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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

"AERODYNAMICALLY, THE BUMBLE BEE SHOULDN'T BE ABLE TO FLY, BUT THE BUMBLE BEE DOESN'T KNOW IT SO IT GOES ON FLYING ANYWAY."

Twenty short years ago, when the Ontario Women's Hockey Association was formed, we would have fit the "bumble bee" example. Society viewed female hockey as something that shouldn't or couldn't be(e). Fortunately, our participants and volunteers focused only on their love of the game. Therefore; we have not only flown - we have soared.

Today, we are moving into a new phase in female hockey. The success of high performance programs resulted in acceptance into the 1998 Winter Olympics. This has given our game tremendously enhanced credibility throughout the world and has had a very positive impact on grass roots growth and development.

Now, it is our responsibility to ensure the future direction remains positive and the game is kept in perspective. The first document we should reference is the OWHA values - the second document is the Constitution, Bylaws, Regulations and Rules.

There is definitely an important business aspect to our game that requires attention. However, it is not enough to have balanced books and impressive statistics. At the end of a season, our most important measure of success comes from the feelings of our players. Have they had fun? Have they made new friends? Have they learned positive life skills? Will they look back at the season - first, reflecting on the fun and secondly reflecting on the scores? Will the adults do the same?

As we look at the provincial picture this year, we are pleased to see many positives. The growth continues at an incredible pace with many new players enjoying the game. There are countless examples of teams, leagues and associations helping each other. The atmosphere at the provincial championships was very upbeat. Many talented teams won championships with many others demonstrating success through their ability to turn the loss of a game into a winning situation. This has also been evident within many competitive leagues and house leagues.

It is important to note some issues and concerns - with the objective of identifying and correcting for the future. We have seen several excellent associations struggling with internal conflict. Some adults are experiencing difficulty resolving differences and moving ahead for the players. Good people appear to be acting in bad ways. We must find ways to identify issues, discuss details, come up with a majority position and move forward together in support of that position. We urge leagues and associations to take time to establish effective communication systems and to sit down on a regular basis to weigh individual concerns with the good of the majority. A team sport requires a united team effort.

As our game gains credibility, we are experiencing external challenges. Before, no one wanted anything to do with female hockey. Now, many "for-profit" businesses and individuals are interested in making money in our "not-for-profit" association. Certainly, there is value in partnerships, but not at the expense of existing programmes.

The insurance issue is always present. In today's society, it may be tough to find the dollars, but we cannot afford to be without insurance. The fear of the liability concerns turned into a reality this season as one of our coaches was served personally with a one million dollar law suit. It is alleged that, at a novice practice, the coach was being assisted by an adult who was running drills in one end of the ice. A player crossed into that end of the ice and collided with the adult assistant who suffered a broken ankle requiring surgery. Copies of the suit, with the names deleted, are available on request.

Two words are often repeated in hockey circles - "risk management". It is important that everyone is aware of risk management. From a safety perspective, players, team staff and volunteers need to take precautions for their own safety and for the safety of others. From a financial standpoint, it is important to have competent budgeting and accounting controls. It is recommended that individual leagues and associations incorporate and also carry directors and officers liability insurance coverage. A presentation will be made at this year's AGM.

Two other important words are "communication" and "responsibility". As our game grows, more and more people are required to assist in the operations. It is important that everyone clearly understands their own role, takes responsibility for the job and is given support in doing the work. Ongoing communication can be a major factor in ensuring a positive outcome. Many issues that develop into major problems simply start as a communication break down.

Centrally, the OWHA is taking steps to address ways of increasing the frequency and effectiveness of communication within all areas of operations. The identification of responsible communication officers in each association combined with effective administration maximizing modern technology will move us ahead in a unified fashion. It is important that communication flows all ways on a regular basis. This is the only way we can help each other provide the best possible environment for the players in Ontario.

