Umpire Code of Ethics

Fair Play Code:

1. Softball Manitoba has entrusted us to assist them in the development of our youth through athletics. The proper operation of such a process requires that officials be independent, impartial and responsible to the people they serve.
2. An official must devote time, thought and study to the rules of the game and to the mechanics necessary to carry out enforcement of these rules. They must do so that they may render competent and credible service in a fair and unbiased manner.
3. An official must work with fellow officials and Softball Manitoba in a spirit of harmony and cooperation despite differences of opinion that may arise during debate of points or rules at issue.
4. An official must resist every temptation and outside pressure to use one's position as an official to benefit oneself. Under all circumstances, officials must avoid promoting the particular interest of any person or group of persons other than the athletes we serve.
5. An official must consistently uphold the honour and dignity of the avocation in all personal conduct and relations with the athletes, coaches, administrators, colleagues, and the public, to be a worthy example to the athletes under one's jurisdiction.
6. An official is mentally and physically prepared, dresses according to expectations and maintains an appearance that is befitting the importance of the game and Softball Canada's expectations.
7. The official shall avoid the use of tobacco products, drugs, and alcohol at the contest site.
8. Every member of the officiating profession carries a responsibility to act in a manner becoming a professional person. An officials' conduct influences the perception of the public toward the specific official and on the profession in general.

Commitment to Players and Coaches

1. I will make sure that every athlete has a reasonable opportunity to perform to the best of their ability, within the limits of the rules.
2. I will avoid or put an end to any situation that threatens the safety of the athletes.
3. I will maintain a healthy atmosphere and environment for competition.
4. I will not permit the intimidation of any athlete either by word or action. I will not tolerate unacceptable conduct toward officials, other athletes, spectators or myself.
5. I will be consistent and objective in calling all infractions, regardless of my personal feelings toward a team or individual athlete.
6. I accept my role as a teacher and role model for fair play, especially with young participants.
7. I will remain open to constructive criticism and show respect and consideration for different points of view.

Zero Tolerance Policy

Verbal and physical abuse of umpires is as unacceptable as verbal and physical abuse of players.

Softball Manitoba has a zero-tolerance policy for umpire abuse, disputing judgment calls, or displays of poor sportsmanship. Umpires shall only be spoken to positively and constructively. It is acceptable to question the interpretation of a rule, but only in a courteous non-confrontational manner.

Umpire Abuse: any deliberate action by a coach/player/spectator that makes an umpire feel physically threatened, verbally intimidated, or emotionally humiliated. Disrespectfully objecting to calls, yelling at, publicly calling out, and constantly disagreeing with an umpire verbally or through physical gestures can be deemed umpire abuse.

Judgment Calls - a judgment call is a decision made by an umpire using their opinion of what they have seen. **An umpire's judgment call is final.** Judgment calls include ball/strike, safe/out, interference/obstruction, catch/no-catch, fair/foul, etc.

Verbal Reporting

It is inherent within the Softball Manitoba community to protect umpires from abuse. All Softball Manitoba members are bound to report any incident of umpire abuse to the league UIC within 24 hours of the occurrence of the incident. The League UIC will follow-up with the umpire and the person who submitted the report, and contact the league president (or designate) to initiate discipline. **Note that an ejection is not required for the initiation of disciplinary procedures related to umpire abuse. Youth/novice umpires are not expected/required to eject coaches.**

Discipline

The penalties for any confirmed case of umpire abuse by a coach, player or spectator will be determined by the league committee and will be appropriate to the severity of the incident. Repeat offenders will face longer penalties. An ejection from a game is NOT a prerequisite for facing discipline.

Ejections

- Ejected coaches or spectators cannot remain on the surrounding field areas, including grandstands, and must vacate all field areas promptly after an ejection.
- Ejected coaches will receive an automatic 1-game suspension, unless otherwise communicated by league UIC's.
- Any incident that involves physical abuse (shoving, bumping) or the threat of physical abuse will result in an immediate indefinite suspension and notification of proper authorities. A manager or coach wishing to be reinstated must appear before the Softball Manitoba Disciplinary Committee for a hearing.

Written Follow-Up

Umpires will provide a written report of confirmed instances of umpire abuse within 72 hours.

