programs offered across the Province. Al Andersons provided sponsorship again this year for the Team Sask program helping to keep Uniform and Clothing costs down to try reducing the cost barrier of players taking part. Our Awards this year were also sponsored by the following groups:

PROVINCIAL EVENTS

This year's Provincial Championships were held in Sturgis (Field), Saskatoon (Novice and House Box Provincials), and Regina (A League Box Provincials). Thank you to all the host committees as all the volunteers did a fabulous job ensuring the success of the events and making sure all the teams had a positive experience. Thank you to Brad Chappell, Duncan Elliott, Derek Wagner, Mandy Currie, and Sheena Hubelit for being the conveners for Provincials this year. It is not an easy job but crucial to the success of the events.



Each year we continue to see our Provincials grow. This was the largest Field Provincials in many years and a 13U division was added that was very well received and provided an opportunity for our younger Field players to attend Provincials. The event seen team growth as well as the event welcomed Regina Field back, and welcomed Kelvington and Swift Current, entering for the first time. The Box House Provincials were completely full this year and the addition of the A League Provincials went over very well. All events had a lot media coverage and provided some great Lacrosse action. As we continue to grow and welcome new Associations to the family, we will see our Provincials continue to grow and attract more and more individuals each year.

This year, thanks to the funding from the Rush, we were able to again provide financial support to Associations offering a Tyke Event in their community. It was great to see pictures of our youngest players having a blast and the Associations did an amazing job creating top notch events for these guys. The promotion of Lacrosse provided by these events are bar none and we hope it helped to get players hooked at a younger age!

Our Awards Night was held on Saturday, November 23rd in conjunction with our Sector Meetings. Thank you to Saskatoon Box Lacrosse for hosting this event. Our Awards Night grew exponential again this year, and in the past 7 years has grown from 60 individuals attending to over 250 individuals attending. We had 70 nominations for awards this year, the largest in seven years. We also welcomed the PGLL to the night to hand out their Awards for the season, and to induct the first individuals to their Hall of Fame. The Sector Meetings also grew in attendance and had representation from all Member Associations, and some of the Sector Meetings doubled in numbers. It is great to see the excitement Province wide to want to #GrowTheGame.

We had our 2nd Annual Rush Lax Day in Sask on February 9th. It was another large success with more players coming out then the previous year. This year we provide clinics for Tyke, Novice and Pee Wee and provided the cutest half time show of the season when our Tyke and Novice players faced off against each other. Each Member Association was able to send a player to run out with a Rush player during the opening show which was an amazing celebration and tribute to the amount of Lacrosse opportunities across Saskatchewan. We look forward to another great event this year on February 29th.

TRY LACROSSE CLINICS

Our Try Lacrosse Clinics almost doubled this year due to Chris and the instructors doing a great job getting the program into new communities. Having Jeff Shattler on board with the program was also a huge benefit as schools were more willing to allow the program in to give students the chance to meet a professional athlete. The Rush joined as a program sponsor, providing funding that allowed us to do 75 clinics this year. A phenomenal job done by all involved.



Another portion of this program is our Indigenous Try Lacrosse clinic. This program is done by our VP of Indigenous Development and is developed for Indigenous communities. Some of our Indigenous athletes and coaches run the clinics and talk to the participants about the cultural aspects of the sport and what the sport means to them. Mandy has done a great job promoting and delivering this program and since she has started growing it Lacrosse has been added to the First Nations Summer Games, and Indigenous Communities are starting to add Lacrosse to their school curriculum and more and more communities are purchasing equipment.

MEMBERSHIP TRAINING

At the Sector Meetings a mandatory Membership Training night occurred on the Friday. At this meeting Tracey was able to provide a report on the Rush 5050, RAMP had a representative come in to go over the database and answer any questions Associations had, and Jody Schmeltzer, Gerald Tornato, and myself provided training on general items (MAP Funding, Non Profit Numbers, Financial reporting, Forms). Due to the positive feedback from the training we will be discussing with the Membership about having monthly training sessions using our Microsoft Teams program. These training sessions will go over items that are due that month (Reports, Grant Applications, permits etc) and we will open the floor for questions from the Associations. I feel offering this is crucial to helping our Member Associations succeed and will help open communication between the office and MA's as well.