We would like to sincerely congratulate the many individuals throughout the Ontario Women's Hockey Association who regularly give so much of themselves for the sake of others. Today's society is tough and fast paced. Sometimes, we see a lot of negatives in a "me" society. Our network is special and has been built on a "we" philosophy. Please take time to reflect on the many, many positive aspects of our game. Also, take time to feel good about your contribution. You do deserve enjoyment from the game as, together, we have experienced a lot of success.

At this year's annual meeting, and throughout the coming season, please consider taking the time to consciously think of something good in every team and in everyone you meet. The opposition today may be your teammate tomorrow. Tell the people you meet the good you see. It is a proven fact that our players perform much better and enjoy the game far more when they hear positive reinforcement. Volunteers can do the same!

Sincere thanks to everyone on a great season. Best wishes for a happy, healthy, snow-free summer!

Some of our brothers from minor hockey throughout Canada have a tough time comprehending why and how female hockey exists, survives and thrives independently in Ontario. Even though we still face some resistance within Ontario the majority are open minded and proud of the Ontario Women's Hockey Association and its dedicated players & volunteers.

The CHA Female Council sessions at the CHA AGM were interesting and it was a great opportunity to meet provincial representatives who are enthusiastic, dedicated and love the sport of female hockey. This group must be commended as they continue to fight for their existence.

To all OWHA members who have family and friends living in other provinces, let's spread the word! Please encourage them to pursue opportunities for female hockey in their area of Canada. Please insist that they **"please don't take no for an answer"** when someone tries to shut the doors.

OWHA DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

The OWHA development programme continues to expand consistent with the growth of the sport. Many thanks to all associations and clinic coordinators who assisted in providing the OWHA membership with certification clinics in 1995-96. It is very encouraging to see many associations creating the position of Director of Development on their local board of directors. Our players will be the beneficiaries of such a concentrated effort towards the training of coaches, trainers and referees at the local level.

INITIATIVES

OWHA Initiative Meetings are held in communities wishing to start up a female hockey program and The meeting is effective way to gauge local interest and drum up the much needed volunteers. In some cases meetings have been held in communities identified by the OWHA as having the potential to develop a local program.

An Initiative Meeting was held in Bobcaygeon on a Sunday afternoon in the middle of last August. Eighteen girls and women attended and through enthusiastic local support two teams registered for the 1995-96 season.

The long awaited tour of Northern Ontario was finally realized in 1995. An extensive promotional tour through northwestern Ontario took place last August. Stops included Marathon, Thunder Bay, Fort Frances, Dryden and Kenora/Keewatin.

In Marathon, we combined an on-ice session with a registration night for girls and women. We also joined Thunder Bay for a registration evening. Plans for Thunder Bay included a coach clinic and on-ice sessions which were to occur at the conclusion of the tour. Due to unfortunate circumstances these were postponed. Plans are still in the works for on-ice sessions and coach development this summer and the coming season.

In Fort Frances we held an Initiative Meeting where approximately 20 people attended on a rainy Friday evening. The meeting took place in the wonderful atmosphere of a classic old arena lobby. The next stop was Dryden where we held both an Initiative Meeting and on-ice session. Over 35 people attended the meeting on a beautiful sunny Saturday afternoon. They asked many questions and were excited about the opportunity to become involved in girls hockey "sooner rather than later". A dozen girls took part in the on-ice session.

The final stop on the tour was Kenora/Keewatin, where the local girls hockey association was entering its second season. Plans included on-ice sessions, coaches chalk talk and a hot stove session where parents and players were invited to ask questions about female hockey in Ontario. Lisa Backman assisted with the on-ice sessions. Lisa hails from Thunder Bay and was a member of our 1995 Canada Winter Games gold medal Team Ontario. Lisa did a fantastic job and gave the young girls an opportunity to witness the high level of skill they can aspire to through dedication and practice.

