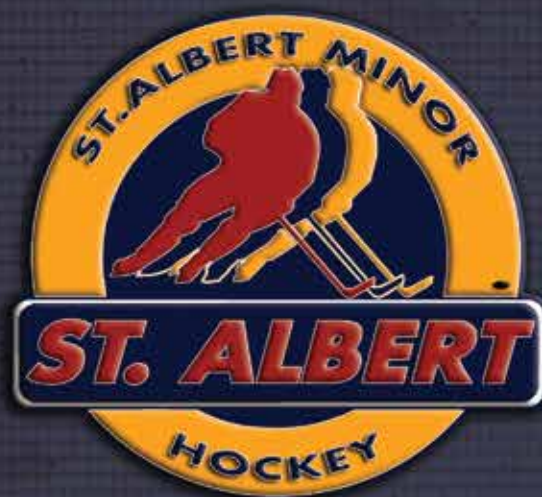

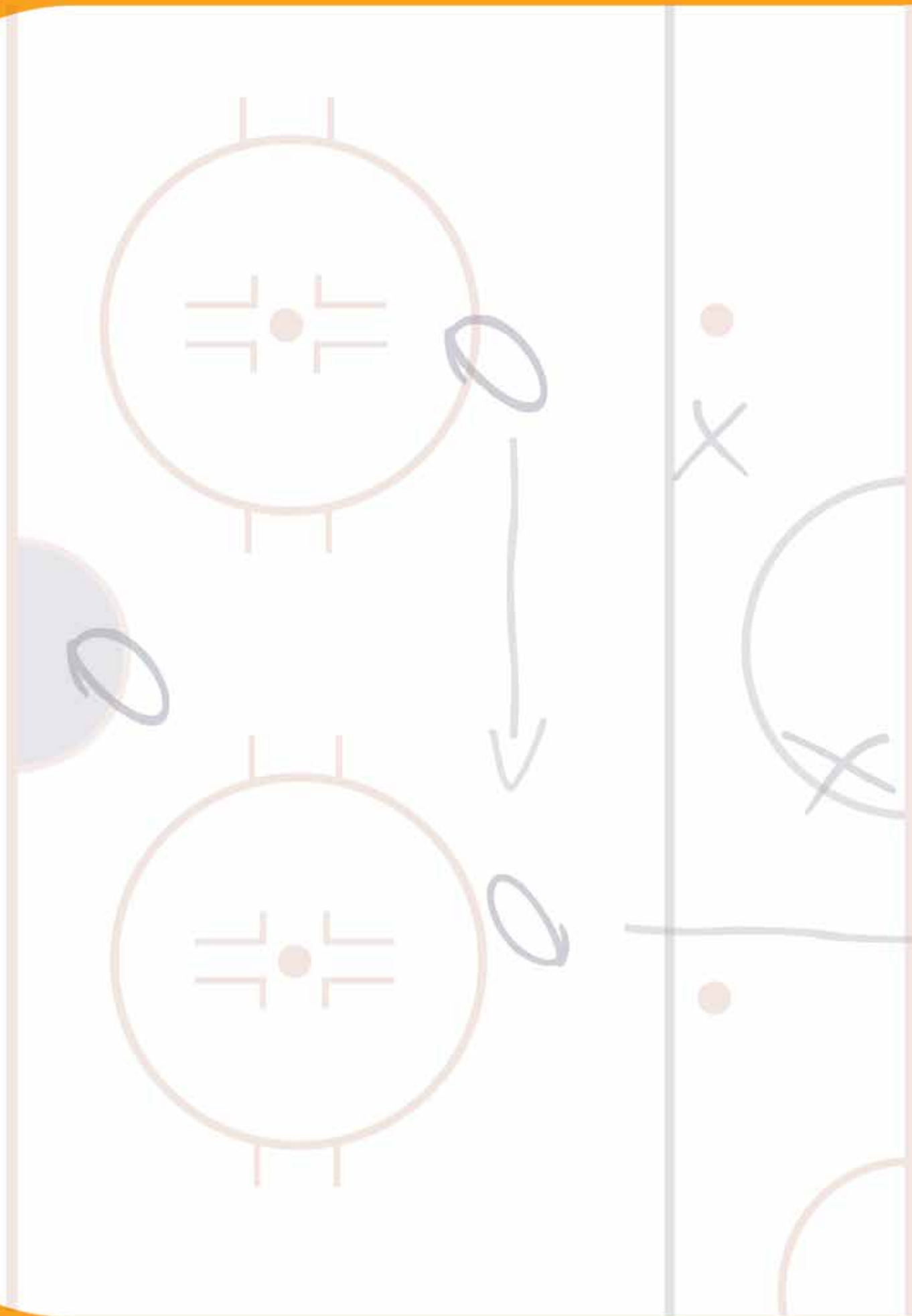

HISTORY

St. Albert Minor Hockey Association

EARLY YEARS

Just when hockey started in St. Albert is a bit of a mystery, as local history books only show photos in Volume 11 of The Black Robe's Vision put out in 1985.

There are a few photos of men's teams dating back to 1932 and an updated photo of The River Rats, who appear to be teenagers from the Indian residential school.

What is known is that the Sturgeon River was the ice surface for any and all teams prior to 1929. That was the year St. Albert's first hockey rink with boards was built on land, just south of the cenotaph on St. Anne Street where St. Albert Place parking is located. This outdoor rink had boards 8 to 10 feet high surrounding most of the ice surface as it was very windy down by the Sturgeon River. The rink was also situated close to the Northwest Mounted Police barracks which doubled as a change room/place to warm up. Long time St. Albert resident, Richard Perrault, remembers that kids had to get to the rink early to secure a peep hole and if you were late, you had to climb up and perch on top of the wall to watch a game. There are photos of this available at the library or Museum in St. Albert Place. The same year the rink was built; the Sturgeon River Club was formed and operated by a lady who worked for the village.

In one of the early photos was a player named Joe Benoit, who played for the men's team while still a teenager. At the age of