Overall, it was a great Lacrosse season and I look forward to planning for an even better 2020. Once again thank you to all the volunteers, Board of Directors, and to Chris, Tracey, and Derek for the hard work and dedication that was put into the 2019 season

I have been very fortunate with finding workers and have a list of spares at the ready. This has worked out very well.

Tutor Shooter – We ran the Tutor Shooter for most of the Rush home games. We hired 2 or 3 local lacrosse players, per game for the Rush home games. We also had lacrosse players work at a few open house events at the Rush location in April.

Parades – We had players participate in the parade in Saskatoon and Regina this year. The young lacrosse players really enjoyed this event.

Flag Ceremony – Many of our teams and players were able to participate in the Flag Ceremony, in many of the Rush games this year. It was a great opportunity for the younger players to get involved with the games prior to the start of the game.

POLICY CHANGE PROPOSALS

CRIMINAL RECORD CHECK FOR COACHES, ASSISTANT COACHES, TRAINER, AND OFFICIALS

- Current Policy: 4.7 Police Check Policy
- Proposed Change: Add that all Coaches, Assistant Coaches, Trainers and Officials complete a criminal record check.
- Rationale: To update current policy to what is now industry standard and aligns with the Responsible Coaches Movement adopted by the Canadian Lacrosse Association.

CRIMINAL RECORD CHECK DUE DATE

- Current Policy: New Policy
- Proposed Change: All Coaches/Trainers/Officials must have their criminal record checks done before they step on floor. Associations who allow members that require criminal record checks to participate after the due date without a valid criminal record check will be subjected to fines and disciplinary action as deemed appropriate by the SLA Discipline Committee
- Rationale: To establish a due date for criminal record checks.

PLAYER MOVEMENT POLICY

- Current Policy: New
- Proposed Change: See Appendix A
- Rationale: To define a player movement process.

SCREENING POLICY

AGM MEETINGS AND FINANCIALS POLICY AMENDMENT

- Current Policy: 1.6.5 Club/Association/League Meeting Minutes – Each member club/association/league is required to submit all their meeting minutes to the SLA office within thirty (30) days. Meeting minutes must indicate time of next meeting.
- Proposed Change: 1.6.5 Club/Association/League Meeting Minutes – Each member club/association/league is required to submit all their meeting minutes and **copy of the financials** to the SLA office within thirty (30) days. Meeting minutes must indicate time of next meeting.
- Rationale: Usually the financials are right in the meetings minutes, but sometimes they aren't for various of reasons. We are responsible to ensure financials of our all leagues, members and associations are in proper order so need to ensure it is clearly communicated that the financials are submitted with the AGM Meeting Minutes.

DATABASE POLICY

- Current Policy: New policy under Registration
- Proposed Change: All Member Associations and Leagues are required to use whatever Database program is selected by the SLA.
- Rationale: It is required by Sask Sport and ISC that we keep track of all registered members information. This needs to be under one database to make this happen, we have a database in place that is required, so just a formal change to update Operations Manual

EXCEPTIONAL STATUS POLICY

- Current Policy: New Policy
- Proposed Change: See Appendix C
- Rationale: Have a process in place for when players/parents request their child play up a division in the Team Sask program.

ADDITION TO RESPECT IN SPORT AND MAP FUNDING POLICY

- Current Policy: Addition to current Respect In Sport Policy
- Proposed Change: Associations will not receive any MAP Funding credit for any Coaches who have not completed their Respect in Sport by the June 1st deadline.
- Rationale: Sask Sport will no longer give MAP funding for Coaches who have not completed the Respect in Sport course. RAMP Database now automatically puts in a Coaches RIS so Associations are able to check. If confirmation is required can ask the SLA Office



RAMP AND TRAVEL ROSTER

- Current Policy: New Policy
- Proposed Change: Travel Permit Rosters will not be approved if Associations don't have their registrations loaded into the RAMP database
- Rationale: We can't approve rosters if they aren't in the data base to check for ages and right groups etc.

