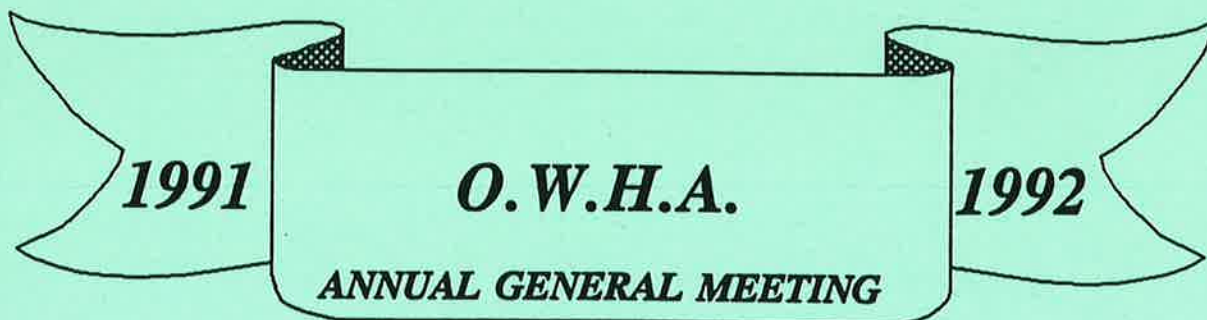

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Congratulations to all members on a very successful 1991/92 hockey season. Our numbers have grown and opportunities have increased in many parts of the province for girls and women of all ages. We thank our long time enthusiasts for their unselfish dedication and we welcome any newcomers to a long, enjoyable involvement in the game.

Our sport continues to gain exposure and public credibility. Our women's game has established an identity of clean play and good sportsmanship and the President of the CAHA, Murray Costello, has been quoted as saying that our game may well be the model to which the males should aspire.

As we achieve an increasing number of high performance events such as provincial championships, Ontario Winter Games, National Championships and possible Olympic involvement we must regularly emphasize the importance of keeping the game in perspective. Elite opportunities are excellent for our highly skilled players, but are even more important as a vehicle for grass roots development and mass participation.

All teams, leagues, associations, players, volunteers and parents are encouraged to do their part to keep integrity, sportsmanship and fun in our game. We must remember that the scores of one game are soon forgotten, but the friendships made and life skills learned by our young players last a life time. Coaches have a major impact on the players abilities and behaviour.

We can look with pride to Cathy Phillips as a reminder of the human aspect in hockey. Most people are aware that Cathy has been an outstanding goaltender, leading her team to many league, provincial and national championships. She was in goal for Canada's gold medal victories in both 1987 and 1990. Cathy has been making a steady recovery following surgery on a benign brain tumor. At the April 11th National Team exhibition game, Esther Richards from the Hockey Hall of Fame was on hand to receive from Cathy her 1990 national team outfit to be put on display. We congratulate Cathy for her outstanding ability as a player and a person.

The OWSHA continues its work to get women's hockey recognized as an Olympic sport. This would be a major step forward for the development of female hockey in many countries. We would gain world-wide credibility, increased public interest and greater financial support from both government and the corporate sector.

Internally, our move to more committee work continues to give us the means of dealing with the increased demands of our members and potential members. We are attempting to respond to the ongoing needs and also take a pro-active approach. Budget restrictions have limited the size of our committees and the frequency of meetings, but much good work has been accomplished.

Our Constitution and By-Law Review Committee has worked long hours preparing a document that will guide us through the 1990's. Our development and marketing committees have been working on long term planning and the finance committee has worked closely with Ernst & Young to provide an independent review of last year's records. We thank all volunteers who served on our various committees. Special thanks to Mayor McCallion and Professor Ed Ratushny who have been active supporters on our Board of Regents.

As we grow, effective communication continues to be a very important aspect of our organization. Information is sent out in our newsletter mailings and by personal contact from our Regional Directors and the Executive members. We encourage contact people to make sure pertinent facts are passed along to the appropriate people. We are very interested in feedback from our members on all aspects

District boundaries encompass school districts that are described on the appendices.

District amateur hockey associations would administer and provide hockey opportunities for all divisions of hockey except major junior and female.

At meetings of the Ontario Hockey Federation, each of the representatives from the respective district amateur hockey associations, shall be entitled to one vote. Voting by proxy will be prohibited. The OHL or OWHA representative shall be entitled to one vote. Voting by proxy will be prohibited.

Chairman of the Table Officers of the Federation would be elected from within the Board of Directors.

Ontario Amateur Hockey Federation would continue to be represented by 5 delegates (5 votes at the National level).

Each district amateur hockey association would be required to determine a structure and organization that is consistent and compatible with the Branch Federation, however, it must have representation at it's Board for all levels of hockey governed.

The office of the Ontario Federation to be situated in a year in the Greater Toronto District as the most accessible location.