19, he joined a junior team that played in South Edmonton. Even though Joe had to hitch hike to many practices and games, old Edmonton Journal articles stated he seldom missed. While playing as a junior, he caught the eye of a scout from the Trail Canucks senior team and was convinced to leave home. After one season with the Canucks, he joined the famous Trail Smoke Eaters, where he tallied 32 points in only 20 games and led the team with 20 goals. That same season, Trail won the Allan Cup and the World Championship in Sweden. They won 8 straight games in the tournament and out scored the opposition 42-1.

Joe continued to play in Trail up to and including the 1939-40 season and then decided to turn pro as both the Toronto Maple Leafs and the Montreal Canadiens were making overtures to him. He ended up on the Leafs protected list but on June 7, 1940 he was traded to the Canadiens. As a member of the Canadiens he centred the famous "Punch Line" with Toe Blake and Elmer Lach, both of whom ended up in the NHL Hall Of Fame. I have checked every player to have played in the NHL and Joe is the only one listed from St. Albert. I have also asked many old time residents of St. Albert if they can recall any others making it to the NHL prior to Mr. Benoit, and no one can.

Joe did not play in the 1943-44 season as he was in the military. After five seasons with Montreal, he was sold to Eddie Shore, owner of the Springfield Indians of the American Hockey League. Joe quit pro hockey after the 1948-49 season and moved back to Trail. He died at the age of 80 while living in the Spokane, Washington area. In the spring of

1961, St. Albert had only 3 outdoor rinks with boards in Sturgeon, Grandin, and Mission. A fourth game a couple of years later in Braeside and all but Mission are still in use at their original sites. The Mission rink was moved not long ago from its location just north of the Little White School house to the grounds of St. Albert High School.