RUSH SPONSORSHIP TERMS

- Current Policy: New Policy
- Proposed Change: Associations must abide by the sponsorship terms in the Rush Contract to be eligible for the discounted Membership Fees or receive funds from the Rush 50/50.
- Rationale: Need to ensure Members are following the rules of our sponsorship so we don't risk losing it.



APPENDIX A – PLAYER MOVEMENT POLICY PROPOSAL

1. Players who do sign or play in another league or association without the permission of the appropriate league shall be suspended for the balance of that season and for the entire season following.
2. **All (Junior, Senior and Minor A) teams** must have a minimum of twelve players registered with the SLA prior to the start of their first league game and throughout the regular season.
3. By the final signing date, a minimum of eighteen players must be signed to Junior, Senior and Minor A team's playing cards.
4. No team shall have more than twenty-five players signed and registered at any one time, except JR and Senior teams who shall be allowed to sign or register twenty-five players at any one time. When the maximum number of players has been signed, one must be released and his certificate returned to the League Registrar before an additional player may be signed and approved.
5. A player may be eligible to play in a game provided that he has been registered and approved in the current year. In the case of players brought up on a per game basis, they must be signed and their certificates approved by the appropriate league commissioner and be released on a game basis by their respective clubs. An approved release form must be attached (in duplicate) to the referees' report (**game sheet**) for the game in which they participate.
6. The SLA will not approve a playing certificate involving a player who has not attained his 16th birthday prior to the first day of January in the season the player intends competing, unless said Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association playing certificate is accompanied by a formal release signed by the authorized officials of his former team and signed by the Board of Directors. Infractions of the above will be subject to the penalties
7. The PGLL will not approve a Senior or JR playing certificate involving a player who has not attained his 21st birthday prior to the first day of January in the season the player intends competing.
8. A player over the age of sixteen (16) may not be signed by a junior team from outside his own residential boundaries per residence rule unless accompanied by a **release** signed by officials of his **residence Junior** team
9. The distance from one municipal boundary to another municipal boundary shall be determined by the shortest well traveled route and by mileage shown on the current map issued by the appropriate department of the Saskatchewan Government.
10. No player who is eligible by age for Bantam competition may play in any Junior or Senior competition (exhibition or league games)
11. A Midget age player may not play on a Senior team.
12. July 2nd shall be the final date for signing or releasing players except that players released from any team on or before July 2nd may be signed in the same category (Jr. A to Jr. A, Jr. B to Jr. B etc.) before July 15th. No further releases shall be allowed after July 2nd, until January 15th of the following year.
13. Up to July 15th, Junior players released prior to **July 2nd** may re-sign with the same team, or if that team has its limit of twenty-three signed, the player may sign with the next nearest team which has fewer than the permitted number signed, and for which he is eligible. All players being signed to a new team under this rule would remain the property of that team. The player could not be released or traded back the following year. **NOTE:** Players released prior to June 1st would be exempted from this rule and would be eligible to return to their previous team in the following season, if released conditionally.



14. Midget players who are affiliated to a Junior team but who are going to be released back to their Minor team, must be released by that Junior team prior to June 1st of the playing year, in order to apply to be reclassified to play for his/her Minor team. (Players being released after June 1st will be ineligible to return to the Minor clubs).
15. Junior players who are going to be reclassified to a lower category Junior team, must be released by that Junior team holding the player's playing rights, and reclassified prior to June 15th of the current playing season. **NOTE:** Players being released after this date will be ineligible to move to the lower Junior team in that season. **NOTE:** The higher level team retains the player's rights for their category, (at no cost, if the player returns).
16. If a club signs a player or players from a city, town or police village which has no team entered but which at a later date does enter a team, all players affected will have the choice of playing with the club with which they have signed or with the later entry. The players must notify the League Commissioner, in writing, before signing the second certificate. **NOTE** new teams wishing to join must have 25 registered players excluding players from that community that are registered with other teams
17. If a club or team withdraws during the season, the players are frozen and become the property of the appropriate league and the league, pending a decision regarding dispersal.
18. Any player refused a release by the club of which he is a member may appeal to the appropriate league commissioner to be granted such release.
19. If the player is applying to transfer to a club within the League such appeal shall be heard by the Commissioner and V.P. At the hearing of such appeal, the player and the clubs concerned, including affiliates, will have the right to be represented and heard. The decision of the Committee is final and the concerned parties notified in writing within three days of the hearing. A player granted such a release cannot sign a playing certificate until written notification is received and the conditions fulfilled.
20. Under no circumstances shall the Board of Directors, release a player from a club, if said player and club have not been invited to attend the meeting at which such releases are being considered.
21. No team may contact, influence, practice or play in league or exhibition games players who do not come under their jurisdiction in conformity with the above rules, the residential rule and the affiliation rule.
22. Prior to contacting a player, the club requires approval from, the MA which the player resides

