PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I would first like to congratulate everyone on a very outstanding season. We are seeing tremendous growth continue again this year with about 25% increase in the number of girls and women in the sport as well as the number of registered teams. This rapid growth we are experiencing is great to see as it will increase opportunities for our players, make us stronger and better, but it does not come without some challenges, as it has put a real strain on our existing resources. I would secondly like to thank the membership of the Ontario Women's Hockey Association for having the opportunity to serve, starting out the season as Vice-President, Administration & Operations and finishing the season as President. I would like to thank everyone and in particular all the members of the executive for providing all their help and assistance during the past season in making this transition.

This has been a very busy season this year for a number of reasons first of which was moving to a new office. A move of this nature does take a lot of work, but considering the circumstances with the timing and everything else it went extremely well due to help from all those that assisted, and the long hours put in by a number of people. This was all capped off by a very successful official office opening on February 9, 1995 which was attended by a large number of dignitaries and the official signing in the awarding of the 1997 Women's World Championships to Ontario.

Another significant step which has taken place this year is the development of our Strategic Plan of which a formal report will be available. One of the issues coming out of this plan and also last year's AGM was regional boundaries. A committee to deal with these boundaries and the number of regions was formed and had representatives from all parts of the province. This committee has worked very hard this past year and will be presenting their recommendations. On behalf of the association I would like to thank this committee for a job well done.

As you are all probably aware this was the year for the Canada Winter Games. The Ontario team was selected last year, and following the recommendations from the membership and the previous Ontario team, we brought this team together much earlier and more frequently thanks to some provincial grants. It makes me proud to report that the group of girls which made up this year's team represented both Ontario and the OWHA both on and off the ice in the highest manner. This talented group of athletes won the Gold Medal and did it with a lot of class, for which a lot of credit goes to the coaching staff of Rick Osborne, Cathy Phillips, Bruce Mullen, Doug Reddon and Pat Nicholls.

This is the second year that we split the provincials into a junior and senior championship held over two weekends, and the first year we have held them in two different locations. Both weekends went off extremely well and the provincials must be held on at least two separate weekends from now on. The volunteers involved in this year's provincials at both Mississauga and Durham West can be proud of a job well done and thank you for all of your time.

Everyone here is probably aware that good volunteers are hard to find and the jobs can be very time consuming. As we are evolving into a society where volunteer time is at a premium and our daily jobs become even more demanding, we should encourage all interested individuals to take part. One does not have to assume an elected position if they do not wish to do so, but there are many less time consuming jobs on committees etc. where one could assist, and if anyone is interested please let the executive know where your interests are.

I would like to wish everyone a safe, happy and very pleasant summer and hope to see you all in the fall for the start of another successful hockey season.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Now is the time to reflect on our theme for the 1994-1995 season - Proud Past, Bright Future. Indeed, we do have a very proud past. It is due to the dedication and enthusiasm of the many women who played the game in the late 1890's and early to mid-1900's, in much tougher conditions than we can imagine, that our foundation was set. The present opportunities are far more extensive than even the most optimistic supporters could have dreamed of 25 years ago. The future is in our hands and with a positive, unified movement forward has the potential to experience even greater advancements.

It is important to step back and enjoy where we are now in relation to where we have come from. Where there are problems, they need to be viewed as challenges. Together, we will find solutions, especially when we distance ourselves from one team or league and look at what is good for every player. Of course, it is not always possible to please everyone, but, when decisions are made with the OWHA values of fun and fair play at the forefront, we can be confident that we have done our best.

Unfortunately, due to our success and the very positive credibility of female hockey, we are experiencing some outside 'challenges'. We welcome newcomers to our game, however, it is important to maintain our loyalty to our players and to those who have sincerely contributed to the growth of our sport and to the personal growth of our players. We have overcome incredible hardships in the past, and by continuing our provincial unity and support, we will see even greater success in the future.

