First I would like to thank the many athletes, coaches, officials, families, volunteers and countless members of Storm Softball that made 2025 an amazing year. The 2025 Season began planning in September 2024 with U15A, U13A and U11A ID Camps. These camps allowed us to determine approximately how many players interested in playing A and identified positional needs. A call for coaches went out and head coaches were identified in October in the U13A, U15A and U17A Divisions. U11 A coaches were chosen after the evaluation process. Registrations opened up December 11, 2024, closing on January 26, 2025.

Evaluations for the U13, U15 and U17 divisions were held at Yara Center, U11 evaluations took place at RBI, U19 tryouts were held at The Den. Pitcher/catcher evaluations only were held on separate nights at RBI. All athletes were evaluated by independent evaluators from 222's Fastpitch. These evaluations were run by volunteer board members and senior Storm Softball players. We also offered pre-evaluation skills camps prior to evaluations to allow for some prep. All teams were drafted by their division coordinators and coaches were identified. Head coaches for our U11 teams were identified after the U11 evaluations, all other coaches were identified once teams were drafted or formed by the division coordinators. Teams began practicing in the gym in April. Our U7 and U9 divisions wrapped up their season mid June. The U9 teams hosted the Clash of Cleats Tournament at the end of May. The U7's held their end of year Storm Showcase mid June. The U11, U13, U15, U17 and U19 teams played into mid July early August. Our Storm teams attended multiple tournaments throughout the season and the successes are highlighted below. Provincials were held for the U11, U13, U15, U17 and U19 divisions in July.

Our athletes, coaches and families continue to represent the Storm Softball Association with great pride. We are recognized as an association that builds great ball players, community leaders and amazing young ladies. We are looking forward to another exciting 2026 ball season!

REGISTRAR - Submitted by Lee Peters

This year had a total registration of 355 players which was up from 319 in 2024. The teams were separated as follows:

U7 – 68 total players made 6 teams (same as 2024)

U9 – 74 total players made 6 teams (up one team from 2024)

U11 – 72 total players made 2A and 4B teams (same as 2024)

U13 – 53 total players made 1A and 3B teams with a Provincial B team (same as 2024)

U15 – 51 total players made 1A and 3B team (up one B team from 2024)

U17 – 27 total players made 1A and 1B team (down one B team from 2024)

U19 – 14 total players – 1 team (new team this year)

This was our highest registration yet and we hope to see even higher registrations for 2026.

DIVISION REPORTS

U5/U7-Submitted by Wanda Pillipow

We had 6 teams this year with around 11-12 kids on each team. They did one practice and one game during the week, and 2 out of the 6 teams did go out to Odessa and join in on the tournament out there. The showcase tournament was a great success again this year. We didn't have any problems again this year with finding volunteers to work their shifts as the coaches let their teams know well before the tournament.

U9-Submitted by Nate Wilson

This season we had strong registration numbers in the U9 division again and were able to form 6 teams. We ended up having a few late registrations which made a few of the rosters a little larger than I would have liked. All teams competed against each other in league play along with a few teams from Lumsden.

Our U9 division once again hosted another successful Clash of The Cleats tournament in May. There were 12 teams competing with visiting teams coming from Weyburn, Odessa, Fort Qu'Appelle and Lumsden. The final came down to two Storm teams the Cyclones and Hurricanes, with the Cyclones coming out on top.

The feedback I received from the coaches was overall positive, here are a few of the concerns that coaches had:

- 1- Thought going out to Lumsden was unnecessary at the U9 level considering we had enough teams here. They are much slower at getting organized which means we must fit those games into an already tight schedule.
- 2- We NEED porta potties at the U9 softball tournament. There are not enough

facilities for that many girls/women.

3- A few of the teams were stronger than other with some teams being mostly second years and some being mostly first years. Not sure how we could get around this as most teams are formed from friend requests and there are no evaluations done before teams are formed.

All the teams competed hard and made great progress in their development. Thanks again to all our coaches and volunteers for making it another successful U9 softball season.

