#### PRESIDENT REPORT

FINANCE REPORT

The Executive Director provides monthly financial reports to the Board of Directors to ensure they

have detailed, timely, and accurate financial information. The Board of Directors prepares the annual

budget in January for the upcoming fiscal year and uses its best judgement to anticipate revenues and

expenses. The overall operating budget for the 2019-20 fiscal year was approximately \$1.6 million.

Booke & Partner were appointed as the Association's auditors for the 2019-2020 fiscal year at the 2019

WYSA Annual General Meeting. Upon conclusion of the 2019-30 fiscal year, the Executive Director

engaged with Booke & Partner to facilitate the year end audit providing them with registration data,

invoices, and other documents for testing. The statements have been included in this annual report

package. The association ended the fiscal year with a surplus of approximately \$32,000, however, due

to the end of the 2019-20 indoor season being cancelled, participating clubs received a credit for

unused facility and referee fees, which amounted to approximately \$30,000. In essence, had we been

able to finish the 2019-2020 indoor season, we would have been near breakeven.

Below is a percentage breakdown of our notable revenues and expenses:

#### **Independent Auditors' Report**

To the Members of Winnipeg Youth Soccer Association Inc.

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Winnipeg Youth Soccer Association Inc. (the "Association"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2020, and the statements of financial activities, net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at March 31, 2020, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

#### **Independent Auditors' Report - continued**

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
  fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
  evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
  detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
  as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override
  of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
  procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
  opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditors' report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

#### 1. Nature of the organization

Winnipeg Youth Soccer Association Inc. (the "Association") exists to promote and develop youth soccer in Winnipeg. The Association is a not-for-profit corporation pursuant to The Corporations Act (Manitoba) and is tax exempt under the Income Tax Act.

#### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies

The Association follows Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations in preparing its financial statements. The significant accounting policies used are as follows:

#### a) Revenue recognition

Grants and sponsorship revenue received generally pertain to programs which run in the same year and, as such, are recorded as revenues when received and collectability is reasonably assured.

Registration and referee fee revenues are recognized in the year to which they relate.

Tournament fees are recorded as revenue when collectability is reasonably assured and the event has occurred.

#### b) Amortization

Amortization is provided at rates designed to write off property and equipment over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Goal posts

Computer equipment

Furniture and fixtures

Leasehold improvements

10 years straight line
5 years straight line
Cover the term of the lease

#### c) Accounting estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reported period. These estimates are reviewed periodically and are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

#### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### d) Financial instruments

The Association recognizes its financial instruments when the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. Financial instruments are initially recorded at fair value with subsequent reporting at amortized cost.

It is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest, liquidity, market or other price risk.

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Association is exposed to less than significant credit risk.

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in foreign currency rates. The Association is not exposed to currency risk as all transactions occur in Canadian currency.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is not exposed to interest rate risk as the Association has no external debt.

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Association has maintained positive working capital that minimizes its exposure to liquidity risk.

Market risk and other price risk are the risks that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market prices. The Association is not exposed to market risk as it has no material assets exposed to market fluctuations.

Management believes these risks are manageable and do not represent a threat to the Association's ability to continue as a going concern.

#### 9. COVID-19

On March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared coronavirus COVID-19 a global pandemic. This contagious disease outbreak which has continued to spread, and the related adverse impact it has had on public health developments, has adversely affected workforces, economies, and financial markets globally, potentially leading to an economic downturn.

The Association temporarily ceased operations, due to indoor and outdoor recreational facility closures in the City of Winnipeg as a result of the pandemic. During this period, cash inflows from registration ceased. Due to the uncertainty as to the outcome of the pandemic, and in particular, when indoor and outdoor recreational facilities will be fully re-opened to the public, an estimate of impairment of financial assets and credit losses cannot be determined, and consequently, no provision for loss has been provided for in these financial statements. It is management's assessment that the going concern assumption continues to be appropriate for the foreseeable future of the Association.

#### 10. Commitment

The Association entered into a sublease agreement subsequent to year end on office space located at 211 Chancellor Matheson Drive. The sublease is for a period of 10 years expiring August 31, 2030, with two 5-year renewal options. The lease requires the Association to make monthly payments of \$675 commencing September 1, 2021, subject to annual inflation for years 3 to 10 at the discretion of the Association in accordance with the unadjusted Consumer Price Index for the City of Winnipeg.



