VP –Development 2019-2020 Report- submitted by Brett Nixon

This year in SMHA development we continued expanding our player development in line with the pathway changes implemented by Hockey Alberta. Providing players opportunity to work in skill-based groups and develop an individual player's assets, while contributing to a team, will be a focus throughout SMHA hockey. This mindset allows us to be flexible as Hockey Alberta continues to revise the player pathways and will be important as we move toward the upcoming U-11 pathway and the U15 "no hit" stream for the 2020/2021 season. A summary of this year's events are as follows:

As usual September started off in a flurry of activity, with SMHA offering skills development sessions, powerskating, Girls Weekend, a Bantam Checking clinic, and ATC goalie development. In keeping with Hockey Alberta's development recommendations for having development skates before tryouts, SMHA offered two weeks of on ice skill development. Skills sessions were run by SMHA coaches and were well attended, particularly with the younger age groups. Coaches ran some great practices and are key for this program's success. During this time, players from Atom to Bantam also took part in powerskating sessions with Val Norrie. Val continues to run a quality program and many of our Midget players were excellent volunteer helpers during the sessions. In addition to the development for older players, SMHA offered powerskating with Ashley Grantham for our Novice players and Ashley was also utilized by individual teams (at their own cost) throughout the season.

Girls Weekend took place in mid-September with great success. For the second year in a row the weekend was opened to Novice girls and Val Norrie attended to offer powerskating sessions. This weekend has been very successful and continues to aide SMHA in having one of the largest female hockey programs in central Alberta.

For a second-year, goalies had an excellent opportunity to attend a clinic hosted by ATC Goalie Development. The clinic was well attended and once again cost was subsidized by SMHA. ATC's programming is top notch and SMHA is very lucky to be working with them as a partner. ATC also allowed a few SMHA coaches to come on the ice and learn goalie coaching techniques to aide in our coaching development of young goalies.



New to this year SMHA offered a Bantam Checking clinic for 1st year players making the transition into hit hockey. This program was run with no cost to SMHA players in coordination with Cross Ice Developments. The clinic was the result of parental requests to better prepare players moving from Peewee into Bantam and to aide them in having a successful tryout. The clinic was well attended and received positive reviews. It was reassuring to hear that both parents and players felt more comfortable about tryouts after the clinic had taken place. Another new aspect this year was our SMHA hosted "Development Nights." SMHA provided ice on Fridays for coaches to work with players on specific skills. Each night had a different focus or theme: such as Defense techniques, Faceoffs, Winger puck pick-ups, Offensive skills, & Goalie "Try it Nights." The ice was also utilized by our SMHA refs for mentorship, positioning, and puck drop practice. The ice time was predominantly utilized by coaches and players in the Peewee and younger age groups. For a first-year program It had some growing pains, with the variety of league and team schedules, which made it difficult for some players and coaches to attend. For those that were able to utilize the time, the skill development was beneficial and I hope that we are able to continue the program, in some form for the upcoming season. On the coach development side SMHA once again worked with Hockey Alberta and hosted both Coach 1 and Coach 2 certification this year. These two programs are the building blocks for the rest of the coach development stream and SMHA will continue to encourage all of our team staffs to acquire certification.

As a follow, up to our Coach 1 certification SMHA hosted two nights focused on our Intro to Hockey programs, one for Mites and one for Novice. These nights were utilized for coaches meeting each other and to come up with a year plan for programming at those levels. It worked well for coaches to socialize and for new coaches to hear from experienced coaches in regards to season planning and development and everyone being able to communicate needs with their Directors.

In late January, SMHA also had the privilege of working with Stettler Minor Ball, and Stettler Minor Lacrosse to host Doug Swanson and his presentation "Stack the Deck." A presentation on, communication and the aspects of mental preparation for performance. This turned out to be a great evening that was well attended by people throughout the community and Stettler's minor sports organizations.

In March with an abrupt and awkward season ending the 2019/2020 season was finished. We were not able to host in-person Coach Exit meetings, but are looking at a format to meet with coaches before next seasons start.