APPLICABLE TO JR AND SENIOR SENIORS ONLY

23. By January 15th each club in the Major series must submit to the Major Commissioner and the Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association a list of players (to a maximum of twenty-five) who may sign for no other team, while their names remain on the list. This list shall be known as the "Protected List" and will include only:
 - Signed players from their previous season
 - Graduates of their affiliate teams
 - Unsigned but protected players from the previous season
 - Drafted players Senior "B" players that are signed Senior "B" but a Major team other than their affiliate holds their Major rights. **NOTE:** To be kept on a separate list outside the current protected list.



24. Not earlier than January 15th and not later than February 1st, each club in the Senior series must submit a "Protected List" which may include the names of player signed by the same team the previous year, signed by one of its affiliates and those eligible
25. On the 15th of February, the Appropriate league commissioner will circulate to all clubs copies of the various "Protected Lists" . .
26. No team shall be permitted to have more than a total of twenty-five players signed
27. Players refusing to sign for the team that has his rights and has protected him may be suspended. They may request a review of the suspension by the Commissioner. If the player is reinstated the team suspending him may place him on their protected list. If the player's situation is not resolved he may request the Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association to review the matter
28. Players eligible to be placed on the protected list who move out of province to play **box** lacrosse shall be placed on an Out of Province list until they return to the Saskatchewan Lacrosse jurisdiction. Returning players must register with the Commissioners who will advise the protecting team to place the player on their protected list. If the team doesn't wish to add his name to their list the player will become a free agent.
29. If they are playing in a non-residence Minor Association, graduating Midgets revert to their residence centre for the purpose of Junior eligibility. **NOTE:** If they have played in a Minor centre, which has a Junior team, for 3 years or more, they are protected from the draft but must return to their residence centre for the purpose of signing a Jr. registration.
30. Any junior team may have on their playing roster, for any given game, a maximum of five (5) players who have been signed as "inter-provincial transfer signings", as per the C.L.A. inter-provincial regulations. These players will be known as "out-of-province signings
31. A player resident in a community represented by a club with a team entered in a category for which he is eligible to play must register with that club except where such player's services are released by the club and subject to the Regulations and By-laws herein printed.
32. Having made his choice such player shall remain member of the club for which he has signed until properly released, or until the municipality in which he lives operates a team for which he is eligible, when he shall have the choice of signing with the new team in his own municipality or remaining with the team with which he originally signed. **Note** new teams wishing to join must have 25 registered players excluding players from that community that are registered with other teams
33. Players of Junior age or under may, at their discretion, play for the Zone/ Draft Lines nearest to their place of residence having a team entered in a series for which they are eligible to play, providing that there is no team in his residence centre for which he is also eligible to play. Once having registered in a category, the player shall remain in that category until he/she becomes overage or is released by his club.
34. If a club in a town or village has a player or players whom they cannot use, these players may, with the consent of the club apply to the Board of Directors for permission to play with the next Zone/ Draft Line. The Board of Directors may grant or refuse such permission.
35. Once a player has signed a Junior certificate and it has been approved by the PGLL, the team having signed him will retain the rights to his services until he is released unless he has been signed on the privilege of conditional release recognized by the PGLL or the player was signed to a Junior playing certificate while still a Midget age player.
36. Although any club may attach conditions to a release of a player bound to it by the residence rule no conditions may be attached to the release of a player passing through a municipality to sign for another team.



