SHARING THE DREAM

Our theme this season, Sharing the Dream, was launched at the OWHA General Meeting in September with the assistance of Her Worship Hazel McCallion and delegates from the Olympic Women's Hockey Team of China. The Olympic Women's Team of China gave thousands of players and supporters in Ontario the chance to "Share the Dream" as we supported China through 3 months of training that included 28 games. China attributes their improvement and success to their interaction and support within the OWHA. The 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver saw Canada win a record number of medals – including the Women's Hockey Gold!

As we enjoy the positive impact on the growth and development of female hockey through the credibility of being an Olympic sport, it is important to give thanks to the past and also to move forward with increased energy and a positive vision to the future.

When the OWHA was formed in 1975, there were no provincial championships, national championships, world championships, sanctioned tournaments and few players, teams and leagues. This season, the OWHA:

- 12 players & 2 coaches on National U-22 Team Gold MLP Cup, Germany
- 3 OWHA on ice officials at Winter Olympics, Vancouver, B.C.
- 160 players and 40 staff at Ontario Winter Games, Muskoka, Ontario
- 511 teams in provincial championships
- 52.692 members
- 1422 On-ice officials

The evolution of female hockey within the OWHA has been an overwhelming success to date thanks to skill and attitude of the players combined with the thousands of volunteers who have worked selflessly for the good of the game. One such person was Bev Mallory, a life-long supporter of female hockey and a founding member of the OWHA. Bev served as a member of the Boards of Directors of the OWHA, Stoney Creek Girls Hockey Association, Hamilton Girls Hockey Association and Hamilton Women's Hockey Association. She contributed to the OWHA development programs and worked with many task groups to form new female hockey teams and associations. Bev's late husband Ross was also a dedicated volunteer as were daughters, Louise and

Ann who also played. Bev suddenly experienced health problems at the beginning of 2010 and lost a valiant battle to cancer on April 16, 2010. We sincerely thank Bev for her contributions and friendship.

The current state of the OWHA is very good. There is a solid foundation built on positive values. There is a strong central operations that is driven by empowering a very capable membership to operate teams and programs in a manner that provides both flexibility and fairness.

We continue to address opportunities and make changes that are consistent with the values and objectives of the OWHA. The Ontario government's Ministry of Health Promotion re-vamped the Ontario Winter Games criteria, bringing in line with the Long Term Athlete Development Model (LTAD). The OWHA worked with the Ministry to create a new format and we were accepted as a Core Sport for 2010 and 2012. This season over 400 players participated in selection/development camps and 160 moved on to play for 1 of 8 teams. Players and staff were mixed by ability and geography and came together on teams named after OWHA high-performance athletes – Lori Dupuis, Geraldine Heaney, Angela James, Karen Nystrom, Cathy Phillips, Cheryl Pounder, Vicky Sunohara, and Katie Weatherston. Prior to the start of the competition, the OWHA hosted very successful Officiating Camps and Coaching Camps.

We are so very fortunate to have the privilege of belonging to the Ontario Women's Hockey Association. It is an organization of players, coaches, team staff, officials, administrators and supporters working side by side providing and enjoying the great game of hockey. It is the only organization of its kind in the world!

Sincere congratulations to everyone in the Ontario Women's Hockey Association. This was a wonderful season of participation, excellence and friendship. The future for Team OWHA is very bright with continued hard work, unity and teamwork. Thank you!



Quest For Gold Program

The *Quest for Gold* Program will provide additional support to Ontario amateur athletes through direct financial support, access to high performance coaching and enhanced competitive opportunities and services for Ontario athletes. The overarching goal of the *Quest for Gold* Program is directly related to the Enhanced Excellence goals of both *ACTIVE2010* and the *Canadian Sport Policy* – to improve the performance and number of Ontario athletes performing at the national and international level, thereby contributing to the improved performance of Canada at international competitions.

Direct financial support will be provided to eligible athletes from Ontario in the form of a living and training allowance. The *Quest for Gold* – Ontario Athlete Assistance Program will be provided through two carding designations – Canada Card and Ontario Card.

<u>Canada Card</u> - Eligibility limited to athletes from Ontario who are carded by Sport Canada. Canada Card will provide <u>up to</u> an additional 33% in funding over and above what an athlete is receiving from Sport Canada – dependant on funding available.

Ontario Card - Ontario Card will provide direct financial assistance to Ontario junior level athletes identified by Provincial Sport Organization/Multi-Sport Organizations.