Let's take action to move forward together and continue to set new trends in Canadian hockey. Anything is possible, but it takes conscious effort. Volunteers must take responsibility for selecting coaches who are dedicated to the players and to the values of the OWHA. Coaches have the power to teach their players respect for each other and officials. Game officials can control the level of play. Players can display fair play. Parents can set the example by cheering positively for their team and not criticizing the officials opposing team.

It is time to strongly encourage leagues and associations to set up programs designed to set and maintain the positive trends in female hockey. It can be done. It can be fun!

Many of the challenges facing the OWHA were identified in our strategic planning process. Issues include player movement, categorizing, communication, finances, gender equity and facility access. Perhaps an even bigger threat may be a high level of stress within our volunteer network. We owe a great deal to the large number of people who continually wrestle with problems to come up with the best solutions. When a decision is made that we do not agree with, it does not necessarily mean it is the 'wrong' decision. Let us remember to help each other find solutions, not create added pressures or problems. Hockey is a game - we teach our children the values of positive team systems - the best lessons are by example - it is more fun!

Welcome and congratulations to the growing number of players who enjoy this great game. Thanks to the Ontario Ministry of Culture and Recreation and the many municipal governments actively supporting female hockey. Thanks also to the many corporate supporters who have joined our team in win-win relationships.

Special thanks for the contributions of the many, many dedicated volunteers throughout Ontario, including OWHA members and members of our brother and parent associations. Sincere best wishes for continued fun, friendship and fair play through hockey

DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR'S REPORT

COACHING

As female hockey continues its rapid growth the OWHA is finding the interest from local associations in developing their coaches to be very high on their list of priorities. Many associations insist that the head coaches of their competitive teams attain not just the mandatory NCCP "Coach" level, but also become graduates of the NCCP "Intermediate" level.

The OWHA was pleased to host our first Course Conductor Seminar this past season. Our rookie instructors are very enthusiastic and had successful first seasons. Many thanks to the CHA Jamie MacDonald, and Rick Polutnik for their assistance and support.

To assist in developing an interest among women towards coaching, a special symposium was held in Kingston in March. Twenty members attended and topics discussed included the National Coaching Certification Program, fitness, nutrition and more. The weekend was very successful and plans are in the works for a similar seminar next season. One of our guest speakers was Senior "AA" and University of Toronto coach Karen Hughes. Karen represents Ontario on the CHA's coaching pool. Karen, together with the rest of the members of the pool, has been travelling the country evaluating players for future participation on the Canadian national team.

TRAINERS

The OWHA remains a strong advocate of the practice of Risk Management. Further to this it is now mandatory for all competitive teams to have a Level I trainer registered on the team roster. As we continue to grow, it is imperative to stress the importance of safety and reducing the risks both on and off the ice.

REFEREES

The 1994-95 season saw a 45% increase in referee registrations. More than ever, local associations are encouraging their young players to give officiating a try. It is important as we continue our rapid growth to maintain a healthy referee program. Also, educating officials who have grown through the ranks of minor hockey about the female game will be an ongoing process. The game is of equal importance to the female player.

Congratulations to the OWHA officials who were chosen to officiate at the Canada Winter Games (4), Senior Nationals (6) and Pacific Rim (1) competitions. Many thanks to our Referee-in-Chief Ivan Locke for his dedication to the OWHA referee program.

INITIATION PROGRAM

Successful Initiation Programs (Mini-Blades) were run again this season in Ottawa and Newcastle. Many associations run similar programs for their young players at the start of each season. The larger associations have now included a tyke program to their schedule of activities.

ROLE MODEL WORKSHOPS

The OWHA looks forward to incorporating ideas from the recent CHA Role Model Workshop in to our programming. It is of great importance that our members (players, administrators, officials, etc.) understand the significant role they play in our game. How they represent themselves, on and off the ice, has an affect on the promotion and development of

our game. The CHA workshop was a great opportunity to meet women from all across Canada who are as excited about our sport as we are.

