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Treasurer's Report

After 4 years as Treasurer for Sooke Minor Hockey, I am happy to say that I'm leaving the Association in good hands and in good financial health. We were able to secure another gaming grant for \$46,500 for player development, equipment and ice time fees which helps to offset costs to players and families. I encourage the association to continue to pursue this grant every year to ensure registration fees remain affordable for families.

Overall, revenues totaled \$274k for the year, and expenses at \$277k which results in a Net Loss of \$3k coming out of reserves. Bank account balances at March 31, 2024 were at more than \$149k which is more than enough to keep the Association afloat well into the future. I recommend that the Association purchase GICS in increments of \$20k to protect these balances in the future.

I have enjoyed my time on the Executive and it was a difficult decision to not seek re-election. I would like to express my gratitude to everyone on the Executive Committee for their support over the last 4 years. This is an amazing group of volunteers who remain passionate about hockey and make great efforts into ensuring that players and parents have the best possible experience in this community. I will continue to support Sooke Minor Hockey and wish you continued success and prosperity in the future.

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U7-U9 Coordinator & Sponsorship/Fundraising Year End Report - April 2024

U7-U9 Coordinator Update

This was my first year on the executive and I believe we had a very successful year with the U7-U9 age group. We were able to implement some great initiatives and build on ones already in place.

The highlight of the year was the first every inaugural U7-U9 Sooke Ice Breaker Jamboree which was organized by myself and U8 manager Jessica Poitras. It was held over a 2 day period with day 1 being for U7s and the second day for the U8s. In the future we are expecting it to run over a 3 day period for all age levels. The feedback from teams was incredibly positive and we believe this can become annual association event that brings immense value. I'm happy to say we had zero incidents and the teams who participated mentioned they'd love to come back next year! This is one of the only full ice jamborees (ie: 2 teams split on each half ice vs 4 teams on a quarter of ice) that happens as soon as games are allowed to begin. The ability to kick off the new year with players and parents who are new to hockey in their home rink, along with new parents learning learn how to run the timeclock, new coaches being exposed to games for the first time, and supporting new referees, etc – all of these components will continue add value to our association.

The U6 and U7 age groups were combined this year in order to make up a very large team with some overaged U8 players who all started out in the first shift program. In previous years we were able to keep the U6 and U7 teams separate, which I recommend to continuing with if the numbers permit. The U8 and U9 teams had healthy numbers and we were able to initiate the new VIAHA cross ice policy for the U9 team, which allowed them to play full ice games after Jan 15th. The full ice games created a challenge for the U9 team due to the larger number of players and ice time. Due to this, I recommend we look at having the U8 and U9 teams mixed like other associations so we can keep the teams a bit smaller to allow more playing time during full ice games (ie: U9-C1 (primarily second year players), U9-C2 (mix of second and first year players), and U9-C3 (primarily first year players, etc) – of course the registration numbers have to support this and ice availability. I also recommend we have the first weekend of ice be considered "assessment practices" based on age, allowing parents and coaches to adjust accordingly based on what's best for the hockey player. Regardless of the format, I still recommend having coaches, managers and team safeties established before the first weekend of hockey.

All 3 teams (U7, U8, and U9) were able to participate in multiple tournaments/jamborees and overall had a very fun year. The U7-U9 coordinator can help in the early parts of the season to ensure the managers are applying to the Vancouver Island based tournaments by late August/Early Sept to ensure our teams are asked to participate. We had a very strong group of Managers, but the support can still be provided to any new manager. We were able to have over 12 new coaches at the U6/U7 age levels certified with either Coaching Level 1 or On Ice Helpers. I believe building a large funnel of certified on ice helpers is crucial to the association and pays dividends in 4-5 years when the players are entering the older age groups and finding coaches becomes more challenging. In previous years the association averaged 3-4 certified coaches per team, so having 12 is a vast improvement.

Finally, thank you to all the Coaches, Managers, Safeties, Executives and Parents who volunteered countless hours to make the season a success, and to the players and their families for their commitment to the sport!



