A Note from the Past President Glen Cuming

Dear Members

I am writing as the Past President regarding concerns about the Annual General Meeting (AGM) which occurred on 28 October. As for some background, there were 237 Rams' registrants for the 2023 season resulting in, after player transactions, 253 players on Rams' hosted teams.

As required, notices for the Rams' AGM were issued 30 days out from the meeting through various media outlets and multimedia platforms with many reminders right up until the day of the meeting. The meeting was held completely virtually this year in order to provide more flexibility to all Members to be able to attend. However, there were only 11 attendees of which one was from the City of St. Albert and six of the remaining 10 represented only three players as they attended as couples. All 10 attendees were also 2023 Members of the Board. Point being, there were no other Member attendees and only 7 out of 253 players and families were represented.

There are two main issues, the first being the lack of attendance at the Rams' AGMs and the Board would appreciate feedback as to what would generate more interest and participation in the AGM. Would an awards banquet be more enticing for players and families to attend where there would be specific awards for each team and/or acknowledgement of Members who went above and beyond during the season? Would free swag handed out to each of the players be more encouraging? Perhaps a meal? Please let us know your thoughts.

The second issue is the current size of the Board of Directors. Without going into a lot of details the positions on the Rams' Board have been increased and decreased several times over the years; most recently reducing from 23 positions to 17 through a rewrite of the Rams' Bylaws and polices. The Board has also reduced from 12 actual people covering off those positions in 2023 to 11 for the 2024 season. This is not sustainable and negatively

impacts the ability of the Club to provide programming.

There are two considerations regarding the current size of the Board. First, from an internal perspective, is the future of the Club. Of the current Board, 10 of the 11 Members have players graduating the minor lacrosse system in the next two years. This includes the entire Executive Committee. The Rams have been very fortunate over the past few years to have had parents stay on the Board despite no longer having any children still playing minor lacrosse. But again, this is unsustainable.

The second consideration is that the GELC must collectively find solutions for Club level Boards that are struggling or simply are not large enough to operate their applicable Clubs. One option that has been discussed is the amalgamation of Clubs in order to combine Boards and sustain operations. The disappointing aspect if such a consideration had to be made for the Rams is that the Rams had the second largest registration numbers in 2023 within the GELC. Often Clubs with struggling Boards also struggle with registrations.

Therefore, the last comment is literally a plea to all Members of the St. Albert Rams Lacrosse Club to consider stepping up to take on a Board of Director position. Appreciate that the majority of the Board also coach or manage teams. As many of the current Board of Directors cover off two or more positions any of them would be happy to handover positions completely, in a manner permissible by the Bylaws, or simply conduct a year long handover to slowly transition someone into stepping up for the 2025 season. If you are interested, please let the Board know. If you have any further comments or feedback, please respond to this email. Registration is scheduled to open <u>1 December</u> and Winter Drop-in commences 8 January; and so, the 2024 season begins! Please considering volunteering to assist with the administration and operation of your Club.








What is NLL UnBOXed™?

REFEREE SHORTAGE LEADS TO BIG CHANGES IN THE ALBERTA TOURNAMENT LAYOUT

In a previous newsletter we highlighted the dire situation that we find the state of our Referee participation in and why it continues to get worse. And though it may not have effected your lacrosse experience to this point, it surely will now. The ALA has made significant changes to the way they will approve tournaments for the 2024 season, with the sole reason being the availability of officials.

What to Expect

There is potential that the ALA will only approve one tournament for each governing body for the 2024 season. That means one in the Calgary area, one in the Edmonton area and one in Central Alberta. This drastically reduces options for teams to travel to, and to take part in. But what could be more detrimental, is the fund raising opportunity it takes away from the clubs who will no longer be able to host a spring tournament.

This does however, mean the scale of the approved tournaments will increase greatly. Which on the surface, seems like a benefit to the clubs that are granted permission to host, but greatly complicates an already complicated process. This will require more volunteer help, more floors and more time to organize.

What else might change

The likely hood of seeing off-season events may now increase as clubs try to supplement the income that they would rely on from hosting a tournament during the season. Events like the <u>Posse's</u> recent 4v4 tournament may become more common throughout the off season, but these are less lucrative and come with their own set of complications, being a hockey-centric environment during the winter months.