INITIATIVE MEETINGS

OWHA Initiative meetings were held in Clarington, Uxbridge, Burk's Falls and Cayuga (Town of Haldimand) this season. Many smaller centers in Ontario appear to be joining the momentum our sport is gaining. Plans are in the works for an extensive trip through northern Ontario to promote our sport.

EVALUATORS SEMINAR

Julie Healy and Rick Polutnik attended our Senior AA Provincials in February. They were available to answer questions from OWHA coaches regarding player evaluation. As the calibre of players in Ontario increases so does the quest for knowledge from our coaches regarding player selection.



VICE-PRESIDENT OF PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

This has been an exciting year in Women's hockey. The strategic planning sessions in September highlighted the need to re-evaluate the distribution of regions and to continue to improve our communications with the membership. Both of these priorities are a result of the continued growth of women's hockey in Ontario.

The "Initiative" programme has continued this season and interest is beginning to increase within our membership. Please note that there are two times in the year when proposals may be submitted - November and February.

The Tournament Sub-committee worked very hard over the summer and developed a handbook which was well received by the membership this season. It is the intent of the sub-committee to annually review the handbook in order to continually update and improve the handbook.

The Coaching Sub-committee planned and successfully implemented a Female Coaching Symposium this spring. There were representatives from the Eastern, Central East and Metro regions. Plans to host a similar symposium for the Central West, Western and Northern regions are being developed for the spring of 1996. The purpose of these symposiums is to provide an opportunity for women who are either interested in coaching or presently coaching to come together for a weekend to exchange ideas and to initiate networks across Ontario.

A draft "Criteria for Hosting Provincial" handbook has been written and will be piloted during the upcoming season. The purpose of this draft is to provide a framework from which associations will be provided with the qualifications and responsibilities required to host a Provincial event.

The Communications Sub-committee is just in its initial stages. Approximately twelve people have indicated an interest in working on this task force. Plans are in progress for the 1995-96 season.

In closing, I am pleased with the accomplishments which have been made this past season. I would like to extend a sincere thank you to those who have volunteered their time, effort and support.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT

The OWHA again experienced a tremendous growth in both the number of registered teams and the number of participants. This is the second year in succession that we experienced a growth rate of over 25%. The number of teams grew from 557 to 693 and the number of players increased from 7848 to 9626. The total number of registered participants is 11,824. There was also a large increase in the number of tournaments that were provided registration information prior to the event.

With such a large growth in a short period of time it is very difficult to complete the registration process and provide the information on a timely basis. The improvements that were made since last season helped to complete these tasks as quickly as possible but still left some aspects of registration needing to be improved. Several improvements are being planned for next season, but it is still the completion of the forms by the teams that creates the large bottleneck. Items missing, incomplete, in the wrong place, or illegible are the biggest headaches. Cheques for registration, insurance and provincial bond deposits not balancing to the forms and/or not indicating for exactly what teams they are for are another large headache.

To try to improve the procedure, copies of the registration form are available in WordPerfect format that can be completed by the team contact and then printed prior to getting signatures are available. If anyone would like to convert this format to Microsoft Word or another popular word processor format it would be greatly appreciated. I am proposing that next season a new form regarding the financial aspects of registration be included in the package.

Also, I am proposing the use of a registration card for each team. This will remove any confusion as to the registration status of any team that you are playing. This will also eliminate the confusion about which teams are entering tournaments.

Hopefully these proposed changes, closer communication with each other and an improved understanding of the process will again help to streamline the process and get about the business of playing and enjoying the game of hockey. Many thanks to all of you who supported and assisted me during the past season.

On the next several pages are some interesting figures from the registration database.

Once you see a child's self-image begin to improve, you will see significant gains in achievement areas, but even more important, you will see a child who is beginning to enjoy life more.





We had a very exciting year in the Central West Region and almost every association showed in increase in player registration.