2010 Isobel Gathorne-Hardy Player-of-the-Year Jayna Hefford

Isobel Gathorne-Hardy was the daughter of former Governor General of Canada Lord Stanley of Preston and Lady Constance Villiers. She was one of seven children, five boys and two girls. While living in Canada, Stanley helped to popularize ice hockey and is considered one of the first women to play the game. In 1898 she married the Honourable Sir John Francis Gathorne-Hardy, a brother of the 3rd Earl of Cranbrook and took the name Isobel Gathorne-Hardy. Gathorne-Hardy had one child: daughter Elizabeth Constance Mary Gathorne-Hardy. Stanley became Dame Commander of the Royal Victorian Order. She shared her father's love of the game of ice hockey and was instrumental in convincing her father to create the Stanley Cup. Stanley played hockey while she was in Canada, playing on the outdoor rink at

Rideau Hall. After the opening of the Rideau Skating Rink, Stanley is mentioned in one of the first games

Sincere congratulations to the 2010 Isobel Gathorne Hardy Player-of-the-Year, Jayna Hefford, an outstanding player and role model. Jayna was born in Trenton, Ontario and she met and exceeded the award requirements as she demonstrates leadership, commitment and positive values. This was exemplified as she wore the "A" for the gold medallists, Team Canada at the 2010 Olympics.



Jayna has been an exceptional hockey player throughout her career, growing up in Kingston and playing for the Kingston Girls Hockey Association. Through her years with Kingston, Team Ontario, the Brampton Thunder and Team Canada, Jayna has been a steady two-way player and a leader with great work ethic,

In the 2000 World Women's Hockey Championship, Team Canada was down 2-0 to a powerful USA team. Jayna scored two unanswered goals in the third period to take her team into overtime where Canada scored to win the gold. In the Salt Lake City Olympics, it was again Jayna who came through with the winning goal to give Canada its first Olympic gold. These are only two examples of Jayna's ability to come through in tough situations, to put her team on top.

Jayna is also a strong contributor to young girls as she was one of the first players to start her own hockey school. She is co-owner of the very successful Lori Dupuis, Jayna Hefford hockey school in Kingston.





Discipline Report – 2009-2010

Novice

There were a total of 9 suspensions at the Novice Level; 5 suspensions at the Novice B level and 2 suspensions at both the Novice A and Novice C levels. Of these 9 suspensions, 7 were given to Coaches. Disputing a Call was the most frequently called suspension with 5 suspensions.

Atom

There were 40 suspensions at the Atom Level. This is an increase of 25% from last year. The Atom B level received the most suspensions with 10, which represents 40% of the suspensions. The Atom C level was next highest with 9 suspensions. Disputing a Call was the most frequently called suspension with 17 or 43% of all Atom suspensions. The Atom B level received the most Disputing a Call suspensions with 7 or 41%. Coaches received 29 of the 40 suspensions at the Atom level which represents 73% of all Atom level suspensions. Coaches at the Atom B level received the most suspensions with 9 suspensions. This represents 31% of all suspensions received by Coaches at this level.

Peewee

There were 163 suspensions at this level. This represents a 12% increase in the number of suspensions compared to last season. The Peewee A level received the most suspensions with 38, which represents 23% of all Peewee suspensions. The Peewee AA level followed next with 32 suspensions or 20%. Disputing a Call was the highest called suspension with 37 or 23% of all Peewee suspensions. Checking from Behind was the next highest with 26 or 16% of all suspensions. The Peewee A level received the most Disputing a Call suspensions with 13 or 35%. Coaches received 68 or 42% of all suspensions at the Peewee level. The Peewee A level Coaches received the most suspensions with 19 representing 28% of all coaching suspensions and 12% of all suspensions at the Peewee level.

Bantam

There were 356 suspensions at this level. This represents an 26% increase in the number of suspensions received last year. The Bantam AA level received the most with 105 suspensions or 30% of all Bantam suspensions. The next highest was Bantam A with 85 suspensions. The suspension called most often was Checking from Behind with 74 suspensions or 21%. The Bantam AA level received the most of these types of suspensions with 23 or 31%. The next highest suspension called was Disputing a Call with 54 or 15%. Coaches received 99 or 28% of all suspensions at the Bantam level. The Bantam AA level coaches received the most suspensions with 26 or 26% of all coaching suspensions.

Midaet

There were 629 suspensions at the Midget level. This represents a 19% increase in the number of suspensions received last year. The Midget AA level received the highest number of suspensions with 143 or 23% of all Midget suspensions. The next highest was the Midget A level with 128 or 20%. Checking from Behind was the suspension called most often with 122 or 19% of all Midget suspensions. The Midget A level received the most of these types of suspensions with 31 or 25%. Coaches received 85 or 14% of all suspensions at the Midget level. The Coaches at the Midget AA level received 23 or 27% of all coaching suspensions at the Midget level.

Intermediate

The Intermediate Level received 207 suspensions. This represents a 25% increase in the number of suspensions received last year. The Intermediate A level received the most suspensions with 64 or 31% of all Intermediate suspensions. The Intermediate AA level received the next highest number of suspensions with 63 or 30%. Checking from Behind was called most often at the Intermediate level with 32 or 16%. The Intermediate AA level received the most of these types of suspensions with 24 or 75% of all Checking from Behind suspensions. The next highest suspension called was Fighting with 26 or 13%. The Intermediate House League level received the most Fighting suspensions with 14 or 56% of these types of suspensions. Coaches received 26 or 13% of all suspensions at this level. The Intermediate House League coaches received the most coaching suspensions with 14 or 54% of all coaching suspensions at Intermediate level.

