



Executive Director's Report

Celebrating the championship of more than a century of female hockey.

Honouring those many women whose desire to participate,
their commitment to excellence and
their recognition of the Values of Integrity and Teamwork
enabled us all to share in the success of our Olympic Champions.
Thank you one and all!

Depending on our age, we all remember where we were and what we were doing on the day of two historic events – the assassination of John F. Kennedy and the Team Canada victory in 1972.

This year, we have seen two similar life experiences. We will all remember that tragic day in September – it has changed the world and leaves us with pain and compassion for those who lost so much. Also, we will remember that evening when we watched, along with six million viewers world-wide, when Team Canada rebounded from 8 straight losses to capture the gold medals in an exciting game against the very powerful USA.

Sports have an amazing impact on people. This report and the records of every team and player tell a very clear story and leave a factual message. Far more important are the life skills learned, the self-esteem gained and the special friendships made. These are those "immeasurable measures" of every game and season that stay with us forever.

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association is a very special team. Since our formation in 1975, we have achieved incredible success. We have worked together, cared about each other, turned hardship into opportunity and have had a world-wide impact on the game of hockey.

We have formed teams, associations and leagues with positive Values at the forefront. Our prime objective has been creating an opportunity for every girl and woman in Ontario to play the game of hockey. A second major objective has been a focus on excellence, successfully striving for provincial championships, national championships, world championships and the Olympic dream.

Our success is recognized throughout the world. The Ontario Women's Hockey Association is a world leader due to the strength of a very capable and caring membership. We have always faced challenges. We have stood up to these challenges and turned them into opportunities.

We have been inspired by the exceptional letters of support we have received. Many times we are asked how female hockey is unique – we all know it is – we all know it takes a special focus and a full commitment if it is to succeed. It is often difficult to put into words what we all understand so very clearly.

There are differences on the ice. There is different equipment. There are different programmes and opportunities. There are different reasons for playing the game. However, the biggest difference is the "immeasurable" that those letters speak. It is a past full of turning a defeat into victory. It is those everyday victories that give little girls and adult women those opportunities they so dearly deserve. We thank you all for your work and share some of these inspirations with you. This is your report and your association. It is an honour and a privilege for each and every one of us to be a part of this exceptional team!

Please enjoy these comments from our friends and our teammates - they are an inspiration:

I referee female hockey and have been doing so for 18 years.....I started out as an inexperienced referee and reached the pinnacle of my career as a linesman at the Winter Olympic Games. This would not have been made possible were it not for the programs in place within the OWHA.

The OWHA has worked very, very hard to build an organization for girls. They are the voice for girls hockey within the province. They unify the girls leagues within the province and through governing of tournaments and provincial championships give a venue to girls to exhibit their talents as hockey players.

Our sport is growing at a phenomenal pace and the OWHA represents us with 100% focus on female hockey development and vision for the future....We (local girls teams & associations in Ontario) are strong together. We have the same vision. And we have 100% dedication to female hockey.

There is no association anymore dedicated to the personal development of young hockey players as athletes and as responsible human beings than the Ontario Women's Hockey Association.

For so many years, the OWHA was doing what needed to be done at a time when few people recognized the value of females in sport....the fact the OWHA is responsible for the participation of over 50% of females playing hockey (in Canada) is such a huge success story. You have so much to be proud of.

When I turned 45, I was invited to a game and had the time of my life. I have been playing ever since. I feel terrific playing Canada's game, and although no one on the National team has to worry about me taking her place, I am thrilled that there is a league for adult women that has welcomed me, taught me skills, and given me so much fun.

The OWHA is an important part of the sport landscape. The growth of female hockey would never have happened if the OWHA hadn't existed.

The OWHA has done an exceptional job of developing women's hockey over the last 27 years.....Having an organization like OWHA giving full attention to the needs of females only has made us a better hockey nation....

I have watched the doors slowly get pushed open and the walls come down so that women have the right to play hockey...... have also watched the growth of players and interest in the sport of women's hockey......This happened with the determination of every young girl and woman who would not let the beliefs of society tell us we shouldn't or couldn't.