As a result of this we had the highest number of competitive teams in the province. Through the hard work and dedication of numerous volunteers we had many successful tournaments, including one in Cambridge - a first year association.

The month of March saw Niagara Falls hosting the Ontario Winter Games and the Midget "A" Provincials. The week-end was a complete success and we were fortunate to see some of the best young hockey players in the province compete for the Gold Medals.

The highlight of this season came from Kitchener when they were awarded the World Championship Games. I had the privilege of working with the committee to assist Kitchener in their bid and we all look forward to the Games in 1997.

I would like to thank the people in my region for their cooperation during the year and look forward to seeing them in the arenas again next year.

I would also like to thank my husband and daughters for their patience and understanding. I could not have got through the year without their help.

CANADIAN HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

This was an historical year for our national body as a merger between the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and Hockey Canada created the Canadian Hockey Association. The Ontario Women's Hockey Association continues its affiliation through the Ontario Hockey Federation with the support of the Ottawa District Hockey Association and the Thunder Bay Amateur Hockey Association. This structure has been the key to the successful development of female hockey in Ontario. This, in turn, has had a major positive impact on the game in other provinces and throughout the world. It is critical to maintain this structure which is in the best interests of female hockey in this province.


Insurance continues to be a major concern. Recent judgments, pending law suits and personal liability exposure make this a very serious issue. The per person fee has gone up substantially in the past few years, but we cannot afford to be without coverage. There has been much discussion, and the national consensus favors a move from a self-insuring program to a commercial carrier. The OHF has tested the market and has some firm quotes which were presented to the CHA. The CHA has appointed an insurance committee to set criteria, solicit quotes and make a recommendation. We hope for a decision by early to mid summer.

Some general points of interest:

- congratulations to our representatives, Mississauga Chiefs who finished fourth in the Esso Senior Nationals held in Summerside, PEI. The Chiefs played extremely well and ran into outstanding goaltending. Sincere thanks to Esso for their support.
- the 1996 Senior National Championship will be held in Moncton, New Brunswick.
- the National women's team won the first Pacific Rim Championship which was held in San Jose, California. Canada took a few veterans combined with many players new to international competition. Our team defeated China and Japan and lost to the USA in round robin play. In semi final action, we defeated China in a shootout and went on to defeat the USA, also in a shootout, to win the championship. Congratulations to all participants and special recognition to Lesley Reddon on her selection as top goaltender.
- there will be a Pacific Rim championship held in western Canada in the 1995/96 season. There will be a national evaluation camp in October or November of 1996.
- the 1999 Canada Winter Games will be held in Cornerbrook, Newfoundland. The age level is currently under review as some provinces would like to see it raised from 17 years to 19, 20 or 21.
- there are plans to hold a junior national championship in the 1996/97 season. This would be the second junior nationals with the last one held in 1993. The previous age limit was 17, but this is currently under review.
- the CIAU has expressed an interest in working with the CHA in the establishment of a national championship. There are many aspects to this, including a difference in regulations between province. As an example, university players in Ontario can play both university and club hockey. At Concordia, in Quebec, they must choose either university or club hockey.
- a national female hockey coaching pool was formed with Karen Hughes from Ontario selected as one of the six members.
- the IIHF has providing funding for Canada to produce a video outlining the differences between body checking and body contact. In July, there will be a special referees seminar in Slovania in July with a special segment for referees of women's hockey. There will be a

Olympic Games. There is a request to increase the number of teams participating in the 2002 Olympics to 8 from 6. This will be dealt with the IOC prior to June 16 when the 2002 games will be awarded.

