


- The veterans who serve as role models and bring credibility to the game of female hockey.
- The coaches who mould talent and personalities in to a true team.
- The trainers who keep players in physical and emotional shape to play and who are always ready to handle whatever may come their way.
- The volunteers who give so freely of their time and agonize over tough decisions with the best interests of the players at heart.
- The parents and number one fans!

We conclude our report with a quote from the OWHA Executive Report - 1986/87

"Congratulations to every member of the OWHA for being a major part of the advancement of female hockey opportunities. We must continue to work hard to teach the importance of team work and good sportsmanship. 





# Frontenac Fury's "Wonderful Little Hockey Tournament" - story submitted by Frontenac GHA

There are so many great hockey events throughout the year that help make women's hockey special. Here is the story about a wonderful little hockey tournament that took place during the 2006-07 hockey season.

The North Frontenac Girls Hockey Association, based in beautiful Verona, just north of Kingston, decided to host a one-day house league tournament for their newly named Frontenac Fury girl's hockey teams. A committee was formed and the process of planning began in December for a March Break tournament. The committee wanted to connect with local teams and build relationships with surrounding communities.

Michael Doggett was the tournament coordinator and led the event administration: "The OWHA was great and they helped us out all the way through. We had teams from Ottawa, Kemptville, Tamworth, Carleton Place, Kingston and North Frontenac. The committee decided to make little wooden welcome signs and placed them in the snow in front of the arena. Everyone said they loved the little hand-made signs with the team names on them. The committee also prepared welcome baskets of healthy snacks and drinks for each team. A local business donated the baskets and two grocery stores donated all of the healthy food. The teams loved the baskets. It made sense to everyone to promote healthy eating for these young athletes."

The tournament committee also placed an emphasis on connecting with the local high school girl's hockey programs to promote education and hockey.

A "Player of the Game" was selected for each team for all twelve games. The player's name was announced and it was explained how she demonstrated hockey skill, why it was important. The "Player of the Game" names were written on the great big score sheet so everyone could see.

The tournament medallions and awards were very special. Little round medallions were hand-made from 150 year-old slate shingles that were donated from a local church restoration project. A local business donated a carbide hole-saw and Michael Doggett hand-cut 140 medallions. An engraver was able to laser inscribe "Building Teams for Life" on each medallion. The "Player of the Game" medallions had red and white ribbons and a gold star on them as well.

Ladies from the Perth Road Crafters Club hand sewed the ribbons for all of the awards. It was really special that these ladies worked so hard to create these special awards for the girls.




Another highlight of this tournament was that "PAWSitive", the OWHA mascot was able to come and promote women's hockey. I asked the OWHA if they would consider the tournament as an outreach possibility. I was so surprised to hear that "PAWSitive" and Cathy Phillips, the goaltender on the first Canadian Women's World Champion Hockey Team (1990) could join us. It was truly amazing for the community.

Katie Glass, a local young singer sang "Oh Canada" before the championship games and the entire building cheered her on.

Every team participated in either an "A" or "B" final. The Tournament Organizing Committee felt it was important to reward effort for these young students of hockey. The local mayors from the communities presented gold trophies and medallions with red ribbons to the champions. The finalists were presented silver trophies and medallions with white ribbons.

The parents all rallied together to help raise funds for the teams as well. Local businesses donated prizes and parents sold home-baked goods. The tournament committee was able to donate money towards the North Frontenac Community Arena expansion project. The local media covered the event and published the photo of "PAWSitive" and Cathy Phillips dropping a game puck together with all the players from both teams.

This was really a great success for women's hockey and the community. The committee wants to continue the March Break tournament tradition and the guest teams have already said they want to return. We want to continue to promote hand-made awards, healthy food, education and the OWHA. The theme "Building Teams for Life" fits so well with women's hockey – we might see it on future tournament awards. This was truly a wonderful little hockey tournament."

### **Discipline Report**

#### Novice

There were a total of 8 suspensions at the Novice Level. These suspensions were in the Novice A (1), BB (1), C (3), HL (3) categories.