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Sponsorship & Fundraising Update

Another great year of sponsorship for the association as all the sponsors continued paying for their wall signage with 3 new businesses waiting for their sign to be installed prior to the 2024/25 season. I took over this position half way through the year.

The main changes this year included adjusting the sponsorship policy so teams no longer have to provide a % of sponsorship dollars to the association – all funds stay directly to the team. The fundraising policy has not changed. A new sponsorship agreement has also been ironed out with Seaparc with opportunities to increase our sponsorship revenue in the future.

As well, The Victoria Royals chuck-a-puck fundraiser was moved from being an association wide fundraiser to just the lower U7-U9 teams, which worked out immensely well as the U7 team also participated in the intermission game the same evening. I recommend continuing the same format as this helps the younger teams obtain enough \$ for tournament deposits early in the year and gives the kids a great experience in the first 6 weeks. Both the fundraiser and intermission game align nicely for this age level.

We also participated in the first ever All Sooke Days event in August (the dunk tank was a hit!) and we had one of our main sponsors, Daniels Market, come and host a free bbq during photo night at the community hall, which is great for community outreach! Thank you to all those who helped!

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2023-24 SDMHA Ice Allocation AGM Report

1. SEAPARC Ice Request/Allocation

At the end of the 2022–23 hockey season, the President, VP–Ops, Head Coach, and Ice Allocator reviewed the existing ice footprint along with the 2023 registration numbers to determine the ice requirements for the 2023–24 season. With some of the highest registration numbers in recent history, it was decided to request additional ice to accommodate our growing association and balance prime vs. non-prime ice time for Sooke & District Minor Hockey Association (SDMHA) teams. The SDMHA submitted the association ice request on April 14, 2023, for consideration by Sooke Electoral Area Recreation Centre (SEAPARC) staff and the Commission. SEAPARC did not hold the annual Ice Allocation Meeting with ice user groups as the new ice policy removed the meeting requirement. In lieu of the ice allocation meeting, the President, VP-Ops, and Ice Allocator scheduled a meeting with the SEAPARC manager and ice scheduling staff to emphasize our requirements and concerns regarding the un-equitable distribution of prime vs. non-prime ice among users, as well as the fragmentation of SDMHA ice throughout the week. Unfortunately, SDMHA was unable to attain more prime ice or an adjustment to see less non-prime and more prime ice. SEAPARC released the ice schedule to users at the end of June, one month later than required in the SEAPARC ice allocation policy.

2. SDMHA Ice Scheduling

Once SEAPARC released a final ice schedule, the VP-Ops, Head Coach, and Ice Allocator started working on the tentative ice schedule for the 2023–24 hockey season. As in previous years, developing an ice schedule was a challenge. SDMHA did its best to balance Hockey Canada requirements for each division as well as the requirements between Representative (Rep) teams and Recreational (House) teams. In the end, the final SDMHA schedule managed to balance most of the needs of our teams. One of the greatest challenges was scheduling Vancouver Island Amateur Hockey Association (VIAHA) games. Some of the schedules were released less than 3-4 days prior to the first games, this was less notice than previous years. This made Ice Allocator review, team distribution, and scheduling of officials challenging. SDMHA requested VIAHA scheduling be finalized further in advance, so associations are not pushing out schedules to teams with only a few days' notice. VIAHA is aware of the issues this creates for local MHAs and is taking steps to get schedules completed in a timely fashion. For the 2023–24 season, SDMHA did not maintain any transient ice as there was minimal interest from teams the previous year.

At the conclusion of the hockey season, a few teams abandoned less desirable ice times, leading to challenges with reallocation and black ice. It is recommended that SDMHA develop a policy to define how ice is returned to the association, penalties for teams returning ice on short notice, and potentially scheduling less ice in the last two weeks of the hockey season.

Overall, despite VIAHA challenges, the season went well. My thanks to the team managers and coaches for taking open ice where they could and being flexible with schedule changes.

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RIC Report 2023/24 Season

This year we had 12 new officials join our crew, which is wonderful. We had 10 x 2 nd year officials, 4 x 3 rd year officials, and 6 adult officials – a total of 32 Sooke officials. We pulled from JDF and Victoria when need be, but Sooke was fairly efficient on its own. In the long run, I would like to see Sooke completely "self-sufficient" and not needing to bring in outside officials at all.