37. No player may be conditionally released more than once by any club to a lower or equal classification. If any club releases any player to the same or lower classification a second time it must be an unconditional release.
38. Players released after June 1st must remain with the team to which they were released, for the balance of that season plus the following season as well. (Players in their final Junior year, are not affected by this ruling)
39. If a player makes a legitimate residential change and upon requesting a release is refused, the player will have the right to appeal to the PGLL
40. Any player signed by a lower category club, including JRB II, but excluding Midget age or lower, when released by the club, may re-sign with a higher category club without releases needed by any other junior clubs closer to his releasing category club. Such player movement will be known as direct releases and each club within the corporation will be allowed three players to be signed each year by means of direct releases. Direct releases will affect the movement of players to a higher category club. Players residing in Junior centers may not be released under this section without the consent of the Junior team in their municipality.
41. Each Junior club in each series (A,B,B II, etc) will be allowed to trade players to other clubs within their own series, i.e. Jr. A to Jr. A, Jr. B to Jr. B etc. Terms and conditions of intra-league trading are as follows:
 - Until the second last Saturday of June, trades may be made between Junior teams of the same classification. There may or may not be conditions attached.
 - NOTE – Traded player/players cannot be traded back to the trading team the following year under any circumstance by the receiving team or by any other means, ***unless he had been released prior to June 1st, on the privilege of conditional release recognized by the PGLL. Note***
 - If a resident player in a centre with two junior teams is traded by the higher category team, the player's rights will be retained by that lower category team.
 - **Note:** Non-resident players, who have previously played for the lower category team, would also be covered under this rule.

Affiliation

42. JR, Senior, and MidgetAA clubs will have an automatic affiliation with all teams in a lower classification in its residence centre.
43. All Jr. to Senior teams may have affiliated with it one additional team from outside their residence centre which is currently unaffiliated, at the specified level requested. If the lower category team is affiliated by residence then it must have the permission of the higher category team which it is residentially affiliated to.
 - **Note:** Jr. A to: Jr. B or Jr. B II
 - Jr. B to: Jr. B II or Midget
 - Jr. B II, or Midget
 - Sr. B, Jr. A or Jr. B
 - Sr. B to: Jr. B or Jr. B II. Two Jr. B teams in adjacent or next closest centers can may an affiliation with any JRB II team if both clubs are supplying players to the JRB II team and there is only JR BII lacrosse in one of the two centers.



44. Providing he has the permission of his team, a player signed with an JR B II or Midget team may play in a higher series with a team affiliated with his own. He may play an unlimited number of games during the higher category team's regular season.
45. A player signed with an S.L.A. Junior team may play in higher series with his affiliated club or clubs in an unlimited number of playoff games providing that the team for which he was signed has been eliminated. If the player's team has not been eliminated,
46. A player may play in **fifteen** playoff games with their affiliate team.
47. Players who are injured may have their games count as played, only if they provide a doctor's note stating that they were injured and unable to play for those games.
48. Players under suspension are ineligible to play for either team and games will only count in the league in which the suspensions were served.
49. No player may play in any playoff game with any team with which he is not on a protective list, except with a team affiliated with his own, and only then with the written permission of the MA
50. **No JR B or JRB II may play in a Senior B league or playoff game**

Tampering

51. Any team using another club's players in exhibition, regularly schedule or playoff games, without proper releases, shall be fined a minimum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and maximum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00).
52. Any lacrosse team judged to be tampering with a player of another club shall be fined a maximum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) by the PGLL. The PGLL must be the final judge of the above charge.
53. A second offence during the same season shall result in a minimum suspension of one year for the person(s) deemed responsible plus any additional fines.

NOTE: Tampering shall be defined as contacting a player who "belongs" to another SLA Club without first receiving permission from that team to which he already "belongs" by residence or affiliation.



APPENDIX B – SCREENING POLICY PROPOSAL

Purpose

The Saskatchewan Lacrosse Association (SLA) accepts its responsibility to children, young adults, parents, and volunteers involved in its programs and is committed to adherence to the following policy to support the provision of a sound, safe, and healthy lacrosse experience in our community.