A Committee consisting of a representative from each partner under the leadership of a CAHA appointed chairman during the 1992-93 season would detail the internal workings of the branch structure.

- the initial task would be to identify an Executive Director with responsibilities commensurate with the same position in other Branches.
- other areas requiring immediate attention include establishing a branch office, drafting a constitution by-laws and regulations, defining roles and responsibilities, setting policy guidelines, determining information and communication flows, identifying branch registration procedures, preparing an initial branch budget, addressing insurance matters and examining to what extent additional people should be hired.

ONTARIO WINTER GAMES

The 1993 Winter Games will be held in Cornwall in March 11-14, 1993 for Midget A teams. Please let the Vice President of Administration know as soon as possible if you will be having a Midget A team for 1992-93.

We will probably have 6 teams competing in the games so there might be playdowns both within and between regions.

This will be the fifth Winter Games that the O.W.H.A. has competed in. We look forward to your team's participation in 1993 in Cornwall.

O.W.H.A. PROVINCIALS

The Senior AA Provincials were held in the middle of February in Glanbrook. The Toronto Aeros were again victorious with a 5-3 win over Guelph in the championship game. The Aeros then represented Ontario at the Nationals in Edmonton and were successful in winning the silver medal. Congratulations Aeros. Thank you to the Glanbrook Girls for hosting an exciting Senior AA Provincials. Thank you Vonnie and Ron Jeffries for all your assistance and hospitality.

The remaining Senior A, B, C, and D provincials were held in Brantford hosted by the Brantford Lady Blues. Carl and Jim reported many exciting games including a four period overtime game in Senior B. Thank you Larry DeVuyst and the Lady Blues for your great job at hosting the Senior provincials.

The remaining 17 divisions were held at the Meadowvale 4 Rinks April 10, 11, and 12. There were many exciting close games especially in the semi-finals and championship games, but one highlight of the weekend was a visit by the National Women's team which included autograph and picture sessions.

A special thank you to all the executive members and their families who help make the Provincials very successful. A very special thank you to Jim and Beulah McInnes, and the host committee for all their extra work in preparing for the provincials.

REFEREE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Referee Committee is a relatively newly formed committee with this being its first full year of operation. The committee's function is to deal with all of the issues relative to referees and its membership is comprised of Deb Adams, Ivan Locke, Melanie McFarlane, Doug Nicholls and Fran Rider.

In the first full year of operation we have scheduled referees for Central Ontario Women's Hockey League, University of Toronto home games, Senior AA Provincials and Provincials in Meadowvale.

We also had OWHA referees participate at competitions outside Ontario. Marina Zenk participated at the Nationals, Deb Maybury travelled to the Western Shield and Karen Hebert went to Finland to referee in the World Championship. We have selected 6 of our senior officials to participate in our referee supervision program. These people all participated in a weekend training program at the Scarborough tournament. The supervisors are still in training under the direction of Ivan Locke.

A NRCP Level I clinic was offered at Leadership Camp and all 30 girls received their certificates. An additional 26 new referees graduated from the Level I and II NRCP clinic hosted by the Stoney Creek Girls' Hockey Association in February.

Our officiating program is gaining a lot of strength as we currently have about 90 registered referees including many new young girls who are joining the program. Our senior more experienced referees are consistently receiving both national and international recognition.

SANCTIONED TOURNAMENTS

Forty tournaments were sanctioned this past season in another successful tournament year. Although the process for sanctioning tournaments may seem a bit of a headache to some, please keep in mind that the procedure is for the benefit of the host as well as all participating teams. The sanction acts as a guarantee that O.W.H.A. rules and regulations will be followed concerning player discipline, playing rules, player and team eligibility, etc.

This past season there was some difficulty in ensuring that convenors received copies of lists of the participating teams and so the sanctioning procedure will be reviewed for next fall. The main recommendations will be that the onus to prove eligibility will rest with the participants. It will therefore become necessary for team managers to carry with them a copy of the O.W.H.A. team and player registration form as filed with the O.W.H.A. Registrar.

Tentative Approval Forms have been mailed out to the convenors of last year's tournaments and you are advised to apply to the O.W.H.A. now to start your listing in the O.W.H.A. newsletter. Early listings will assist teams in planning their activities well in advance, and should help tournaments attract the desired number of teams. Submission of the Tentative Approval Form also starts the sanctioning process in that the convenor will subsequently be supplied the appropriate sanction forms and information. The fee for tentative approval is \$50.00 which will be deducted from the Sanction Fees once they have been submitted with the final forms.

I would like to thank the tournament convenors for their indulgence in working with a rookie like myself, their understanding and support was greatly appreciated.

TROPHIES AND AWARDS REPORT

All O.W.H.A. Provincial Trophies are continually being refurbished and brought up to date. Mr. Jim Martin was kind enough to restore two more trophies this summer. Thank you Jim. There are only two more trophies that are in urgent need of refurbishing at this time. Hopefully, they can be done this off-season.