We set out to make it better by giving 100% focus on building the best possible female hockey experience possible. We did.better promotion of girls hockey, more aggressive ice purchasing practices and a stronger partnership with Town parks and recreation would help us to increase enrolment from 139 in 1995 to more than 600 girls playing hockey by 2000. We did.

Girls Hockey is girls hockey...and vive la difference!

Female Hockey in Ontario continues to thrive due in part to its uniqueness, its innocence, its popularity at the grass roots level and its thousands of volunteers who have worked tirelessly over the past twenty-five years to make the female game what it is today.

...female hockey under the OWHA is the most significant hockey growth area in the country. The OWHA is the model for female Hockey in this country...

...the success of the OWHA in running a program for girls hockey that is the envy of all those throughout the world who want to grow the game, and promote its excellence.

The OWHA cares for each and every member of the association whether you are "AA" or house league. The grass roots players who are registered with the OWHA develop hockey skills plus learn respect of all opposing players, officials and spectators.

The OWHA program is unique in Canada. It is the only stand-alone girls organization in the country. It also happens to be the most successful for providing a fun, rewarding recreational experience for our kids.

The OWHA was responsible for nurturing the development of women's hockey from its inception to the status and numbers it is today. The OWHA has done this through dedication to the sport, embracing strategic visions, maintaining the flexibility to adapt through growth in numbers and popularity while at the same time keeping its responsiveness to its members. The positive influence that this body had on women's hockey is not only felt in Ontario but also in Canada and the rest of the world. Without the OWHA, the level and popularity of women's hockey will not be what it is today.

Nowhere else in North America is there anything like the OWHA regional playdown and provincial championship process. OWHA development programs with OWHA instructors allow female hockey volunteers to learn from people experienced with female hockey, and to network with other female hockey volunteers.

OWHA registration and rules are flexible and fair for small organizations in areas where few female teams exist, as well as for organizations in highly populated areas.

My daughter played competitive hockey, Atom "A", this year. She has continued to learn, and been treated in a very fair and equitable way. Along with her teammates she has developed tremendous skills, self-esteem and a love of a sport she will be able to play for the rest of her life. She has learned to win and to lose with grace, and to play for the enjoyment of the game.

....the OWHA Provincials is an excellent way of giving girls of all calibres a chance to participate in a provincial championship.....hockey is about participating.

By living in northern Ontario, we are all aware and experience massive conditions in which we have to run our hockey programs under (egs. Distances between communities, winter conditions on our northern highways, small registrations in small communities......But as we stand together in all the diversity we still make it HAPPEN and without the support of OWHA our GIRLS OF THE NORTH would never have experienced or had the opportunity to compete in the PROVINCIALS or to drop the puck at the WOMEN'S WORLDS!......

Geographically, the distance that divides us is enormous, but you cannot make distances between us affect the growth of our unique togetherness as one. At the "stage in the game" there is no looking back because the future of girls hockey will be phenomenal.....

The OWHA provides consistent guidance and direction to its member organizations, while sharing its rich history, a history that provide today's young female athletes a clear line of sight from the arenas of Ontario to the Olympic ice pad.

The OWHA is a leader and a model for the world not simply because it exists but because it is so successful.

I am a second year coach of a girls hockey team in Ontario. It has been a very rewarding experience being involved with the girls league....They play with a lot of heart, concentration and camaraderie during the game and have fun together, after the game. Encouraging these girls to reach new heights is very rewarding.

Last weekend we were involved in the Provincial Championships, with 24 ice pads, and over 5,000 girls. Needless to say, it was an awesome event. The hockey was great and the people were too.

I envy the young girls of today and the opportunities they have to play this great sport and develop their skills. The teams are there. The coaching is there. The competition is there. Most of all the FUN is there. The opportunities increase every year. How I wish I was 5 again!

They say the atmosphere is very different from boys, being much more positive, supportive and fun. They also note that the level of competition is excellent, dispelling the myth that girls hockey is not as good. Let's face it girls are different, not better or worse just different.

I am thrilled and awed at the number of girls now playing from house league to AA, and the skill and dedication they exhibit.

My daughter was involved in the Championship Weekend and it was an absolute blast. Hockey at its finest....all the girls are winners for having played this wonderful game and being part of this amazing organization.