- there are many changes to the CHA playing rules which have been approved for the 1995/96 season.
- the CHA research committee is looking into various new equipment that is coming on the market including the "Curtis Curve" goaltender stick, Christian "Hammerhead" Goaltender stick, Hughes Bi-Blade Hockey Stick, neoprene pucks, pucks made using recycled, steel- belted radial tires, etc. Caution should be used in purchasing some of the new and/or innovative products as they may or may not receive CHA approval.
- there was a recommendation that all members amend their regulations to a) name all prenovice hockey (ubder the age of 8 yeasr) "Initiation" b) show evidence they adopt the Initiation Program in their curriciulum in their Branch and associations. c) the CHA mandate all on-ice personnel in leadership positions in the divisions of Novice and below successfully complete the IP instructor seminar.
- the CHA is forming a committee to establish a recommendation on the number of games, practices and other ice times that players should receive at each age category. The report and recommendations will be presented at the 1996 CHA AGM.
- the CHA presented a proposal for a uniform branch database system. If approved, it could be operational next season.
- the British Columbia female council representative reported that, "My worst nightmare came true, when our branch decided to allow a male goaltender to card on an all female AA team. Thank goodness the CHA had given us those booklets on gender equity and the law and how it relates to women's sports. An appeal was launched and the decision was reversed, as the ramifications to the female program were realized."
- Note: the OWHA is officially recognized as a special program by the Ontario Human Rights Commission and, as such, has support in allowing female-players only.
- the CHA held a role models workshop and is developing a video and manual.
- a female hockey supplement has been added to the Coach Level Participant and Course Conductors Manuals.



CHA FEMALE HOCKEY REGISTRATION

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association continues to derive its official affiliation to the International Ice Hockey Federation through the Canada Hockey Association. We are represented at the Board level by the Ontario Hockey Federation and are supported by the Ottawa District Hockey Association and the Thunder Bay Amateur Hockey Association. The OWHA also has a delegate on the CHA Female Council.

1997 WOMEN'S WORLD HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP

Dates:

March 30 to April 6, 1997

Place:

Kitchener, Ontario

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association is extremely pleased to be hosting the 1997 world championship in cooperation with the City of Kitchener. The Canadian Hockey Association selected our bid over very strong presentations from Kamloops, B.C. and St John, New Brunswick. We congratulate the organizers in the other bidding provinces and wish them well with their hockey programs.

The 1997 event will be very special as it is a qualifier for the 1998 Winter Olympics to be held in Nagano, Japan. Women's hockey will be a full medal sport with six countries vying for the highly coveted gold medals! Japan will enter a host team with the other 5 countries being the top finishers of the 1997 event.

This will be the fourth official world championship with Canada, United States and Finland winning gold, silver and bronze medals respectively in past competition. The 1990 championship was held in Ottawa, Canada; 1992 in Tampere, Finland; 1994 in Lake Placid, New York. The competition throughout the world is increasing with countries showing enhanced interest in developing programs in this "Olympic" sport!

The OWHA has a tremendous challenge ahead. It is a challenge that offers exceptional opportunities. High performance events such as national championships, Canada Winter Games and the Ontario Winter Games have been great catalysts in the growth of grass roots programs for young girls. There are now a tremendous number of young people and a growing number of adult women enrolling in hockey for the fun and friendship it brings.

It is our goal to run a first class championship and also to leave a legacy for female hockey in Ontario, in Canada and throughout the world. Existing organizations will grow and new programs will begin. Government, corporate and media ties will be strengthened. We sincerely thank the CHA for selecting us as teammates in this venture. By combining the guidance of the CHA, the enthusiasm and abilities of the City of Kitchener and the experience and dedication of OWHA members, we have the ingredients for a great championship team. Volunteers are welcome!

REGIONAL ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES COMMITTEE REPORT

This committee consisted of the OWHA President, Executive Director, Registrar and the Regional Directors along with the volunteers, Charlene Zyma, Al Dawson, John Summerhill, Georgina Rayner, Maxine Russell, Sharron George, Doreen Howes, Gayle Parks and Sue Gibson.

Meetings were held in February and March in Toronto. Our first priority was to get the Regions realigned to meet the rapid growth in women's hockey. At the AGM in 1994 we were to come back this year with new boundaries. I feel the committee has done an excellent job with zones and placing them in Regions. We then moved on to the Regional Directors' responsibilities.