#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT**

The 2019 – 2020 fiscal year started off normal, however, it ended in a way that nobody could have predicted. Firstly, the WYSA Board of Directors, with overwhelming approval from its district representatives, approved the removal of registration boundaries for developmental and premier soccer at the February 2020 general meeting. This significant shift was a step in the direction of inclusivity thereby allows for other organizations to apply for membership to compete in those divisions. Secondly, the COVID-19 global pandemic which forced us to stop soccer operations on March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2020 came next. Even at the time of this report in November 2020, the COVID-19 global pandemic continues to negatively affect soccer here in Manitoba and across the country. Prior to the pandemic, we continued to improve our operations efficiencies in league management and jamboree events, while continuing to grow our tournament participation and the indoor high school league.

The 2019 – 2020 fiscal year also introduced the Manitoba Soccer (MSA) requirement for all youth clubs to become licensed Quality Soccer Providers (QSP). The QSP is a form of Club Licensing coming down from Canada Soccer (CSA) which is adapted to each province and sets a minimum standard of delivering a sanctioned soccer program. There are four levels of Club Licensing which all emphasize safe sport policies/screening, developmentally appropriateness, accessibility, inclusivity, and membership expectations. Currently, Manitoba has licensed 17 QSP clubs out of the 49 in all of Canada. Currently, WYSA has 13 QSP licensed clubs participating in its programs, and for the first time in its history has accepted academies to participate in the developmental and premier streams.

The Association is fortunate to have many dedicated and passionate leaders at many levels of youth soccer who are constantly making efforts to improve the soccer programs here in Winnipeg. I would sincerely like to thank them for their efforts and contributions to the Association, and especially, our Board of Directors who have committed a considerable amount of time to helping move the Association forward. We're continuing to make a concerted effort in communicating regularly with our members, through our website, social media platforms, email, and have included some statistics in the





communications report. We will aim to have current and relevant content, as well, continuously look to improve our communication methods based on traditional and innovative opportunities.

We are extremely lucky to work with these sponsors and we hope to continue doing so for many years to come.

#### **2019 OUTDOOR LEAGUE SEASON**

In 2019 we continued to fine tune our scheduling processes of implementing and sticking to a single day of play for all developmental league and premier league teams, meaning they played on the same day of the week (1 match per week). We have also made strides with recreational scheduling in



working with many of our convenors and teams to avoid school conflicts. Across all leagues administered by WYSA for the 2019 outdoor season (U13-U18 Recreational, U9-U12 Developmental and U13-U17 Premier) we scheduled a total of 2,538 league matches and 293 jamboree matches. We had a total of 508 teams registered for the 2019 outdoor season; 351 in the

U9-U18 Recreation Leagues; 93 in the U9 – U12 Developmental Leagues; and 64 in the U13-U17 Premier 1 & 2 Leagues. Congratulations to all our League and Cambrian Challenge Cup Champions who are listed in the Director of Outdoor report.

The 2019 outdoor season marked the fifth year in which all U9 – U12 participated in the Long-Term Player Development (LTPD) framework. The long-term player development model was developed to give players more touches on the ball, deemphasize scores and standings, and focus on coach education at the grassroots levels. With smaller sided games, more touches for each player, and less of an emphasis on winning and losing, we are confident over the long term, players and coaches will be better developed and enjoy the sport more, which will ultimately strengthen our game. This year we







implemented the "Retreat Line" for all U9 & U10 divisions as a tool to assists with the development of players, technically and as a team, tactically. The Retreat Line has been introduced around the country to allow younger players to learn and gain confidence in how to play the ball out from the back and forward to attack.

In 2013, in order to adapt to the smaller sided games and fields, WYSA purchased 75 pairs of 6'x16' sized goals which were distributed amongst the 5 Districts to U9 & U10 fields. At the time, WYSA paid



approximately \$50,000 from its reserves and received a \$100,000 loan from the Winnipeg Soccer Federation (WSF) to purchase the nets. In 2018, we began discussions with the WSF to have the balance of the loan forgiven at the end of the 2018-19 fiscal year and to their credit, they agreed to forgive approximately \$25,000. We'd like to thank the WSF for their support in providing the funds and for their donation to WYSA.

At the end of the U9 – U12 recreational and developmental outdoor seasons, WYSA again

organized the season finale jamborees. The jamborees included 2-3 matches for every team, a free team photo at our photo booth station, food, and activities for each team such as the shot speed and shot accuracy stations. I would also like to personally thank the Board and Staff of Winnipeg South End United for their tremendous support and efforts in making the 2019 jamborees successful. We could not have done it without you!