#### Atom

There were 27 suspensions at the Atom Level. The Atom AA and Atom BB levels both received the most suspensions with 6 which represents 22% of all Atom level suspensions. Disputing a Call was the most frequently called suspension with 12 or 44% of the Atom suspensions.

#### Peewee

There were 115 suspensions at this level. The Peewee B level received the most suspensions with 25 which represents 22% of all Peewee suspensions. The Peewee C level followed next with 24 suspensions or 21%. The remainder of the suspensions were spread out amongst the remaining levels. Disputing a Call was the highest called suspension with 23 or 20% of all Peewee suspensions. The Peewee C level received the most of this type of suspension with 7 or 30%. The Peewee AA level followed closely with 6 or 26% of these types of suspensions.

#### **Bantam**

There were 339 suspensions at this level. The Bantam AA level received the most with 90 suspensions or 27% of all Bantam suspensions. The next highest was Bantam B with 64 suspensions or 19%. The suspension called most often was Checking from Behind with 74 suspensions or 22%. The Bantam AA level received the most Checking from Behind suspensions with 18 or 24%. This was followed closely by the Bantam A level with 17 and Bantam B level with 16 suspensions.

#### Midget

There were 627 suspensions at the Midget level. The Midget AA level received the highest number of suspensions with 163 or 26% of all Midget suspensions. This was followed by the Midget B level with 121 or 19%. Not counting Misconduct penalties, Checking from Behind was the suspension called most often with 64 or 10% of all Midget suspensions. The Midget AA level received the most Checking from Behind suspensions 19 or 30%.

#### Intermediate

The Intermediate Level received 212 suspensions, with the Intermediate A level receiving the most at 61 suspensions. This represents 29% of all Intermediate suspensions. The Intermediate AA level followed closely with 28% or 60 suspensions. Checking from Behind was called most often at the Intermediate level with 29 or 14%. The Intermediate AA level received the most Checking from Behind suspensions with 14 or 48%.

#### Senior

There were 139 Senior level suspensions, with Senior A receiving the most at 44 or 32% of all Senior suspensions. Abusive Language was called most often at the Senior Level with 22 or 16% of all suspensions at this level. The Senior House League level received the most number of Abusive Language suspensions with 6 or 27%.

#### Referees

There were a total of 699 referees identified as having called the suspension penalties this year. Most of the penalties called were spread out amongst the 699 referees. However, there were six referees who assessed more than ten suspendible infractions. The most suspensions called by an individual official was twenty.

#### Overall

Overall this year there were 1468 suspensions called. This represents an increase of 10% over last year where 1326 suspensions were reported.


The suspension called most often was Checking from Behind with 200, which represents 14% of all suspensions called. The next highest suspension called was Disputing a Call with 169 or 12%.

Again this year, the Midget category received the highest number of suspensions with 627 of the 1468 or 43% of all suspensions. The next highest category receiving suspensions was Bantam with 339 suspensions or 23%. The Midget AA level received the highest number of suspensions with 163 or 11% of all suspensions. The next highest was the Midget B level with 121 suspensions or 8%.


# % of Coaching Suspensions by Division






# SUSPENSIONS BY DIVISION


# Suspensions by Level

# CONGRATULATIONS HAZEL McCALLION 2007 HOCKEY CANADA FEMALE HOCKEY BREAKTHROUGH AWARD

Hockey Player, Hockey Volunteer, Hockey Promoter, Hockey Supporter, Hockey Activist

Sincere congratulations to Hazel McCallion, recipient of the Hockey Canada 2007 Female Hockey Breakthrough Award. Hazel's passion for the game has spanned seven decades. In 1940, she was one of few women in the world who lived their dream of playing hockey. Her love of the sport continues to this day where, at 86 years young, she still laces up her skates. Her contributions have impacted female hockey throughout Ontario, Canada and the world.