Suzanne Essex will be the speaker on the budget for zone reps. This committee will meet in late summer to explore the avenues for Provincial Playdowns and Provincials.

Sixty-five tournaments were sanctioned during the 1994-95 hockey season. This was a ten per cent increase from last year.

The Tournament handbook has provided a framework which outlines the responsibilities and rules to be followed when hosting an OWHA Sanctioned Tournament.

Next year the focus will be on a more consistent enforcement of the consequences when rules are not followed.



Special thanks also to Mel Stevens, Manager of the Teen Ranch, for making their fine facilities available to us on short notice. We would also like to thank the HDCO and Ministry of Culture Tourism & Recreation for the level of funding which enabled us to conduct a successful program of this magnitude.

REFEREE COMMITTEE REPORT

Your Referee Committee met on a regular basis from August on during the entire hockey season with meetings scheduled the second Tuesday of every month. They dealt with all areas of concern relative to referees, the officiating of games, and recommendation of our officials for national and international assignments. The committee membership this year was made up of Ivan Locke, Melanie McFarlane, Doug Nicholls and Fran Rider.

The committee this year started off the season by scheduling seven referee clinics five of which were double clinics with both a junior (level I & II) and a senior (level III & IV) clinics running the same day. We have seen a very dramatic 45% increase in our referee registration this year in our program with many of our young players from local associations becoming interested in officiating. We have reviewed and updated our five year plan for the development and expansion of our referees program which includes both supervision and instruction, upgrading of all of our officials at all levels to ensure continued growth in our program and recognition at all levels including both National and International. We are extremely proud to report that we had 4 officials (Laurie Taylor-Bolton, Sue Cassidy, Gale Ellis, Jill Finlin) selected to take part in the Canada Winter Games, 6 officials (Marina Zenk, Sharon Watts, Deb Maybury, Deb Hands, Sue Cassidy, Chantel Champagne) selected to the Esso Senior Nationals, and 1 official (Marina Zenk) selected to officiate in the Pacific Rim, an international event.

During this season, the referees committee has reviewed all concerns which have been expressed by members of the OWHA relative to officiating some of which are still ongoing. We have also scheduled referees for the Senior AA Provincials, the Ontario Winter Games, both the Junior Provincials in Mississauga and Senior Provincials in Durham West (Pickering/Ajax) and, at the request of the CHA, for international exhibition games.

As mentioned above, our program is being well recognized by the CHA receiving both national and international assignments. Also mentioned above, we are seeing outstanding growth with a membership this year of approximately 300, but we realize there is a long way to go and with your help we can only improve and become better.

DISCIPLINE REPORT

We had hoped to see a decline in discipline matters with the directive from the OWHA being good sportsmanship and fair play but unfortunately this was not the case. We have received the reports from two Regional Directors and once the balance of reports are in, we hope we can address the main areas of concern in the upcoming season.

Our Central West Regional Director reported the following:

- 18 Verbal Abuse calls to coaches (from Novice on up)
- 7 Verbal Abuse
- 5 2 minutes for hit from behind
- 3 5 minutes for hit from behind
- 2 5 minutes for high sticking
- 2 Intent to injure
- 1 5 minutes for roughing
- 1 3rd player in fight
- 1 Peacekeeping

Our Central East Regional Director reported the following:

- 1 player received 6 games for 3rd player in
- 4 players received 4 games for fighting
- 1 player received 4 games for kicking
- 1 player received 3 games for verbal abuse

The Junior Provincials and Ontario Winter Games saw only one major discipline problem in each while the Senior Provincials saw many incidents that had to be dealt with. On the positive side, there were many Penalty Free Games at Provincials this year.

Your input would be greatly appreciated as to how we can further promote the idea of extremely competitive hockey without having the numerous discipline problems. The objective of the OWHA is to encourage all ladies to play the game, not sit them out.