We must also recognize our MSA Provincial Championship teams that went on to represent Manitoba at the Canada Soccer National Club Championship. Heading into the final day, our U15B Bonivital SC squad had a chance for bronze but fell to 4-0 to Quebec (CS St. Laurent) thus finishing in 4<sup>th</sup> place. Our U15G Bonivital SC and U17G FC Northwest both placed 7<sup>th</sup>, and the U17B Bonivital SC squad finished in 5<sup>th</sup> place.







#### **2019 BOSTON PIZZA PLAYERS TOURNAMENT**

In 2015, the WYSA Board of Directors voted to create a player subsidy fund to help address the shrinking subsidy funds available to youth soccer players and their families. This meant switching the recipient of our annual summer tournament proceeds from the Children's Hospital Foundation of Manitoba to a newly created player's subsidy fund. Over the 23 years, WYSA contributed more than \$300,000 to the Children's Hospital Foundation, which is due to the tremendous support of our soccer community.

In partnership with Boston Pizza, we were able to raise another \$10,000 from the tournament and a



total of \$53,000 over the last 5 years. Those funds are used to help support local soccer players and we are confident that the player subsidy fund will leave its own amazing legacy as interest and participation in the tournament seems to get stronger each year.

The 2019 tournament was a tremendous success with 168

teams participating, in 25 divisions for a total of 288 matches and 72 referees over the 5 days.

Congratulations to all the teams that participated and continue to support our subsidy fund. We must also congratulate and thank all our volunteers and referees who help make the tournament such a great success.

#### **2019 WYSA 3v3 TOURNAMENT**



The 3v3 Tournament was introduced in 2015 and we continue to have significant participation with 89 teams competing in 18 divisions this past year. The one-day tournament guaranteed 3 round robin matches for each team and finals for those that advance. We had a total of 157 matches throughout the day and 48 different referees to help execute the event!





#### 2019 MOBILE MINI SOCCER PROGRAM

In 2015 WYSA took over the administration and operation of the Mobile Mini Soccer Program from the St. Charles Soccer Association. We continued to build on the program which offers a one-hour drop-in session which teaches children the fundamental skills of soccer at 4 different inner-city schools through May and June. New this year, our district clubs selected one week with one school to deliver their mobile mini soccer program. Each club selected their own coach coordinator for the 4 sessions they were assigned aided with volunteer teams to help with run each session.

Each club did a tremendous job with the programming and the feedback from the schools and participants has been very positive. Below is a recap of the dates and locations of the program.

May 13<sup>th</sup> to May 16<sup>th</sup> – Weston School – FC Northwest – 197 total participants (3 sessions)

May 21<sup>st</sup> to May 23<sup>rd</sup> – Fort Rouge School – Winnipeg South End United – 89 total participants (3 sessions)

May 27<sup>th</sup> to May 30<sup>th</sup> – Greenway School – St. Charles Soccer Association – 385 total participants (4 sessions)

June 3<sup>rd</sup> to June 6<sup>th</sup> – River Elm School – Winnipeg Phoenix FC – 191 total participants (3 sessions)

June 10<sup>th</sup> to June 13<sup>th</sup> – Brooklands School – Bonivital SC – 225 total participants (4 sessions)

In total, we had 1,087 participants which is up from 357 from last year. Over the 5 years of the



program, we have had 3,900 participants. Speaking with the parents attending, as well as the school representatives, the majority loved the fact that this program was being offered and were very grateful for the chance to play soccer and learn from our premier players. Of the two new schools, Greenway was an instant hit. We had tons of kids attending and the teacher coordinator did a fantastic job recruiting kids out. This participation rate in these areas has always been strong, however, many parents also seemed unfamiliar with WYSA, or any

organized youth soccer leagues in their area. If we could collaborate with local community clubs to have them come to maybe 1-2 sessions a week to be available to answer questions parents may have about where to sign up for soccer as that was a common theme.