Hazel McCallion has been a leader in the growth of female hockey in Ontario. She actively supports the game across Canada and put her name and enthusiasm behind the lobby for world championships and Olympic competition. We sincerely believe that, without the efforts and support of Hazel McCallion, there would not be world championships and Olympic opportunities for female hockey. Hazel McCallion continues to be an active volunteer with the Ontario Women's Hockey Association.

As a star centre of the Kik Team in Montreal in 1940, Hazel was a true pioneer. She was paid \$5.00 a game to play centre with her two sisters backing her up on the blue line. When she moved to the Toronto area, she did not play as she could not find a team. However, her love of the game continued to grow.

Hazel McCallion moved on to a successful business career before going into politics where she has attained unprecedented success. She has received countless honours and awards from Canada and abroad. In 2005 she was appointed Member of the Order of Canada. The same year, she was the runner up for the World Mayor. She is a wonderful role model for everyone and continues to inspire women.



Throughout the years, Hazel maintained her intense love of hockey. She skated when she could, followed the game and offered her help at all levels. She kept a vision of improved opportunities for girls and women. She was determined to do what she could to make a difference.

In the early 1980's Hazel McCallion regularly attended the Dominion Ladies Hockey Tournament that was coordinated by the Brampton Canadettes and held in Mississauga. The tournament was the highlight for teams in Ontario and often attracted participants from other parts of Canada and the United States. Hazel McCallion became a regular at the annual tournament, offering her support and encouragement to the teams. As Mayor of Mississauga, she understood the challenges the teams faced in securing ice time and support. She provided valuable assistance to them on how to leverage support back home. Her offer to make calls to local Mayor's was often accepted and met very positive results.

In Mississauga, Hazel's support of the Mississauga Girls Hockey League has helped it grow to be one of the world's largest female hockey leagues. The MGHL has provided solid development programs for girls and women to excel in hockey and gain valuable life skills. Many Team Canada players have played in the Mississauga system.

Although Hazel is the Mayor of Mississauga, her love of hockey has no boundaries. When the Ontario Women's Hockey Association hosted the 1988 National Championship in Burlington, Hazel McCallion was there. She traveled to a press conference in Arnprior/Renfrew in 2002 to promote the Esso National Championship. She not only attended these events, she also promoted them. These are only examples of many events and activities she attended.

Hazel McCallion is famous throughout the world. She does countless interviews in the media, makes keynote speeches and addresses audiences at many functions daily. She always finds innovative ways to add female hockey to her speeches. She speaks very positively about the game and encourages participation as a player, coach, referee or supporter. She urges girls and women to play and pitches sponsors to add their support. At the political level, Hazel opens many doors and encourages support at municipal, provincial and national government levels.

The most important factor in increasing participation for girls and women is getting the word out to the general public. Hazel McCallion does this on a daily basis. She has brought the credibility she has earned to the sport of female hockey. Hazel McCallion was Honourary Chairperson of the 1987 First Women's World Hockey Tournament, the 1997 Women's World Hockey Championship and the 2000 Women's World Hockey Championship.

To truly recognize the impact of Hazel McCallion's contributions, it is important to reflect on the monumental impact of one very special event – the 1987 First Women's World Hockey Tournament. Without that event, it is extremely unlikely that there would be world championships or Olympic opportunities for female hockey. At the time of this event, there was far more skepticism than support. The event was incredibly fragile but was a resounding success against all odds. The key to the event was the credibility and optimism of the Honourary Chairperson, Hazel McCallion. Hazel cared enough to put her own credibility behind the event and on the line. She challenged sponsors to put up support. Hazel talked world-level female hockey and people listened. She inspired the athletes from all countries who, to this day call her, "Our Mayor." Hazel McCallion gave the players a chance. The rest is history.

It is very fitting that during the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 1987 tournament, a major turning point for women's hockey, that a key player in the event is honoured with the Female Hockey Breakthrough Award. Congratulations Hazel, "Our Mayor" from all the members of the Ontario Women's Hockey Association and from all female hockey enthusiasts in Canada and the world. You opened up a WORLD of possibilities for us all. Thank you.