I am 47, and have played in a women's league for 2 years. We have something undeniably different in the way we play and what we get from the game.

I have three daughters all of whom started playing hockey when they were 5-6 years old. The oldest is now 17 and all of them continue to play and have a passion for the sport.

It was a great day when the inception of the OWHA was formed. A body of individuals with high standards for the female game.....It is a different game, and the OWHA has the best interest of all female players and officials.

If it wasn't for the OWHA support, women's hockey would not be where it is today.....The success and popularity of women's hockey today is because the OWHA exists. They will always have our best interests in mind.

I wanted to write a note of support for the OWHA......a vibrant organization administering and supporting girls and women's hockey.

This governing body has spearheaded the organization and development of the game of hockey for women of all ages across Ontario and they are not only wanted they are needed to continue the development of our game.

.....Through concentrated efforts of the OWHA, women's hockey has grown from about 30 teams when we were children to its current level where participation has surpassed 1700 teams and over 25,000 players.....and a National Team program. Women of our age would never believed it possible when we were kids playing that the game would have grown to the level and organization that it has. An awesome accomplishment to think that many of my teammates girls (and believe me we have enough among us to create our own farm team) can actually dream of playing on the national Women's Hockey Team and the dream of playing in the Olympics!!!!!!! Everything that is Girls hockey has been made possible by the OWHA.....





Congratulations to all members of the Ontario Women's Hockey Association on another season of phenomenal growth. Membership in the OWHA increased by 128 teams and 1,807 players in the 2001-2002 season. The growth can be directly attributed to the dedication of the OWHA membership towards promoting the game in their local communities combined with the incredible enthusiasm of the players. All female hockey administrators are now in the planning stages for the upcoming post-Olympic season, readying themselves to capitalize on the great interest generated Canadian Women's Olympic gold medal.

OWHA GROWTH CHART (Players/Year)



NEW MEMBERSHIP

Seventeen new teams or associations have been approved over the 2001-2002 and none were denied.

All new teams and associations are reviewed once they pass their one (1) year probation and if necessary, a further one (1) year probation will be issued. This allows the committee to take another look at them, offer assistance if needed and help create a positive atmosphere for the girls.

Every area has their own unique environment. House League hockey is strong in the larger cities; there may be a ratio of 3 House League teams to every 1 competitive or Rep team. Other areas have one or two house league teams who play other house league teams in the area on each other's ice.

One thing we've learned is the girls want to play female hockey regardless of the structure because it is fun! We're also experiencing a competitive edge, as girls want to get the most out of their hockey including the many opportunities now available to them that weren't before.

Thank you to those who contribute input when asked about a new team or group in their area. Without your input it would be impossible to know the impact of a new entry.

FEEDBACK ON THE 5-OUNCE LIGHTWEIGHT PUCK



- Throughout the year, we encouraged teams to try the lightweight puck
- Our initial feedback indicated that teams were reluctant to try the pucks with one reason being the cost.
- The OWHA purchased pucks for each member of the board of directors to carry and loan to teams
- We continued to have trouble persuading anyone to try the pucks. The general response we faced was, in fact, quite negative. Most people found the idea quite offensive.
- In another attempt to secure input, we circulated a questionnaire at the provincial championship.

Conclusion – Lightweight Puck

- The majority of OWHA members found the concept offensive
- Our conclusion at this time is that there is little interest in the light weight puck.

SURVEY RESULTS

CANADIAN HOCKEY ASSOCIATION BACKGROUND AND UPDATE Lightweight puck (5 ounce)

Status of Light Weight 5oz Puck Field Study for Women's Hockey

Last season a study was completed under the CHA Young Investigator's Program through the University of Manitoba on the use of lightweight pucks for women's hockey. The study suggested that from three pucks tested: 4.5, 5.0 and 5.5 oz, the 5.0 oz puck be best suited for women's hockey ages 10 and up. As this was only one study conducted, it was an approved recommendation last season that the CHA further investigate the use of a 5 oz puck through field-testing. A market 5 oz puck was developed through the CHA licensee throughout Canada. A comprehensive evaluation form targeted at players, coaches, parents and administrators was developed and included with each shipment of ordered pucks.