#### 2019 - 2020 INDOOR LEAGUE SEASON

The 2019-2020 indoor season kicked off on Saturday, October 19<sup>th</sup> at our traditional playing venues of the WSF Soccer North, WSF Subway Soccer South, and the University of Winnipeg RecPlex. The WSF



facilities hosted both half-field and quarter-field matches, while the U of W RecPlex is only be able to accommodate quarter-field matches. We played on Thursdays (both genders), Saturdays (female only), and Sundays (male only) throughout the season until March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2020 when were forced to shut down due to the COVID-19 global pandemic. Unfortunately, due to the

global pandemic, we were not able to award our Cambrian Challenge Cup Champions, however, we have recognized all of the League Champions in the Director of Indoor report. We had a total of 228 teams registered, 114 in the U9-U18 Recreation Leagues, 70 in the U9-U12 Developmental Leagues, and 44 in the U13-U17 Premier 1 & 2 Leagues. As we moved to half field play, our number of teams have slightly decreased due to teams playing 9v9 and carrying a higher roster number. WYSA is the league administrator for all leagues during the indoor season (U9-U18 Recreational, U9-U12 Developmental and U13-U17 Premier) we scheduled a total of 2,247 league matches. Thank you to all our indoor soccer convenors, staff, and volunteers who help get teams registered and ready for play each season. As well, congratulations to all our League and Cambrian Challenge Cup Champions who are listed in the Director of Indoor report.

#### 2019 – 2020 INDOOR HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE

Our indoor high school soccer league continues to grow, this past year reaching a total of 39 teams (20 male and 19 female), which plays October to March. Over the past 6 seasons this program has grown in popularity and with the new WSF Soccer North facility being built, the league grown from 12 teams in 2015 to 39 in 2019. As we did last season, upon conclusion of the league season the top teams from the Championship division were promoted to the Premiership and the bottom teams from the Premiership were relegated to the Championship division for the Challenge Cup. The feedback has







been fantastic with regards to scheduling, home/away matches, and the new league structure of the promotion and relegation. Congratulations to the League and Playoff Champions listed in the Director of Indoor report.

#### **2020 GOLDEN BOY TOURNAMENT**

The Golden Boy Tournament has been our most successful indoor tournament since WYSA began indoor programming and the 2020 edition was no different. The tournament was held February 13<sup>th</sup> – 17<sup>th</sup> at the WSF Soccer North and South, and the University of Winnipeg RecPlex. We had a record number of 50 out-of-town teams register for the tournament, up 14 from the previous year, with a 176 total teams (102 quarter-field & 74 half-field teams) across 30 divisions. The 50 out-of-town teams represent rural Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario, and North Dakota for a total of 300 matches over the 5 days!

We received many compliments regarding the event, such as the on-site athletic therapists, LOC communication, individual team packages, 50/50 and raffle opportunities, the overall website design,



and how timely the results were posted. This year, we went digital with our 50/50 and raffle which turned out to be cost effective and efficient, which resulted in more sales than ever before. Merchandise continues to be a big hit and was available at all the playing venues and by the final day we had sold out of everything! Canteens were available at all tournament locations for the duration of the event. We had custom

medals made for this tournament that were a huge hit with the participants and will continue to use those medals in the years to come.

An evaluation survey was sent out to all team officials that participated in the tournament once the event was over asking for feedback on the event and what we can do to improve in the upcoming







years. Of note, the feedback from the tournament survey was that nearly 90% of respondents would participate in this tournament again and would recommend it to other teams.

In closing, I would like to sincerely thank the WYSA Staff, Cheryl Ginter, Scott Dixon, and Adam DeJonckheere for their efforts and dedication over the past year. I would also like to thank our Board of Directors for their continued efforts to help build and grow the beautiful game here in Winnipeg. WYSA is committed to providing quality soccer programs and services that are accessible and affordable as the power of sport reaches far beyond the soccer pitch.



#### DIRECTOR OF OUTDOOR REPORT

My fourth year as Director of Outdoor with WYSA has been a great building experience. We continue to grow as an Association as we attempt to provide a better soccer experience for youth within the community.

First, I would like to highlight all the hard work and dedication that so many in Manitoba give to improve and grow soccer in this Province. From coaches, players, referees, district representatives, WYSA Staff and WYSA Board Members, there are a tremendous amount of people in Manitoba that go to great extents to ensure the continued improvement of soccer.

For our Boston Pizza Players Tournament in 2019, we had a total of 168 teams participate and



scheduled a total of 288 matches. The WYSA 3v3 tournament in August saw a decrease in teams 89 from 111 teams in 2018, however, our maximum capacity was 90 teams due to daylight considerations (2018 was host at IG Field where there are lights). These two tournaments are becoming highlights of the summer for many kids as we are excited to see the continual growth in our tournament participation numbers.




