7. SAMBA Executive and Director's Reports

7A. President's Report

The 2016 season was the "Year of Rain", but also another year of learning and growth. SAMBA continued to enhance our experience, while improving the various programs to put forth the best programs possible. The registration numbers exploded making SAMBA the largest baseball association in Alberta. In his President's Report, Kurtus Millar details the Achievements and Challenges in 2016, as well as some of the Key Objectives for the upcoming year, highlights of which are as follows:

Achievements

- SAMBA registrations surpassed initial expectations, with 819 total players registered in all divisions in 2016. The SAMBA Board put in countless hours, and worked diligently to make this increase in player numbers work, and ensure success in all levels of the programs.
- SAMBA Rep Teams had a tremendous season, with the most teams making the playoffs since 1993. Overall stats included a Western Championships Gold, 5 Provincial Gold Medals, 2 Silver and 1 Bronze.
- SAMBA's Fall Ball Program and Winter Baseball Camps continued into their 6th Season and enjoyed good participation numbers. Additional successful events this year included the Coach Certification Program, the Spring and Summer Camps, Tigers Camp, and Girls Baseball Day. All programs had very good registration numbers and produced very positive feedback.
- SAMBA again hosted Provincial Championships, this time at the Mosquito AA, Peewee A, Bantam AAA and Midget AA levels, and in August hosted the Western Championships for the Peewee, Bantam, and Midget AA levels for the second straight year. Outstanding reviews were received from Baseball Alberta, the Western Canada Baseball Association and from all those attending this event.

- Unfortunately most of the regularly scheduled yearly tournaments, including the ever popular Early Bird Tournament had to be cancelled this year due to rain.
- The House League division had another very successful year, and despite the weather, regular season games, as well as the mid-season and year-end tournaments were completed successfully. Rally Cap saw immense growth again this year, with SAMBA expanding the program yet again to include more teams, coaches, and even an additional playing field.
- The Grounds Crew fought a hard fight during the season, due to the tremendous amount of rain experienced this summer. Many hours were spent by the Crew, alongside SAMBA Directors and Association members, maintaining the fields to the highest level. A number of repair and maintenance projects were also completed, and new tarps were purchased for all of the Diamonds.
- SAMBA launched its new Website, which has received thousands of hits, and continued to heighten its Social Media profile through Facebook and Twitter, keeping all of the membership up to date.

Challenges

- House League Level monitoring and support continued to be an issue, as the program has grown to a level that is difficult for one person to maintain. An Amendment will be presented at the 2017 AGM to split this key position into 2 separate roles.
- Grants and Special Fundraising is an area that SAMBA will continue to focus heavily on. SAMBA is very fortunate to call Legion Ballpark home, but the facility is beginning to show its age, and will require many upgrades over the next few years.

2017 Objectives

- The Membership will incur Fee increases in 2017 to sustain the facilities, utility cost increases, salaried grounds crews and coach honorariums.
- SAMBA's current Bylaws, Policies, Procedures, and League Rules are in desperate need of review and revision. Comprehensive published documentation will ensure continuity and conformity to regulations, and decrease the volume of issues that continually arise.
- Early Coach Selections and Mentorship will be encouraged throughout the season, to allow better participation in the Winter Camps. As well, a focus on Umpire mentorship will be encouraged to address the disparity in the numbers of Players vs. Umpires.
- Individual meetings will be scheduled with the Tigers, Sr. Cardinals and Prospects Academy programs to ensure all costs and needs are

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covered, and to guarantee a better, more clear understanding of the terms from all parties involved.

- SAMBA will continue its focus on a regular and efficient field and equipment maintenance program due to aging grounds and equipment. Discussions will take place with the City in the hopes of garnering more support for the facilities, and allowing growth to the membership.
- A continued focus on Sponsorship and Grant opportunities, which are integral to the running of programs, the maintenance of the facilities, and the overall success of the organization, will be maintained.
- The creation of a Contingency Fund for emergency maintenance, special projects and/or any other additional expenditures deemed necessary, will be implemented, through an increase in member registration, and it is anticipated the fund will contain a minimum balance of \$20,000 by the end of the year 2017.

Acknowledgements

Kurtus further thanked all of the Board of Directors who came together as a team and tackled some very tough issues this year. Most assume multiple roles and go above and beyond all expectations to ensure SAMBA maintains its reputation as a first class organization. Special Congratulations were afforded to Jason Enright, who continues to volunteer countless hours to our players and programs.

6B. 2017 Budget Review

The projected Budget numbers for 2017 are slightly higher than the previous year, as it allows for anticipated revenue from the upcoming Casino scheduled for the second quarter of 2017. Lorie further noted that a line of expense for Chase Financial and Quick Enrollment in the amount of \$8,500 was omitted accidentally during the preparation of the Profit & Loss Budget Overview, and will need to be accounted for through an amendment to the Budget as presented. This will reflect a change in the projected income to \$30,000 from the reported \$38,500.

Lorie gave the attendees a few minutes to review the Budget for 2017 and asked for any questions or comments.