# 2006 ONTARIO FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR




Vicky Sunohara was named the 2006 Female Athlete of the Year by the Government of Ontario after a year highlighted by Gold at the Torino Winter Olympics. She was recognized at the Ontario Sports Awards where Minister of Health Promotion Jim Watson presented her with the award.



Vicky has been with Canada's National Women's Team since the 1989-90 season, taking part in three Winter Olympic Games (1998, 2002, 2006), eight IIHF World Women's Championships (1990, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2004, 2005, 2007), eight Four Nations Cups (1996, 1998, 1998, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2004, 2006) and the Torino Ice Tournament (2005). She has won fifteen medals with the Canadian National Women's Team, including fifteen gold medals and three silvers, and is Canada's seventh all-time top 0 scorer with 111 points.

In 1987 at the First Women's World Hockey Tournament, Vicky was a flag bearer.



Vicky currently plays for the Brampton Thunder, the NWHL's 2007 Champion. She also won the Esso Women's National Championship with Brampton in 2006. She has been with the team since its inception in 1999 and is their career leading scorer.

Vicky received her education at Northeastern University, where she was an All-American in 1989-90 and won an ECAC Championship in 1988-89, and the University of Toronto, where she won two OWIAA Championships.

Vicky also runs her own hockey camps out of Whitby.



# CANADA WILL PLAY HOST TO FIRST-EVER **IIHF WORLD WOMEN'S U18 CHAMPIONSHIP** January 7-13, 2008



Women's hockey has been given another boost with the addition of a second world women's championship, after the IIHF announced the creation of the IIHF World Women's Under-18 Championship.

This inaugural championship will include the best female players under the age of 18 from eight countries. At its meetings in Moscow on May10th, the International Ice Hockey Federation awarded the inaugural IIHF World Women's Under-18 Championship to Canada. The championship will be held in Canada, in a city to be determined, from January 7th to 13th, 2008.

The 2008 IIHF World Women's Under-18 Championship will include national teams from Canada, the U.S.A., Sweden, Finland, Germany, Switzerland, Russia and the Czech Republic.

The IIHF World Women's Under-18 Championship is a great opportunity for all participating nations to further grow their female programs. The National Women's Under-18 Team is the first step in Hockey Canada's Program of Excellence for young women.

It is a tremendous honour for Hockey Canada to be selected to be the first host of the World Women's U18 Championship. This event will play a big role in building the depth of National Team programs in Europe and Asia. We should now see greater increases in the numbers of young girls playing hockey in countries all over the world. # SINCERE THANKS TO THE HONOURABLE JIM WATSON AND THE ONTARIO MINISTRY OF HEALTH PROMOTION

On January 11, 2006 the Honourable Jim Watson, Ontario Minister of Health Promotion, announced the establishment of the *Quest for Gold* Program aimed at providing additional support to Ontario's amateur athletes. The *Quest for Gold* Program will be funded through net revenues generated from the new *Quest for Gold* lottery game that was also launched by the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation (OLGC) and Minister Watson on January 11<sup>th</sup>.

The *Quest for Gold* Program will provide additional support to Ontario amateur athletes through direct financial support, access to high performance coaching and enhanced competitive opportunities and services for Ontario athletes. The overarching goal of the *Quest for Gold* Program is directly related to the Enhanced Excellence goals of both *ACTIVE2010* and the *Canadian Sport Policy* – to improve the performance and number of Ontario athletes performing at the national and international level, thereby contributing to the improved performance of Canada at international competitions.

### **Quest For Gold Program**

The Quest for Gold Program will provide additional support to Ontario amateur athletes through direct financial support, access to high performance coaching and enhanced competitive opportunities and services for Ontario athletes. The overarching goal of the Quest for Gold Program is directly related to the Enhanced Excellence goals of both ACTIVE2010 and the Canadian Sport Policy – to improve the performance and number of Ontario athletes performing at the national and international level, thereby contributing to the improved performance of Canada at international competitions.

