### Treasurer Report for April 26<sup>th</sup>, 2022 AGM

As I'm finishing my first term as treasurer, I'm pleased to report that the association is in good financial health! As reflected in the financial statements for the year ending March 31, 2022, the association ended the year with a \$89,000 surplus. This surplus is primarily due to more than budgeted raffle revenues, higher player registration including the addition of First Shift and additional grant revenues. Expenses were less than budget primarily due to less Ice Time Fees.

In September of 2021, the association was able to secure \$43,000 in gaming grant revenues from the Province of BC to help offset expenses directly related to our minor hockey program such as ice fees, player development and equipment. In addition, we received \$7,500 from the viaSport Local Sport Relief fund to help offset incremental expenses incurred in 2020/21 as a result of COVID-19 such as print materials, supplies and additional ice fees to segregate cohorts.

I'm also pleased to report that registration fees were reduced for the 2022/23 season. I'm confident that we can keep fees affordable and ensure that our hockey program remains accessible for youth in Sooke.

### Ice Allocator Report for the AGM: 2021-2022 Season

This year was my third year as Ice Allocator and as a member of the SMHA Board of Directors. I would like to thank all of the Board members for their hard work in this difficult season.

While the Ice Allocator position is always a busy one at the beginning of the season, this year was quite challenging due to COVID and the fact that we decided to implement a new software for the association. The fact that Seaparc did not have an ice allocation meeting also meant that SMHA did not get preferred ice times for the season but had to go with the same ice footprint as the year before which was not ideal for the association.

The implementation of the new software caused a few issues this year. The fact that the main module and the ref assigning module do not talk to each other meant that any changes that occurred throughout the year had to be changed or fixed in at least 2 places every time. Initially, updates had to be made in 3 different places, but an update to the software meant that was reduced to updating in 2 places. Another main issue with this software is the fact that team managers would make updates to their own schedule via the app thinking that would update the entire system, which it did not. This meant that teams would have updated information from the managers, that would not be reflected on the website because the information was not given to the ice allocator. For next year, I highly recommend that all changes go through the ice allocator only to ensure that all updates occur in the places they should. I also recommend that a tighter system be put in place for ref assignment via this software, or that the RIC use different software to assign the refs. The fact that the various modules for RAMP do not talk to each other is a major flaw in the software which causes lots of extra work and confusion.

I also found that the division reps would often be sent updates which would then be given to the team managers. Teams would have the updates, but they had not been communicated to the ice allocator who is the person who should be making all the changes to the schedule. This is an issue with the way VIAHA disseminates information that should be addressed by the next ice allocator to ensure they receive all changes to the schedule in a timely manner to avoid confusion. Again, I recommend that all changes to the

schedule go through the ice allocator only so that the changes are confirmed by VIAHA and errors can be avoided.

An ice allocation meeting with Seaparc is essential to get the best ice times for the association. SMHA should try to arrange it so that all practices finish by 10pm and the ice footprint is not interrupted by other hockey associations having ice time in the middle of our time. SMHA is the client who uses the ice the most and, in my opinion should have priority for ice times over other associations who do not use it as much as we do.

This is my final year as ice allocator, and I would like to thank the association for 3 good years. Best of luck in the 2022-23 season!

#### **Annual Report - Registrar**

This was my first year as registrar and I worked closely with Laura - last season's registrar - to learn the position.

We registered approximately 235 players for the 2021/22 season. The majority of players registered in during our main registration in March. We had a few players withdraw at the beginning of the season for various reasons.

Sooke ran a successful First Shift program in the fall. We registered 30 of those players to continue developing their hockey skills one day per week.

At the beginning of the season we changed our website platform to RAMP and used the RAMP Registration program to run our 2022/23 registration March. This registration was very successful. We currently have 206 players registered for next season. We will be running a late registration at the end of June for those players who are new to Sooke or missed the main registration. Returning players will be charged a \$50 late registration fee.

#### Annual Risk Management Report

#### 18-April-2022

#### 1. ePACT

Player medical and emergency information profiles were completed with reasonable timeliness this year. There were a few outstanding players with incomplete or outdated information that required persistent follow-up, one player was eventually pulled from their team roster due to non-compliance.

To reduce the level of effort in the fall of 2022, ePACT completion was made a mandatory part of the 2022-23 registration package. Players without completed profiles will be moved to the division waitlist and will not be permitted to participate in sanctioned events until completed.

Team Safeties did not have issues or concerns accessing ePACT or using the mobile phone app. Good communication between the Safeties and Director of Risk Management helped resolve minor issues rather quickly.

To enhance injury tracking year to year, injury reports and return to play forms were uploaded to player ePACT profiles. This will ensure information on past injuries is available to Team Safeties and any trends can monitored and discussed with parents, player and physicians.

#### 2. Annual SEAPARC arena inspection

The Director of Risk Management completed the pre-season inspection of the SEAPARC arena and dressing room facilities on Sept 07, 2021. The facility was in overall good repair ready for SDMHA to take the ice. As with 2020, there were a few minor defects noted with the boards but they were quickly repaired by facility staff prior to the SDMHA schedule. The Hockey Canada arena safety checklist was completed and accompanied by relevant photos as well as email correspondence with facility staff.

#### 3. Safety Person Training

Team Safeties completed the HCSP, RIS, CATT and CRC requirements prior to the Dec 1 deadline. As per BC Hockey requirements, CATT was added to the list of mandatory Safety Person training for the 2021 season. Safety Person training was recorded and monitored by the Registrar.

#### 4. Annual Team Safety Meeting

The manager/safety meeting was held outside SEAPARC on Sep 21, 2021. The meeting was well attended and covered the main aspects for team coordination and safety. This meeting remains the best way to emphasize key aspects, ask questions and put faces to names.

#### 5. Injuries

SDMHA saw a higher number of injuries in the 2021-22 season due to the increase in the number of games. All injury reports, BC Hockey notification and return to play notes were completed in the required time frames. Each injured player was able to return to full hockey activity after they were cleared by their physician.

#### 6. COVID-19

The 2021-22 hockey season was more normal than 2020 but was still challenging due to changing Public Health Office requirements and increased documentation. An extra level of coordination and participation was required to ensure teams had volunteers to scan COVID-19 vaccination status and monitor conformance to public health guidelines. Despite these challenges, players were able to complete the hockey schedule without any major COVID-19 outbreaks or transmission. The Association had few members throughout the year that required supplementary measures to ensure future compliance with SDMHA policies and the PHO. For the 2021-22 season, SDMHA moved to online attendance tracking and COVID-19 health screening. This eliminated the requirement to have a health screener outside SEAPARC and made storing/accessing health questionaries much easier for the Association.

With the recent lifting of most COVID-19 restrictions the Association will be able to modify the Communicable Disease Plan to be more generic in nature.

#### 7. Safety Policies

SDMHA created an on-ice helper policy in alignment with BC Hockey requirements. Teams and on-ice helpers must follow the policy to ensure that they are covered under the insurance coverage for the Association.

#### 8. SDMHA Website - Safety/Risk

Over the course of 2021 the Safety/Risk section of the SDMHA website was updated and broken into pages that include the critical safety information for the Association. New/update pages in include Risk Management, Respect in Sport, Communicable Disease Info, ePACT, Criminal Record Checks, Concussion Awareness and Team Safety resources.

#### 9. Acknowledgement

Thank again to all of the Team Safety volunteers for donating their time to complete the required training and ensuring player safety throughout the season. 2021-22 was more of a regular season but challenging with many COVID restrictions/rules still in place.