8. New Business - From Membership

- John Tkachyk questioned the results of the recent Baseball Alberta "Transfer Forum". Kurtus reported that he, along with Brenda Bourassa and Coaches Mark Brisson and Chuck Blackburn attended the full day open session meetings, which were open to any member of a baseball associations in the Province, and were facilitated by an outside Mediator. During the regularly scheduled Baseball Alberta Board Meeting the following day, and despite very lengthy discussions, a decision could not be reached at that time. Further discussion and a Final Vote/Decision has been tabled to their next Regular Board Meeting November 27th, the day after the AGM scheduled for November 26th.
- John Tkachyk also had questions regarding player safety, and specifically how to better protect a Pitcher while on the mound. He recommended that Baseball Alberta and all large Associations further investigate options for the overall protection and safety of all players while on the field. Additional discussions concluded that SAMBA will look to establish a Concussion Protocol for Baseball.

Special Resolutions for the 2017 SAMBA AGM

In accordance with section 1(d) of the Societies Act, SAMBA is required to provide notice of proposed changes to our by-laws. At this year's AGM on November 15, 2017, the following special resolutions will be advanced for consideration.

Special Resolution #1 - Election and Term of Directors and Officers

That Article 5.4 (b) (i) include the position of Junior (Jr) House League Director; which is elected every even numbered year and edit 5.4 (b) (ii) to read **Senior (Sr)** House League Director; which is elected every odd numbered year.

Special Resolution #2 - Designation of Officers

That Article 6.1 Designation of Officers be amended in the SAMBA by-laws. Article 6.1 Designation of Officers to read:

- (k) Jr House League Director (Rally Cap, Rookie, and Mosquito)
- (<u>I</u>) Sr House League Director (Peewee, Bantam, and Midget)
- (m) Special Events Director.

Special Resolution #3 – Job Description Splitting of Jr and Sr House League

That Article 6.3 Duties and Responsibilities of Officers be amended in the SAMBA by-laws. That Article 6.3 (g) be amended to read:

(g) Junior (Jr) House League Director

The <u>Junior</u> House League Director shall:

- be responsible for heading up the operation of the House League teams in the TBall, Rally Cap, Rookie, and Mosquito, Pee Wee, and Bantam, and Midget divisions;
- prepare a brief summary of the League Division for the A.G.M.;
- work with the Junior Rep Director, Senior Rep Director, and Facilities Director in preparing the field schedule;
- work with the Junior Rep Director and Senior Rep Director in preparing and executing player evaluations;
- work as a liaison between the respective House League division coordinators, coaches, players and parents, and
- Perform such other duties as may be specified from time to time by the board of Directors or these By-laws.

Re-number from (g) onward so that Senior House League Director immediately follows Junior House League Director.

That Article 6.3 be amended to ADD:

(h) Senior (Sr) House League Director

The Sr House League Director shall:

- be responsible for heading up the operation of the Sr House League teams in the Peewee, Bantam and Midget divisions;
- prepare a brief summary of the League Division for the A.G.M.;
- work with the Junior Rep Director, Senior Rep Director, and Facilities Director in preparing the field schedule;
- work with the Junior Rep Director and Senior Rep Director in preparing and executing player evaluations;
- work as a liaison between the respective House League division coordinators, coaches, players and parents, and
- Perform such other duties as may be specified from time to time by the board of Directors or these By-laws.



2017 SAMBA/Tiger Liaison Report

Another successful year for the SAMBA/Tigers Partnership agreement. To start off the season, baseball evaluations went well again, and it appears as though both SAMBA and the Tigers enjoy the current schedule and the way the Rep Level Evaluations are conducted. I have had positive feedback from both sides.

Tigers Camp

Tigers Camp was held June 3rd of this year and we had another year of nearly 100 kids in attendance; final count was 92. This is a great turnout which included kids from Rally Cap through to Mosquito and all kids registered within the Baseball Alberta umbrella are welcome to participate.

We are still hearing negative feedback from some PeeWee parents as our camp is usually held on the weekend of their mid-season tournament at NEZ. With all the busy schedules out there, unfortunately we have not been able to accommodate much different, but are open to ideas in future seasons.

New shirts were designed this year, with a new colour and material that isn't so hot for the kids to wear in the warmer weather. The shirts were welcomed by all.

Discussions of raising the cost of the camp from \$20 to \$25 to cover increasing costs of food and tshirts. The cost of the camp hasn't been raised in well over 10 years and I believe it only makes sense to have the small increase.

Tigers Tournament

The Annual Tigers Tournament was held the weekend of June 23rd-25th.

One game was canceled due to a rain delay, but the Tournament did go on to finish throughout the weekend.

The Tigers were very pleased with the field crew who did an outstanding job on the diamonds throughout the weekend.

Tigers Clinics - Legal & Morinville

The Tigers spent some time helping out the Legal Association with some clinics on two separate weekends. Unfortunately, the Morinville clinic was canceled due to weather.