Social Media Policy

Per the Softball Canada Discipline Policy and Code of Conduct, the following social media conduct may be considered minor or major infractions at the discretion of the case manager:



- a) Posting a disrespectful, hateful, insulting, or otherwise negative comment on social media, that is directed at members or at other persons connected with SC and/or other National Federations, the WBSC and related events.
- b) Posting a disparaging or harmful comment on social media, that is directed at SC and/or other National Federations, the WBSC and related events.
- c) Creating or contributing to a Facebook group, webpage, blog, or online forum devoted solely or in part to promoting negative or disparaging remarks or commentary about SC or its reputation and other National Federations, the WBSC and related events
- d) Posting a picture, altered picture, or video on social media that is harmful, disrespectful, insulting, or otherwise offensive, and that is directed at members or at other persons connected with SC and other National Federations, the WBSC and related events.
- e) Any instance of cyber-bullying or cyber-harassment between one member and another member (including a teammate, coach, opponent, volunteer, or official), where incidents of cyber-bullying and cyber-harassment can include but are not limited to the following conduct on any social medium, via text-message, or via email: insults, negative comments, vexatious behaviour, pranks or jokes, threats, posing as another person, spreading rumours or lies, or other harmful behavior
- f) Any instance of bringing the game of softball into disrepute.

Member Responsibilities

1. Members must be aware that their Social Media use may be monitored by Softball Canada or by the Members' provincial/territorial or local softball associations.
2. When using social media, a member must model appropriate behaviour benefitting the Member's status as a member of Softball Canada.
3. Removing content from social media after it has been posted (either publicly or privately) does not excuse the Member from being subject to the Softball Canada Discipline Policy.
4. A member who believes that the social media use by another member is inappropriate or may violate Softball Canada's policies and procedures should report the matter to Softball Canada in the manner outlined by the Softball Canada Discipline Policy.
5. All conduct and behaviour occurring on social media may be subject to the Softball Canada Discipline Policy at the discretion of the case manager.

Mentorship Program

Purpose:

The mentorship program has two main purposes:

1. To provide new officials with guidance and support beyond the basic rule interpretations and mechanics that are offered in the clinic setting.
2. To retain new officials beyond their first year in the program and prepare them for officiating in championship caliber tournaments.

Rationale:

Young umpires consistently drop out of officiating after they encounter situations they are not yet confident in handling- namely negative feedback from coaches, players and parents.

Can I get a mentor?

YES! IF you are a new Softball Manitoba umpire in your first 3 years of the program, you can be provided with a mentor!

Can I be a mentor?

YES! IF you are a veteran umpire who wants to give back to the program, you can sign up to guide and support a new official!

How does it work?

- Mentors will contact their mentees early in the season via a mutually convenient method (phone, text, email).
- Mentors will attend a game in the early stages of the season and provide positive reinforcement and guidance to their mentees. This support will NOT be an evaluation.
- Mentors will attend additional games during the season (as agreed upon with the mentees) and serve as a resource for the mentees to consult with any questions or unique situations they encounter.
- Mentors will keep a log of their activity and provide it to the program coordinator at season's end.

Umpire Certification Summary

Level 1 Certification

Level 1 certification requires participants to attend a 6 to 8-hour clinic. This clinic will provide both classroom and on-field instruction. Participants must receive a minimum grade of 60% on a written test.

Cost: Under 21 = \$80.00 Over 21 = \$120.00

Level 2 Certification

Level 2 certification requires participants to attend a 6 to 8-hour clinic involving both on-field and classroom instruction. Second-year officials have the option to remain a Level 1 for a second consecutive year or advance to Level 2. Officials will be required to maintain a Level 2 certification for a minimum of two years before advancing to Level 3.

Level 2 officials require a minimum grade of 70% on their Softball Canada exam.

Cost: Under 21 = \$80.00 Over 21 = \$120.00

Level 3 Certification

Officials wanting to attend a Level 3 clinic must either be recommended by a Zone UIC/DUIC or apply directly through the UDC. Applicants to a Level 3 clinic will need a positive evaluation from a recognized evaluator.

Level 3 certification clinics take place every two years. The 12 to 14-hour clinic will be held over at least 2 days and will involve game situations as well as classroom instruction. To obtain a full Level 3 certification, officials must receive a positive evaluation and recommendation (from a recognized evaluator) from a game at the U15AAA level or higher.