Policy

1 Due to the positions of trust that are inherent in the provision of active, high quality sport activities, volunteers shall be required to undergo a screening process based on the duties assigned by the SLA or the SLA Members. The screening process will be comprised of a variety of measures and includes a Police Record Check for all volunteers.

2 Failure to participate in the screening process as outlined in this policy will result in the individual being ineligible for any of the volunteer positions.

3 The SLA will not knowingly place in a volunteer position an individual who has a conviction for certain offences as defined in this Policy.

4 However, when the SLA is of the opinion that, notwithstanding a conviction for certain offences, a person can occupy a volunteer position without adversely affecting the safety of a participant, the SLA may approve an individual's placement in a volunteer position.

5 If a volunteer, in a volunteer position, subsequently receives a conviction for, or is found guilty of an offence listed in this policy, he or she must report this circumstance immediately to the SLA.

6 If a volunteer provides falsified or misleading information, that person will immediately be removed from his or her position and may be subject to further discipline in accordance with the SLA's Discipline and Appeals Policy and the SLA Code of Conduct.

Scope

Screening is an ongoing process designed to identify any person, who may potentially harm children, youth or other vulnerable persons. Screening involves isolating the risks related to specific volunteer positions, and then establishing appropriate methods to reduce the risk. Screening take place before someone starts volunteering and continues throughout their involvement.

Definitions of Screening

1 A Volunteer is an individual:

- o who chooses to undertake a service or activity
- o who does the activity in service to an individual or organization; or to assist the community at large
- o who does not receive a salary or wage for this service or activity



2 A Participant is an individual:

o who participates in programs or receives services from a recreation or sport organization. The word participant is used throughout the policy as a generic term and represents players, athletes, clients, users.

3 Vulnerable Person

One who has difficulty protecting themselves from harm temporarily or permanently and is at risk because of age, disability or handicap. Children and youth are considered to be vulnerable.

4 Position of Trust

Situations in which someone has a significant degree of

- o Authority or decision making power over another
- o Unsupervised access to another person and to their property

Situations where the success of the service depends on the development of a close, personal relationship between the individual as in mentoring or friendly visiting programs. Where volunteers are in a position of trust, there is more opportunity for abuse and more expectation that the organization will do what it can to reduce the risk of this happening.

5 Orientation

Orientation is a period of process adjustment. Providing information to a volunteer about the program they will be involved in, providing them with the rules and regulations and the code of conduct are all part of the orientation process. Orientation is a valuable screening process.

6 Training

Training is the learning process, during which time an individual is taught specific skills and expectations, which will assist them in performing their duties.

Risk Factors

1 Screening is a way of reducing the risk of harm involved in doing certain things within the sport environment. The screening that is done for each position is based on the specific risks related to that position. Factors that increase risk include: young age of participants, minimal family presence, transporting participants, low or no on-site supervision, isolation, overnights, physical contact, close relationships, positions of trust, and lack of organizational policies.

2 While the SLA cannot unduly discriminate against individuals, the SLA and the SLA Members have the right and the obligation to refuse potential volunteers based on the risks and requirements of each position.



Police Record Checks

1 For certain positions within the SLA and the SLA Membership, a Police Record Check will be required as an important but not exclusive element of the screening process.

2 Individuals with past Criminal Code convictions for certain offences will not be accepted for a direct service position with participants. These offences include, but are not limited to, the following time frames listed:

Lifetime

- o Any type of sexual assault
- o Invitation to sexual touching
- o Sexual interference, bestiality, or sexual exploitation
- o Procuring sexual activity
- o Indictable criminal offences for youth abuse
- o Any court order forbidding the individual to have contact with children under the age of 14
- o Any convictions related to child pornography

Five (5) Years

- o Assault
- o Any weapons offence
- o Conviction under any controlled drug and substance act
- o Criminal driving offences

Until resolved through the judicial system

- o Outstanding convictions or charges pending for any violent offence
- o Outstanding convictions or charges pending for criminal driving offences, including but not limited to impaired driving
- o Outstanding convictions or charges pending for sexual offences

Applicants may also be rejected as a result of other information gained during the police record check or through the screening process as a whole, or as a consequence of the other factors which are directly relevant to the requirement of the position, and to the ability of the applicant to carry out their duties in an effective, safe manner.