The Tigers are willing to continue to try to accommodate the surrounding smaller communities for clinics for a fee agreed to by both Associations. Fees go towards Tiger Player Registration costs of the players who volunteer their time.

2017 Umpire Coordinator Report

This is a short report on the state of umpires at SAMBA.

Once again I'd like to say that we had a successful season.

The strength of any program is the ability to bring in new umpires every year, have your 2nd year and more experienced umpires fulfill their obligations to the SAMBA house league program and move on to work some BA rep ball. We have met all expectations, but there is still more work to do.

We have 34 umpires registered from the SAMBA area. We have 16 new umpires first year umpires. All the umpires worked the house league program, and only 6 of the new umpires did not do any rep games. We had 9 umpires who worked some Provincial Weekends.

We have about 8 of these umpires who are committed on a full time basis, the others are either players, have other commitments not forgetting school and family. We lost 7 umpires from last year, this is normal for most Associations and SAMBA is no different. The problem we have every year is that we have to replace these umpires and attract additional new ones.

We had 7 umpires who worked primarily Rep Ball for SAMBA and BA. We had 15 umpires who worked some Provincial assignments for BA, and did quite well. They worked all over the North central part of Alberta. One of our umpires, Sam Mahe was featured as one of the Baseball Canada umpire of the week and appeared on the BC website.

Registrations are going up every year as more teams are registered. Additional umpires are required. We need more umpires, house league games are mostly during the week, and the BA Rep games are primarily on the weekends. We cannot have some of these umpires work 2 or 3 games during the week and expect them to work during the weekend, unfortunately there is a fear of 'burn-out' and we lose them permanently.

We have no umpires from Morinville, their player registration is going up and we need local umpires to work their games. We have a number of umpires from the Legal area that only work their games and quite a bit of fastball, we need them to participate in our local programs as well.

We have to make additional effort to recruit through the schools and from other sports officials. We have to have at least one or two parents from every Mosquito team to take the NUCP umpire course and assist with at least the bases at every house league game.

Have commitments from about 18 of them that they will be back, some of the others are going into university and will evaluate early next year

We have enough equipment for at least 20 umpires, some of the umpires are purchasing their own equipment. Some of the old equipment has to be replaced. Will evaluate what we have later in December or January, once that is done I will let SAMBA know what additional equipment is needed.

All in all we had a great year, have some great aspiring young umpires who should do well next year.

I would return next year if SAMBA so wishes.

2017 Jr. House League Director Report

This was the first year the house league director was split between Junior (Rally Cap to Mosquito) and Senior (PeeWee to Midget) levels. It is my belief that splitting up the workload has reduced the number of hours required by each volunteer and has allowed us to focus on the quality of program we offer.

Our Junior programs are where we have the majority of our participants. Historically we have had 55% of our participants in the Junior House League program. That continues to be the case with the previous year as we are again in that range. We continued to have growth in our program we grew by 4.3% or 19 players this year in our Junior House League program. Rally Cap saw growth of 11 players and the number of teams stayed the same at 17, Rookie saw the biggest growth of 19 players and an increase of 2 teams. Where we had a slight decline was in our Mosquito program we decreased by 11 players. The decrease in Mosquito was not a result of registration being down, it was due to the fact that SAMBA added a 3rd Mosquito Rep team (up from 2 the year before) that took 12 players away from the house league program. Therefore, the Mosquito division actual grew by 1 additional player as we were only down 11 on the year.

Partnerships - Our partnership with Morinville Minor Baseball and Legal Minor Baseball continued this season. Both programs continued to grow. While a complaint in the past from our parents regarding the travel to Morinville and Legal, there was very little opposition to the travel to the other cities and we managed to develop the schedule to reduce the travel and create an equitable schedule for all. Our partnership with these associations does provide us with benefits of increased availability to diamonds, increased availability to players looking to rep programs, and increased competition with our programs. Our partnership with these organizations only continues to strengthen our associations and helps us to achieve the common objective of promoting baseball in our regions.

2017 Baseball Season - This year league play began a week late due to a late snowfall. We began the season on May 8 and the Season ended on June 25. Once league play began it ran smoothly with very few issues and any issues that did occur were minor in nature. Rainouts this year were not the issue they have been in the past as we had relatively decent weather, though Monday/Wednesday did have a few games rained out. In talking to some of the coaches and players, it should be noted that both felt the season is too short and wished they had another month of baseball to continue to learn, develop and have fun. Overall it seemed the kids developed from the beginning of the year and had a fun experience.

Diamonds - House League diamonds continue to be an issue. The issues range from condition of the diamonds, to lack of diamonds to grow our program. The SAMBA board has been working hard to try and rectify these issues. This year in conjunction with the City of St. Albert we set up a complaint section on our website that allows people to complain about the diamonds. These complaints go directly to the City and allows them to fix up any issues that might be easily fixable. As for the lack of diamonds, we are constantly in touch with the City working to find a solution that fits all user groups.