With the COVID 19 protocols the planning for next season and how programming will be carried out is in its infancy, however SMHA plans to operate as many of its programs as it possibly can. I encourage coaches to continue their development by attending the Hockey Alberta webinars, and I look forward to seeing you next season.



VP – Operations 2019-2020 Report- submitted by Trevor Speakman

This year we were without a VP of Operations, with this vacant position I tried to fill in as best I could with the Help of the VP of Development Brett Nixon, and President Sandra Shell. Our season Started fairly smooth with our pre-skates running great and getting all of our members out to begin our season. Our tryouts followed which are never an easy part of our season, limited ice times to make difficult decisions with a fast-approaching timeline set by CAHL for having rosters in place and teams registered. With the help of many it still went fairly smooth, again never an easy part of the season when players have to work through cuts and team selections. This Hockey Season started great! Communication between SMHA and SMHA Families is all done through RAMP and over the last few years I believe it has been very effective and as the website is kept up to date it is a very reliable source of information for families to rely on. Thank you to all the families for their help fundraising this season, its greatly appreciated.

SMHA helped with the IODE Rummage Sale which we saw another successful amount of our parents and players help with. Families were awarded volunteer hours for their time commitment, it was voted at the beginning of the season that each family would be able to have a maximum of 4 hours allocated towards their 8 volunteer hours towards the Rummage Sale. IODE in return gives SMHA a donation based on the hours we provide them.

SMHA also hosted the Drumheller Dragons AJHL Team in September as a fundraiser, it was well attended, this was another opportunity to receive volunteer hours by working the door, raffle table, security, Beer Gardens, and Setup.

Fundraising wise this year we did;



- 1. Gear Halo Volunteer Hours were awarded to each family based on amount sold. 15 Cubes = 4 Hrs 25 Cubes = 8 Hrs
- 2. Hockey Calendars Volunteer Hours were awarded to each family based on amount sold.
 - 15 Calendars = 4 Hrs 25 Calendars = 8 Hrs
- 3. Cash Raffle to end the season. Each booklet of tickets gave families 4 hours of volunteer hours in return. There was a total of 200 booklets to sell. We did extend the raffle draw date with AGLC to June 30th so we don't have a total profit on this fundraiser as of today.

I would like to thank all of SMHA Executive and Directors for your countless volunteer hours you have contributed this past season. It takes many hours of commitment to make this association successful and I truly believe this has been a great season, I look forward to the upcoming season and having an even more successful year.



Treasurer 2019-2020 Report- submitted by Christa Cornelssen

At the start of the year, the SMHA board voted in favor of increasing fees for the season. Our fees netted SMHA an additional \$15,000 for the season. The increased revenue was offset with ice fees, insurance costs, and referee costs. The board also entered into discussions for purchasing new jerseys for all teams for the season. We currently have approximately \$75,000 that has been allocated for the replacement of jerseys. The board has decided to wait on the purchase given the economic situation. There were a couple of fundraisers during the course of the season also that has netted over \$21,000 to hockey operations. At the end of the season, SMHA ran a profit of \$27,906, however, there are some additional expenses and revenue that will be required to factor into this. We will need to include the fundraiser costs that are outstanding for the raffle that was held over and there are some outstanding expenses that have not been submitted that relate to the 2019-2020 season. Once we factor those in, I anticipate that we will have a profit of \$25,000. Much of this profit can be attribute to the fundraising. With hockey operations being suspended in the middle of March the ice fees were down for the month which saved the association some additional money. Overall, the season was successful and we have ended the year with approximately \$160,000 in the bank account.

I want to thank the executive and board of Stettler Minor Hockey who I have worked with off and on for over 5 years. I have enjoyed my time coming back on the board but work commitments have me needing to step back from this position. I look forward to working with my replacement for a smooth transition of treasurer duties.

