President's Report

I feel like the past year has flown by! Hard to believe it's been a year since we met in Kelowna and put our long-contemplated governance changes in place. I want to thank the voting delegates again for getting this across the finish line. I think our organization is the better for the changes from top to bottom, with our staff, board and advisory councils all having adjusted and achieving some great things!

A big focus of our last year has been our strategic plan. Our previous plan had expired and Diane and her staff, together with the consultant selected through a bid process, have been consulting with members and other stakeholders and working with the board to identify our priorities for the next four years and to put in place achievable goals that align with those priorities. The strategic plan will be presented to the voting delegates and the AGM, and we look forward to having it in place.

This year we also made changes to some of our meetings, celebrations and honors. While getting together at the AGM is always fun and rewarding, it is also incredibly expensive relative to our organization's overall budget. The decision was made by the board to hold this year's AGM virtually, saving tens of thousands of dollars that can go to staffing and programming. Annual awards will be presented at the recipients' home associations, where they can be celebrated by those that know and love them, as well as being recognized by Softball BC. And for the first time this past summer, the Hall of Fame inductions were conducted at Softball City during Canada Cup. This allowed us to unveil the awards at the Wall of Fame with so many of the recipients friends and family present, and also to host a cocktail reception with both new and existing Hall of Fame members, an event that was incredibly well-received.

Personally, I enjoyed being the Softball BC rep for the U11 Rep Showcase at Lakehill here on the Island, helping to host the U19B Provincial at Langford, and acting as Assistant Supervisor at the U19 Women's Nationals at Softball City. I also attended the Women's A/B Provincials in Richmond as a parent. As always, I enjoyed seeing familiar faces and getting to know new ones, and was struck again by the amazing volunteer community we have and the quality of softball in BC.

In terms of challenges, I see culture as our primary one. Our sport is far from alone in this, but we need to remember to respect each other and treat each other with kindness and in the spirit of cooperation. Most of the complaints we are receiving at the Softball BC office these days involve poor treatment of each other (be it coach or parent to umpire or coach to player), or disputes between associations within a district. Our sport is better and more enjoyable for everyone participating when we can remember to treat each other well and to not let our own egos get in the way of what's best for the game and the participants.

As my term as President comes to an end, I just want to sincerely thank everyone that loves and supports softball for all that you do.

Provincial Umpire-in-Chief Report

Introduction

The 2025 season was one of measurable progress for the Softball BC Umpire Program. Recruitment initiatives, retention strategies, and training investments all contributed to a stronger, more sustainable officiating community. Our umpires also achieved significant

success at Canadian and Western Championships, continuing to raise the profile of British Columbia on the national stage as one of, if not the strongest Umpire program in Canada.

Recruitment and Retention

Recruitment in 2025 saw 395 new umpires register, a 48% increase over 2024. Targeted efforts included:

- Utilizing Technology, further expand e-learning for clinics and strengthen in-person clinics by using Virtual Reality and other video tools.
- "Try Umpiring" Fall Ball initiatives, which provided prospective officials with low-pressure, low-cost entry points.
- Local Association recruitment, many associations took an active role in recruiting Umpires for the 2025 season. Outreach programs that introduced officiating to youth athletes showing them the opportunities to make money and learn more about the game.

Retention still struggles most notably, with only 53% of first-year umpires returning for a second season. Key factors identified in the year-end survey of 1st year Umpires included:

"Some parents can be very hurtful to new umpires and it can make them not want to ump."

"If I get a different job at a restaurant or something then I will probably not return."

"Push back from coaches and parents on decisions I made. It sometimes felt really disrespectful and intimidating."

81% of comments regarding "your Biggest Challenge in Year 1" specifically involved Coaches and/or Parents being difficult.

Ultimately.... "It would be nice if the coaches and parents were told we were just learning too because some were **very hard on us** and we could hear the **insults** and **making fun of us** from the stands."

Training and Development

Training participation remained strong, with:

- 27 clinics delivered across BC (19 in-person, 8 online).
- 800 total participants, including 395 first-year umpires.
- 58 umpires advancing certification levels, a 28% increase from 2024.