Coaches - This year we had enough volunteers to cover off all our teams for coaches. At Rally Cap and Rookie we had enough coaches to have at least 3 per team. This is a great number considering the age range of the participants. At Mosquito we were not as fortunate and were short coaches for one team, but were able to find a solution for that team. Unfortunately, due to some diamond shuffling we were not able to have our schedule out for the coaches' meetings, but we had it out and uploaded to our website before the beginning of May. The end of the year required equipment return, I found that with allocating three days of 1-hour slots to return the equipment we had 95% of the equipment returned in this short period.

This year was a great year for coaches and it should be noted that we heard numerous coaches wishing they could spend more time with the kids teaching them how to play baseball. I'd like to thank all our coaches who put forth numerous hours of their time to help teach the kids how to play the game of baseball.

Tournaments - Rally Cap had its annual Rally Cap day. 15 of our 17 teams were at the event. While it is mandatory to be at the event, the coaches of the 2 teams were quick to offer an apology and schedule the Rally Cap day at their next practice. I was very impressed with both coaches and how they realized they had made a mistake. Rally Cap had their mini tournament on the last weekend of the season. In talking with the parents and coaches there were a couple of teams that had a team BBQ between games or after their games. Overall it seems all participants had fun and enjoyed the day of baseball.

Rookie and Mosquito held their annual Mid-season and Year-End Tournaments. The weather was great. The only real issues to occur was a couple of umpire no shows (which can happen when dealing with young umpires) but a parent who is registered as an umpire grabbed his gear and jumped right in doing the last three games on Sunday. I also saw one of our Mosquito teams out supporting the Rookie and Mosquito kids while fundraising by selling cold treats and necklaces at a few of the St. Albert diamonds.

A new initiative put forward by the board this year was to eliminate medals for all teams in the tournament and only award medals for 1st and 2nd place. This was received very well and from the couple of comments I overheard from the kids was that the medal had value to them and it seemed as though it would be something they would cherish in the future. While we did not hand out medals to everybody SAMBA thinks it is very important that the kids receive a memento to remember their season by, therefore year end trophies were provided to all house league Participants.

Girls Baseball – Our number of female participants at the Rally Cap to Mosquito Level was 64 in 2017, this was the exact same number as last year. There has been relatively low growth among female participants our numbers have grown from 50 to 64 since the 2013 season. Female participants only make up 13.8% of our participants. While SAMBA is competing with Fastball (which is predominantly female) and soccer we need to find a way to advertise and entice female participants to join our programs.

Recommendations/Insights to Future Seasons

- Advocate for new ideas and ways to increase female player registration with a goal to increase registration by a minimum 25%.
- Find new, fun, and creative ways to continue to deliver our programs and develop skills in our youth.
- Determine ways to extend the House League season or create a possible summer league.
- Look at creating a House League survey to determine SAMBA member's value of our programs and to highlight the areas we do well and need to improve.
- Continuing to foster and develop relationships with the City to continue to help improve our programs and our access to facilities for our programs.
- Continue to work to improve our working relationship with Morinville Minor Baseball and Legal Minor Baseball to strength our programs.
- Continue to find ways to support, develop and retain coaches.
- Finding volunteers to help coordinate the divisions and provide support for the tournaments at the Junior House League level.

2017 Sr. House League Director Report

House League Overview:

While 2017 was my 5th year in this role, this year brought about great change as we chose to divide our House League teams into a junior and senior split. I was responsible for the senior teams, including Pee Wee, Bantam and Midge. As demonstrated in the reports of previous years, our numbers and our association continue to grow. Our Board continues to work together with the best interest of all members at heart. "Unity is strength... When there is teamwork and collaboration, wonderful things can be achieved". - Mattie Stepanek

Our Senior House League registrations continued to rise, close to 10% from 2016. To provide actual registration numbers, we increased from 183 athletes in 2016 to 208 athletes in 2017. I believe our membership is overall happy with their Association, providing a great opportunity for their athletes to play and learn baseball in their community. Our Pee Wee teams played off nights on Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday in St. Albert. Our Bantam and Midget teams participated in the Edmonton Rural Recreational Baseball League, with games scheduled Monday through Sundays, playing against teams in Edmonton and surrounding areas.

General Comments for Senior House League Teams:

- Player Evaluations 2017 was the fourth year we did our best to group players by neighbourhood. There continue to be differing opinions on how to best make teams, be it either through areas in which kids live or through evaluations; however, until evaluations are made mandatory with over 90% attendance, there will always be a chance some neighbourhoods will have stronger teams than others. No matter which way teams are decided, people will not be happy I still think grouping kids by neighbourhood is a better way to create teams unless evaluations are made mandatory.
- Evaluations (cont) As a suggestion by an experienced coach (thank you Rob Brown) we also added a question to our membership to see how many players were interested in both pitching and catching. The answers provided added an additional level of complexity to the make-up of teams, but did allow coaches to know who they could play at each position.
- **Registrations** Based on the historical data, I believe we will see at minimum a 5% increase for the upcoming year. However, we will need to determine how to manage the increase with the diamonds we have available to us.
- Player / Team Pictures This year's photo sessions were again at SDI Digital Imaging. The majority of pictures were scheduled for the start of the season rather than mid-season to ensure delivery prior to the end of season. Working with SDI and making sure pictures were not on Mother's Day, seemed to work out better than in 2015. There were some teams with later dates in the month due to the amount of teams needing pictures.
- **Girls Baseball** While our number of female players increased this year at most levels, because of the choice of nights of play (either Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday) we would have been unable to create a separate girls team for any other division than Rally Cap. The feedback we received is mixed some girls enjoying playing on mixed teams, some girls would rather play on an all-girls team.
- League Play Our official date to begin was May 1, 2017 with our end date of June 25, 2017. The weather cooperated much better through the season with fewer rescheduling of games
- Midseason Our Pee Wee teams participated in the NEZ tournament, with SAMBA paying for \$175 (75%) of the registration fee and the remainder, \$50 (25%) being funded by each team. The tournament was a success for our SAMBA teams, enjoying the opportunity to play other teams outside St. Albert.
- Year-End The weather was hit and miss for some teams, but with some rescheduling, we were
 able to get the entire tournament in. The final was a barn burner, going down to the last at bat
 games like this make the sport exciting, teaching players about winning and losing, and giving it
 all. The Bantams & Midgets played their year-end tournaments through the week with the
 ERRBL.
- **Practice facilities** and schedules were made available for all divisions/teams, including access to the batting cages. The requests were accommodated through Kurtus Millar
- Coach meetings to review and discuss the 2016 program, distribute information packages, schedules, uniforms & equipment took place at the clubhouse prior to the start of season. This year, rather than having meetings every night throughout the week, we had all of our coaches sessions on a Sunday. Even though the majority of required SAMBA Board Members were there for close to 8 hours, in my opinion, it was more efficient and effective to spend one day there getting through all the information.
- The only level in which there was a draft was at the Midget level. It was exciting to be able to field three House League teams at this level. The coaches worked very well together drafting their teams during their coaching meeting. We were fortunate to have very knowledgeable and experienced coaches at this level to help these young adults grow in their passion and ability.

- **Umpires** John Bresler (Umpire Coordinator) and all his local umpires need to be commended for their efforts to ensure the games were played as scheduled. Colleen Allison, Legal Minor Baseball Association, also needs to be commended for her role for coordinating in Legal.
- Facilities We require more diamonds!! We tried to meet with the City and Fastball St. Albert to work together to have additional fields available, and we did get additional access to two fields but we do need more. The City of St. Albert ball fields were well maintained, grass cut and shale raked on a regular basis. They responded quickly to requests for action. The fields in Morinville and Legal were maintained regularly and to a high standard.
- Equipment Deposit Program SAMBA this year once again collected a deposit from each House League coach prior to distribution of equipment. Teams were held responsible for non-returned equipment
- SAMBA Camps and Coaching Clinics These clinics and camps continued throughout the year, welcoming players at all level of abilities. It's great to see the progress our athletes are making by attending a few of the camps each year.

And most of all, thanks to George, Alex, and Aiden Whyte, for their continued support to me and SAMBA as an organization which they are all a part of in.

2017 Jr Rep Director Report

INTRODUCTION

2017 was another good year for the Jr Rep program as registration numbers were up in both the Mosquito and Peewee divisions and we were able to field 3 teams in both divisions.

Rep evaluations for 2017 took place at Athletes Nation and Servus Credit Union Place (Servus). All hitting was evaluated at Athletes Nation, with limited pitching and fielding drills also conducted. The majority of fielding evaluations took place at Servus for infield, outfield, and catcher/pitcher evaluations. Knowing that St Albert hockey play-offs combined with high registration numbers would continue to affect evaluation sessions, SAMBA put in place a new evaluation process for the Jr Rep Divisions which consisted of 7 evaluation sessions, including:

- Measurable Stage (2 One hr sessions 1 player per session);
- 2 Baseball Skills Assessments (2 One hr sessions 1 player per session);
- Regrouping and cut downs where appropriate; and,
- 4 more sessions- Baseball Skills Assess (2 One hr sessions 1 player per session) with regrouping and cut downs where appropriate, after each session.

Feedback was requested and received from both coaches and parents on the new evaluation process and will be considered for the 2018 player evaluation process. A summary includes:

- Initial groupings of the players could be based on where they played in the previous year. For example, in the Peewee division: Peewee AAA, Peewee AA, MQ AA 1/2, PW A, House league.
- One-hour slots were not enough time to complete a full evaluation of the players with the large numbers of players in each session.
- Need to have better communication with parents / players before evaluations and once again early in the process on the expectations of playing rep ball – re: time commitment, cost, length of year, tryout process and absences, etc.
- Need to have better communication between coaches in the process.
- Informally set roster sizes prior to the start of the evaluation process. Can go down, but not up.
- Provide some prescriptive measures to coaches (with their option to use) for hitting, catching, pitching, and fielding.

MOSQUITO DIVISION

In 2017 - 40 teams made up the Mosquito AA division for Baseball Alberta. In St. Albert, 41 players tried out, with 38 players being selected for one of three AA teams. 3 players were released to the House League program.