To date approximately half a dozen orders have been made and only one set of evaluations has been returned to the CHA. Promotion and delivery problems from the manufacturer have been sited as some problems affecting the field study. As a result, the Research Committee feels that making a recommendation out of only one completed set of evaluations does not suffice for the argument supporting the use or non-use of the lightweight puck in women's hockey. Instead, a recommendation to extend the field study into the 2002-2003 season under the same conditions is suggested. It is the position of the Research Committee that we feel confident that we will receive more survey returns at this time next year in order to better assess the use of the light-weight 5 oz puck.

So far, detailed data has been collected from BCAHA (BC Winter Games Female Program) as well as feedback from the OWHA. The following number of people filled out the survey for each of the different group for the BC Winter Games Program:

That the 5 oz lightweight puck field-testing project be continued into the 2002-2003 season. Conditions that apply are that the 5oz puck will be ordered through the Canadian Hockey Association and purchased by the user. Secondly, an evaluation form must be completed and submitted to the CHA upon completion of the implementation period.

DISCIPLINE REPORT

Summary for the Year

- 1. Of all suspensions checking from behind was called the most with 220 of the 934 suspensions or 24%.
- 2. Abusive Language is the next highest at 12% with 107 suspensions called.
- 3. The Central East Region received the most suspensions with 22% (209 of the 934). The next highest Region is Eastern with 166 or 18% followed closely by the Central Region with 155 or 17%.
- 4. The Bantam level received the most suspensions with 294 out of 934 suspensions or 31%. The next highest level was Midget with 177 and Intermediate with 176 which represents 19% each.
- 5. The level/category with the most suspensions is the Midget AA level which received 77 out of 934 suspensions or 8%. The next highest is the Intermediate AA with 73 and the Bantam AA level with 70. These also represent 8% of all suspensions.
- 6. The Novice level received 8 suspensions, with the Novice A level receiving the most with 4 or 50%.
- 7. The Atom level received 39 suspensions, 13 or 33% of which were at the Atom AA level. The Central Region received the most suspensions at this level with 12 or 31%.
- 8. The Peewee level received 130 suspensions or 19% of all suspensions. The Peewee AA level received 39 of the 130 Peewee suspensions or 30%. The Central East Region received the most number of suspensions at the PW level with 50 of the 130 or 39%.
- 9. In the Bantam category, the suspensions were fairly evenly spread out between both the levels and the regions. The Bantam AA level received the most suspensions with 24% or 70 out of 293 suspensions. The Central East Region has the most suspensions at this level with 71 or 24% of all Bantam suspensions.
- 10. The Midget AA level is the worst offender in the Midget category with 77 out of 177 suspensions or 44%. The Central Region has the highest number of suspensions in this category with 41 or 23%.
- 11. The Intermediate AA level has the most suspensions at this level with 73 out of 176 or 42%. The Western Region leads the way with suspensions at this level with 48 of the 176 or 27%.
- 12. The Senior level received 103 suspensions or 11% of all suspensions. The highest number of suspensions at the Senior level go to the Senior House League with 24% or 25 out of 103 suspensions. The Metro Toronto Region has received the highest number of Senior level suspensions with 24 or 23%.

Comparison of Suspensions to this period last year

There has been an increase of 18% in the number of suspensions handed out this year compared to last year. Last year there were 795 suspensions compared to 934 this year. Significant increases and decreases can be seen in the following areas:

REPORT ON SURVEY

OWHA PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIPS - BANTAM THROUGH SENIOR

A survey was distributed to the teams at the beginning of the Championship. The questions focused on the issues of the "No Centre Red Line" and the "New 5-ounce Lightweight Puck".

The "percentages" and "comments" were collected from 215 surveys that were submitted. The "comments" sections will not have percentages as many did not answer and some provided more than one comment. Please be aware that the choice of words used in the comment portion reflect the comments expressed by the participants.

FEEDBACK ON THE CENTRE RED LINE

- The OWHA competitive teams at the bantam competitive level and higher played the 2001-2002 season without the center red line for offside passes.
- We circulated a questionnaire to the teams at those level who were competing in the provincial championships.