Reports of the Directors

Mites 2019-2020 Report - submitted by Nicole Doan

During the 2019-20 Mites season, Stettler Minor Hockey continued to use the small area game policy, using 1/3 of the ice for games. The key objectives of the policy are to have fun, to develop an interest in hockey and a desire to continue, to develop basic hockey skills, and to promote physical fitness. Interested parties may refer to the Stettler Minor Hockey website, under the Policies tab for additional information.

We went back to having one on-ice coordinator this year, but coaches continued to help run practices. This structure was used to increase confidence in our coaches to run practices, and to reduce the burden of organizing and running the practices for the on-ice coordinator. During practices, players were divided into six groups based on his/her skill level. Working on drills with similar skilled players was good for the players and helped the coaches work more effectively with each player.

The practice and game times changed to later times in the evening with 5:15pm and 5:30pm start times. This increased the number of coaches that could be on the ice with the Mites players. It was not uncommon to have up to 15 coaches on the ice, which helped improve the program dramatically.

We started the season with 50 registrants, so it was decided to have five teams instead of four teams to increase playing time during the games. Some players did drop out of the program, which resulted with 9 players being on each team. On game days, some players were often



missing, which led to games being played as 3 vs 3 instead of 4 vs 4 on occasion. Some teams also needed to pick up players from other teams for away tournaments if a player on its own team was not able to attend. Going forward, it should be discussed of whether it is beneficial to stay with five teams or go back to having four teams.

The game format also changed with having five teams. Two teams played against each other for the full hour, but the other three teams had a rotation using the middle 1/3 ice surface for drills and skill development, and the other 1/3 ice surface for playing games. Each team spent 20 minutes in the middle working on drills, and the other 40 minutes playing games against two different teams. This worked very well to keep players engaged and allowed us to utilize the whole ice surface.

During the beginning of the season, the Mites Director took the initiative to book the away tournaments for the five teams. Our away tournaments were played in Castor, Eckville, Big Valley, Bowden and Alix. Going forward, this job may fall to the team manager as in past years, depending on whether nearby tournaments are filling up.

Our tournament was hosted on February 8, 2020. In addition to our five Mites teams, seven other teams came to make a 12 team tournament. Each team played two games. The hosted teams were from Forestburg, Castor, Bowden, Sylvan Lake, Bashaw, Drumheller, and Killam. The tournament was a lot of fun, well organized, and financially successful for our program. All in all, it was a wonderful season. Many thanks to the coaches, managers, parents and of course, all the amazing little players for your participation!

Novice 2019-2020 Report - submitted by Chelsey Rowledge and Meghan Nichols

- Total of 50 players (12 female) - Four house league teams (3 boys, 1 girls) and one travelling/league team (9 players) - 3-5 coaches per team and one team manager

League/Travel Team (Green)

- Option to try out for the League team was open to all first and second year players - Had a great season. The only comment from their manager was that the West Country league was quite unorganized (especially compared to CAHL) – hopefully things will run more smoothly next season

House League



- The season began October 7 for all house league players with practices and power skates. Players were divided into 2 groups based on last name (A-L and M-Z). House league teams were selected October 26 - Coaching numbers were a bit challenging as there were a significant number of volunteers for the female team and not as many to divide among the 3 boys teams. Thankfully a number of parents were persuaded and stepped up! - Each team participated in 2 away tournaments and our home tournament (except the female team who opted out of a second tourney) - Teams generally had practice twice a week, with game counts as follows for the season:

Midget Female 2019-2020 Report - submitted by Brad Robbins

The Midget girls season kicked off in early September completing a number of off ice training sessions with CJ Oprea at Crossfit Stettler. This has been a great team builder over the years for this group in addition to preparing them for on-ice activity. In addition to the off-ice workouts the team was tasked with helping out at the annual "Girls Hockey Weekend" as mentors during the Saturday on-ice sessions and coaches during the Sunday games. The girls did a great job helping out the younger players and the weekend was a good way for the Midget girls to work together and start building as a team.