<u>Team Size</u>: 12 players with all 12 players graduating to the PeeWee division next year.

Tournaments: Entered 2 tournaments in 2017:

Coach Development

SAMBA Coaches/Umpire Cooperation Clinic

Well attended again, this is a clinic we receive a lot of positive feedback on. It's a very interactive session that provides coaches an opportunity to not only learn the rules of baseball, but understand the reasons behind them. The session concluded with a question and answer forum.

NCCP Coaches Clinics

SAMBA and other cities in Alberta offered a multitude of National Coaching Certification Program (N.C.C.P.) clinics earlier this spring/summer. SAMBA has always committed to continuing coach development and education. Moreover, SAMBA covers the cost of all its registered coaches that attend these nationally recognized baseball coaching clinics. It's a great way to improve your skills, confidence and value to our players. These clinics were hosted all over the Province (including a handful at our own Legion facilities), in various blocks (teaching modules), by very dedicated, highly experienced baseball Learning Facilitators, from the month of January till as late as the month of June. Thanks to all our coaches who took the time either to refresh and or to improve their skills this season.

Rally Cap & Rookie Clinic

This year we conducted our 3rd SAMBA run Coaches Clinic for our Rally Cap Coaches. This was well attended and we focused on providing our coaches with the tools to run an effective practice and provided them the skills to discuss items such as how to grip the baseball and throwing technique. We will continue to run camps such as this and will look to increase our program to the older age groups. This was the first time we have offered a SAMBA Rookie Clinic. I worked with coaches on basic tools to run their season and how to lay out a practice plan. It was very well attended and I will be looking at adding for Mosquito and Peewee.

2017 Facilities Director Report

2017 will be marked as the year where given enough manpower, shop vacs, propane, and drying agent, tournament and playoff games will be played no matter what. We recovered from rain to complete the House League end of year tournament, PeeWee AAA Provincials, Midget AAA Provincials, Zone Championships, and the Tigers tournament. The grounds crew, were exceptional once again throughout the year arriving early in the morning and staying late at night to ensure the games would get played. That being said, a significant amount of games and practices were lost due to diamond conditions after major rain events. The Midget diamond as in previous years had the most lost games.

In advance of the Midget AAA provincials a decision was made to drill drainage holes in the low areas in hope that this would accelerate the draining of the areas. Initial results showed success, but as heavier rain fell the drains plugged with silt and did not work. The Midget AAA provincials showed that we could no longer delay upgrading the Midget field. In August a contractor was lined up and budgets were established to upgrade the skinned areas of the infield. Construction started in late August and was complete by the middle of September. Unexpected quantities of existing shale, in excess of 8-10 inches deep in some areas increased the final construction value to \$45,000. The costs were higher than expected; however, the end result is a beautiful field that has shown to drain properly and not have ponding in any areas. In fact, after two days of steady rain the diamond would have been playable. Thanks to our contractor Décor Landscaping must be made as they worked with us to help control the costs while still providing an exceptional final product. I would like to thank Brent Moffat, Kevin Millar, and Kurtus Millar for their countless volunteer hours, and for keeping me sane through the entire process.

Rain was not the only weather-related problem from the season, high winds hit Legion Park on several occasions. The high winds resulted in downed limbs from the trees surrounding the diamonds. The alarming part is the sizes of the limbs coming down. Arborists from the City had to be called in to safely remove limbs up to 16" in diameter that were hung up in the branches of adjacent trees. The storms showed that our beloved trees at Legion Memorial are reaching the end of their life expectancy. A priority of the board for next year is to work with the City to come up with a tree replacement program that will maintain the beauty of the park while replacing the trees to prevent further property damage to our fences and dugouts.

2017 marked the first year of a sponsorship agreement with Martin Deerline. The sponsorship provided SAMBA with the use of a new mower for the season in lieu of advertising around the park. The first year was a resounding success for both parties with SAMBA benefitting by having the drag tractor available for other work while reducing our mowing time significantly. SAMBA looks forward to continuing the agreement in the years to come.

We continued our agreement with Green Drop and the fields continued to look great. In addition, an all-natural mosquito repellent was applied to the fields by Buzz Off as a trial. Initial results were good for the players, although the fans continued to be bombarded with the pesky insects.

New LED lighting was installed in the clubhouse. Thanks to Emerson Buck for the donation of the time and labour to this project. New plumbing fixtures were installed in the downstairs washrooms, thanks to Frontier Plumbing for helping with the supply of the fixtures and Jason Pitruniak for helping with the installation.

2017 saw our concession operators, Leanne and Tony Arlia, have a more profitable season with less games lost and more time being open. As usual the food quality was excellent and Tony and Leanne were awesome in helping SAMBA with raffle ticket sales, cleaning the clubhouse, and just being great supporters of SAMBA. Looking forward to next year and the early morning breakfasts after a few hours of work on the diamonds.