In 2006, there are outdoor rinks located in Akinsdale, Deer Ridge, Flagstone, Gatewood, Lacombe and Woodlands.

50'S AND EARLY 60'S

In the late 50's and early 60's, St. Albert's two senior teams, the Comets and the Meteors, played some of their home games at Sturgeon rink. They were bitter rivals and many a scuffle broke out as they fought for dominance.

St. Albert also had a few bantam and midget boy's teams, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, who played most of their games in a league in north Edmonton. At this time, minor hockey was administered by the St. Albert Parks and Recreation board.

The St. Albert Kinsmen Club was chartered on May 4, 1964 and five of its members (Erling Winquist, Barry Welsh, Rusty Govenlock, Dave Joyal and Roger Gelinas) discussed the idea that the club sponsor minor hockey. Kinsmen member Rod Erickson joined the group and the St. Albert Kinsmen Club took over operations for the 1967-68 season. The first year, the KMHA iced 12 mite, 8 peewee, 5 bantam and 2 midget teams. Registration fees were only \$3.00 per player regardless of age and a mysterious Kinsmen would

pay the fees for those who could not afford to play. EVERY player had an opportunity to participate and there were 380 boys registered that season. Registrations were taken at the St. Albert Sport Shop on Perron Street.

All games were played outdoors and although the town was responsible for snow removal, many times the teams had to scrape and shovel before the game could start. Rules also stated that no game could be played if the temperature was -20 but that theory was often ignored. Lots of kids came home with white fingers, toes and noses that needed thawing out by mom.

Led by the hard working Kinsmen Club, a drive to raise funds for a covered arena was launched. After volunteers knocked on EVERY door in St. Albert and area, enough money was raised to build St. Albert's first covered ice surface, originally named The St. Albert & District Arena.

In the spring of 1970, the Kinsmen held their first ever Skate-A-Thon on the Sturgeon River, just west of Perron Street Bridge. Some 14500 skaters showed up with pledges worth \$7000. Lt. Governor Grant MacEwan, Kinsmen president Tom White and Mayor Ray Gibbon secured an additional \$1300 in pledges. Most of the funds were used to help offset annual charges of \$11,000 to operate the minor hockey program.

On October 1, 1970, the St. Albert & District Arena (also known as Perron Street Arena and later, the Ducky Dome) opened its doors for business – St. Albert finally had a facility they could be proud of. No more cancellations due to inclement weather! We could now invite out-of-town teams back for exhibition

games, tournaments etc, and schedule 6 a.m. practices that no one seemed to mind. The following is a capsule of hockey in St. Albert after the opening of the covered arena.

1970'S

In addition to their minor hockey program, the Kinsmen added a junior B team with the help of local businessmen Garth Leaske and Ron Yanosik. They funded and managed St. Albert's entry into the Capital Junior B Hockey League. The team known as the Bruins and later sponsored by the Bruin Inn, were coached by Rick LeLacheur. Rick was a former Edmonton Oil Kings captain in the Western Canada Junior Hockey League and a partner in his father's Western Moving & Storage Company. Mr. LeLacheur is now the CEO of the Edmonton Eskimos football club and a long time St. Albert resident.

In 1975, the Kinsmen added a juvenile "B" hockey team to their expanding program. The Standard Generals emerged, sponsored by the local developer of the same name, who are still in business today on Bellerose Drive. The team was coached and managed by John Ewen and were members of the North division of the province wide Central Alberta Junior Hockey League. The league had 17 teams.

St. Albert Comets were one of the major tenants and were always near the top of the Alberta Intermediate Hockey League. Their last season of play was in 1977-78 when they were forced to cancel operations due to the arrival of the St. Albert Saints from the Alberta Junior Hockey League.

In the spring of 1977, the Spruce Grove Mets junior A hockey team was purchased

by local businessman Tom White and moved to St. Albert under the guidance of coach Doug Messier, father of NHL legend Mark. The Saints played from September 1977 to February 1978 in Perron Street arena but soon moved to the new Akinsdale Arena which opened on February 25, 1978.