Recertification at Level III requires officials to:

- a) Attend a refresher course involving classroom and on-field instruction and write and pass an online exam provided by Softball Canada.

Level 3 officials require a minimum grade of 80% on their Softball Canada exam.

Officials will be required to maintain a Level 3 certification for a minimum of two years before advancing.

Cost: \$145.00

Level 4 Certification

Level 4 is by **invite only** and comes from a positive evaluation at the Provincial, Western or Canadian Level. Recommendations from the local UIC and the UDC of Manitoba are also required.

Level 4 Theory is conducted yearly by Softball Canada. The program is only offered online and requires participants to attend sessions over a 6-week period. An in-person Level 4 clinic also offered in conjunction with the Blue Convention every three years.

To obtain full Level 4 certification, umpires are required to attend a Canadian Championship at the U19 Level or higher and receive a positive evaluation along with a recommendation from the evaluator.

Recertification at Level IV requires officials to:

- a) Attend a refresher course involving classroom and write and pass an online exam provided by Softball Canada.

Level 4 officials require a minimum grade of 85% on their Softball Canada exam.

Cost: \$145.00

Level 5 Certification

Achievement of Level V is through a recommendation by Softball Canada from a Canadian Men's or Women's Championship.

Recertification at Level V requires officials to:

- a) Attend a refresher course and write and pass an online exam provided by Softball Canada.

Level 5 officials require a minimum grade of 90% on their Softball Canada exam.

Umpires selected to represent Softball Manitoba at Softball Canada or Western Canadian Championships must:

- Officiate at a minimum of one AAA Level Provincial Championship.
- Volunteer at least twice for UDC fundraising events in 2024
- Attend any additional in-person or online instruction or educational sessions as required by the UDC.
- Complete the Softball Canada exam and receive a passing grade.
- Undergo a criminal record check, if required, for the Championship as outlined by Softball Canada or the WCSA.
- Have the proper uniform elements necessary for the Championship as outlined by Softball Canada or the WCSA.

Fundraising

All umpires are encouraged to support UDC fundraising. The monies raised help to offset the cost of registration and support umpire development across the province.

If you are travelling to a Western or Canadian Championship, you or a representative must volunteer at least twice for UDC fundraising events in 2024.

Even if you aren't attending a Championship, you are encouraged to help fundraise.

Current fundraising options include

- Gate shift(s) at the UDC-hosted Championship(s) (currently the Softball Manitoba U11 A Girls' Championship),
- Umpiring a minimum of two games without a fee at U11 A Girls' Championship,
- Selling a minimum of 25 tickets for any UDC sponsored raffle
- Helping for a day as a liaison at UDC hosted Western Championship.

The UDC may offer other fundraising events during the year.

Fitness Testing Protocol

All candidates attending U19 and above Canadian Championships must complete the WBSC fitness requirements before attending the Championship. Travelling umpires must complete their fitness test by April 30th.

The UDC will be conducting the testing during the Softball Manitoba U19AAA Championship.

UDC Awards

The Umpire Development Committee has established several achievements and awards. Any Softball Manitoba registered umpire can nominate individuals prior to September 30 for:

- 1) The Ellery Scatch Northern Umpire of the Year Award
- 2) The Grassroots Umpire of the Year. Up to 2 awards per region
- 3) The Home Run Sports Wayne Deschouwer Umpire of the Year

The UDC also provides recognition when:

- a) A Manitoba registered umpire receives WBSC Certification
- b) A Manitoba registered umpire receives Level 5 Certification
- c) A Manitoba registered umpire receives Full Level 4 Certification
- d) An umpire announces retirement from Softball Manitoba Umpire Program
 - Must have given a minimum of 12 years to the umpiring program.
 - They served in a volunteer officiating position for a minimum of four years.
 - They contributed to umpire development as an instructor, evaluator, and mentor or program developer.
 - Have a high level of officiating ability.
- e) Special Recognition Award
 - To be given to a non-umpire who has made significant contributions to the Softball Manitoba umpiring program.

Wayne Deschouwer Home Run Sports Umpire of the Year

This is the highest honour an umpire in Manitoba can receive.