The applicant has the right to know why they are being refused and may appeal pursuant to the SLA Policy Manual

3 The Police Record check will be valid for three (3) years and may be made available to other sport organizations upon receipt of written permission from the applicant.

4 Every volunteer, once accepted, must notify the SLA or SLA Member if they are charged, tried, convicted, or involved in any way with a police investigation matter related to any of the above noted offences.

5 The collection of Police Record checks is subject to SLA Policy – Privacy of Personal Information. The information collected can only be disclosed to individuals who are making decisions regarding the volunteer. There is no dissemination of the information unless there is written consent. Information is to be destroyed in such a manner as to prevent unauthorized access once the individual is approved/rejected for the volunteer role.

RULE OF TWO

1 The rule of two is for the protection of the child as well as the coach and the official. The Rule of Two states that there will always be two screened and NCCP trained or certified coaches/officials with an athlete/ young official, especially a minor athlete, when in a potentially vulnerable situation. This means that any one-on-one interaction between a coach/official and an athlete/young official must take place within earshot and view of the second coach/official, with the exception of medical emergencies. One of the coaches/official must also be of the same gender as the athlete/official. Should there be a circumstance where a second screened and NCCP trained or certified coach/official is not available, a screened volunteer, parent, or adult can be recruited. This rule serves to protect minor athletes/young official in potentially vulnerable situations by ensuring that more than one adult is present. Vulnerable situations can include closed doors meetings, travel, and training environments amongst others. Organizations must create and implement, policies and procedures, in a sustainable, phased and measurable process, that limit the instances where these situations are possible.

FACILITY PROTOCOL

1 Players in dressing rooms are to be supervised. The Rule of Two is to be adhered to at all times with players and especially when they are showering or changing. Should separate dressing rooms be required, both dressing rooms require the appropriate adult supervision.

2 Team officials and parent/guardian representative(s) of every team shall ensure that the dressing room door remains closed while Players are changing.



3 Video or photography is NOT PERMITTED in the shower/dressing rooms while Players are undressed or changing. Where special events (e.g., team pictures, championships) lend themselves to this equipment, the Players must be appropriately dressed. The privacy and dignity of the Players is the first priority.

4 The trainer when treating injuries should avoid treating injuries out of sight of others. The Rule of Two is to be adhered to at all times.

5 Female Teams require the Rule of Two and there is to be at least one (1) female supervisors with the players.

6 In isolated spaces, parents/guardians should never leave their child unsupervised in a facility, nor should they leave their child alone with a single personnel member. The Rule of Two is to be adhered to.

7 In sport and training facilities, participants who are minors should never be left waiting in a facility without the supervision of their parent/guardian or personnel member. The Rule of Two is to be adhered to.



APPENDIX C – EXCEPTIONAL PLAYER STATUS

Team Saskatchewan program strives to put athletes in the best possible scenario for personal and team success. Team Saskatchewan program can only grant a maximum of two underage players will be allowed on any team.

An Exceptional Player is one who meets the following criteria:

1. **Personal Resume**; it should include academic standing, athletic achievements, leadership activities, community service, other extra-curricular activities (sports, clubs, etc), academic awards and work experience (if any);
2. Deemed by the coach(of team attempting to join) to be a starter based on provincial depth charts: either a top 3 offense/attack, top 3 transition/midfield, top 3 defense or top goalie.
3. A letter of recommendation from a former coach and attached coach recommendation form.
4. Recommendation from filled out by current classroom teacher on attached form.

Players wishing to play in a division above their age category for the upcoming season must e-mail the Director of Saskatchewan Lacrosse with their request no later than April 1st. Players will be advised by April 15 if they have been granted exceptional status.

- How Selections will be made:
 - Applicants will be evaluated by SLA (Sector Chair, Coach Coordinator, VP of operations)
 - Applications will be reviewed on their individual merit; taking into account the physical, emotional and social maturity of the athlete.
 - Depth chart obtained from coach of team.
 - Applicants will be notified of the decision on or before April 15.