The St. Albert Saints defeated the Pincher Creek Chinooks 8-3 with Mark Messier scoring the first ever goal at Akinsdale – just 27 seconds into the opening period.

In 1979, the Territorial Leasing Sabres sponsored a bantam AAA tournament that is still going strong today. The tournament was renamed the John Reid Memorial in honor of previous Saints player and dedicated minor hockey coach John Reid, who died of cancer in 2004.

The first year of Representative hockey was 1978-1979 and a yearbook was published with photos and player lineups of 8 teams (130 players) that would represent St. Albert in league play. With a rapidly expanding minor hockey system, the Kinsmen Club felt the need to channel their fundraising to other St. Albert projects. The 1979-80 season was their last year running minor hockey. They continued to sponsor teams under the new St. Albert Minor Hockey Association, which still operates minor hockey today (SAMHA).

1980'S

The first season for St. Albert Minor Hockey Association (SAMHA) was 1980-81 with president as Jim Steeden. That same year saw the Kinsmen put aside \$20,000 as seed money for a new recreation centre for the rapidly growing St. Albert. A further \$200,000 from the Kinsmen, raised through a house lottery,

was also put towards the new centre.

Along with the new association, a new logo was created, simple stickmen with St. Albert Minor Hockey around the perimeter. In 1980-81, rep tryouts ran the first week of September with a fee of \$1 per player. St. Albert also refined their program with second year players in major and first year in minor for each age group. CSA approved helmets were mandatory. Ice rentals at both Perron and Akinsdale were \$20 to \$25 per hour while outdoor rinks were \$5 to \$6.50 per hour.

The new arena complex funded by the Kinsmen was a new ice surface attached to Akinsdale and was appropriately named Kinex. The building opened in the fall of 1982 but the official opening was set back to January 29, 1983.

On May 13, 1984, at a meeting in Red Deer, the Alberta Major Midget Hockey League was formed with St. Albert registered in the province wide league. This was St. Albert's first venture into AAA hockey and the league is still in operation today with the St. Albert Raiders.

St. Albert Merchants Junior B team came on the scene in 1983-84 as members of the Capital Junior Hockey League. The team was formed by Bob Couture, Gabe Kellar, Bill Fellows, Terry Moore, Max Plageman and coach Gord Hollet. Their idea was to provide those who did not crack the St. Albert Saints lineup an opportunity to continue playing hockey. This team is still going strong with some of the original ownership still involved. St. Albert's Junior C team had to fold due to no league to play in 1988-89. That same year saw the Midget Raiders AAA team win the Alberta Major Midget league title and

advance to the Air Canada championships, where they finished fourth. The Raiders were coached by John Thompson and managed by Phil LaRue.

1990's

In 1992, St. Albert approved the building of Campbell Park twin arenas and the Perron/Ducky Dome land was reclaimed to make way for downtown revitalization. A Ducky Dome "Farewell Party" was held on June 20, 1992 and hundreds of people stopped in to say goodbye to the arena that had meant so much to them. NHL players Jamie McLennan and Geoff Sanderson were in attendance and added to the stories of many people present. The building was carefully dismantled that summer was shipped to Tijuana, Mexico to be recycled into housing for the less fortunate through the Habitat For Humanity organization.

St. Albert Raiders midget AAA team hosted an exhibition game at Akinsdale against a Czech midget team which ended in a 5-5 tie. One of the Czech players was Peter Nedved who defected following the Mac's Midget tournament in Calgary. Nedved has been an NHL player for a number of years, recently with the Edmonton Oilers.

SAMHA changed its logo in 1996 to the current three color hockey player in red, blue and yellow. All SAMHA rep teams have the same logo on uniforms and jersey colors are also the same home/away.