The grounds crew welcomed some new members this year including Jordan Blundell, Jackson Moffat, Michael Brisson, Evan Bourassa, and Tom Leathem. Ben Hoffman, Seth Waselenchuk, and Connor Burns returned as well Sean Erikson. It is hard to find a group of guys who are willing to give up their weekends throughout the summer to be at the diamond as early as 6:00 AM and stay to dark. Thank-you to all of you for your hard work this summer.

In closing I look back on 2017 as a year where we accomplished and learned a lot, and I look forward to applying this new knowledge to 2018 and beyond. Finally, thanks to Kurtus Millar who I spent a lot of time with over the last year, thank-you for your leadership and support. You make being a volunteer with SAMBA a pleasure.

2017 President's Report

GENERAL COMMENTS:

The 2017 season was my third year as association President. Once again, we faced many challenges and learnt a great deal as a team which we believe to be one of the best around. In the past 3 seasons, we have built a very strong BOD (board of directors) who worked countless hours and communicated well together to provide top notch programs to our young athletes. SAMBA continued to enhance our experience while trying to improve our various programs and put forth the best programs possible in all age groups and levels. Our registrations numbers continued to grow once again making SAMBA the largest baseball Association in Baseball Alberta. Our house league program was bursting at the seams while we maxed out on city fields and set record amounts of field usage at Legion Memorial Ball Park. However, our main goals stayed the same. We always strive to promote a fun and positive environment in our House League and Rep programs while focusing on player development and skill enhancement. Not only trying to improve our kids' athletics, but help grow them into confident, strong citizens. One major focus this season was to improve our facilities and begin to restore them to top notch levels. I am pleased to be able to present the following achievements and challenges, as well as some key objectives for the upcoming year.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Administration:

- Registrations: All SAMBA registration numbers grew and even surpassed our initial estimates. 874 athletes. The SAMBA Board of Directors worked very hard to make these numbers work and ensure all registrations were placed in their desired programs. SAMBA added team numbers in both HL and Rep. Thank you to our BOD who put in countless hours to oversee these growing programs.
- Baseball Alberta League/Player Registrations: Like earlier mentioned, the largest in BA, all registrations and team forms were completed in a timely and organized manner which met all Baseball Alberta standards and deadlines
- Multi-Year Agreements: Our Rep apparel agreement with St. Albert Source for Sports continued and worked well to provide all our Rep teams a high-quality product. The main concern with SFS is invoicing times and accuracy. SAMBA continued our House League apparel agreement with Anything Branded, previously Amyotte's, who continue to provide a great product in a very timely manner. SAMBA no longer had contract restrictions for facilities used to host our winter camps, spring camps, and Rep evaluations. Athletes Nation and Servus place were used for evaluations while Home Run Sports was added for camps. SAMBA will look at an agreement with a new indoor facility, 5 Tool Fieldhouse, in 2018.
- SAMBA was very happy to enter an annual agreement with Martin Deerline. In exchange for the
 use of a brand new high-speed mower, SAMBA offered and exchanged advertising at our facility
 and on our website. This partnership was very beneficial to our grounds crew team. The new
 mower cut maintenance times down and took a lot of pressure off our other machines. Thank you
 to Brian Bourassa and Jeff Yee for their hard work and great customer service. We hope to
 continue this partnership for years to come.
- EIBF Grant. A huge thank you to the EIBF who generously donated \$35,000 to SAMBA. In late
 August, John Bresler who has been working with the EIBF for years, secured SAMBA the
 opportunity to present their goals and financials needs to the EIBF. With the help of Brian
 Bourassa, Colin Leathem, Brenda Bourassa, John Bresler, Kurtus Millar, and Danielle Moffat, the
 EIBF approved SAMBA for these funds and delivered the cheque at a small press conference

organized by Jeff Hansen of the St. Albert Gazette. The EIBF described the presentation as "the best we've ever seen" and we thank Danielle Moffat for building the presentation. Thank you John and Danielle who led us to obtaining the funds.

PROGRAMS:

- Winter Camps continued to operate. SAMBA Technical Director Travis Parker secured facilities and coaches, Jason Enright, Brad Wolansky and Jesse Beley, to provide these camps throughout the winter months.
- Winter Ball. Thanks to Sheen Bromley and Brad Wolansky from Baseball Alberta for providing this winter program through St. Albert schools and promoting the great game of baseball.
- Spring Camps also ran again with good numbers and I believe continuing and strengthening this program would be beneficial to SAMBA's athletes.
- Our Coach Certification and Training Program were outstanding. Our Coaching Clinics once again
 ran with maximum numbers and received great feedback from Baseball Alberta and our coaches.
 SAMBA set an all-time record number for coach certifications. Rally Cap and Rookie clinics were
 provided by Travis and Kurtus this season and received great feedback. These programs should
 only continue to grow as our membership grows. We are looking to expand those clinics in 2018
 to mosquito and PeeWee levels.
- NUCP Certification continued to show strength and positive growth again this season. A special thanks to John Bresler for his hard work in training and retaining young umpires while coordinating thousands of assignments throughout the season.
- SAMBA Coach/Umpire Cooperation Clinic. This program has proven to be crucial to the development and retention of numbers of both young umpires and coaches. Thank you to Jeff Donnelly for organizing and putting on this clinic every year.
- Challenger Baseball. SAMBA is very excited to announce that our first season of Challenger Baseball was a tremendous success. Thank you to Brenda Bourassa and Kurtus Millar who attended a special Challenger clinic provided by Jays Care Foundation in Vancouver, BC. At that clinic, we met Karen and Jim Poniewozik who were instrumental in getting Challenger Baseball off the ground and running at SAMBA.
- Blue Jays Super Camp. Once again, SAMBA was very fortunate to host the Blue Jays Camp. This camp involved players from throughout the Province and was great for everyone involved. Thank you to the St. Albert Tigers for assisting our coaches during the eval process. All assignments were filled and performed in a professional manner.
- Larry Rindero Memorial, formally known as Early Bird, saw its inaugural season and went off with great success. 40 + teams from around the province and every SAMBA AA Rep team, competed in this tournament. SAMBA decided to run this tournament as a AA tournament only which will