U11-Submitted by Reena Legien

We had 74 girls registered, 65 attended evaluations. We made 6 teams. 2 "A" teams and 4 "B" teams. Of our 4 "B" teams all the coaches were new to U11 and 3 out of the 4 were new to head coach positions, so it was a bit of a learning curve. Out of the 4 teams, we made 3 teams that attended provincials. One of our B teams had 11 1 st year players, 5 of which had never played ball before, so congrats to them overall. Our A teams competed at very different levels. Craig entered 4 tournaments plus and one day tournament in Lumsden while Jenn entered 3, both Regina tournaments, Moose Jaw and I believe they were in Lumsden as well. Blizzards placed 4 th in the league and Lightning were 9th out of 10 teams. In Provincials the Blizzards got Silver and the Lighting got 4 th .

Our B teams didn't place at Provincials.

Some notes and feedback I collected are:

- -Nobody likes working with or scheduling with RMSL
- -Everyone loves Shelley
- -Everyone wants more coaching development and player development especially in the areas of pitching and catching.
- -Strong suggestion to have tryouts for our B teams and only send one or two teams, but ideally just one. All the coaches struggled to have commitment.
- -Some coaches asked for more information shared about cages, gym space/times and diamond allotment to coaches. We had lots of new coaches, so I think it was just a lot of information at once. I think I needed to offer up some repeat information.
- "A" players/families on the Lightning team were disappointed with the division between softball and hockey and working around/accommodating hockey. The even noticed division among the team.

Which leads me to comment that when drafting the A teams, both coaches collaborated and agreed that one team wanted all the hockey players and other team preferred to not have any due to lack of commitment to softball during key tournament dates. My concern would be that both teams were not offered A experiences. I would say that could be measurable in different ways and are defined differently depending on the person. But I can say that even though all but one the hockey girls scored in the top 18 (to make 2 A teams), the team with the 6 hockey players did not compete at the same level as the other team with 13 committed softball players.

Personal reflection as a parent, coach and U11 coordinator is that players that commit to spring hockey until June 15 th should not be allowed to play A ball. It was argued by

one coach that the hockey players are the strongest athletes and shouldn't have to play

- 1. It's their commitment, not their talent that lands them in B
- 2. They proved to not be the stronger set of athletes
- 3. These players sign a contract with hockey to put all hockey practices and games ahead of other sports.

I know spring hockey didn't interfere with softball years ago, but that is no longer the case. They travel to US tournaments on multiple occasions.

As a parent my daughter didn't grow as a softball player at all this year and will have to work very hard over the winter to achieve a chance at U13A.

U13- Submitted by Jenn Soos

The U13 Division had a very successful enrollment with approximately 53 registered in this age group with enough girls to round out three "B" teams and one 'A' team.

Our A team represented the Storm association at the Regina, Saskatoon, Brandon, Lloydminster, and Moose Jaw Tournament. They also placed 4th overall at Provincials. Their league rounded out with 14 games played with 11 wins, 2 losses and 1 tie.

The U13 Division was fortunate to have three "B" teams.

We had a brand new coach Sheldon Thomas who coached the Storm Dust-devils. They rounded out her season with 13 games played and finished strong with 9 wins and 4 losses.

The Storm Heat was coached by Deanna Unser this year. Their season consisted of 13 games and they ended their season with 7 wins and 6 losses.

The Storm Surge was coached by Jerrod Mohr this year. They rounded their year out by playing 14 games, with 11 wins and 3 losses. Jerrod Mohr went on this year to coach the one provincial team we had this year. He held tryouts to select his team. The team did well and went all the way to finals but came up a tad bit short. They ended their season with a silver provincial medal.

Storm fielded 3 teams in the Regina B Division and 1 team in the Regina A Division.

The A team attended Nationals, with Storm fielding one team in B and C Provincials. 15A (12 players), H/C Kari GRIFFIN

Started season with an indoor exhibition game April 3rd against the Regina Saints in Moose Jaw. This was helpful to identify team needs early.