When the tour was in its planning stages we offered an open invitation for any Canadian National Team player, past or present to join us in promoting our great game. We received immediate, enthusiastic response from Brenda Richard Kuan-Veng. Brenda had been solid on defence for our 1990 Women's World Championship team and had since retired from the elite game to marry and raise a family. What an excellent role model to help demonstrate the sport of women's hockey while keeping the game in perspective. Tragically Brenda fell ill while in Kenora and passed away two days later in Winnipeg. Her passing shocked the OWHA hockey family. Sincerest appreciation to everyone for the kindness and support shown to Brenda's family, her husband Alex and son Scott.

To Rick, Tara and Ryan McFarlane many thanks for all your help on the trip. It couldn't have happened without your patience and support. We met many wonderful new friends on our northern adventure and isn't that what hockey is all about!

To the many enthusiastic players, parents and volunteers who have responded to the challenge to develop the sport in Bobcaygeon and Northwestern Ontario, best wishes for continued success and FUN!!



SECOND VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

SANCTIONED TOURNAMENTS

Seventy-five (75) tournaments were sanctioned during the 1995/96 season which is a fifteen percent (15%) increase over last year. A more consistent enforcement of rules that were not being followed resulted in fines being handed out to some organizations. The new Tournament Manual brought positive feedback from tournament convenors and it will be upgraded for the 1996/97 season. In all, 82 manuals were mailed out to OWHA organizations.

CATEGORIZING

Fifty-eight (58) teams were re-categorized either up or down during the 1995/96 season. This was the first year that teams were required to hand in a report card on their own team which was a great asset at the re-categorizing meeting in January. This was also the first year that every competitive team in Ontario was discussed by the members of the Committee.

REQUEST FOR SANCTION

Approximately 250 sanctions were issued to OWHA teams. Eighty percent (80%) were issued to compete against male teams and twenty percent (20%) were for tournaments and games out of the Country. It is important to note that the CHA insurance is only valid when playing sanctioned games against other teams that are under the IIHF. Special approval is required to play all non-OWHA teams.

In closing, I would like to thank all the volunteers who make female hockey possible and especially the rest of the OWHA Executive. Have a safe and pleasant summer!

REGISTRATION REPORT

The OWHA again experienced impressive growth in both the number of Registered teams and the number of participants in the 95/96 hockey season. The number of teams increased from 693 to 854 and the number of participants increased from 9,626 to 12,296. The total number of registered participants increased from 11,824 to 14, 887. Impressive overall growth rates of 23% in the number of teams and 28% in the number of players attest to the growing popularity of Women's Hockey in Ontario.

As you review the registration statistics, you will note the increase in house league registration. There were 2,023 more players playing at this level this season. Growth occurred in all regions of the Province in both urban and rural areas. This is particularly gratifying as it speaks well for the future of Women's Hockey at the grass roots level in Ontario.

The registration process was completed in an orderly fashion in the fall. Team and player information was submitted generally complete and on time. We thank you for your prompt replies to our requests for further information. Our growth in numbers alone complicated the task of processing and completing registration on a timely basis. We experienced further delays in converting to a new CHA data base, programming and debugging problems delayed the start of data input until the month of March. Our objective is to have printed lists for all of this year's teams to be part of the registration package in the fall.

The 95/96 season was a year of transition and change in the registration process and we wish to thank everyone for their patience and cooperation. A thank you to Steve Benoit, who volunteered his time and worked with Ken Buna of the CHA and supervised the conversion of the data base. Thanks also to Kathy Dyer and others who are handling data entry. A final thank you for our executive members for their cooperation and teamwork to ensure an orderly function, in what certainly was, a busy year in registration.


The region is proud to be hosting a satellite game for the Women's World Championship in 1997. We hope everyone will come out to watch the skills and have some fun.

HOCKEY DEVELOPMENT CENTRE FOR ONTARIO

The HDCO is the agency which administers government funding for hockey in the Province of Ontario. The OWHA together with representatives from male hockey sit on its Board of Directors. Needless to say, the political climate in Ontario has resulted in a year of difficulty and uncertainty. The OWHA experienced a 50% reduction in the level of its funding for project funding during the current season. We have also been advised that support for development personnel salaries are to be discontinued effective April 1, 1996. HDCO has not been informed at what level future sport funding will continue. The HDCO Board of Directors is concerned by the present status and is committed to maximizing the amount of such funding for development purposes. The role of the HDCO is presently being evaluated. However, it is clear that hockey, like all other sports faces substantial funding reductions.