Conclusion - Centre Red Line

- Our conclusion is that the participants prefer playing without the center red line.
- There is a proposal to be discussed at the OWHA AGM to remove the center line from all levels of female hockey in Ontario

Canadian Hockey Association Decision Regarding the Centre Red Line

The red line will be removed for all Esso Women's Nationals and Central Canadian Championship for the 2002-2003 Season.

PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW COMMITTEE

Report to the Ontario Women's Hockey Association Membership and Board of Directors as per direction at the 2001 OWHA AGM.

Thank you to everyone who took time to complete and return the provincial questionnaire. Your comments provided an insight into the opinions and concerns of the membership. It is important to note that these questionnaires served as a reference guide as some areas and divisions differed in numbers and opinions.

Participation, excellence and regional representation are the cornerstones upon which the Provincial Championships are structured. It is important to note that the current structure is well supported. The results seem to indicate that there is a lack of understanding regarding the selection process. The current process allows regions with a comparatively greater number of teams in a particular division and category representation reflecting their team numbers. (For example, one region may have no representation while another has 2 or 3 teams participating in provincials.) This enables maximum participation in each level of play while giving fair representation to those regions with multiple teams.

During the meetings of the provincial championship review committee, discussions included the pros and cons of the following:

- Realignment of the regions
- Floating regional boundaries
- Setting a participation target of division and category
- Changing the qualifying format to mirror softball or basketball, or to a seasonal ranking model
- Timing, site and size

Another area discussed was the role of districts within the regions. The committee recommended to the OWHA Board of Directors and Membership that they consider eliminating districts as in Rule 2 B 7(a), which states, "District Playdowns, which must be completed by February 15th, will precede all Regional Playdowns, where applicable. District Playdowns for Senior AAA, AA, A, and BB teams, which must be completed by January 1st, will precede all Regional Playdowns, where applicable." For example, last year, Metro Toronto eliminated their districts to enable all teams in the region to playdown together, thereby allowing no team an advantage of resting while other teams played the district series before advancing to the final playdown games.

The committee recommends that the OWHA consider a pilot study for Regional Playdowns. We would like to encourage a designated host community to facilitate playdowns on a specific weekend. The weekend could vary by division and category, but would bring teams together for a tournament style playdown, thereby enhancing the visibility of Playdowns and Provincials.

In order for the membership to have a better understanding of the philosophy and procedures involved with running the provincials, the committee developed the following mission statement:

The OWHA Provincial Championship is an annual competition to determine a Champion in each Division and Category and to provide an opportunity for each Region in the province to have representation.

It is our recommendation that the Board includes the above statement in the OWHA Constitution, By-Laws, Regulations and Rules Book. In addition, provisos should be developed to clarify the procedures used when organizing the provincials.

As a provincially unified body our challenges are diverse. We strive to base decisions on inclusion and an awareness of the unique status of our organization. Valuable information was generated for consideration when planning future change. I would like to thank all Committee members for their time and contributions in assisting the OWHA in reviewing this important event.



Risk and Safety Management

Beginning September 2002 all helmets must have ear protection in place. The removal of ear protection voids the CSA certification of a helmet. This rule will be enforced beginning next September.

Discussion and concern around Facility Agreement and Rink Rental Agreements containing the hold harmless clause continues. It is important that teams, associations and leagues are very clear on what they are signing and if uncomfortable or uncertain of the full meaning of the contract that it is not signed.

The Safety Requires Teamwork book will once again be distributed for the 2002-2003 season. This document provides information on the CHA Insurance Program, equipment fitting, concussions and harassment and abuse prevention and recognition.

The application of stickers to helmets has been very much in the public eye over the last few months. There are certain adhesives that will affect the integrity of the helmet and therefore these stickers should not be applied. There are adhesives that are acceptable but the problem stems from the fact that when the stickers are applied there is no way to identify them as being acceptable and therefore policing becomes impossible. The CHA has been in communication with the manufacturer and the CSA to try and formulate a solution to this issue and will keep you informed as these discussions progress. It is also important that the stickers that are affixed to the helmet when purchased such as the CSA sticker not be removed.

Speak Out!