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allow those teams a better Rep experience playing almost all their games at Legion Memorial Ball Park. Thank you again to Meadowview Facilities for allowing us to rent their facility and offer more games to more teams throughout this event.

- Girls Day was another success this season. While numbers continue to grow, SAMBA will look at bringing in a Girls Baseball Coordinator to offer more events were girls can prosper and gain experience together. Special thanks to Tara Sliwkanich and her team of coaches for their continued efforts in providing Girls Baseball Day.
- Tigers Camp. Always a hit, saw high numbers and received great feedback from players and parents. Special thanks to Kelly Phelan (SAMBA/Tigers Liaison) and Brad Wolansky (Tigers Manager) who once again worked very hard to provide these great experiences.
- House League this season, ran with 2 Directors. The addition of a Jr. HL Director proved to be very beneficial to the program. A special thanks to Byron Whittal and Michelle Whyte who put in very long hours allowing SAMBA's HL program to run smoothly and offer a fun and positive environment for our kids. Byron and Michelle organized and allowed SAMBA to complete the season, mid-season, and year end tournament in a timely and very positive manner that provided our athletes with some great experiences.
- The competition level of SAMBA continued to be a very gratifying and exciting experience. SAMBA offered 3 Rep teams at Mosquito, 3 PeeWee, 3 Bantam and 2 Midget. - Facilities. SAMBA's very lucky to call Legion Memorial Ball Park its home. Thank you to Tara Feser and her staff at the City of St. Albert for their support. However, our facility is beginning to show its age. Many upgrades are necessary to continue providing top notch programs for our athletes. More fundraising programs and active fund promotion would seriously benefit the SAMBA facilities. A tree replacement program needs to be secured with our city as the trees really showed their age this season. A special thank you to Brian Bourassa for all his efforts!

2017 OBJECTIVES:

Administration:

- SAMBA will continue to work tirelessly to provide top notch programs and facilities to all our athletes. New house league programs are being discussed to allow membership growth. Rep programs are always being carefully monitored and tweaked to help provide support to our volunteers and better experiences to our players and coaches.
- Bylaws, policies, procedures and league rules: Review Update desperately required. Proper documentation and publishing of these would decrease a large amount of issues brought up during our season.

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Program:

- Early coach selections and mentorship throughout the season. Coaches need to be selected even
 earlier in the season to allow them participation in our winter camps. The number of "new coaches"
 in SAMBA has grown significantly. A coaching mentorship program would greatly enhance the
 chances of these coaches' success and sticking with the game. SAMBA did begin to modify and
 upgrade these programs in 2017
- Umpire Mentorship Program. The number of baseball players is rising significantly and the number
 of umpires decreases every year. Thank you to John Bresler who brought in many new and young
 umpires into our system and provided very good support to them. Members, players, coaches and
 parents need to understand that without these officials, we cannot play the great game of baseball.
- Tigers, Sr. Cards, and Prospects. SAMBA BOD has schedule private meetings with each program
 to ensure all costs and needs are covered. Better and more clear terms from all parties should
 make life a lot easier on all members.

Facilities:

- Continue focus on a regular and efficient field and equipment maintenance program due to aging and mature grounds / equipment.
- Light usage. Agreements towards the cost of running our Midget field lights need to implemented.
 The hourly cost of \$111.43 / hr will only continue to increase and as such should be covered by
 the teams using them. Our VP Colin Leathem has begun negotiations to obtain Provincial grants
 to change and add lights on our Midget, Bantam, and PeeWee fields. This grant could also provide
 3 new scoreboards at those fields and would secure Legion Memorial Ball Park as one of the elite
 facilities in Alberta.
- Discussions with the City have begun to take place in hopes of more support to our facilities and allow growth to our membership.

Marketing and Image:

Continued sponsorship programs/grants: These are crucial to the costs of running all our programs
at a high quality. The number of programs we deliver and the condition of our facilities rely heavily
on these programs. SAMBA is always looking to grow fundraising opportunities and grant
applications to support all our financial goals and requirements.