The HDCO administers the trainers and risk management programs in Ontario. Our thanks to John Panethere for his assistance with facility problems we experienced this year. Injury data analysis is also an important risk management function. Our thanks to our teams for their injury data input.

The HDCO publishes the *Ice Times*, a report on amateur hockey in Ontario which is printed twice a year. We commend its staff for the quality of this publication and the coverage afforded Women's Hockey.

HDCO again conducted the Penalty Free Sweepstakes, the major sponsor of the program again this year was the Ontario Milk Marketing Board. Many of our teams participated and we were well represented in the list of prize winners. Our own Margot Page and ex-Leaf, Paul Henderson, were again spokespersons for the program and do an excellent job of promoting and encouraging good sportsmanship. Congratulations to all teams who qualified and entered the contest.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

In the Winter Newsletter, a request was made to forward names of coaches, managers and/or teams who consistently demonstrate fair play and good sportsmanship. We must all work together to ensure that female hockey is as respected now as it was in the past and, as noted in the Winter Newsletter Editorial, "Strict compliance with the recently published CHA 'Fair Play Codes'" of conduct would do much to restore the unblemished past reputation of exciting, fast-paced and aggressive, yet non-violent, female hockey.

We are in the process of compiling data regarding discipline from across the Province and a copy of this report will be available at the General Meeting.

CATEGORIZING / PROVINCIAL COMMITTEE

An amendment was put forward at last year's Annual General Meeting dealing with a new format for Provincial playdowns, but unfortunately nobody was in attendance to explain the rationale. The amendment did bring forward concerns about categorizing, playdowns and provincials and the membership requested that a committee be formed to deal with the issues and the amendment was put over to the General Meeting. Every member who put their name forward was contacted and asked to be part of the committee. At the General Meeting, again no one was in attendance to speak to the amendment and the membership gave the committee the task to look at, not just the amendment, but the whole Constitution dealing with these issues. At that time, a request was made to all members in attendance at the General Meeting to forward any of their ideas, solutions, etc., to the committee. A further request was made to the membership in the Winter Newsletter.

After some thought, fourteen members committed to being part of the committee but once the hockey season was in full swing, some felt they were unable to fulfill their obligation and withdrew. The committee continued with a very dedicated group of eight, together with the Regional Directors who offered their input regarding what presently was working and what wasn't working. After the General Meeting, the committee met on October 28th, December 9th, January 13th, March 9th, March 24th and May 11th, with each meeting lasting four to five hours. The committee looked at the amendment, what was presently in place and at three letters that were received. Conclusions were reached after many hours were spent discussing all aspects of categorizing, playdowns and provincials and what the committee felt was in the best interests for the Province as a whole. Consistency across the Province was felt to be the key and with the assistance of each and every member of the OWHA, this will happen and the OWHA will flourish in a positive atmosphere.