Requirement for 2002-2003 Season

Definition of "Teams" for registration purposes. A group of team officials, at least one of whom must be a coach, with all coaches meeting OWHA certification and Speak Out requirements, and one of whom must be qualified in the CHA Safety Program, and a group of not less that 15 registered players, at least two of whom must be goaltenders, who are qualified in one Division and category under CHA regulations governing age, and other regulations up to the maximum number provided by CHA regulations. (Does not apply to Senior Recreational Teams & some Senior Teams that do not compete in national championship competition.

Checking to the Head – NEW RULE 2002-2003 season

A Minor and a Misconduct penalty, or a Major and Game Misconduct penalty, at the discretion of the Referee, based on the degree of violence of impact, shall be assessed to any player who checks an opponent to the head area in any manner. A Match penalty could also be assessed under this rule. If a player is injured, a Major and Game Misconduct penalty, or a Match penalty must be assessed. Note: Referees are instructed not to substitute other penalties when a player is Checked to the Head with significant impact.

Rationale: To provide further protection to players specific to the prevention of concussions which is an ongoing problem and concern in the CHA. To provide Game Officials with a more clear and concise rule concerning this aspect of player protection. Referees will be instructed to call this penalty when moderate to severe impact with the Check to the Head has occurred. Mild impact would be called under the other appropriate rules. e.g. Roughing, High-Sticking, Elbowing.



PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT - REMOVAL OF EAR GUARDS FROM HOCKEY HELMETS

By September 1, 2002, all leagues should have received this info and ensure their teams have complied. Full enforcement of this rule will start as of this date.

It has become apparent that in the 2000 – 2001 season, many players, especially at the Junior and Senior level, but also in other levels of hockey, were modifying their helmets by removing the earpieces. Since 1984, the CSA has required that helmets have no ear openings bigger than 38 mm (1.5 inches), or if they do, that an earpiece exist to provide additional protection.

Players, coaches, officials, administrators and parents are reminded that Canadian Hockey playing rule 24 (b) - Protective Equipment - states that "While on the ice, all players, including goaltenders, shall wear a CSA approved hockey helmet, to which a CSA approved facial protector must be securely attached and not altered in any way. Any alteration to a CSA approved helmet or facial protector automatically destroys the certification." Removal of earpieces is considered an alteration of the CSA approved helmet.

Coaches and safety people / trainers are instructed to ensure that their players do not remove earpieces or alter their helmets in any fashion. If the earpieces have been removed, they must be replaced or the helmet can not be used. Not only does the removal of earpieces cause a safety concern but also insurance coverage could be at risk if the equipment has been altered and an injury sustained as a result.

Officials should watch for infractions in pre-game warm-ups, and if it is clear that a player is playing with an altered helmet, advise the coach and player that if the player appears in the game with the earpieces removed from a helmet that came from the factory with such earpieces, they will be penalized for use of illegal equipment, without exception or warning as per Rule 24 (e) which reads as follows:

(e) If the Referee's attention is drawn to the possibility that a facial protector or helmet may not be certified (CSA approved), or if the Referee observes that a facial protector or helmet may not be certified, and should that piece of equipment in effect turn out not to be certified, the Referee shall assess a Minor penalty and at the same time order that illegal piece of equipment removed from the game.

(Note 1): The Referee is empowered to make the call without his attention being drawn by an opposing player or team official, through the Captain.

If there is some question as to whether the helmet has been altered, the Referee shall report the infraction on the official game report to the President.

Please note that it is expected that coaches and safety people / trainers will look after ensuring their players are using helmets that comply to the above CHA standards. For the officials, this is not an optional or judgement call, and the onus to ensure players comply with the rules in this area falls on the coaches.

Executive Directors are asked to forward this safety concern to coaches, trainers, safety people and administrators within the Branch to give this message the widest circulation possible.

CLARIFICATION ON OWHA'S RULES AND REGULATIONS REGARDING AGE CHANGE

Please be advised of the following clarification of age changes for the 2002 – 2003 season.

The age category change comes one year after the motion was tabled at the CHA's 2000 Annual General Meeting, when the CHA membership requested more time to review, examine and gather feedback from constituents across the country on the proposal.

The change, as approved by the Canadian Hockey Association Board of Directors, means that the age categories in female hockey will be as follows for the start of the 2002-2003 season:

OWHA - NEW INITIATIVES - Fair Play Evenings.