Attended several tournaments starting with the Regina Kickoff, The Presidents Tournament in Saskatoon, The Wheat City Classic in Brandon MB, the 222's Shootout in Melfort, and the Energy City Exposure showcase in Nickle Lake.

Attended Provincials in Regina, finished with a Bronze medal – earning a trip to attend the Canadian National Championship in Winkler MB.

Picked up two additional players for Nationals as it's a week-long tournament. Had a team goal to win 3 games. Exceeded expectations with an amazing 9 th place overall finish of 21 teams and some amazing memories.

Division Comments

Game scheduling meeting can be chaotic to start season, with a lots of changes afterward. Feels like an auction. (Shelly STAMM did a fantastic job scheduling this season for Storm).

Playoff format could be re-visited. Possibly have U11 and U15 teams play 1 weekend and U13 and U17's another weekend or look at a weekday format, this way you will have more umps and access to AP players.

We ended up having only 1 A team and 1 B team. It was a struggle in the beginning trying to get a head coach for the B team but in the end, Glen Brule stepped up after I was given him name and reached out. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to get enough interest in girls to put together a team for provincials. As for the A team, Kara Felske was the head coach. They had a good season with a lot of growth on the team. They competed in 5 tournaments and placed 3rd in provincials, peaking at the right moments. The team played well only losing to 1 team in provincials. They also qualified for nationals where they were able to compete and have some close great games in nationals. They ended up 16th overall in the country.

2025 was the first year Storm was able to field a U19A team. Tryouts were held beginning of January to accommodate players that would need to return to university after the Christmas break. Head coaches were Leigh Fuessel and Mike Bourque. We had 17 players attend tryouts

and the final roster was set at 14, which in ladies is a very reasonable number as many players have other commitments and jobs throughout the summer. The team played in division 1 of the Regina Ladies League and finished first in league play winning 11 and losing 4. The team finished 2nd at provincials earning them a spot to represent Saskatchewan at the Canadian Championship in Surrey BC. They had a decent showing and many games were close, it was a great experience for these players as they have been together since U10.

- Managed extra volunteers during the lunch rush.
- Menu: Hamburgers, hot dogs, chips, candy cups, chocolate bars, freezies, pop, granola bars, and Gatorade.

We did 45 minute shift to allow for more volunteers and less time commitment but it led to no one really knowing what to do as they never settled into the canteen. The coffee and hot water urns take way to long to get hot for the morning shift to serve coffee but that is when everyone wants it.

COACH DEVELOPER- Submitted by Pamela Kydd

Storm Softball registered 118 coaches total. As our association continues to grow every year we are thrilled to also see the number of willing and excited coaches join our association each season. We are getting more and more volunteers who are excited to have the opportunity to be a coach with us and less and less begging people to step up to coach.

- -Ramp website registration has now become a tool to make registration easier for affiliation every year. Next year we look to streamline the work needed as we collect registrations, as far as timing of opening up coaches ramp registration availability. And using google form to collect applications before we can open up ramp coach registration.
- -Every Coach provided us with the necessary credentials including Respect In Sport numbers, NCCP numbers and levels according to age group coached, recent within 2 years VSC. All applicants' information was checked and verified before the affiliation deadline.
- -I am very happy to report that all Coaches who I reached out to, to complete their required clinics and online courses, did put in the effort and got it done. This shows the passion and commitment in our volunteers.
- -Head Coach's information was provided to Softball SK for the purpose of gaining them access to the coaching resource app that supported them with practice plans, drills etc.