Campbell Twin arenas opened September 17, 1992 and the ice surfaces were named Troy Murray and Mark Messier arenas. Murray was a member of a few NHL teams including the Colorado Avalanche where he won a

Stanley Cup. Messier has been on 6 Stanley Cup teams and retired before the start of the 2005-06 season.

SAMHA opened new offices in the Akinsdale/Kinex complex and hired Bob Rogers as a full time employee. One of the most significant things to happen in the 90's was the formation of St. Albert's first all female hockey team in 1994-95. The midget team was known as the Sharks and featured the elite of girl's hockey.

One of the players Meaghan Mikkelson, was also the first female SAMHA player to obtain a NCAA scholarship at the University of Wisconsin. Her father Bill played with 3 NHL teams before retiring in 1977. Her brother Brendan currently plays for the Calgary Flames although he was earlier drafted by the Anaheim Mighty Ducks.

SAMHA had 52 girls registered in hockey for the 1997-98 season. Prior to all female teams in St. Albert, there were always a few that played on boy's teams. Goaltender Julie Cox played 3 games for the AAA midget Raiders picking up a win in the 1999-2000 season.

In 1998-99 SAMHA had 1668 players registered. That was the same year that SAMHA came out with their "Parent's Handbook"

2000'S

Probably the biggest news from 2000 was the YES vote by a narrow margin on October 18, 2004 to build the \$42.5 million Multipurpose Leisure Centre scheduled to open in September 2006. The state of the

art project is attached to the Campbell twin arena complex.

Other happenings in 2000 were SAMHA becoming the first minor hockey organization in Alberta to go online with registration and the first association in Canada to accept credit card as a method of payment. Over 1758 boys and girls were registered. A big thank you to office administrator Holly Tanner, assistant Anna Hnit and all those involved for spearheading this process.

SAMHA under the direction of Team Alberta and Hockey Canada were given Elite team status in 2008-09 which meant they had to be the association to form teams in the St. Albert and North West areas. As a result the St. Albert Raiders who are the Elite team registered 3 bantam AA teams, 1 Bantam AAA and 1 female bantam AAA. In midget it was 1 midget AAA, 2 midget AA clubs, 1 midget minor AAA, 1 midget 15 AA and 1 female midget AAA club.

Our Raider midget AAA team hosted Team Canada's women's Olympic team to Servus Place and for the first time since the facility opened, the arena was full 2200 plus to watch a very entertaining hockey game on Jan, 10th, 2010. Canada went on to win the Olympic gold medal in Vancouver a couple of months later. Team Canada coach Melody Davidson felt playing against the Albert Midget Hockey League teams were a big plus for how they did in the tournament. St. Albert's Meaghan Mikkelson was a member of Team Canada and has shown her gold medal at many of St. Albert's functions. She is a great ambassador for women's hockey and we are proud to call her one of our own.

FEMALE HOCKEY

The year 1994-95 was an important milestone for female hockey players in St. Albert as it was the first year an all-female team was formed in the St. Albert Minor Hockey Association (SAMHA) under the name of the St. Albert Sharks. A photo of this team is on display in the trophy case at Akinsdale Arena.

Wayne Large was the Sharks coach and his assistants were Lucy Manning and Lou Doan. Players were Christy Farrell, Marty Mitchell, Christy Cooke, Alison Lutic, Nancy MacLean, Darlene Richard, Amy Campbell, Colleen Helgron, Jennifer Muzichuk, Candice Richard, Sheri Large, Kristie Mason, Lindsay Poelzar, Erin Brandt, Kelly Doan and Teresa Manning.

Prior to the Sharks, there were other female players in SAMHA although all played on various boys teams. I have not been able to find out who may have been the first female registered in either the Kinsmen Minor Hockey Association who ran hockey in St. Albert from 1964 to 1980 when the current SAMHA took over. If anyone reading this knows who that may be, please email me and I would be most pleased to enter the name in this article.