Thank you to Ron Jeffries, of Mount Hope for providing some last minute engraving on short notice during the Provincial Championships. This was required to get a trophy ready for Brantford. Ron is also doing the trophy engraving for this year's Provincial Winners.

Three Provincial Champions posted bonds and took their trophies home with them. One has since been returned. Provincial winners are permitted to take their trophies with them if they post a bond and have the trophies returned prior to the next annual competition.

I am also making arrangements this year to upgrade the large trophy in the O.W.H.A. office that lists the winners of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association's yearly Distinguished Service.

Nother's of London are currently engraving new backs for this year's Provincial Medallions. They will be sent to each team contact as they are available.

CENTRAL REGION REPORT

This season was another very busy year with hockey in general and the region in particular. Much of the National team activity was held in the region as well as the Ontario National Team selection camp being held in Barrie which took up a lot of time. The new association in Barrie certainly added to the time spent in the Northern part of the region as well as increased focus on the York Peel League. The formation of the North Simcoe League late in the year also added to the amount of time spent in that part of the region.

The two largest tournaments in the province are both held in the Central Region as well as four other tournaments. Congratulations to the committees in Brampton, Keswick, Mississauga, Orangeville and Stouffville for a job well done.

There were also thirteen sets of Provincial qualification games that were played in the region this year. Congratulations to the teams that made it to the championships. The Central region was very well represented and won six divisions and came second in two more. There were fifty-six teams registered in the region this year. I watched as many of these teams as possible, and as often as possible.

My second year as director passed very quickly and I feel that there are very many positive things being done to improve women's hockey in the region. As always, there is much work left to do. I think that I have continued to learn more about the problems facing our teams and organizations and I am better prepared for next year if I am elected as the Region Director for another term. I have participated on many O.W.H.A. committees over the past season as well as publish the O.W.H.A. newsletter. I certainly enjoyed my year as director and hope that I will represent you again in the coming year.

CENTRAL EAST REGIONAL REPORT

Once again, another hockey season is quickly drawing to a close and it gives us the opportunity to look back for a moment and reflect on the past year, as a new season will soon be upon us.

The season started early this year for us with registration and our assistance in running the provincial try-out camp for the National team across the province from Brantford to Ottawa.

The Central Region itself has been very active once again this year with league play going on and numerous tournaments taking place. The region hosted 10 tournaments this year covering all ages from novice to senior starting with United Canstar Bantams/Midget tournament in November. These tournaments varied anywhere from 1 to 3 days. I had the opportunity of attending most tournaments in the region and when I was unable to attend, I ensured there was representation present.

I found the latter part of the year very busy with arranging playdowns and attending most playdown games. I was also actively involved in the Senior AA provincial in Glanbrook and the provincial which took place in Meadowvale. Also with many others, I also took part in hosting the Exhibition game with the National team on April 11, 1992. All this I found very satisfying and rewarding.

I wish you all a safe, happy and very pleasant summer and hope I have the pleasure of serving you through the next hockey season.

CENTRAL WEST REGION REPORT

It's been a very busy year in our region. To start with, Brantford Girls' Hockey hosted the National try-out camp in Ontario. Then we had the National Camp hosted by our Kitchener people. Next, the Senior "AA" Provincials were hosted by Glanbrook. Last of all, the Brantford Lady Blues hosted the Senior A, B, C and D Provincials.

Congratulations to the Sarnia Starfires' Senior "B" and Novice "D" teams on winning the provincial championships in their division. Many thanks to the tournament hosts for providing competitions that invite teams to travel to western Ontario. We anxiously await the 25th anniversary of the Wallaceburg tournament. Best wishes to Wallaceburg on their upcoming silver anniversary season.

Again it has been a pleasure to represent the western region for the Ontario Women's Hockey Association. Many thanks to the parents, coaches, managers, executives and especially the players who made the past season an interesting and exciting one.

NORTHERN REGION REPORT

The North was the place to be this year! From Thunder Bay to Barrie, new members joined the OWHA. Sudbury registered over 100 new members and are looking to more than double that total for next year. New teams were developed in Barrie and Gravenhurst with more to come for 1992-1993. Huntsville hosted the largest women's hockey tournament in Northern Ontario with 24 teams. The Huntsville tournament also featured the first ever "Youngtimers Game" which showcased both active and non-active players over the age of 35. The two stars of the evening were Captain/Celebrities Mabel Boyd, of Mississauga, our province's oldest registered player, and Mickie Walker of Bala (near Gravenhurst), our province's oldest non-registered player. Both Mickie and Mabel more than doubled the age requirement, at 74 years of age and 71 years of age respectively. The game was such a success that the Huntsville Tournament organizers have agreed to make it an annual event. I would personally like to thank Mickie and Mabel for taking the time to "strut their stuff". I would also like to thank our president, Fran Rider for participating in the game, OWHA representatives Ross and Bev Mallory for coaching the two teams, and a big thanks to all those from across the province who participated in the game. It's an evening you won't want to miss next March! Congratulations to Huntsville from the OWHA.

