The 2021 Season continued to present its own individual challenges. Following all guidelines and restrictions set out by Softball Saskatchewan and the Saskatchewan government we were able to hold our evaluations for the U12 and U14 divisions at the Affinity Plex at the beginning of March. We also offered pre-evaluation skills camps prior to evaluations to allow for some prep, although numbers were restricted due to covid. All teams were drafted by their division coordinators and coaches were identified. Teams were allowed to beginning practicing at the beginning of May in pods of 8 and league game play began at the beginning of June. Restrictions at the ballpark allowing only players and coaches into the park posed a challenge for our parents who just craved to see their child play eventually lifted and the sound of fans was back. Our U6, U8 and U10 divisions wrapped up their season at the end of June. The Timbit Divisions (U6, U8 and U10) coaches were provided with a new APP from Softball Saskatchewan to aid in practice planning, scheduling and team attendance The U12, U14 and U16 teams played into late July. We had instructors from the 222s program. The turn out was great with all 3 time slots full and the players and parents who attended seemed very happy with the camp.

#### GRANTS AND FUNDRAISING - Laurie Colhoun

For the 2021 season we once again applied to Softball Saskatchewan for the Membership Assistance Program (MAP) Grant. The grant application was applied for to cover league costs and equipment replacement. This application is still pending approval from Softball Saskatchewan. Public acknowledgement of Softball Saskatchewan and Saskatchewan Lotteries is requested.

# Coach Coordinator- Submitted by Shona Elder

The 2021 softball season was once again hindered to some degree by Covid-19. The Division coordinators did a great job of finding a Head coach for each of the teams within all of the age divisions. In some divisions it was more difficult to fill those roles, but ultimately there were enough Head coaches and Assistant coaching staff.

We had planned to host a Competition Introduction clinic for Storm Softball coaches in conjunction with Softball Saskatchewan, but unfortunately it had to be cancelled due to gathering limits and Covid-19 restrictions. It was decided to try and offer the clinic in the Spring of 2022. There were 10 to 12 individuals interested in taking the course from our association. I felt this number was encouraging.

All coaching clinics offered through Softball Saskatchewan were cancelled for 2021, thus there was also a modification of the coaching certifications needed to attend Provincial softball championships. The 2022 Softball Saskatchewan coaching clinic dates have not been released at the time of this document. We do know that there is pressure on Softball Canada to have more content provided online to shorten the amount of in-person learning needed (ie from two full weekends to one full weekend). This should help to increase the number of coaches interested in taking the clinics with less in person time commitment.

Coaching evaluations were sent out for completion in late August as all teams had wrapped up their seasons by the third week of August. We used a new platform SoGoSurvey which was free and had no limit on the number of survey responses that could be collected. (we had used Survey Monkey in the past, but they introduced a fee structure that would have cost money based on the number of survey responses that we needed to collect). SoGoSurvey also allowed printing and sharing of the results for free which had a cost associated with it through Survey Monkey.

We had a record number of survey responses completed: 106

60 respondents in the U6 to U10 age groups and 46 respondents in the U12 to U16 (there were no respondents in the U19 age category).

All survey results were collected and distributed to the Head Coach from each team who was instructed to share the results with their assistant coaches. All results were also shared with Leigh.

# TREASURER – Submitted by Michelle Maystrowich

For the 2021 season Storm Softball ended the year with net income of \$17,653 which was \$13,385 ahead of the expected profit of \$4,268.

Revenue was \$3,535 above budget. Registration numbers returned to expected levels in 2021. Revenue from donations, the sale of Storm Softball hats and other branded items, and player development clinics were higher than expected.

Expenses were \$9,850 less than budget primarily due to lower than expected Regina Minor Softball League Fees.

During the year, Storm Softball received a \$3,700 donation from the Town of Balgonie to cover the cost of a storage shed.