Females playing hockey in St. Albert goes back a number of years as there are photos of a ladies team taking on a married men's team in volume 2, page 493 of the Black Robe's Vision series. These historical books can be viewed at the library and can also be purchased at the museum at City hall. This game was played in 1935 at St. Albert's first outdoor rink with boards and was located just west of Perron Street across from the Cenotaph on St. Anne Street. The rink with

high boards to keep the wind and snow out was erected in 1929 and was part of the North West Mounted Police barracks, also used as a changing room. I have spoken with an old timer who was at the game and no one can remember who won the match or if a score was even recorded although there were plenty of laughs during the game. Photos show about 7 or 8 ladies took part and they wore some of the men's uniforms of players who were not married.

The St. Albert Gazette also published a history book outlining the years 1861 to 1999 and some of these photos appear there. The Gazette probably has copies for sale at \$5.00 or you can view it at the library.

Although I am still researching old Gazette issues for females playing in the 70's and 80's, SAMHA had just two females registered in 1992-93. Sarah Oxtan, an assistant captain for the St. Albert G & M Crusaders pee-wee C team while Francis Kramer was a right winger for Shoppers Drug Mart in the pee-wee D division. Sarah was also chosen to play for Zone 5 at the 1993 Alberta Winter games.

In 1996-97 there were 29 females registered, 52 in 1997-98. 1998-99 registration soared to 74 while 1999-2000 it was 66 and 59 in 2000-01.

Julie and Jenny Cox started their 1st year of rep hockey in 1997-98 as goaltenders in the bantam division. In 1999-2000 Julie was playing for the Midget AA Crusaders and was called up to the Raider midget AAA squad where she recorded 40 saves in a 5-3 win over Gregg Distributors.

The first female to play in the Alberta major bantam AAA hockey league was Lara Smart

who was a member of the Airdrie Extreme team in 1999. Lara is now a member of the Edmonton Chimos women's hockey club along with Erin Blake and Lauren Cherewyk who also played in SAMHA.

In 2000-01 SAMHA had only two female teams, peewee/bantam under the Storm name and bantam/midget under the Sharks banner. In 2001-02 there were five teams under SAMHA with the Novice Attitude, Atom Bandits, Peewee Storm, bantam/midget Storm and the Midget Sharks.

In 2003-04 SAMHA's yearbook lists 8 female teams. Novice C was the Ice Hawks, while the Hot Shots were an Atom team. Girl's peewee teams were the Demolition and Krush while over in the bantam it was the Wildcats (A) and Rattlers in B. The midget "A" team was the Sharks while the Storm were our "B" team.

In 2004-05 SAMHA had 5 teams with the Extreme in peewee A and Ice in peewee B. Bantam also had a pair of clubs with the Rage in regular play while the Rush were in A. The Storm were our only midget B team.

2004-05 also saw the formation of the Alberta Major Midget Female Hockey League (AMMFHL) with 13 teams taking part with 7 in the South division and 6 in the North including the St. Albert Slash who are sponsored by Kal Tire. This is a highly competitive female league which will be producing players for NCAA teams in the United States as well as Canadian University and college teams. The Edmonton Chimos are also closely monitoring this league as well and their most recent addition is Lauren Cherewyk of the Slash. She very well could be offered a NCAA scholarship next year.

Last year saw an increase in clubs to 8 teams as the Pink Panthers were our Novice team while our Atom A club was the Wolfpack and the Devils were our B squad. In the peewee division it was the Force in A while the bantam A team was the Silvertips and the Rush were our B entry. Midgets had two teams with the Slash carrying the A banner while the Storm were the B reps.

Over the past few years SAMHA girl's alumni had made an impact in university/college hockey as a number have obtained university/college scholarships.