In other happenings, the Huntsville Honeys represented the Northern Region at the Sr. "C" Provincial Championships this year, finishing third. The Northern Region as also represented in the Sr. "D" Division by Thunder Bay and Midland.

In Development, Bev Mallory hosted initiative meetings in Timmins, New Liskeard and Cochrane with hopes that these centres will soon make room for Women's hockey. Interest has also been expressed by teams in Wawa, Hornepayne, and Dubreilleville to join the OWHA. Membership in the OWHA reached this year in the north, and with development as our main focus, don't be surprised to see a noticeable increase in that figure in next year's report.

Before I sign off, I should tell you that I have certainly enjoyed my first year on the OWHA Executive. Being Regional Director is certainly a demanding, and at times, a very challenging position, but with the support and advice of my colleagues on the Executive, the answers to a lot of difficult questions were certainly much easier to find. I look forward to next year and anticipate the growth of women's hockey in the North. I wish I'd have thought of this Regional Director position sooner! It's been a blast serving you and the OWHA.

METRO REGION REPORT

This season was an increase in the number of girls playing hockey in both Scarborough and Leaside. There was also an increase in the number of teams in the North Metro Girls Hockey League, which now includes teams from three regions.

Leaside, Newtonbrook and Scarborough all hosted successful tournaments. The Aeros, the OWHA Sr. "AA" provincial champions, captured the silver medals at the National Championships held in Alberta.

There has been much positive growth, not only in Metro, but across the province. However, we still have a long way to go to provide every girl and women in Ontario, with a place to play hockey.

With growth, comes problems...I am now going to make a personal commentary regarding what I perceive to be a major problem, which showed itself in all its ugly form at this year's provincial championships in Mississauga. I am referring to the shameful and disgraceful behaviour shown by many parents and some coaches towards their own players and towards the opposition. Adults yelling and screaming negative and spiteful words at children and making inappropriate, derogatory gestures towards children. In any other social setting, at school, in a shopping mall, at home, etcetera, this type of behaviour would constitute child abuse. As adults, what type of role models are we providing for our children? Do we want these impressionable children to internalize negative attitudes and display such a total lack of respect for others?

As Association Executives, you have the ability (and the responsibility) to change this inappropriate behaviour. We need to educate these people and demonstrate the behaviours that will be tolerated as acceptable. It is time for the "good" coaches and parents to exert their influence and speak out. Together we must strive to keep the game in perspective and to ensure the kids are allowed to compete in a positive, constructive environment.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP/NATIONAL WOMEN'S TEAM

Congratulations Team Canada - gold medallist of the World Championship held April 20-26 in Tampere, Finland. Our National Women's Team displayed great teamwork and discipline combined with an outstanding skill level controlled the play in all games. Our team finished first in their pool with victories over China, Denmark and Sweden, and then went on to defeat Finland in an exciting semi-final match and finished with a solid 8-0 victory over the United States to win the gold. Canada kept its record intact having won both the first World Championship in Ottawa in 1990 and the pilot World Tournament held in North York and Mississauga in 1987. Sincere thanks to the Finnish Ice Hockey Federation and the International Ice Hockey Federation for hosting a well run championship. Congratulations to all participating countries on great hockey and good sportsmanship.

A highlight of the Championship was the visit by Mr. Gilbert Felli and Mrs. Pirjo Häggman who are official representatives of the International Olympic Committee. They will be reporting back to the IOC on the possibility of women's hockey being added as an Olympic sport in 1994 or 1998. The OWHA has been lobbying for inclusion in the Olympics for many years and we are now supported in our efforts by many countries and the IIHF itself. We know the calibre of our sport warrants inclusion in the Olympics and we recognize the tremendous impact this would have on world wide grass roots participation, financing and credibility.

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association was very involved with our National Women's team. Each province was given the option of recommending up to twenty players to go to a national try-out camp. We set up three open camps in Brantford, Mississauga and Ottawa and the top players were chosen to advance to a provincial camp held in Barrie on the Thanksgiving weekend. The National Team coach, Mr. Rick Polutnik, attended our final camp and worked with our selection committee on choosing the 20 candidates for the national camp from our list, 12 players were invited to the final try-out camp in Kitchener and nine made the team. We sincerely congratulate all athletes who attended the camps. The calibre of play was outstanding, but the quality of the people, with exceptional enthusiasm, sportsmanship and sincere concern for their teammates' competitors was exceptional. You were all successful as you understand and enjoy the true value of sport in our