The teams started game playing with tiering. Early tiering games against some historical rivals ended up being blow outs and therefore the final couple tiering games were against Midget A defined teams with scores being close so the team was ultimately placed in Midget A of the Rocky Mountain Female League. The team finished with a 9-5-4 record in regular season which was good enough for 3rd place in Midget A behind Olds and Okotoks. The team was competitive in every game and were the only team in the league to hand both Olds and Okotoks losses during the regular season which was a significant accomplishment for the group. Devon Johnson would end up 4th in goals for the league with 15 goals in 18 games and Baylee Stahlberg would end up 4th in GAA at 1.93.

In provincial playdowns the team received a first round bye but had a tough 2nd round match up against Okotoks Midget A. Game 1 was in Okotoks and after playing a fantastic game the team was unfortunately down two goals with a 2-0 loss. Game 2 was in Stettler and unfortunately the girls would lose 5-1 losing the series by a two game total score of 7-1. Okotoks would end up losing in the playdown final to Olds in the third round.



In league playoffs the Midget girls played another hard opponent in Strathmore who would finish 6th in regular season as a result of the RMFHL moving two teams up from Midget B later in the season and allowing them to keep the points they had accumulated at the B level. Neither team won a game against a Midget A opponent but got the 4th and 5th place spots as a result of earlier points playing Midget B teams. Game 1 was played in Stettler and ended in a 3-3 tie. The Midget girls would ultimately be bumped from playoffs losing Game 2 in Strathmore by a score of 4-0. The league final ended up being between Olds and Okotoks with Okotoks winning the Championship.

Overall, it was an extremely successful season. Although the outcomes did not end in a league championship or opportunity at Provincials the girls competed hard for each other at the Midget A level every game. Playing at the Midget A level allowed the team to have excellent competition each and every game that was played winning and losing games by 1-2 goals every night. However, as a single team MHA playing against teams that are able to field a team at both the A and B level it is not easy and forces our girls to challenge themselves and ensure they compete every night often sacrificing individual goals in addition to winning championships. We had a very successful season. We played 40 games and finished with a 16 wins, 16 loses and 8 ties record. So 500. Registrar 2019-2020 Report- submitted by Martyne Nixon

Registration for the 2019-2020 season was successful. There were very few glitches in the online registration/payment processes in HCR. In person registration night for import players was successful as well. There was excellent communication between Christa (Treasurer) and myself throughout the process, and reconciliation between the bank and HCR went fairly smoothly.

We submitted a total of 9 teams to CAHL (2 Midget teams – 32 players; 2 Bantam teams – 33 players; 2 Peewee teams – 33 players; 3 Atom teams – 45 players). Lots of information needs to be collected to meet the CAHL information submission deadline of October 10th. This deadline is a little tight considering team selection is occurring into the final week of September, or first week of October. Lots of great cooperation from directors and managers to ensure this information was submitted in a timely fashion.



We also registered 63 female players (19 Midget, 12 Bantam, 16 Peewee, 16 Atom). The female director and/or managers are responsible for collecting and submitting the data for the Rocky Mountain Female League. There were 51 Novice registrants (30 male house league players, 12 female house league players, 9 West Country League players) and 45 Initiation registrants. The Novice Manager collects information to submit to West Country League for the travel team.

We had about 50% of teams with coaching qualifications that were not met, but we were able to handle these on a case by case basis. Many rosters needed to be amended post deadline to accommodate these upgraded qualifications.

Permitting went well this year, with the majority of teams submitting permit requests well in advance of events. There was great communication with Jerilyne (VP of Marketing and Communication) to have items added to the permit requests in order to comply with Hockey AB rules and regulations.

All in all, was a great year with a definite steep learning curve. I am thankful to the past-registrar, Danielle, for her mentoring. I must also commend the helpdesk employees in HCR, Hockey AB personnel, and the CAHL registrar for their patience and professionalism. They all were more than happy to help out while I was learning. It certainly made the job a lot easier to have these positive interactions.