Meaghan Mikkelsen was SAMHA's first player to receive a NCAA scholarship as the University of Wisconsin Badgers recruited her and 2003-04 was her first year. In 32 games that season, Meaghan had 7 goals and 7 assists for 14 points which was not too bad for a rookie. In her second season with the Badgers she increased her points to 20 with 7 goals. Last year was a breakout season for Meaghan when she and her Badgers won the NCAA championship as the best female team in the United States. This very talented young lady comes from a hockey family as her father Bill played 147 games in the NHL for Los Angeles, Islanders and Capitals. Brother Brendan was drafted 31st overall by the Anaheim Mighty Ducks in 2005. He is currently playing junior for the Calgary Flames of the NHL. Meaghan has also played on a number of Canada's national women's teams and as they are too numerous to report, please go to www.uwbadgers.com under women's team and her accomplishments will appear.

Also receiving a NCAA scholarship is Karrah Stephen who is presently attending the

Quinnipiac University in Connecticut for the Bobcats. She is in her third year and is a graduate of the Edmonton Chimos.

The women's division of the Alberta College Athletic Conference has had a number of SAMHA alumni on their rosters including Ashley Edwards and Amy Large for NAIT, Brittany Offers and Kaitlyn Paradis with Red Deer. Grant MacEwan College have had Julie Monteith and Danielle Bles in their lineup. Grant MacEwan College Griffins ladies team are playing their ACAC home games out of the brand new Servus Credit Union Place and their opening game on Friday, October 13th/06 had four players in Raelle Houle, Julie Monteath and the Shwetz sisters Seyara and Kanesa in the lineup. Griffins opponent that night were the University of Calgary Dinos and they had Shannon Davidson who played for the St. Albert Slash in their lineup. Griffin's won 3-2.

Danielle Bles is an excellent goaltending prospect for the U of Alberta Pandas as she had a 7-0 record in CWUAA play in 2005-06 with 5 shutouts and a GAA of just 0.29. Bears will be relying on her this year as they go for another Canadian University championship.

You will note that I have concentrated on girls/women who have played on higher profile teams as their teams/leagues have kept stats or records which are easier to research. I have also followed this route on boys/men's hockey with SAMHA.

Our St. Albert Kal Tire Slash midget AAA team won the women's division of the annual Mac's midget tournament when they knocked off the home town Calgary Flyers in 2009.

This past winter (2010-11) saw the privately

owned St. Albert Merchants junior B team become part of SAMHA and the Raiders as it serves as an extension to our minor hockey program providing a place for our graduating midgets who do not make a junior A team a place to play rather than just dropping out of hockey.

Congratulations are in order to the St. Albert Slash midget AAA women's team for winning the prestigious Mac's tournament in Calgary in 2009. Slash defeated the home town Calgary Flyers in the Gold medal game.

The St. Albert Slash hosted the National Female Midget Hockey Championships April 17th to 23rd, 2011 with monetary help from SAMHA and the Raiders at Servus Place in the Performance arena. Six teams from across Canada competed and they were from Atlantic Canada (Kings County Kings from the Maritimes), Notre Dame Hounds from Saskatchewan representing the West, Du Lac St-Louie Kodiaks representing Quebec, Edmonton Thunder from the Pacific and the host St. Albert Slash. Slash won 2 and lost 3 in round robin play and failed to make the playoffs. Notre Dame defeated Edmonton Thunder 5-2 to win the Gold medal while Ontario shut out Quebec 4-0 to win the bronze.

It is interesting to note that both Eddie Joyal and Joe Benoit both saw Stanley Cup action with Benoit winning in 1945 - 46. There were no minor hockey leagues in St. Albert when they played and both had to go into Edmonton to play organized hockey.

There was no organized minor hockey in St. Albert until 1960 when we had two bantam and two midget teams that played in a North Edmonton league. I have not been able to find any records of team names what players were on those teams and I continue to search.

Mr. Benoit was the first person from St. Albert to play in the NHL as a member of the Montreal Canadians in 1940 - 41.