As the Chair of the Committee, I would like to thank each and every member of the committee, with a special thank you to Cathy Lehman as our Secretary, for all the input and time you have contributed to the difficult task that was given to you and I look forward to working with each of you again this year as we initiate, test and examine the amendments that are accepted by the membership and as we continue the pursuit of implementing a policy manual for same. - Summer Hockey The following motion carried: "That the CHA and its branches expand its
 influence to include summer hockey activities." To implement this motion, various committees
 are investigating options and will report to the CHA councils. The Board will establish a small
 committee to report on demand and the best way to meet demand. The Officers would place
 before the 1996-97 CHA Semi-Annual Meeting an action plan for the 1997 summer season.
- The National data base program is in place in most provinces. Many have not switched over due to various implementation problems. The OWHA experienced difficulties with conversion by the developer and subsequent bugs in the system. Our existing database was one of the largest in the countries. We encountered various bugs that had not been detected when working with smaller programs. Many of the bugs have been worked out, but, as with any new program, improvements are still required. The program is excellent and will prove to be a very valuable tool thanks to the hard work of Ken Buna and Steve Benoit.
- The top 30 players received Sport Canada carding last October based on evaluations carried out during the 1995/96 season.
- Clare Drake is a mentor coach for the coaching pool of Shannon Miller, Melody Davidson, Karen Hughes, Julie Healey and Danielle Sauvengeau.
- Under 18 National Championship Summerside, PEI March 21 23, 1997.
- Esso 1997 Women's National Championship has been moved from Alberta due to a conflict with Briar. To be in British Columbia - March 6 - 9, 1997
- Esso 1998 Senior Women's National Championship awarded to Calgary, Alberta.
- Esso 1999 Senior Women's National Championship awarded to OWHA in Thunder Bay.
- The 1999 Canada Games (Corner Brook, Newfoundland) Technical Package is under review.
- A body checking/body contact video has been completed and must be shown before all major national female events.
- The female hockey supplement will be a mandatory component of all Coach Level Clinics.
- CHA budget is now close to \$10 million, but the Association is struggling.
- The ages are under review with reports available on request. Status quo is expected for at least the next 2 seasons.
- Royal Bank Canadian Hockey week will be January 18 25, 1997.

IN-LINE HOCKEY

In-line hockey, as a result of the popularity and unparalleled growth of in-line skating in the '90's, is the fastest growing team sport in North America generally, and in Canada more specifically. All relevant demographic and social indicators point to the fact that in-line hockey will be the team sport of choice for boys and girls, as well as men and women in the year 2000 and beyond.

Some points:

- presently over 20 million in-line skaters in North America, over 2 million in Canada.
- of the above, over 3.5 million played some form of in-line hockey last year with 50% playing for the first time. The number is expected to reach 7.5 million by the end of this year.
- In Canada, more than 50% of present in-line hockey players are coming from non-ice hockey backgrounds. The sport is experiencing growth within a broader, more ethnically diverse grass roots setting than traditional ice hockey, with a demographic mix reflecting a male/female ratio and a wider array of participating age groups. The majority (80% or so) in Canada are within the 7 to 18 year old age group.
- The International Ice Hockey Federation, having witnessed the growth within its 51 member nations, held a seminar in November 1995. On May 3, 1996, the IIHF declared itself the World Wide Representative governing body for in-line hockey, owning and operating all international commercial rights. The IIHF council agreed to establish in-line as a separate and distinct division within its own statutes, bylaws and regulations. The IIHF is organizing the inaugural in-line World Championships in August 1996.
- The International Olympic Committee is taking a wait and see approach. It has nevertheless clearly indicated that if the sport continues to grow at the rate it has, it will become a full fledged Olympic sport in either the summer games of the year 2000 or 2004. A 4 team demonstration is envisioned in the 1998 Olympics. If all goes well, Canada could be sending a men's and potentially a women's in-line hockey team to upcoming summer Olympic Games.
- The CHA has made a decision to get involved. Mark Bandrauk has been hired and a national committee is in place. The main issues include insurance and an analysis of the main groups (many of whom do not get along) operating in-line leagues in Canada.
- The CHA committee has prepared a mission statement and objectives. Other areas discussed include:
- > Short-term approach to specific elements of its projected in-line hockey programme.
- > 1996 !IHF in-line hockey championships.
- Status of sponsorship
- Potential structure and approach at the branch level
- Registration process for in-line hockey
- Insurance considerations
- Playing rules and regulations
- > Approach in dealing with various existing in-line hockey organizations in Canada
- Coaching programmes
- Refereeing programmes
- Regional and National Championships
- > Skill clinics and in-line hockey festivals
- > CHA In-Line Hockey newsletter, magazine and resource hotline
- Facilities
- CHA long-term approach with regard to In-Line Hockey

The CHA has concluded that the near perfect fit between in-line hockey and ice hockey, combined with CHA's proven organizational experience will make this the program of choice for the Canadian in-line hockey player/participant.

