11U Division Director Report

Tryouts were hosted March 21st-23rd at Prime/Stockade for AAA and AA. We were able to have 8-10 evaluators over the course of the 3 days, providing great external perspectives for the coaches.

AAA was head coached by Chad Duckworth, with assistants Nick Giesbrecht, Dave Myers and Conrad Funk. They had a great season, attending a tournaments in Regina and Saskatoon. Unfortunately, the AAA host tournament was cancelled due to weather. They finished as league finalists and while reaching the semi-finals at provincials in Saskatoon.

AA was head coached by Dave Langen, with assistants Bobby Singbeil and Clay Becker. AA hosted a tournament on June 6th where they lost the bronze medal game. They played well at the top-8 playoff for league. They hosted provincials, going undefeated in round robin play before losing a tight semi-final. Hosting provincials was a great feather in the team's cap, with some great volunteering from the parents and coaches – special thanks to Lori Langen for being the chair.

A had four teams which played in the Elks League of SW Saskatchewan. Tom Christianson, Mike Jahnke, Jesse Sinclair and Dustin Reamer were head coaches, with Jahnke's Giants team reaching the league playoff and winning their playoff.

Tom Christianson also provided head coaching to an A Provincial Team. This team was quite young but ambitious, getting in a several practices, exhibition games and a couple tournaments. The feedback from parents was that this program was very well run by Christianson and gave players an opportunity to continue their season. We hope the A-Provincial team to continues in future.



Registration had 72 kids when finalized, down 2 from the year before. Overall no real concerns; soccer/lacrosse continue to be competition to baseball. It should be noted, there were kids who tried out for AAA/AA but ended up not playing baseball when they did not make a team.

Equipment was all returned and in good order. No immediate issues noted.

The new Mosquito South equipment shed was built and much appreciated! The Mosquito South diamond could use an improvement in chalking device and water hoses. Sharon Hogg is basically ready to go. The city has been contacted and completed a fall spraying program with the late rain causing a significant flush of weeds.

Based on discussions and feedback, it would be important to:

- 1) Open Registration, Coach Recruitment earlier, while offering Coaching Clinics;
 - a. These would greatly benefit the A League (Elks), and provide stability later on.
- 2) Baseball Jerseys/Hats
 - a. There were some delays in getting uniforms due to shipping/tariffs. It would be great to have supplies ready for April 15th for the teams.
- 3) Diamond Maintenance and Supplies:
 - a. Discussed with board on-field maintenance and field duties of 11U Division Head
 - Depending on solution board provides, access to bases/chalk for Elks League should be considered.
- 4) 11U Division Head
 - a. Recruitment of a non-coaching person would be optimal.

The umpire schedule was once again done by Clayton Obst, it was appreciated by all.

I'd like to thank all the coaches, team managers, and parents who volunteered in all capacities for 13U baseball in the 2025 season which made it a successful year for the players at all levels.

We only had one team of 14 players this season, coached by Garnett Unger. They competed in the Sask Premier AAA league. The team reached their goal of making the 10 team provincial championships for the second season in a row. Their league record was 16-16, good enough for 8th overall.

At Provincials the 18U's qualified for the play-offs but lost a heart-breaking tie-breaker after finishing the round robin with a 2-2 record.



Winter indoor sessions were minimal this season. Tryouts were held in the Stockade and players practiced regularly in April for a quick start to league play in May. The team practiced Tuesday/ Thursdays with regular "Wake up Wednesdays" where the team would train or enjoy breakfast on Wednesday mornings throughout the season.

Additional highlights to the season was a 2nd place finish in Medicine Hat Tournament, and a strong showing against some tough competition at the Minot, ND. The team also hosted Sask Five Giants in their 3rd Annual Pink Game, which saw pink jerseys be worn, and a fundraiser held for local kids with special health needs. This was very well received once again.

The 18U's were proud to have 5 of their players play up with the 57's and performed very well, both on the mound and at the plate.

Congratulations to Sask Premier League Home Run Leader, Mason Fauser, who was selected to represent Team Sask and the Canada Summer Games in Newfoundland. Also to LHP Jase Johnson, who joined the Provincial Silver Medalist Regina White Sox at Westerns in Winnipeg.

The team was happy to have SCMB Alumni Connor Choo-Foo and Wyatt Harkes as the assistant coaches, and saw great growth in their coaching, which is very beneficial to SCMB moving forward.

I heard nothing but positive comments from the players and families. This team is graduating 7 players, leaving some major holes in the line up to fill next season! At the time of preparing this report, the U18 coaching position for next season is open.