- -All team head coach applicants and past feedback on them was reviewed, and due to being qualified and ideal volunteers for the positions they were awarded their teams. We had some struggles filling a few needed Head Coach positions and were grateful for the people who stepped up who had never done it before.
- -Coaches who needed to obtain coaching clinics for their provincial coach requirements were given that information very early and many times throughout the spring. We were able to have all age divisions with a coach who qualified to coach in their provincials again this year. We were very excited to have three U15B teams with qualified coaches attend provincials and one U17B team as none did last season.
- -We held a pre-season meeting for all Head coaches of all teams to attend. We handed out printouts of the coaching information document as well as emailed it to all coaches. This meeting was led by Pam Kydd and Shelley Stamm. Coaches had a chance to ask questions and give some discussion about plans and how to make the most of their season. I feel that this document was extremely thorough and provided all coaches with somewhere to turn first to remind themselves of the answers that they need. They were of course encouraged to reach out to myself or their division coordinators for anything they might need as well.
- -Will continue with the non- anonymous approach to acquiring Coach feedback. This will come through first hand accounts and Division coordinators as they receive it. Both positive and challenging feedback was received on some of our coaches and will be addressed with those coaches as they apply for future coaching positions.
- -Any post season coach development opportunities have been re-posted/promoted and sent out to our membership to help promote earlier preparation for our coaches gaining their requirements.
- -The goal of Coach Developer continues to be: to successfully provide channels of communication between our coaches and our board members, and provide easily accessible answers somewhere for the coaches who are either experienced or brand new to feel equally supported by myself and Storm Softball.
- We had the exciting opportunity to include a new coach development course for our coaches to take part in this season. We were approached by the Lincoln's life matters foundation to offer our volunteer coaches the Connect Mental Health Training course online for free to our coaches. We are very grateful to Rick West and the west family for offering this to our volunteers. Many of our coaches took part and we are very proud of that. We continue to look forward to opportunities for growth that this foundation makes us aware of and invites us to. It showed the commitment of our volunteer coaches to be very high as many of them took part in this online course. We shared the invite for an in person seminar in Balgonie taking place in December and really hope our coaches willingly dive into this very important topic.

Preplanning for 2026 season:

- -U13A Head coach has been selected.
- -U15A Head Coach has been selected.
- -U17A Head Coach has been selected.

- -Plans are to continue to receive coach feedback from division coordinators as they receive it and from first hand non anonymous accounts. And address those with coaches as needed.
- -Focus on continuing the support and backing for our volunteer coaches as they work through their seasons with our wonderful athletes.
- -I am truly excited for another new season moving forward while always learning and doing our best for the kids in our community playing Softball. We are very proud of what we built so far with Storm Softball and hope to see more kids fall in love with the game.

UMPIRE COORDINATOR/ DEVELOPER- Submitted by Audra Hill

The 2025 softball season was a success for our umpire group. A total of 58 games were booked and covered through the Ramp system between May 6 and July 8, 2025, which was consistent with the 2024 season. Our officials showed great commitment and professionalism throughout the year, contributing to a smooth and positive softball season.

Umpire Clinic

An Umpire Clinic was held on April 27, 2025, at Pilot Butte Elementary School, with 20 umpires in attendance — a mix of new and returning officials from our region, as well as a few from Vibank, Fort Qu'Appelle, and Regina. Of these participants, 4 were new umpires, compared to 15 new umpires in 2024, showing a strong retention rate and greater continuity within our officiating group.

Mentorship and Development

This season emphasized mentorship and learning. Newer umpires were often paired with returning officials to promote skill development and confidence. Coaches were informed when newer umpires were scheduled for their games, and communication between teams helped ensure supportive mentorship and sportsmanship.

There were only two follow-up calls during the season regarding umpire treatment or responsibilities, both of which were resolved professionally and constructively. Senior Umpire Availability

For U15 and U17 games, senior umpire availability remained limited due to player commitments. However, Brody Schneider was consistently available and covered most games. We successfully staffed two umpires for all but two games throughout the season. Coaches expressed appreciation for the reliability and professionalism of the officials provided. Near the end of the season, there was growing interest from adult volunteers considering becoming umpires — including parents interested in officiating games alongside their children. This is an exciting opportunity for growth in 2026, and greater promotion of this initiative will help

address shortages in U15 and U17 coverage.

Looking Ahead to 2026

Our goals for next season include:

Increasing the number of qualified umpires, particularly for older age divisions.

Encouraging adult participation and family involvement.

Continuing to pair new and experienced umpires for mentorship.