Development programs emphasized rule knowledge, mechanics, and game management, while higher-level umpires received advanced preparation for championship assignments.

Success at Canadian and Western Championships

Softball BC umpires were highly visible at national and regional events in 2025: ● Canadian Championships:

- 17 BC umpires appointed (up from 14 in 2024)
- 9 officials selected for medal games, including 5 Gold Medal plate assignments and 2 Bronze Medal plate assignments.
- Plate assignments: Megan Parsons (Gold Plate U17 Girls), Bronwen Marchant (Gold Plate, U20 Women's), Kaleb Hutchinson (Bronze Plate, U20 Men's), Norma Mino (Gold Plate, Women's), and Jason Ranchoux (Bronze Plate, Women's), Lucas Crosby (Gold Plate, Men's)
- 2025 Canada Summer Games:
 - 2 BC umpires appointed, 1 BC umpire as UIC
 - Kiera Hamm, Plate Bronze Medal game and Mark Webster, 1st Base Gold Medal game.
 - Tonya Ribalkin-Zanon, UIC Women's Championship
- Western Canadian Championships:
 - 10 BC umpires appointed across U13, U15, and U19 divisions. o 2 appointed UIC and/or Deputy UIC.
 - 5 officials selected for medal games, including 2 Gold Medal plate assignments and 1 Bronze Medal plate assignment.
 - Plate assignments: Mischa Tung (Bronze Plate, U13), Megan Halfnights (Gold Plate, U13), Dana Edamura (Gold Plate, U15)
- Canada Cup & Provincial Championships:
 - Over 450 games officiated by BC umpires.
 - 20 umpires evaluated for advancement at major events.

These appointments and recognitions confirm that BC officials are among the most respected in the country, consistently trusted with high-profile assignments.

Looking Ahead to 2026

- Increase recruitment by an additional 10%, targeting rural and underrepresented communities with asynchronous Online clinic and reality-based training.
- Raise the retention rate of first- and second-year umpires to 65% or higher.
- Continue national-level appointments, aiming for 15+ BC umpires at Canadian Championships.

Langley Fastball Association Highlights for 2025

The start of Spring 2025 was a very busy one for LFA. With the recent upgrade package we received from the Township of Langley a lot of our energy was spent adjusting and settling into a renovated Noel Booth Park. Double headers on four diamonds, including field turnover and adjustments, umpire assignments, and post late game cleanup. On top of that, the lights were delayed by Hydro so we had a temporary generator - we needed to start each night and then turn off! Our goal was to have every kid in every classification play at Noel Booth, on the new diamonds and possibly under the lights. We also make use of other municipal and school district diamonds within South Langley.

On our umpire recruitment, training and advancement, we welcomed 29 new umpires to Langley for a total of 85 registered. Our umpire program is shared amongst Langley Fastball and North Langley Softball and led by Paul Muirhead. We had 587 regular season games scheduled, and all were covered by a certified umpire and none were cancelled.

We ran several large tournaments and events :

- LFA Opening Day Celebration
- U13A (8 Teams) & U15A (12 Teams, incl. NW Bullets & WA Ladyhawks) in April
- U11Rep (10 Teams) & U13C (14 Teams) in May
- U11 Celebration of Softball (23 Teams)
- Langley Fastpitch Championships (25 Teams) in June
- We also hosted the U17C Provincials with probably the best parent organizing committee EVER!

We would wish to extend our thanks to all the teams that attended all our events and congratulations to all the teams that claimed a medal.

- U11Rep Langley Wild (Pirro) taking Bronze in Softball City in the U11Rep Showcase
- Xtreme 10 taking Gold in District 8 for U15B
- Fusion 10 claimed Silver in U15A Provincials

- Xtreme 06 claimed Silver in U19B in Langford
- Fusion 08 won Provincials

Abbotsford Minor Fastball

A Decade of Growth

Our primary goal was to increase our player base to 640 participants. We fell short of this objective, but we did manage year-over-year growth, which keeps that 10-year trend intact. In 2026, we will shoot again for 640, with the following expected composition:

- Four A teams '09, '11, '13, '14
- Seven B teams, one for each birth year 08-'14
- Two U11Rep teams
- 225 players in the Learn to Play program
- 250 players in the Recreational program

We are excited about our performance in U11Rep from last season, having a team finish 2nd in the gold bracket and 1st in the silver bracket sets us up well to field two (one A and one B) competitive teams this coming season in the 2014 birth year. Operational Initiatives

Permanent Closure of the Langley Office

In December 2024, the Board approved the permanent closure of the Softball BC office located in Langley, BC. This decision created an opportunity to:

- Redirect funds towards enhancing staff capacity in order to improve service levels for our members.
- Eliminate the need to centralize staff to the Lower Mainland out of need to maximize the use of the space.