Direct financial support will be provided to eligible athletes from Ontario in the form of a living and training allowance. The *Quest for Gold* – Ontario Athlete Assistance Program will be provided through two carding designations – Canada Card and Ontario Card.

<u>Canada Card</u> - Eligibility limited to athletes from Ontario who are carded by Sport Canada. Canada Card will provide <u>up to</u> an additional 33% in funding over and above what an athlete is receiving from Sport Canada – dependant on funding available.

Ontario Card -

Ontario Card will provide direct financial assistance to Ontario junior level athletes identified by Provincial Sport Organization/Multi-Sport Organizations.

# They're in cancer-stricken teen's corner

Folks in Saugeen Shores have lent financial and moral support to ailing hockey player Caitlin Cobean

On New Year's Eve, Caitlyn Cobean felt fine. The next day, the Grade 8 student and minor hockey player couldn't remember her mother's name. Her head was unaccountably throbbing, her vision fuzzy.

"It just came out of the blue," recalls mom Rona, a nurse in Saugeen Shores, a town of 11,400 on Lake Huron south of the Bruce Peninsula. "She suddenly said that she couldn't see. I kept kidding her along. She said, `No,' everything was blurry. Then she said she was seeing two of me.

"She knew who I was but couldn't tell me my name, her sister Bryanna's (name) or my friend's name. That lasted about five minutes. Then she had a massive headache."

The symptoms launched an urgent series of hospital visits and, 10 days later, a life-altering diagnosis: an inoperable, malignant brain tumour. For the past month, Caitlyn has been in and out of Toronto's Sick Children and Princess Margaret hospitals. She takes chemotherapy pills at night and radiation treatments during the day. Weeknights are spent with mom in a downtown hotel.

But back in Saugeen Shores, Caitlyn's diagnosis has helped show that hockey truly is a game of heart. The 13-year-old played with the Storm bantam C team. When they heard about Caitlyn's tumour, the Storm and "Party Pylons," a senior women's recreational team, decided to hold a benefit game to help cover the family's expenses in Toronto.

Rona Cobean expected the event to raise about \$500 – enough to pay for one week at a hotel while they wait for a room at Ronald McDonald House. She was wrong. On Jan. 26, barely two weeks after Caitlyn's diagnosis, almost 1,200 people crowded into the Saugeen Shores Community Complex Arena on a bitterly cold night.

"I didn't think I could get in," said Scott Drysdale, a local hockey convenor. "There were over 1,000 people crammed into our arena that holds 800. People were lined up outside the rink. It was a brutal evening with freezing rain, blustery winds and horizontal snow all night. It was very touching."

With Caitlyn coaching, the Storm won 5-4. But there was more than a hockey game going on that night.

The peewee boys rep team (11- and 12-year-olds) raised more than \$8,000 by having their heads shaved as a show of solidarity with Caitlyn, who is losing her hair to the radiation.

"That meant the world to Caitlyn," Rona wrote in the family's blog.

"Why would I be scared now, there is at least 20 other kids in town that are bald!" Caitlyn told her mom.

More help was coming.

The atom and peewee teams had a raffle table at the fundraiser. Her 11-year-old sister Bryanna's team held a 50-50 draw. There was a "chuck-a-puck" at \$2 a puck. An oldtimers team ran a silent auction, another sold drinks in the "Blueline Club."

Older brother Dylan, 15, accepted a dare from the winner of the 50/50 draw to have his head shaved. He raised \$2,300.

Team Caitlyn T-shirts, in deep blue with a Maple Leaf on the front, were made and are being sold around the town.

Total raised: \$37,000 and counting.

"It's absolutely amazing, beyond belief," Rona says. "Having the whole town behind us, I can walk away from home now knowing the bills will be paid."

The surprises are continuing. Last week, Caitlyn and the family were granted a wish by the Children's Wish Foundation – a trip to Disney World, likely in the spring.