The OWHA plans to set up an ad hoc committee to investigate options regarding in-line hockey.

HOCKEY HALL OF FAME/ CANADIAN HOCKEY CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

Our strong relationship with the Hockey Hall of Fame and the Canadian Hockey Centre of Excellence continued in the 1995-96 season. For a change of pace the OWHA opted to coordinate a couple of events throughout the season rather than the traditional end of summer "OWHA Week".

Working together with the CHCE the Ontario Women's Hockey Association proudly showcased our sport at various events during Royal Bank Canadian Hockey Week, January 20-27,1996.

The highlight of the week was the opportunity for six OWHA players to demonstrate their skills to the Maple Leaf Gardens crowd between the first and second periods of the Leafs vs. Black Hawks game. The majority of the fans remained in their seats to watch the players who ranged in age from 9 to 70+ display their skills. It was a fun-filled evening for everyone that began with a reception sponsored by the Royal Bank at the Hockey Hall of Fame.

The thrilled players included Heather Lane, London Devilettes (Novice), Lindsay Gowan, Barrie Sharks (Peewee) and Tanya Witty, Stouffville (Midget). Representing the 1995 Canada Winter Games, gold medal winning, Team Ontario was assistant captain Corinne Hustler from Cobourg.

OWHA Northern Regional Director Wayne Barrie joined with the Thunder Bay Amateur Hockey Association executive in a special ceremony prior to a Thunder Bay Flyers hockey game to recognize Royal Bank Canadian Hockey Week.

The week concluded with a workshop at the Hockey Hall of Fame where participants answered questionnaires on several aspects of hockey including the coaching, referee, trainers, Initiation Program and female programs. The evening also included a tour of the Hockey Hall of Fame.

Many thanks to the players, parents, coaches and administrators who helped celebrate Royal Bank Canadian Hockey Week. Thank you also to the Canadian Hockey Centre of Excellence for involving the OWHA in the week's events. Extra special thanks to the Toronto Maple Leafs and the Niagara Falls Thunder for the opportunity to showcase our talented players.

The CHCE and the OWHA also worked together to host OWHA Hockey Day (March 9) at the Hockey Hall of Fame. The day's events included an excellent presentation by John Panethere, HDCO Safety & Research Coordinator, on the "Importance Of The Coach." Participants toured the museum, enjoyed dinner then travelled to Maple Leaf Gardens to take in the Toronto Maple Leaf vs Calgary Flames game.

The season concluded with a tour of the Hall of Fame by the original Stratford Aces ladies hockey team from the 1930's. The modern day Stratford Girls Hockey Association surprised their local pioneers with the tour announcement at their year end banquet. The past and present day players and administrators were greeted at the HHOF by Brian McFarlane, hockey historian & author of Proud Past, Bright Future, 100 Years of Canadian Women's Hockey. It was a memorable day for all involved.

MARKETING REPORT

During the last five months I have been working with the Board members on the development of our first officially recognized OWHA title sponsor - Revlon. The Revlon negotiations were initiated by the OWHA, but we are currently working through the CHA. We hope to make a formal announcement at the AGM.

I have also been meeting with Choice Hotel hoping to have them become the official hotel of female hockey in Ontario. Again, we hope to make a formal announcement at the AGM.

In February, we updated the sponsorship/information package that will be used to obtain corporate involvement with female hockey. In the off-season we hope to turn this package into a document that all regions can utilize for its sponsorship/partnership activities.

I have been spending a considerable amount of time with the 1997 Worlds marketing and sponsorship committees. We helped develop the sponsorship package and it is our intention to encourage several major sponsors to continue their involvement in female hockey with the OWHA once the 1997 Worlds have been completed.

We are also hoping to use the continuation of a proposed Legacy Event at the Worlds as an annual fundraiser for female hockey in Ontario.

Lastly, we hope to offer a marketing and revenue generating workshop to OWHA regions sometime during next season.