Staffing Restructure

In December, the Board approved a staffing restructuring plan aimed at reallocating funds to enhance staff capacity in specific areas without necessitating a significant increase in membership fees. A summary of the portfolios assigned to each staff member is available on the Softball BC website.

System Changes

Softball BC's accounting system was heavily paper-based and in need of an upgrade to incorporate more advanced accounting tools. With the assistance of our new service provider, we transitioned from Sage to QuickBooks for our accounting system, supplemented by additional accounting tools at little to no cost to Softball BC. This new system has significantly increased our reporting efficiency, particularly in tracking cash flow and year-end projections. The updated staff procedures that accompany the new system also ensure more thorough documentation, which will notably reduce audit time in future years.

Additionally, the Association has migrated to the Google Workspace platform to eliminate the costs associated with Microsoft licenses, as Softball BC qualified for the free non-profit rate offered by Google. We anticipate the elimination of other redundant fee-based tools, such as JotForms.

Website and publication

The Board has decided to eliminate the production of an annual Softball BC Handbook in favor of listing the SORs individually on the website in PDF format. This new approach extends the timeframe available to the Board, Governance Committee, and Councils to complete their work, as the production process is no longer limited by the costs associated with design and printing.

AGM / Congress / Annual Awards

In December, the Board decided to eliminate the October Congress.

- The Annual General Meeting (AGM), which serves as a strictly business meeting, will be conducted in a virtual format. This change allows for greater participation by removing the need for attendees to travel just to cast a vote.
- The Congress will now be held in the spring with a different theme that supports coaching development, umpire development, LSO (Local Sport Organization) support and development, or PSO (Provincial Sports Organization) initiatives. The Board, with input from the Finance

Committee, will design a financial support program to ensure the Congress is financially accessible for all members.

- A new Awards Policy, which includes the Hall of Fame, was developed over the summer to provide increased clarity on nomination criteria, selection procedures, and the presentation of awards. Starting this season, recipients of the Annual Awards will receive their physical awards at an event hosted by their association or club, creating an opportunity for family, friends, and the community to celebrate their accomplishments. These moments will be captured and promoted on the Softball BC website and social media platforms.
- The Hall of Fame recognition has also been revamped to coincide with the Canada Cup. The revised format provides an opportunity to honor inductees in front of a larger audience of family members, friends, and current Hall of Fame members.

Strategic Plan

In August 2025, the Board finalized a new Strategic Plan for 2026-2030. While developing a strategic plan is a requirement for funding, the Board believes that this new plan clearly outlines the priorities for Softball BC. The plan will be officially unveiled at the 2025 Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Operational Effectiveness Initiatives (OEI)

The <u>OEI</u> is a multi-year project funded by viaSport, aimed at strengthening the capacity and sustainability of Designated Sport Organizations in British Columbia (BC). viaSport has partnered with <u>Sport Law</u> to assist all 75 Designated Sport Organizations in modernizing and enhancing their governance structures and operations.

The review conducted by viaSport identified several key components that align with best practices and standards. These components include:

- 1. Legal Incorporation
- 2. Foundational Statements and Intentional Planning
- 3. Informed Governance (Good Governance)
- 4. Committee Structures
- 5. Human Resource Planning and Management
- 6. Financial Planning and Management
- 7. Risk Management
- 8. Safe and Inclusive Environments
- 9. Delivery of Programs and Services

Sport Law provided 42 recommendations to Softball BC that address the above areas. Efforts have begun to implement these recommendations, with a goal of completing all implementations by the end of the 2026 calendar year.