It's hard to count blessings when a child is sick, but the Cobeans are doing so. Jim Cobean used to be a dairy farmer, but in August he started working for Zeigler Lumber. The job came with drug benefits. Without them, last month's chemo bill would have been \$8,400.

"Someone up there is watching us," says Rona.

Divine intervention had nothing to do with the hockey community's support. For 10 years, Jim and Rona have given to the game by coaching and managing teams. Now, the game is giving back.

"We just wanted to do something for her," says Sheri Perdue, the manager of Caitlyn's bantam team and one of the many organizers of the benefit. "It's wonderful living in a community that will help you. We're all part of the hockey community and we're all digging for her."

Hockey is helping in other ways, too. On Jan. 8, five Maple Leafs walked into Caitlyn's Sick Kids hospital room, including captain Mats Sundin.

"Sundin is my favourite player and he came into my bedroom," Rona gushes. A coach has bought Caitlyn a Sundin jersey.

"Our kids were ecstatic when the (Leafs) walked in," says Rona. "We had to peel them off the ceiling."

But hockey can do only so much. Caitlyn is now on medication for seizures, caused by the anti-tumour treatments. She faces radiation and chemotherapy into November.

On Friday, the local high school is having a shave off; Caitlyn will be there to remove the last of her hair with other students.

"I'm okay, but tired," she says.

Adds her mom: "It blows you away (as a parent). But you have to deal with what life has dealt you. Caitlin says there is no sense crying about it. That's not going to make it go away."

# Play for Julianne

The Kanata Girls Hockey Association is asking the hockey community for their help in supporting a former KGHA player, Julianne. While working in Banff during the summer of 2005, she was viciously attacked & strangled by a complete stranger on July 11, 2005, leaving her for dead and later lapsed in to a coma with severe brain injuries, unable to speak, walk or breathe on her own.

Like most of us, with children playing hockey; hockey was a very big part of Julianne's family life. Both Julianne and her older sister, Melissa, played in the KGHA from novice to intermediate. Her parents, Ron & Valerie, were both on the KGHA executive and Ron was also a coach.

Julianne's parents need financial help as Julianne is currently at the Ocean Hyperbaric Neurologic Centre in Fort Lauderdale, Florida for 6 months undergoing a Hyperbaric Oxygen Treatment (HBOT) and adjunctive therapies which is costing them between \$230,000 and \$340,000. This is the family's last hope for Julianne to become independent again. Ron was excited to report that the treatments are working and progress is being made.







### PARTICIPATING TEAMS

#### TEAM CANADA

Canada was represented by the 1987 National Champi ons, the Hamilton Golden Hawks. Hamilton had been the OWHA's representative at the National Championships for 4 consecutive seasons, winning a bronze, a silver and two gold medals. Five players were added to Team Canada for the World Tournament – Shirley Cameron and Dawn McGuire from Alberta; France St. Louis from Quebec; Donna Lavasseur from Manitoba and Colleen Kohen from Ontario.

#### TEAM ONTARIO

The Host Team Ontario, Mississauga Warriors, qualified as they were the silver medalist at the OWHA Provincial Championship. They were formed in 1981 and in their third season captured both the Central Ontario Women's Hockey League and playoff titles. The team added four players for the World Tournament.

#### TEAM USA

Team USA was made up of 21 players selected via on-ice tryouts through local, regional and then finally a national camp. Twelve players were from Massachusetts, five from Minnesota, two from New York State and one each from Michigan and Wisconsin. All the Team Personnel were from Massachusetts.

#### TEAM SWEDEN

Team Sweden was an All Star team of seventeen players. Thirteen of the players were from the Nacka HK Team that were National Champions. Two players were from Brynas IF and two from Farsta.

#### TEAM SWITZERLAND

Team Switzerland came with twenty players who were selected specifically for the World Tournament. The team was made up of members from EHC Kloten the 1984, 1985 Schweizer Cup winners along with players from SC Ischchrauer, ZSC Cosmos, SC Rapperswil-Jona, DHC Bona and La Vannierie Fribourg.

#### TEAM JAPAN