1. Be a registered umpire in Manitoba.
2. Be a registered and in good standing. Minimum Level 2 certification required.
3. Must have participated as a working official at local league competitions or Provincial Competitions in Manitoba.
4. Must have been involved in assisting with the development of officials at the local or provincial level.

Canadian Indicator Club

Since 1997, Softball Canada has recognized individuals who have made significant contributions to officiating in the sport. Some of the criteria used to determine nominees to the Indicator Club include:

- 10+ years of service to the umpiring program, including 4+ as a volunteer as an instructor, evaluator, mentor, or program developer.
- high level of officiating ability and a positive role model.

Softball Canada recognizes bats certified by both USA Softball and the WBSC for use in Fast Pitch competitions and USA Softball, the WBSC and USSSA for Slo-Pitch play.

FASTPITCH - MALE (UP TO U19) AND FEMALE (ALL LEVELS)

- Any bat that appears on the WBSA Softball Approved Bat List and has a current ISF certification stamp (2005 only) will be accepted for play at a Softball Canada event *or*,
- Any bat that appears on the USA Softball Approved Bat List and has an ASA 2000 or 2004 certification stamp will also be accepted for play at a Softball Canada event.
 - The bat must meet the compression standards outlined by the certifying organization and may be tested to ensure they are in the proper range.
 - The bat must still pass a visual inspection per the current Softball Canada rulebook.

FASTPITCH - ADULT MALE (U23 AND ABOVE)

ISF2005 WBSC (New) ASA2000 ASA2004 USA Softball (New) ASA2013 USA Softball (Replacement)



- Any bat that appears on the WBSC Approved Bat List and has a current ISF certification stamp (2005 only) will be accepted for play at a Softball Canada event *or*,
- Any bat that appears on the USA Softball Approved Bat List and has an ASA 2000, ASA 2004 or ASA 2013 certification stamp will also be accepted for play at a Softball Canada event.
- The bat must meet the compression standards outlined by the certifying organization and may be tested to ensure that they are in the proper range.

- The bat must still pass a visual inspection per the current Softball Canada rulebook.

All other bats are not approved for use. Non-approved bats shall be removed from competition and visibly marked (e.g. tape). Teams should be advised that attempted use during the game will, by rule, result in ejection.

Updated November 2018

- Any bat that appears on the WBSA approved bat list and has a current ISF certification stamp (2005 only) will be accepted for play in Softball Canada competition or,
 - Any bat that appears on the USA Softball Approved Bat List and has an ASA 2000 or ASA 2004 certification stamp will also be accepted for play in Softball Canada competition (*the ASA 2013 certification stamp is no longer accepted for endorsement in Slo-Pitch competition*) or,
 - Any bat that has a new USSSA certification stamp and is not on the USSSA withdrawn/non-compliant list will also be accepted for play in Softball Canada competition.
 - The bat must meet the compression standards outlined by the certifying organization and may be tested to ensure that they are in the proper range.
- The bat must still pass a visual inspection per the current Softball Canada rulebook.

Note: Bats with an ASA 2013 certification stamp may still be eligible for use in Slo-Pitch competition if they are eligible under WBSC (ISF) or USSSA certification.

Accident and Liability Insurance

Softball Manitoba umpires are insured through the Liability and Accident Program offered through All Sport Insurance while acting within the scope of your duties.

The general liability coverage is \$5,000,000.00, which pays for your defense as well as any costs found against you.

Travel Permits

Any team, player, coach, manager or umpire wishing to travel outside of Canada to participate in any softball competition must have a travel permit issued by the Executive Director or Administrative Coordinator.

1. No team, player, coach, manager or official may travel outside of Canada to participate in any softball competition at the same time the team, player, coach, manager or umpire has an obligation to participate in any association sanctioned competition such as a Softball Manitoba Championship.
2. Umpires wishing to travel outside of Canada to participate or officiate in any softball competition must have a travel permit issued by the Official Director (PUIC) or his/her designate.
3. Failure to observe these regulations could result in suspension or other actions.

Lightning Rule

USE THE 30/30 RULE

- Take appropriate shelter when you count 30 seconds or fewer between lightning and thunder.
- Remain sheltered for 30 minutes after the last thunder.