First year officials developed nicely with a lot of promise for our future squad in Sooke. There is still a lot of development needed for all our officials, but I did see lots of improvement from our returning officials as well. All new officials had on ice supervision for at least 3 games, a big thanks to the 2 officials who shadowed most new officials on ice this season- Larry Galbraith and Yves Moog. Your hard work with our new officials showed in their development.

Issues with officials still dealing with calls being questioned/yelled at/cursed at/etc, and as most associations are doing, I'd suggest a zero tolerance for official abuse. Sooke allows far more than other associations and I would like to see us follow suit. We have a huge official shortage and the main reason is due to the fact that officials aren't perfect (never will be). Coaches, players, spectators all need to realize this and understand that everyone on the ice will make mistakes during a game, officials included. On that note, I want to suggest any player removed from a game for "abusing an official" suspended for an extended period of time – same goes for coaches. Unless we start hammering down on consequences, the culture is not going to change. I suggest even longer suspensions from SDMHA for repeat offenders.

Moving forward to next season:

- *Advertise to players moving into U13 2nd year, that they are eligible to officiate and sign up.
- *Run a New Official Clinic as well as a Returning Official Clinic in Sooke in September.
- *Use U11 pathways/try outs for returning officials to "get the dust off".
- *Shadow or supervise all returning officials for at least one game, see where they are at, and decide what levels they are capable of.
- *Provide new officials with a minimum of 3 on ice shadow supervisors.
- *Continue supervising officials (off-ice) on a regular basis to continue their development, be there for support/advice.
- *Use returning officials (3+ year officials) shadow new officials, good for mentorship/experience.

Lastly, over the course of the season, Sooke on-ice officials officiated nearly 200 games and skated approximately 500 individual assignments. That is an amazing accomplishment for a small association – a huge thank you to all the new, returning, and veteran officials who worked hard and did a great job throughout the season.

All in all 2023/24 was a good year for SDMHA officials. I believe with continued development, supervision, and encouragement, Sooke will have a strong program in the years to come.

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2023/24 Risk management - Admin Annual Report

- 1. ePACT: Player medical and emergency information profiles were completed with reasonable timeliness this year. There were a few outstanding players with incomplete or outdated information that required persistent follow-up by both the Director of Risk Management and the respective Coordinators. As rosters are finalized, it's imperative Managers/Coordinators/Safeties liaise with the Director Risk Management if any new players are added to their teams to ensure their respective Team Safety has the most current roster in ePact.
- 2. Annual SEAPARC Arena Inspection: The pre-season inspection of the SEAPARC arena and dressing room facilities was delayed this year due to the ongoing work to replace the chiller machinery. Once completed, the facility was in overall good repair ready for SDMHA to take the ice. The Hockey Canada arena safety checklist was completed and accompanied by relevant photos as well as email correspondence with facility staff. There were a few defects noted with the boards throughout the season, but they were repaired by facility staff.
- 3. Dressing/Locker Room Policy: In response to Hockey Canada updated dressing room policies, SMHA in consultation with BC Hockey and VIAHA instituted an updated locker room policy which was aimed at creating a more inclusive environment for players and staff.
- 4. Safety Person Training: Most Team Safeties completed the HCSP, RIS, CATT and CRC requirements early into the season. There was some confusion determining who was Safety for which team while the rosters were being completed, good communication from the divisional coordinators/team managers helped resolve the issue.
- 5. Injuries: All injury reports, BC Hockey notification, and return to play notes were completed within a reasonable timeframe to allow processing. Team Safeties use the Director Risk Management as a resource to clarify policy and protocol; this is a good thing.
- 6. Team Safety First Aid Training: SDMHA has approved the reimbursement of funds for First Aid Training for one (1) Safety member per team. The specific level of training required and amount of reimbursable funds will be confirm as we approach the 2024/2025 season.
- 6. Acknowledgement: Thank you to all of the Team Safety volunteers for donating their time to complete the required training and ensuring player safety throughout the season Without volunteers our great organization would not exist