Senior

There were 162 Senior level suspensions. This represents the only decrease in suspensions compared to the number of suspensions received last year. The Senior level suspensions decreased by 11%. The Senior A received the most at 50 or 31% of all Senior suspensions. The next highest level was Senior House League which received 34 or 21%. Disputing a Call was called most often at the Senior Level with 27 or 17% of all suspensions at this level. These types of suspensions were spread out amongst all levels except for the Senior AA and Senior REC levels which received 1 and 0 respectively. Coaches received 27 or 17% of all suspensions at the Senior level. The Senior A level coaches received the most suspensions with 8 or 30% of all coaching suspensions.

Unknown Levels

There were 36 suspensions where the level was not identified.

Referees

There were a total of 841 referees identified as having called the suspension penalties this year. Most of the penalties called were spread out amongst the referees. However, there were 4 referees who called 15 or more penalties. One official called the most with 19.

Overall

Overall this year there were 1602 suspensions called. This represents an 18% increase over last year where 1359 suspensions were called.

The suspension called most often was Checking from Behind with 280, which represents 18% of all suspensions called. The Midget level received the most Checking from Behind suspensions with 97 or 38% of these types of suspensions. The next highest suspension called was Disputing a Call with 208 or 13%.

Again this year, the Midget category received the highest number of suspensions with 629 of the 1602 or 39% of all suspensions. The next highest category receiving suspensions was Bantam with 356 suspensions or 22%. The Midget AA level received the highest number of suspensions with 143 or 9% of all suspensions. The next highest was the Midget A with 128 suspensions or 8%.

Coaching staff received a total of 348 or 22% of all suspensions. This represents a 27% increase from last year where coaches were assessed 273 suspensions. The Bantam level coaches received the most with 99 or 28% of all Coach suspensions.






Suspensions by Level



MAYOR HAZEL McCALLION



The contributions she has made, and continues to make, every day have a major impact on the citizens of Canada. Hazel is respected and admired by both men and women for her excellence and commitment to people. She succeeded throughout an era that often closed doors on females. Hazel remained focused and showed through hard work and determination that women deserved rights and opportunities. She earned a place for herself and has served as a role model for many other successful Canadian women.

Hazel is an icon in the world of women's hockey. The participation of female hockey as a medal sport in 1998 in Nagano, Japan and in 2002 in Salt Lake City would not have been possible without the support of Hazel McCallion. She is very much a part of the Canadian Team's gold medal victories in Salt Lake City, Turin and Vancouver.

Hazel's love of sports led her to challenge the belief that "girls can't play hockey". In the 1940's, Hazel and her sister laced up their skate to play for a team in Gaspé. She may actually have been the first professional women's hockey player as she was paid \$5.00 per game.

In the late 1970's, Mayor McCallion joined the Board of Regents of the Ontario Women's Hockey Association (OWHA). The OWHA had been formed in 1975 as a province-wide organization to promote the development of female hockey. At this time, girls' hockey struggled against tremendous hostility. It was almost impossible to get ice time, sponsorship support or any credibility. Talented players had limited competitive opportunities and young girls had nowhere to play.

Hazel was a role model. She showed that women could succeed. In addition, she became spokesperson for the game. Hazel was a credible person – when she spoke, people listened – when she stated that girls and women could play hockey, they did. Hazel became an active lobbyist. If girls and women could not get ice time, she made phone calls and secured support. Hazel encouraged the corporate sector to get involved and they did, making it possible for more girls to enjoy hockey and gain valuable life skills. Publicly, Hazel McCallion spoke at meetings and to the press – hockey is our Canadian game – hockey is for every Canadian girl and woman.

By the mid 1980's the momentum of women's hockey was expanding to other countries. It was becoming apparent that the challenges we faced were universal. Hazel McCallion's role must be expanded! In 1987, against overwhelming odds, the Ontario Women's Hockey Association hosted the very successful, "First Women's World Hockey Tournament" in North York and Mississauga. Hazel was the Honourary Chairperson. Hazel's credibility and hard work made this event a success and the catalyst for world championships and Olympic competition.

At the international level, Hazel quickly became a role model for female hockey players throughout the world. Her advice has helped them create better opportunities in their countries. They also gain courage in her example of an exceptionally successful female in countries still heavily dominated by men.

Hazel continued her work, lobbying for female hockey acceptance and participation at all levels. Her local contributions brought support and opportunities for young girls who gain valuable self-esteem and life skills through hockey. Municipal governments became aware of their role in supporting female athletics.

Hazel's leadership and excellence have made it possible for girls and women to live their dream of Olympic competition. She has made an everlasting contribution to the equality of opportunities for girls and women of all ages. Thank you Hazel from the Ontario Women's Hockey Association!