There are suspensions in place to deal with individual situations that occur within hockey. Occasionally, the actions of individual teams, on and/or off the ice, have come to our attention. Some may have had a number of different players suspended. Some have had an unusual number of penalty minutes. When we looked at the situations, there appeared to be numerous factors influencing their behaviour.

The OWHA set up and ran four pilot projects this year called, "Fair Play Evening". All players, team staff and parents had to attend the session, which ran for about 3 ½ hours. The agenda was somewhat customized to the specific situation, but basically consisted of: 1) Welcome & Introductions 2) Background/Purpose of evening 3) Parent Video 4) Verbal Abuse Segment from Speak Out! 5) Video on Checking From Behind 6) Question and Answer Period. The response to these evenings has been quite good. We are continuing to evaluate and revise the process. Our current plan is to package the material to facilitate delivery by individual teams, associations and leagues as required.

ICE CHIPS

Individual Stories

The biggest highlight of any season continues to be the individual stories of girls and women of all ages who gain enjoyment and positive life skills through their participation in hockey. There have been countless examples throughout the season. We site one example of a teen-aged girl from Stratford. Last winter, she had an accident and lost part of both feet when she fell beneath a train. One of her very first comments to her father from the hospital bed was her future in hockey would she ever play again? Her determination and love of the game helped her overcome the pain and challenges. She returned to hockey this season as a valuable team member and an inspiration to others facing similar hardships.

Teamwork

We see examples every day of teamwork - line combinations, team systems, team building, etc. The Ontario Women's Hockey Association sees an even greater example on a regular basis as players and organizers demonstrate their understanding of the big picture. Hockey is a game - it is a game for all people. Members of the OWHA know the meaning of winning and they truly know the meaning of hardships and uphill struggles. The recent Olympic victory is one that all players, staff, volunteers, parents and supporters truly share. The participation in the Olympics of female hockey is a tribute to those past and present who worked so hard to fine-tune their skills and to build the game universally so girls and women in all countries could benefit.

Provincial Championships

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association season culminated with our 2002 Provincial Championships held in Brampton, Mississauga and Oakville from April 12th to 14th. Three hundred and forty-eight teams, representing girls and women from across the province competed to crown provincial champions from Novice to Senior.

The Senior AAA, AA, A and BB provincial championships were held in February. Teams competed for the medals and also for the opportunity to advance to either the Esso Senior

National Championship or to the Central Canadian Cup.

The competition was absolutely outstanding, featuring exceptional athletes in all divisions with many overtime games. Even greater was the atmosphere of celebration and support. The focus on positive Values and fair play that predominated throughout the events is a tribute to the players, team staff and volunteers who work tirelessly throughout the season to balance high performance competition with positive life skills. The individual acts of sportsmanship that came so naturally and sincerely gave us far more champions than simply the medal winners.

This prestigious award is presented to the team that demonstrates fair play and sportsmanship by recording the fewest penalty minutes during round robin play.

RECATEGORIZATION

As female hockey continues to grow across the Province of Ontario we are finding that the task of trying to align the teams to be a very onerous job. Many, many hours are put in by the categorizing committee, attending tournaments, reviewing Form A's to identify the teams that are out of line and should be moved up to a higher category.

An example of the time spent by this committee in trying to align the team is the Atom division where, 6 ½ hours was spent going over this division alone. In December and January, we moved over 150 teams and the end result was that they were moved to exactly where they should be. Of those that appealed the decision of the committee, won their appeal and were moved back. Statistics have proven that the original move was correct in most cases. This system works quite well and is being evaluated on a regular basis in an attempt to provide fair opportunities as much as possible.

We need our teams and associations to take responsibility; if a team needs to be moved up, move them. It is unrealistic to think that 7 Regional Directors can police this province.

We invite, no, encourage teams to give us feedback if a team is in the wrong category. We had some input last year and it was very useful to us when we met in December and January to review the teams.

We have had several discussions amongst ourselves and with some of our members as to whether or not there was another way to do this. There is no definitive answer.

We would like to thank those who supplied us with input and hope that if there is some information that will help us make these decisions, that that information will be supplied.

How many positive memories will you look back in the coming years?




